### UMPI's Wind Turbine Spins

A 600 kW wind turbine began spinning at the University of Maine at Presque Isle in May, providing a green energy resource for the campus's electricity needs and helping the University in its efforts to reduce its carbon footprint.

The turbine – the very first midsize wind turbine to be installed on a University campus in the State of Maine – was officially commissioned on May 14 during a midday ceremony that included both addresses from top state officials and a unique ribbon cutting at the turbine site that featured a Native American drumming song and the release of environmentally-friendly balloons.

During the first half of the event, held inside the University's Campus Center, remarks were delivered by UMPI President Don Zillman; Sumul Shah, President of Lumus Construction, Inc.; Commissioner Vendean Vafiades of the Maine Public Utilities Commission; University of Maine System Chancellor Richard Pattenaude; representatives speaking on behalf of Maine's Congressional Delegation; and Presque Isle City Manager Tom Stevens.

The celebration moved outside to the wind turbine site — located near the athletic fields at the southern end of campus — during the second half of the event. In addition to the release of environmentally-friendly, dove-shaped, paper balloons (similar balloons were released during the 1998 Winter Olympics in Nagano, Japan), the University celebrated the ceremonial commissioning with the release of more than 100 small, paper mementos from the top of the 65-meter turbine tower as a remembrance of the historic day. Wind-themed refreshments and videos showcasing UMPI's wind turbine installation were available inside the Campus Center following the ceremony.

The Wind Turbine Commissioning Ceremony was held just two years after University officials announced their intentions to move forward on installing a wind turbine on campus.

"What a remarkable adventure we have been on in the past few years as we've worked to make this wind turbine a reality," President Zillman said during the ceremony. "We are so pleased to see this moment finally arrive and gratefully acknowledge that our wind turbine would not be standing here without the hard work and contributions of so many individuals. We intend to acknowledge those efforts in the years to come by sharing our experiences with those who would like to explore wind power options of their own."

The University's wind turbine is expected to produce about 1 million kilowatt-hours of electricity per year and save the institution more than \$100,000 annually in electricity charges. The \$2 million project is expected to save an estimated 572 tons of carbon dioxide from being released into the atmosphere each year, or the equivalent of removing 123 cars from the road. Wind turbine measurements taken over the next year will help to clarify those numbers.

The University set forth on this project for several reasons: a serious campus commitment to renewable energy and reduction of carbon fuel use and global warming; a desire to serve the community as a pioneer in projects that others might want to pursue themselves; a desire to increase the educational programs both for UMPI students and for students around the state; and a desire to reduce its \$375,000 annual electric bill, which is only expected to go higher over the next two decades.

Officials promised to make the wind turbine project very public and show all sides of completing an alternative energy project, both the value and cost-effectiveness of harnessing natural resources for clean electricity as well as any problems encountered along the way.

## Caroline D. Gentile's Legacy

The University of Maine at Presque Isle has received the largest aift ever given to an educational institution in The County's history.

Officials with the University of Maine at Presque Isle and its Foundation Board announced in May that through gifts and the estate of the late Caroline D. Gentile, the University's longest serving faculty member, UMPI received a legacy gift of more than \$1 million.

Gentile, known to many as Miss Gentile, dedicated herself in many ways to the institution over the course of her 56-year teaching career and gave more than \$500,000 several years ago to help build the wellness center that now bears her name. Including the legacy gift that she bequeathed to the campus, her gift to the University totals approximately \$1.1 million.

UMPI President Don Zillman and Shaw, President University's Foundation Board, announced the details of the legacy gift during a press conference held in the Caroline D. Gentile Health and Physical Education Building.

"We take immense pleasure in announcing this legacy gift and what it means to the institution," President Don Zillman said. "The remarkable aspect of this gift is that - in addition to the human legacy that Caroline Gentile left over 58 years of teaching, mentoring and program building of Physical Education and Recreation throughout the state - she has also left this remarkable financial legacy."

During the press conference, Shaw the possibilities discussed Foundation Board is considering in how to utilize Miss Gentile's gift, including scholarships, distinguished lecturers, recreation and physical education-related activities, and improvements to Gentile Hall.

