# Hands of Elim: Expressing Community, Devotion, Integrity and Service

onsistency is a rare commodity these days. From the halls of Congress down to the local barbershop, people want someone who can simply do what they said they would do. The public strains to find a politician who will truly represent their position like they promised in the campaign.

Perhaps we intuitively understand that what a person *does* is usually an accurate reflection of their *attitude*. James, the brother of Jesus, had a few choice words to say about how actions expose our true colors: "What use is it," he asks the brethren, "if someone says he has faith but he has no works?" In this question, James pushes past the catchy slogans and supermodel endorsement, right to the core of the product. He says, to the shocked amazement of his "faith-only" disciples, that he can discern their heart by watching their hands.

Our hands express the truth about our life. They betray our smiles and cool mannerisms. If any duplicity hides in the undertow, our hands will bring it to the surface. They will show the difference between what we say and what we believe and what we do. They will expose our inconsistency.

We at Elim desire consistency. We won't settle for anything less. We make a bold statement about our position and ourselves. We say, in our Mission Statement, "Our staff and students comprise a community of believers committed to a life of expressive worship, prayer, simplicity, integrity, holiness, servanthood, and mission-mindedness."

It's a quick sentence that sums up the very core of who we are. This is our ship's colors, our foundation for service. The truths behind these words are the pillars we rest upon. If anyone is confused about what our values are, we point them to this statement—then we live it out for them to see. We show what it looks like by doing it with our own two hands.

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### Hands expressing a life of Christian community.

As Jesus says in John 13:35, the world will know we are Christians by our love for one another.

Unlike the world's message of mere tolerance, this scripture compels our hands to embrace one another. Anybody can tolerate another's differences, but it takes Christ's love to embrace our spiritual family at large—with all their differences.

We believe in loving people indiscriminately. On campus, age, race, denomination, culture, and language all differ. To each, a loving hand is extended. Each knows the warm embrace of the Elim Bible Institute family.

Elim not only believes we should accept those who come to our door; we believe we must actively pursue a diverse climate in which to express our unity. Our admissions office works diligently to bring in students from beyond America's borders. We strive to build relationships with leaders and congregations from all over the world. We feel successful at our conferences and meetings when dozens of accents fill the air. But more than accents, we embrace the whole picture—God's whole family.

Family members give up rights to help each other. Family members encourage each other. From the dorms to the deans' office, from Lima, New York to Lima, Peru, we endeavor to build up our brothers. By our attitude, by our example, and by our words, we propel each other toward Christ. As different as we are, a common calling links us.

I'm an ear, and you're an eye. It's wonderful that we all get

along, but when our hands embrace our brothers and sisters, God's heartbeat is felt on the campus and around the world. That is how the heartbeat of the world is felt on this campus. That's why we are a family—worldwide.

### Hands expressing a life of simple devotion.

"Lifting up holy hands to the Lord" (I Tim. 2:8) is not just an idiomatic phrase. It's a way of life on campus.

As a matter of course, we have our scheduled times of prayer and worship. Chapel, Sunday morning, and Week of Prayer are all important. But beyond the schedules and mandatory services—in the leisure time of private life—that's the real test. And our students are making us proud.

In actual fact, most of the prayer and worship on campus is *not* happening in the existing program. There are student-led women's groups, men's groups, one-on-one prayer partners. We have 'SOAK' and '5-Hour Worship' services, and spontaneous prayer meetings at the most unlikely places and times. Even lunchtime in the cafeteria has not been exempt.

All of these meetings, all the tears and cries found in them, are simply the inside coming out. In the staff and students, a desire for God's presence burns brightly. As our worship and our hands lift together, it's nothing more than the flame being exposed.

We can forego a meal here and there to meet with God, because He's meeting with us in these times of devotion. He's giving us a daily Pentecost, and it's way more satisfying than a grilled turkey





and tomato wrap. Even if you add cheese.

