












What our Parents are Saying:

Teacher communication with parents, students, and colleagues is supported by reliable communication technology, including phones, faxes and email. CCS – 96% agree STATE – 85%


Teachers have sufficient access to office equipment and supplies such as copy machines, paper, markers, etc. CCS – 94% agree STATE – 76%

Superintendent's Message

Greetings from Cullman City Schools!

On behalf of the Board of Education, I am pleased to provide a snapshot of the accomplishments of our faculty, staff and students during the 2008-2009 school year. These accomplishments would not have been possible without our dedicated faculty and staff, and the support of our parents and community leaders. Gratitude is extended to all who helped us continue the tradition of excellence. We especially want to thank Congressman Robert Aderholt, Governor Bob Riley and State Superintendent Dr. Joe Morton for the \$250,000 ARC grant we received for SMART Technology. Because of this grant, our students have state-of-the-art technology in classrooms and science labs. We also want to thank Senator Zeb Little for securing a \$250,000 grant to assist with the construction of a new library media center at West. We appreciate our supportive elected officials: Lt. Gov. Jim Folsom, Senator Zeb Little, and Representatives Jeremy Oden and James Fields; and Mayor Max Townson and the members of the Cullman City Council.

This year we celebrated 100 years of excellence. Numerous Centennial Celebration events were held during the year. We are thankful for the CCS Foundation and the financial support it offers to our faculty and students. In particular, we thank President and Vice-President Jeff Hogeland and Suzanne Harbin and all the members of the Foundation Board. Additionally, we wish to thank our Adopt-A-School partners: Cullman Jefferson Gas, Traditions Bank, Premier Bank of the South, First Federal, and Wachovia.

We are extremely proud of our students who surpassed state and national averages on all assessments! Our students improved their test scores again this year. In Alabama, they are ranked 6th on the SAT-10 test, 5th and 10th graders are ranked 3rd on their ADAW (writing scores) while seventh graders ranked 4th place. Our high school students' average ACT score is 22.5 as compared to the state average of 20.3.

We are proud of our schools. West Elementary was selected as one of twelve schools in Alabama as a CLAS Banner School. Additionally, West was nominated as a U.S. Blue Ribbon School. East Elementary was one of four schools in Alabama that earned Blue Ribbon Lighthouse Accreditation. And, Dr. Elton Bouldin, principal at West Elementary School, was named AAESA District I Distinguished Principal. Cullman High School added a Bible Literacy Class among its curricular offerings and had more students register for it than we could actually teach.

Our students excel in diversified extracurricular offerings. Cheerleading, Algebra II and Geometry Teams won State Championships! And, our Softball Team came in 2nd in the State. Our outstanding Band, under the direction of Mr. Christopher Smith, earned superior ratings throughout the year. We added a Strings program at Cullman Middle School, and our Choir continued to explode under the direction of Mr. Josh Agnew.

We, in Cullman City Schools, value service to others. Through our Service Learning Endorsement program, we strive to instill a lifelong dedication to service to others in our students. Forty seniors voluntarily earned the prestigious Service Learning Endorsement seal on their CHS diplomas in May by volunteering 50 hours in our community. The Cullman City School district is a leader in our state and nation. Our school district was featured this year in the National School Board Association's "Magna Best Practices Database" and their September issue of Electronic School. Also, CCS was featured in the April/May issue of EdTech journal as well as the May issue of Business Alabama. In lune, we received notification that CCS was selected as one of three school districts in the nation for the National School Board Association's prestigious "Salute Districts" due to our seamless technology immersion. School Board Attorney J.R. Brooks was selected as one of The Best Lawyers in America in the specialities of Commercial Litigation and Education Law.

We achieved SACS District Accreditation this year. We continue to offer our students a well-rounded educational experience through a rigorous academic program, diversified extracurricular opportunities along with physically demanding athletic opportunities.

In closing, I want to welcome our new and returning board members. It is an honor and a privilege for me to work with President Brenda Howell, Vice-President Suzanne Harbin, Kim Addison, Jason Neal and Steve Sides along with the faculty, staff and students of Cullman City Schools.