"The income generated from this gift is going to allow the University to spend more than \$25,000 per year on items that will continue to promote the work that Caroline Gentile spent her whole life doing," Shaw said. "It's inspiring to see her legacy continue and to think that 20 to 30 years from now, these initiatives will still be moving forward and her name is still going to be tied so closely to the principles in which she so strongly believed."

Charles Bonin, Vice President for Administration and Finance, and Dick Gardiner, Director of Gentile Hall, provided details on green initiatives and other immediate changes that will be able to happen because of the legacy gift, how it will help to preserve Miss Gentile's building, and what the

> moting health and physical education in The County. Bonin mentioned that one item officials anticipate purchasing is a pool cover for the Gentile Hall pool that save up to \$16,000 annually in energy costs. He said



Miss Gentile served the University for 59 years. She was hired in 1946 by Dr. Clifford O.T. Wieden to teach at the then Aroostook State Normal School, and build its Health, Physical Education and Recreation program (HPER). Through her extraordinary long range planning abilities and her more than a half-century as a classroom teacher, she created a physical education program that has served The County, the State, and the regions beyond. Over the years, the program has gained a reputation for excellence around New England. For more than 50 years, she orchestrated commencement every year, paying strict attention to protocol and tradition. She taught thousands of students, served on hundreds of committees, and influenced many a faculty member.

In March of 2000, Miss Gentile was inducted into the Eleventh Maine Women's Hall of Fame. In 2003, she was inducted into the Maine Sports Legends Hall of Honors. In November MAHPERD 2006, Maine Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dancel honored Miss Gentile with its top distinction: the Highest Praise Award. \*







## UMPI Owls featured in The New York Times

#### FOR MANY YEARS,

members of the UMPI Men's Baseball team have had to hit the road for every single game they've played. It hasn't always been easy, but it's something they've been willing to do in order to play the game they love.

That dedication caught the attention of New York Times sports reporter Bill Pennington, who wrote a moving story about UMPI's "road warriors" that appeared on the front page of the Sunday Sports section on March 1, 2009. Pennington's story, On the Road Again, followed the UMPI Owls Baseball team - this year there were 16 players, two coaches, one manager - on their February road trip to Virginia to play games against Ferrum College, Lynchburg College, Roanoke College, Shenandoah University, Averett University and Southern Virginia University.

After the story ran, Coach Saucier, the team, Athletic Director Bill Casavant and other UMPI officials began receiving emails from people across the country who wrote to say how moved they were by Pennington's article. Some sent donations to support the

team; others asked how they could purchase team gear. "Go Owls!" was a recurring statement in those letters.

The story also sparked the interest of media outlets from New York City to Phoenix, Arizona. So far, Coach Saucier has spoken with radio stations in Phoenix, in Dallas, Texas, and in Charlottesville, Virginia. The Owls and The New York Times story garnered a mention on Sports Illustrated online. On March 20, Coach Saucier, the entire team, and even the Owls Athletics bus appeared on the ESPN show "First Take." On April 11, a feature story on the team appeared on the New York City-based YES Network, the most-watched regional sports network in the country. According to its website, the network is available in New York, Connecticut, New Jersey and Pennsylvania on cable and is also available nationally on DirecTV.

Coach Saucier said the story's producer spent time in Presque Isle with team members prior to their trip to NYC and met them again when they played Lehman College in the Bronx. The story was aired after the New

York Yankees' post-game report on the sports show "Sports Life New York City."

It's the kind of attention the team never dreamed of. But how did a story about a baseball team in Presque Isle, Maine, get into The New York Times in the first place? Bill Pennington explained by email that he was "slightly familiar" with the region because some of his wife's relatives are from the general area (they're spread from Québec to Fort Kent to Moncton), but he did not know that Presque Isle had a ball team. Pennington said he had been working "on and off" on a series of stories about people in college athletics who play for the love of the game.

"About a month ago [in February], I was thinking about people who endure various hardships but who do so willingly to play. I was thinking of various obstacles, be they cultural, economic, and then, geographic. And when it came to geography, one of the first places I thought of was Northern Maine," he wrote.

After checking out the UMPI team's baseball schedule and

learning about some of the situations the team routinely faces (such as playing four games in one day), Pennington said he was struck by the fact that no one ever seemed to complain.

"I was also amazed that no one had written much about a situation I knew was fascinating and engaging. So I figured I better get to know this team," he wrote.