To be in His presence, lifting up holy hands—to know you are accepted in His throne room—who wouldn't want to 'SOAK' on Wednesday night? Losing a little sleep is a small price to pay. If God is really there, "Let us go unto the house of the LORD!" We'll drink an extra cup of coffee in the morning to hold us over in Brother Barry's class.

God's presence is too sweet to miss.

### Hands expressing a life of academic integrity.

It's been said more than once that Elim Bible Institute is about excellence.

Because this is true, it holds us to excelling scholastically. Timothy exhorts, "Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a workman who does not need to be ashamed and who correctly handles the word of truth" (II Timothy 2:15). With our focus firmly on eternal things, we still manage to find time to exercise good old-fashioned self-discipline for our present task. If that task is schoolwork, we do it and do it well.

In class, even though we have fun, we take it seriously. Clutched around a pen, each hand is hard at work, jotting notes. In the evenings, during study time, the students' hands are still busy—writing, diagramming, highlighting a textbook as they study for a test.

Although we are not an accredited college, we embrace an academic standard that enables our students to transfer to selected graduate level schools. Many colleges welcome our graduates into

their programs with little or no additional study. To a great extent, this is possible because of the individual excellence of our students. Coming from Elim, they show the same positive attitude and focus in their graduate work. For our current students, admission to our partner colleges is made that much easier.

Our students know it's not just a test they prepare for on a Monday night. They're preparing for the world. This is why the school holds them to such a high standard. Difficult tests, time spent burning the midnight oil—it's all just a proving ground. The challenges are a reminder that they carry the flag. One day, they will lead in battle. For now, their hand holds a pen, but one day it will hold the lost.

### Hands expressing a life of dedicated service.

It's no secret that we are a missions school. Our passion is to reach the unreached.

We are only happy when our hands are reaching across the world, spreading the good news of salvation. As Solomon admonished, "Whatsoever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might." Show us the one who hasn't heard, and we'll find a way to change that statistic.

From around the world, Elim recruits leaders and teachers whose hearts ache for the unsaved. Here in Lima, they pour their passion into each new class. Most of our staff would rather be on the mission field, but that's exactly the kind of people we want. People who aren't content to buy a house on four acres of land just

so they can say they did. We want people who want to see change.

With the encouragement of their teachers, many students choose internships and long-term positions overseas. Each summer, you can find Elim students on every continent. Another world exists outside our beautiful campus, so that's where we must go.

We want revival, and not just up on the hill. At our annual Missions Conference, through our student missionary prayer teams, and in every classroom in College Hall, we keep that fact in mind. It's not about us. Elim is not the end, and we're not supposed to get comfortable here!

That value is embraced by countless students, including Briana Smith, recent Missions &

International Community Health Program graduate. She shared a brief portion of her day in a recent e-mail from her internship in the Republic of Congo:

This morning at the clinic, after having dozens of patients come through with malaria, amoeba, scabies, typhoid fever, etc., I was doing patient consultations with Dr. Joe Harvey (the American missionary Dr. I am working under here). We had sisters come in, ages 19 and 14, and one of them was diagnosed with a serious STD. Joe had me talk to them in French while he translated into Lingala about AIDS and why the Lord says waiting until marriage is not just another rule to follow but because He wants us to have the very best. We spent an hour talking to these girls and praying for them, hoping they will be able to go against sleeping around which is so common here. Marriage is not a common concept here and multiple 'wives' is normal. The spread of AIDS is so huge that almost every day we have another patient be diagnosed with AIDS.

After that, our next patient was a girl the same age as me. She weighed only 60 pounds and probably only has a couple months to live. Another AIDS patient . . . but the SAME AGE as me! She also had malaria and tuberculosis. All of her dreams crashing down to just



focusing on how many months left she has to live. The guy who gave it to her was definitely long gone, along with all of her friends. She looks like a frail old woman and yet you spend five minutes with her and realize she's still just young. We spent some time talking and praying together.

