

Prior to this good news, the College's deregulated status has already been extended with the memorandum from the CHED chairman, Emmanuel Angeles dated 22 January 2009 on the "Extension of the Autonomous and Deregulated Status Granted to Private Higher Education Institution by Virtue of CMO No. 21 s. 2003, CMO No 21, s. 2004, and CMO No. 59 s. 2007 until April 30, 2009."

Being one of the institutions granted the award under CMO 20, 21, s. 2003, the College had reapplied for its retention even before the grant expired in October 2008.