The story has meant a lot to the UMPI Owls. The article mentioned that the team never has fans cheering them on because they're hundreds of miles from home. Coach Saucier said several people have called to say they'll be at upcoming games, inspired by this team with so much heart. The article pointed out that the team ended its road trip to Virginia winless but in good spirits. Since then, the Owls completed another road trip, this time to New York and Massachusetts, and came away with four wins. Perhaps the words of encouragement from people across the country played some part in helping the team to clinch those games.

It's going to be quite a season to remember. Go Owls! \*

assess the restoration needed and have engineered the secure installation of "Don & Charlie," [the IT Men] on the west end of Pullen Hall. A helpful crew of UMPI Facilities employees (including Dave, Richard, Joe B., Joe M. and Phil) have reconstructed and refurbished these giants under the guidance of Professor Giles. The intent of their installation is the broader aspect of what they represent beyond the rock spectacle: the illumination of higher education, for example, or the role aviation has played in the history of Presque Isle, Limestone and Aroostook County, Maine. They also bring recognition to our Fine Art program on campus.

The Reed Fine Art Gallery at the University of Maine at Presque Isle will be hosting a retrospective, highlighting the three enormous Phish Festivals that were held at the former Loring Air Force base in Limestone, Maine in 1997, 1998 and 2003. With the current reunion of the Phish band, which is generating sell-out venues across the nation, we thought it appropriate to recall some of the fond memories of the three remarkable concerts held in northern Maine. Each of these concerts resulted in remote Limestone becoming the 'largest city' in the State; there have been estimates that when added together the attendance for the three shows was approximately 200,000 fans and generated in excess of \$25 million in revenue.

THE GREAT WENT, LEMONWHEEL and IT will be fondly remembered by legions of fans who enjoyed the concerts as well as the hospitality of our Aroostook County people. Each of these festivals was a multi-layered creative extravaganza, reminiscent of famed creative theorist John Cage's ideas about the sharing of communal creative energy, in what he called "happenings." The creative phenomenon that was generated by the Phish organization was recognized by national and international media outlets. Rolling Stone magazine had a feature article about the IT Festival which remarked, "On August 2nd and 3rd, more than 60,000 Phish fans witnessed the end of Phish's summer tour – and one of the most bizarre rock spectacles ever seen."

With a careful sense of documentation, Professor Andy Giles is able to supply the gallery and present a broad spectrum of artifacts and photographs that Giles has been actively collecting since 1997. The exhibition will include an extensive collection of relics, memorabilia, posters, and art works from the three shows which will be featured in the Reed Fine Art Gallery in the Campus Center at the University of Maine at Presque Isle October 4 through November 21. An opening reception is being planned for Sunday, October 4, 2009.

There will be other events, lectures, forums, gallery talks, etc. surrounding the Phish Festivals during the weeks between Homecoming and the close of the Retrospective Exhibition. WUPI radio will also host guest Phish commentators and perhaps broadcast a Jam or two. UMPI will have an interactive website for Phans to record some of their memories and to show images of The Great Went, Lemonwheel and IT Festivals. Keep checking the website for date, time and place updates as they become available. \*

Dear Alums and Friends, As our May Graduation

neared, I reflected on what an extraordinary year this has been for UMPI. I stopped my

list of major accomplishments at 15 knowing that I was missing many.

We measured many of them by the statewide, regional, and national news coverage they received: two New York Times major articles on our men's baseball team — the road warriors; Boston TV coverage of the Andy Warhol photos; the Bangor Daily News lead editorial on our Retrospective Week of 1968, including the marvelous visit of journalist Richard Dudman; continuing recognition of the Maine Solar System model in various travel magazines; and the wind power venture described on Maine Public Broadcasting, the state's commercial channels, and in the major newspapers. Quite a year!

At the same time, we have been working our way through the worst economic year that most of us can remember. The impact on the University of Maine System has been considerable. But, when similar anguish comes from Harvard, Bowdoin, Colby and the like, we know we are not alone.

The University of Maine System has taken action to address both the needs of the state for more higher education and the realities that there won't be enough legislative dollars to pay for what we offer now. I would encourage all of you to follow the discussions (they have been well covered in the state-wide media and the University of Maine System website) and to offer your perspectives in the opportunities for public comment.