Our next patient, who couldn't even come to the clinic, is also dying from AIDS. She sent her sister to get her medicine and to take her three-year-old daughter to get checked as well. This little girl was so cute—chubby, gorgeous big eyes... She just sat on my lap and we played with the stethoscope listening

played with the stethoscope listening to her heart . . . She has AIDS; her mother does also, and her father died from it last year. So what will happen to her 11-year-old brother

when the rest of his family is dead—in a couple of years at the most? I couldn't hide my emotions anymore . . . I kept her in my lap so she couldn't see me crying.

Our vision, our purpose and drive, is to see God being worshipped in every language and in every nation under heaven. This is the vision we impart to our students from registration to graduation. As a people, we are set apart for Kingdom purposes, and that means we allow God to use our hands, our lives, our money and whatever means necessary, to reach out to the harvest.

These are our hands at Elim. Community. Devotion. Integrity. Service. These are our pillars, firm and intact. Unlike the world, we aren't embarrassed to stand behind our words. We aren't afraid, because our hands give testimony to the consistent lifestyle we walk out.

To the Church, the world, and each new freshman class, Elim doesn't represent Elim. It represents Jesus Christ. So we show them the real McCoy. We said we would, and by God's grace, we will not shirk our responsibility. We aren't content to print our core values statement on our promotional literature. We allow the Holy Spirit to put it in our hearts. It shows by what our hands have been doing lately and for over the last 80 years.

Joy Bowden, a returning Junior from Maine, told of her experience in one inner-city ministry, "I had a blast with these city kids, and I got to love them and tell them about Jesus."


"My most memorable testimony from the trip doesn't come from any one specific time of ministry, though there were many," says Matt Brake, returning Senior and one of the four

male members of the team. "It seemed to me that our effectiveness in ministry came from how we matured in relating to each other in private. Some of my greatest growth spiritually came from interactions, positive and negative, with people on the team. It seemed like

the growth from those interactions bled over into the ministry we did."

These reports and more are just a slice of the many layers of ministry and life the Elim

Kingdom Force team experienced this summer. After a week of intense training and prayer, the team was launched during the EF Leadership Conference in early May. Six students, a handful of instruments, and a few changes of clothes rolled off the "hill" and headed south to the Virginia Tidewater area for the first leg of their tour. For the next two weeks, the team ministered in churches, a missions conference, a home for troubled



teens, and much more before working their way back north in their itinerary.

Matt Brake continued his reflections. "I'm thankful to God that He put the people that He did on this team. There was not only

strength in ministry because of their various giftings, but we had a tremendous opportunity to grow personally from the sharpening that took place between us! I can honestly say it has been my pleasure not only to do ministry with this group of people, but also to grow with them. I love you guys!"

What more can someone ask for, than that their heart would be inclined to follow hard after God in their personal relationship with Him, and that they would be available to serve Him wherever possible? For years, Elim has been a place where students come to encounter God and receive the kind of development and training that would carry them for a lifetime. For many students, that has meant being a part of a ministry team that has them surrender nearly half of their summer to invest themselves in the lives of young people and older alike, wherever the Lord would open the doors for their ministry.

One day back on campus, where the team completed its tour of ministry with the final three days of the Elim Summer Family Conference, Brandon Jackel had these words to say about his experience on Kingdom Force, "Thank you for considering me for this opportunity. Next to accepting the Lord and coming to Elim, it has honestly been the best decision I've ever made in my life!" Brandon added, "The life-changing experience God has been doing in my own heart has truly been worth the time, energy and sacrifice in being a part of Kingdom Force. As I look back at the process, I can say that, though it's been rough, in the long run it has been well worth it. I learned so much from the lives of many we were with along the way. One pastor said to us, 'A shepherd should smell like his sheep!' I was so broken, because the people I least wanted to be around, he surrounded himself with."

"God seemed to really use this team to bring good news to the afflicted," said Chris Tarantino. "We encountered so many on this trip who have been afflicted by the marks, claws, and back-biting stuff of this world. It has been a privilege to bring liberty (Isaiah 61) to hell's once held captives and destroy the chains that bound so many hearts."

