This year over \$9,000.00 will be awarded to Scranton School District students from the profits of last year's golf tournament.



Message from the Superintendent

How's Your Eyesight?

f course it's important to make sure that your vision is checked regularly – and that your children are also seen by an eye care professional – in order to make certain that you protect your valuable sense of sight. But, the physical process of light refraction and visual acuity is not really what my comments at the conclusion of this academic year are (pardon the pun!) "focused" on!

As the end of another successful year comes to a close in the Scranton School District, I hope that every one of us parent, teacher and administrator-recognizes that when we look at children, we need to be looking through more than the single lens of academic proficiency and performance on tests and class examinations. Tests and course grades allow us to see one level of our children's progress from childhood to adulthood-but there is more to evaluating and appreciating kids than that. And, every parent knows that while an "A" on a report card is a marvelous thing for a child to bring home, it is no less touching and meaningful than a fistful of daisies picked from a field and presented to Mom ... "just because I love you" is!

For a moment, I want to focus the lens of acknowledgement and appreciation on the kind of achievements that the students (and staff) of the Scranton School District have accomplished this year in arenas other than academics or sports.

This year has seen our students perform amazing feats of service to others – both locally, regionally, nationally and internationally. The service and connected service-learning that is part of the philosophical foundation of the Scranton School District reverberate thru the way we teach and encourage all children. We believe, as Martin Luther King Jr observed, that "service to others is the rent we pay for living." In the Scranton School District, note these representative accomplishments:

- Students raised over \$20 thousand dollars for aid to the victims of the Haitian earthquake
- Students (and staff) increased their level of giving to the Lackawanna County United Way sufficient to earn recognition from the organization
- Students raised over \$3700 to support the American Cancer Society

- Assistance in area charity events (from food collections at the holiday season to assistance in the annual Steamtown Marathon that benefits St. Joseph's Center to participation in the Annual Tour De Scranton) flowed from both high schools, as well as intermediate and elementary buildings
- Juniors and Seniors from both high schools volunteering to assist exceptional students in the various Special Olympic athletic events throughout the school year
- Professional staff donated time and talent by speaking at community events, as well as providing mentoring to children in various venues throughout the city

Teaching children to understand that "global citizenship" requires awareness of events beyond our immediate region ...as well as a determination to become part of the solution to problems ...is part of what the professional staff of the Scranton School District does every time it participates or encourages participation in service to others. One of the lenses that we use to monitor our achievement as sentient human beings <u>must</u> be how we treat those among us who are least able to help themselves or most vulnerable to the exigencies of life.

We, in the Scranton School District, are proud of the fact that our work with children does not stop with their academic education nor with their extracurricular or co-curricular activities. We extend our area of responsibility to our students to include making certain that they understand the need for them to honor the life with which they have been gifted by finding meaningful ways to serve others ... to "pay the rent", as it were ... from childhood through adulthood.

It is my wish that the coming summer season offers you and your children a chance to rest, to vacation, to celebrate life ... and to discover at least one way in which you – as a family—can offer service to others around you. Whatever you choose to do will, for sure, create a memory every bit as significant as any other you have over vacation season! Be well and stay safe over the summer months.


FIRST PLACE CONTEST WINNER AT ROBERT MORRIS ELEMENTARY



This spring outstanding high school students from across the United States will take part in this unique leadership development conference in our nation's capital. During the six-day program the NYLC will provide scholars with the opportunity to interact with a variety of personnel who operate within the three branches of our government, the news media, and the international community.

NYLC prepares students to serve our country well, whether that means as an elected official, active members within their communities, or as intelligent, creative and responsible members of the work force. Past highlights of this program have included welcoming remarks by a member of Congress, made from the floor of the House of Representatives- a privilege d\seldom afforded other groups.
