Commanding general delivers State of the Military at luncheon

Maj. Gen. Howard B. Bromberg, commanding general of Fort Bliss, addressed a crowd of more than 650 people at the annual State of the Military Address, hosted by the Greater El Paso Chamber of Commerce and FirstLight Federal Credit Union. The discussion surrounded the unprecedented expansion of Fort Bliss, including facility and housing construction, training grounds improvements, and the required "off-post" expansion that will be required to support the swell in population.

Bromberg, in addition, addressed some of the growing pains that our region is experiencing, and asked that everyone recognize the sacrifices our soldiers and their families make every day to protect our nation.

Fort Bliss is continuing to lead the way for the strenuous requirements currently being put on the U.S. Army. Fort Bliss is constantly cited as the "best practices" model for how Army installations and the surrounding cities need to meet our country's future military needs.

Not only is Fort Bliss expanding its capacity to house and train soldiers, but it is also training and deploying soldiers for overseas duties, all at the same time. Bromberg said he felt very confident in the way Fort Bliss is performing and meeting the Army and nation's needs. He also noted that Fort Bliss' success is due in no small part to the support provided by the El Paso community.

University of Texas at El Paso, and other university leaders hosted a welcome luncheon at the Larry Durham Center overlooking the Sun Bowl. Natalicio's presentation focused on the university's current momentum, including being prominently well positioned to compete for tier-one status. After the lunch, respective department leadership and students within those fields gave tours of UTEP's new biology and engineering buildings. The legislators learned the amount of research UTEP faculty and students accomplish and how UTEP has remained a leader in those fields, serving a large Hispanic population.

The Paul L. Foster School of Medicine opened its doors to the legislators and hosted a reception at their new facility. Dr. Manny De La Rosa, founding dean, and Dr. John C. Baldwin, president, greeted the legislators and provided an overview of the medical school, including an update on the development of the curriculum for first-year students in 2009 and the status of the recruitment effort. The legislators toured the training building where simulated interaction with patients takes place, as well as a tour of the research building.

TEAM El Paso hosted a welcome reception for the legislators at the Plaza Theater with performances by the Ysleta del Sur Tigua Indian Dancers and Viva! El Paso dancers. City, county and state elected officials interacted with the legislators and welcomed them to the city. From the Sky Garden of the Plaza Theater, the legislators had a magnificent view of downtown El Paso, allowing the opportunity to discuss the downtown revitalization and public-private partnerships that are fueling development.

Even though Fort Bliss was hosting its Senior Leaders' Off-site Retreat that weekend, Fort Bliss opened its doors to the legislators and provided them with a comprehensive briefing on the transformation underway and the plans to grow to accommodate the soldiers and families coming to El Paso through the Base Realignment and Closure process. The interaction with the future combat systems illustrated to the legislators the advances in war fighting. A windshield tour provided the legislators to see the growth firsthand. They had the opportunity to interact with many key El Paso leaders and relax with food and spirits at their disposal. 

sent to Congressmen Silvestre Reyes, Texas Senators Kay Bailey Hutchison and John Cornyn, U.S. Small Business Administrator Steve Preston, and SBA El Paso District

The president and CEO of both the Hispanic Chamber and Greater Chamber were invited by the San Antonio Hispanic Chamber of Commerce to testify in San Antonio in August. Chamber CEO Richard Dayoub testified in front of Cornyn and a panel of representatives that included the U.S. Small Business Administration's Deputy Administrator, Jovita Carranza, This month El Paso will host a small SBA delegation from Washington to learn more about the needs of our business community. Community support will improve the chances of making this request a reality.

What is a PCR and what do they do for you? Procurement center representatives are the U.S. Small Business Administrations' procurement analysts and engineers who implements the Prime Contract Program. PCR's are located throughout the nation at major military and civilian federal buying activities to ensure fair and equitable opportunity to compete for federal procurement opportunities by:

· Reviewing proposed contracts and making recommendations to increase number of acquisitions set aside for small business

 Reviewing the Small Business Program of Federal contracting activities

· Recommending procurement strategies to maximize small business participation as both prime and subcontractors

· Counseling small business through outreach and training in obtaining federal contracts

· Reviewing bundled procurements and make recommendations for small business participation

· Conducting or participating in surveillance reviews

Since BRAC (Base Realignment and Closure) 2005. El Paso has experienced an unprecedented growth. Fort Bliss has seen \$4.5 billion in transformation contracts alone. With the arrival of more troops and their families, the amount of federal dollars will continue to grow, making El Paso a large buying "activity". San Antonio chamber leadership visits El Paso

The leadership of the Greater San Antonio Chamber of Commerce visited El Paso in late August specifically to learn more about El Paso's needs and to discuss collaborative efforts with our Chamber in the upcoming 81st Legislative Session. Richard Dayoub, Richard Fleager and the Government Relations Division staff greeted the San Antonio Chamber, led by Richard Perez at the El Paso International Airport.

Following their arrival, the Greater San Antonio Chamber delegation joined the Greater El Paso Chamber leadership on various tours throughout the day. First on the tour was Fort Bliss. Wayne Julius from the Fort Bliss transformation staff and Chuck Haare, Armed Forces Division chairman took the group on a windshield tour, pointing out the nearly \$4 billion of infrastructure work underway at the installation.

A windshield tour of the University of Texas at El Paso followed. Key points of the tour included the new biological sciences building, the swimming and fitness center, the new basketball facility being built and the plans for a new nursing school facility.