One final testimony comes from Isaac Jacobs, the male co-leader of the team, who just completed his program at Elim this past spring and felt to make this tour a commitment of his first fruits in ministry. "I cannot say enough about the faithfulness of God! Though sometimes I felt as though we were not getting the message across, I discovered later that the Lord had touched people's hearts by their own profession. He demonstrated his faithfulness to us in so many ways, in ministry, financially, and even mechanically with the van! My heart is filled with gratitude to our Father for giving us this privilege to bring His Word to so many, and for His never-ending faithfulness."

About two years ago, the Slishers joined Oasis Elim, a humanitarian aid organization

partnering with the Kazakh government.


Coming into a village where they couldn't communicate was emotionally and physically exhausting. Matt and Stephanie both felt isolated in their new house, which needed almost as much work as their vocabulary. Because of the communication barrier, the Slishers focused their first term almost exclusively on learning the language.

After only a few weeks, Stephanie had acquired a vast vocabulary of two words:

'boy,' and 'yarn.' It was a good thing, too. While talking with a Kazakh lady one day about boys and yarn and the like, she realized three-year-old Andrew had disappeared. Like a good missionary mother, she kicked her language ability into high gear, and ran through the neighborhood shouting, "BOY! BOY! BOY!" With the help of a few teenagers, Stephanie found Andrew down the block, playing in the town water spigot.

Frustrating encounters like this weren't as few as the Slishers had hoped, but through work and patience, life became smoother. As the days passed, they weren't quite so tired from trying to communicate. Business transactions didn't take all day because of misunderstandings. Sign language wasn't used as

This "venture of faith" began in an outdated and abandoned summer country club facility with 12 students and three families. Many are the reports of God's gracious provision that first year—and in the years following.

Over the following years the school moved four times, each time to more adequate quar-



ters—to Rochester, Red Creek, Hornell and finally to Lima, all in New York. The challenges to faith, serving young people who had no funds and could find no work, were especially strong those early years when

the country was in the Great Depression. Many were the times we, as students and staff, prayed for food for the table and for fuel for the furnaces, without which we would be both hungry and cold. But thanks be to God, Whom we watched make daily supply!

Over the years, God has been gracious to grant significant visitations, bringing life-changing encounters with Him. During one of the earlier ones, while in my teens, my life was apprehended by the Lord, as was the case

sons taught in the classroom led into times of prayer, changing the "order of the day," occasionally with purposed loss of the noon meal or more. Some of these cannot be forgotten, including the missionary prayer periods following the evening meal. In one such, a student (Roy Hill) was praying in other tongues, with an oft repeated word, which later he found was a city in the heart of Africa. In due course he and his wife found a way to get to a nearby country, out of which a mission was opened that has crossed Central Africa in six countries, with thousands of churches, a number of Bible schools, orphanages and training programs, all under National leadership.

Eighty years! God granted a visitation in the first year and subsequently through the eight decades following. The visitation of the early '50s and the cross-denominational awakening in the next brought Elim a larger student enrollment and some glorious years. ### **Jasmine Jiminez**

In the Summer of 2003, Jasmine Jimenez heard about Elim Bible Institute—the dream college of all potential ministers. For a Brooklyn girl, however, the appeal was limited at best. She had big dreams. Dreams that went beyond smalltown obscurity.

Jasmine intended rather intently to become a dentist. As Elim had no dental program, leastwise, none that made it on the brochures,



it was out of the question. She was hardly willing to sacrifice the glamour of the dentist's office for Bible college in rural America. With the Fall semester upcoming, she was headed to a local school.

As the calendar turned its pages, she made plans to enroll at New York City College of Technology. In the back of her mind, she knew she should apply to Elim, but the buzz of the dental drill was too seductive to resist. She had to go to secular college if she would

ever make it to her first root canal.

God, however, kept insisting that His way was best, and finally Jasmine relented. It was too late for her to make Fall registration, so she finished out one semester at NYC Tech and made plans to attend Elim in the Spring.

During the break between semesters, God's preparation began. The transition to a town with a 2,000% difference in population was itself daunting, not to mention whatever the Holy Spirit had in mind once she got there. It took a lot of trust.

After weeks of prayer, she left the comfort of the New York skyline, bound for Lima. It would be her first time at the school and her first time being away from home. It was a first-shot. Either God was leading her here or He wasn't.

She arrived shortly before registration to a

bleak winter campus. Most of the students were still on break, and so was the sun for the last four months. Cold, rainy, and dark, the charming 19th century architecture lacked the magic portrayed by the *Year in the Son* pamphlet. The first few days were lonely.

Once the initial shock wore off from living in a town where the highest structure was the water tower, Jasmine had some time to think. Besides, it was Week of Prayer, and God was beginning to speak to her.

To start with, He assured her that He indeed had amazing things in mind for her. It was a good thing, too, because she was beginning feel unsure about the whole thing. Back home, she was the spiritual giant, but now she was going to chapel every day with people who *spoke in tongues!* 

Eventually, the prayer-language machines Jasmine saw from a distance became the people she knew and trusted. They were normal people, just like her. In the mornings, they would stagger into the cafeteria for a couple hard-boiled eggs, and the disproportionate romance associated with tongues and prophecy fell by the wayside. If these guys could follow God, she could, too.

Still, Jasmine had doubts about the future. Would there be enough money for next semester? Would there even be a next semester, and if there were, what was God trying to do? Would she ever get to use one of those nifty dental mirrors, or was her life going to follow a different path?

For weeks, she worried about all the possibilities. She wasn't really sure she even wanted to go back to live in Brooklyn even if she had the chance. Her life was different now. Different friends, different focus. The water tower was almost a comforting sight.

Throughout these uncertain weeks, the Holy Spirit began teaching Jasmine about the virtue nobody wants to wait for: Patience. The answers to her questions would have to wait for another day. For now, He had more important things say.

He began showing her that when she went home, she would face ridicule for her faith in God. Just like in Luke 4, the prophet would not be welcome in her hometown. Old friends and old ways would be contrary to God's purposes for her life.

Jasmine completed the Spring semester at Elim and returned to Brooklyn, still apprehensive, but believing God to make a way. She was unemployed, futureless, and missing her Elim friends, but God had her in His hands. Despite the competitive marketplace in the city, Jasmine landed a job shortly after returning home.

She still doesn't know if flossing total strangers will ever be a part of her daily routine, or if she'll see her college friends any time soon, but she's learning to be patient. For someone who grew up in New York City, that's nothing to scoff at.

ome months ago, when Gloria and I were in Connecticut, we came out of our motel room in five-below-zero weather and proceeded to our car. When we tried to use the automatic door opener keypad, the lock mechanism jammed. No one was able to open that door from inside or out. It required that we drive back to Elim in a snowstorm, crawling over each other to get


derstand how something so bitter could produce such a sweet and delightful dessert. It's because it was mixed with confectionary sugar and the bitterness was tempered.

In God's preparation in our lives it is not any one of the ingredients, but the combination of "all things" that brings joy to His heart. If we would say "some things work together for good," we might be omitting the As Christ faced the awfulness of the cross, Hebrews says, "It was the joy that was set before Him" by which he endured it and despised the shame. A prophetic eye and ear are the prerequisites to a prophetic voice. The ability to see good in the midst of impending disaster is a gift that is given to those that trust. The prophet prayed, "may the eyes of the servant be open to see . . . and he saw."

The disciplines of God in our lives are for His ultimate glory and our present good. While the Hebrew Christians were going through great difficulty, they were encouraged in Hebrews 12:11, "No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it." This principle applies to both the "good" and "bad" things that happen in our life. The need for discipline is always with us. Someone is suddenly left an inheritance of \$1 million dollars. They see it as positive until five years later this financial bonanza has upset their life and divided their family.

As we are able to see God in all things and everywhere, we will draw more upon His grace. Was Joseph more in the will of God in a pit than he was in a palace? "All things work

out the passenger door. Awkward to say the least. Since there was no way of opening the door except by taking the inside panel off while it was closed, a friend of mine said that he would work on it. When he was unable to get to it after two weeks, he called his friend, who, while taking it to his garage, had an accident. So now, it was not just the door, it was the front end that needed repair.

My friend called and began the phone conversation by asking if I was sitting down. My response was how I handle most problems, "All things work together for good to those that love the Lord." (Romans 8:28). When I said those words, I felt a divine impression, "It's all things, or no things, but not

some things." A few months later the car was finally up and running, but the revelation of that moment stayed with me. "It must be all things or no things, but not some things."

This has many applications in our lives. The Bible says, "All things

work together for good." One translation says, "That's why we can be so sure that every detail in our lives of love for God is worked into something good." We are not given the privilege of choosing what is good and what is bad. What seems on the surface to be bad or good may ultimately prove to be just the opposite in the long term.

The operative word in this verse is "works together for good." Our life is in God's hands, where He mixes the ingredients of the natural to produce permanent eternal dividends. When my brother and I were younger, mom baked a chocolate cake from scratch. She had to include baker's chocolate. To us it looked like just another Hershey bar. When she wasn't looking we took a bite only to spit it out as soon as possible. By itself it was entirely too bitter! Our young minds could not un-

long-lasting value of a financial setback or even the loss of a loved one. Because we have given our lives fully to the Lord, He declares us a "dependant" on His income taxes! This means that He is responsible. In simple, childlike faith, we know that no good gift will He withhold from them that walk uprightly.

The declaration by the apostle Paul in Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengtheneth me," is made in the context of the victories and setbacks he faced on a daily basis. Verse 12 says, "I know how to be happy with little or much." "I've found the recipe for being happy whether full or hungry, hands full or hands empty." (The Message). This is the context of "I can do all things." In the natural, the word "things" can be seen as positive or negative. Elsewhere Paul states it was the tribulation that

made me steadfast and gave me ripeness of character. James is so bold as to say "When all kinds of trials and temptations crowd into your lives my brothers . . . welcome them as friends!" (Phillips). God will test us with plenty or poverty. (I think we're safer with the latter.)

Since the command "Give thanks in all things" comes with His grace, which is sufficient, the blending of the bitter chocolate with the confectionary sugar will enrich life as God serves us to the needy world. What would any picture be without its shadows? It is the shadows that give it depth.

As communication became easier, Matt began teaching 8th-11th grade English at the local school. He immediately began to build relationships with his students. In his hands were the future of the town, and he loved teaching them.

In December 2002, the Slishers were given charge of the humanitarian aid project. Oasis Elim was given the valuable privilege to grant visas to humanitarian aid workers who want to join them. In other words, they could bring in anyone they needed.

In the summer, they hosted a kids' camp, bringing in an outside team to help. Later, they sponsored a window replacement project for the poor, and a team from California came to work with them. Even YWAM got involved, sending a King's Kids performance group from Puerto Rico.


As the Slishers return to their home overseas, they plan to tackle two main projects: micro-enterprise development and the creation of a community center.

The first project focuses on economic development in Mullaby, a town of about 4,000. In an environment where entrepreneurs find new business difficult, this project could help them get off the ground. In addition to small-business loans, Matt hopes to facilitate business training and help write business plans. As he interacts with local businessmen, he will have opportunities to plant God's Word in their hearts.

As career missionaries working in Kazakhstan, the Slisher family hasn't had the ministry opportunities one might expect. They aren't really allowed to preach on the street corners. Jesus isn't considered the latest, greatest thing. But their restrictions have only focused them that much more intently on individuals. Personal friendships based in hard-earned trust are proving to be open doors for the Holy Spirit.