A lunch roundtable discussion regarding legislative issues was held after a tour of the Paul L. Foster School of Medicine and a presentation regarding the teaching curriculum for new students and the recruitment efforts underway for the first class at the medical school, planned for 2009. Government Relations Chairman, Walter Miller and Chairman-elect, Hector Gutierrez, joined the group for the discussion, along with Bob Cook and Bob Burns from REDCo. Some of the key points of the discussion focused on revamping the Skills Development Fund this upcoming session. San Antonio would like to focus on retention components of the legislation, while El Paso

would like to focus on the recruitment components of the policy. The group also discussed tier-one status for universities, a key issue for both UTSA and UTEP. Lastly, the group discussed the Chambers' role in immigration reform as well as the including tax credits in the margin tax legislation that was previously known as the franchise tax.

After the legislative discussion at the medical school, the group toured the Kay Bailey Hutchison Desalination Plant and the Carlos Ramirez Tech Center at the desalination plant. The San Antonio Chamaber was able to learn more about what the El Paso community has done to address water issues and to make sure that the region has an adequate water supply for the future. Addressing water issues is a critical initiative currently underway in San Antonio. The desalination plant is another great illustration of El Paso's collaboration with the Department of Defense.

Dark Sky compliance project works to target light pollution

The city of El Paso Street Department has begun replacing light fixtures in the downtown area in keeping with the city's Dark Sky Ordinance and as part of an ongoing initiative to reduce light pollution.

The project consists of replacing about 800 luminaries primarily in the downtown area. Street lights to be affected include those within the Union Plaza District: Stanton, Texas, El Paso and Kansas streets. The \$1.9 million project is being funded through the Palo Verde Award grant the city received from the El Paso Electric Company.

Street light fixtures installed under this project are designed to reflect light downward, preventing light form shining upwards obscuring the night sky. The reduction of light directed into the sky should allow our citizens to see the stars more clearly without glow caused by light pollution.

The Street Department is conducting the required work in collaboration with Beltran Electric. The project is estimated to take nine months to complete. The work will not require street lane closures.

El Paso MHMR unveils Mobile Crisis Unit

Residents of El Paso County will now have access to mental health services through a custom designed mobile clinic that brings mental health professionals directly to the scene of a crisis.

El Paso Mental Health and Mental Retardation displayed the 28-foot Mobile Intake and Crisis Unit on October 1 at 1600 Montana.

The vehicle is equipped with an exam room and reception area and will allow mental health professionals to dispatch to locations throughout the County to establish remote mental health centers very quickly should the need arise.

"As the mental health authority, El Paso MHMR is charged with directing



mental health services for the County. This new unit allows us to provide services directly where they are needed-especially during a time of crisis or disaster in our community," says Gary Larcenaire, CEO for El Paso MHMR.

The unit is especially equipped with satellite technology to allow for mental health screenings and assessments to be conducted remotely.

"Our telemedicine capa-

bilities in this vehicle allow for a client to receive treatment from psychiatrists anywhere in the world," Quiroga, says Jesus Director of Crisis Intake Services. "This is especialimportant if local lv telecommunications svstems are down or overloaded during a disaster situation. By relying on satellite technology, we are helping to ensure that our clients have access to the treatment they need."

City rep proposes state legislation

• State of Texas to allocate funding for the revitalization of the Medical Center of Americas within a five-mile radius. The Medical Center of Americas sits on District 3, which is the area she represents. She wants to ensure that the MCA area will flourish with revitalization.

• State of Texas to allocate at least an additional \$8 million dollars in funding for mental health services in El Paso.

She wants to ensure that funding is

secured to serve mental health patients. If funding is not provided, then MHMR will establish a waiting list and have to shut doors so those that are served will not receive treatment and the city and county will see an increase in the judicial and healthcare costs.

• State of Texas to allocate funding for mobility initiatives in El Paso. She wants to ensure that these mobility initiatives are addressed and taken care of before the growth is out of hand

Representative Acosta congratulates Texas Governor Rich Perry and Deirdre Delisi, chair of the Texas Transportation Commission, for forming a committee that will compile information that will formulate the future transportation needs of Texas.

In the next 20 years the city of El Paso's transportation needs will be at a critaical state. With our current demographics and proximity to Mexico and New Mexico, our mobility issues must include:

• Improving the international bridges' connectivity to our Interstate Highway System

• The building of a new, larger, international brigde that is able to move people and vehicles onto our roads and highways smoothly and effectively.

• The El Paso region needs a bus rapid transit system that is able to meet the needs of the local community that includes El Paso, New Mexico and the border city of Ciudad Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico: A transit system that is able to travel into Ciudad Juarez from El Paso and back and is able to move passengers from the bridge to various parts of the El Paso community and into New Mexico.

"Today's military families are facing a perfect storm: multiple deployments, rising gas and food prices, the sub-prime mortgage mess, and a struggling economy. Coupled with visible and invisible wounds of war, many families can't win this battle without our assistance," Roger Stradley, founder of USA Cares, said. Members of any branch of the military serving post 9/11 and their families can apply for help.

USA Cares has worked with military families since it was founded in 2003. Since then, the organization has responded to over 11,000 requests with more than \$5 million in direct assistance grants.

Tiguas receive development grant

The Ysleta del Sur Pueblo have been awarded \$1.13 million grant from the U.S. Economic Development Administration to support the renovation of an Ysleta Del Sur Pueblo tribally owned property for use as the Tigua Business Center.

The grant, which includes \$375.000 in financial assistance from the Global Climate change Mitigation Incentive Fund, will create a business center that will support Tigua-owned enterprises. The center will house a business incubator that will support TDSP owned enterprises and other teaching tools that can assist tribal enterprises, as well as tribal members in developing and operating successful businesses.

Tribal officers have identified economic development as a key component to economic growth on the reservation. The tribe suffered a major economic setback when gaming was prohibited six years ago, which forced the tribal-owned Speaking Rock Casino to discontinue gambling.

Foundation awards new grants under the Begin at Birth Initiative

The Paso del Norte Health Foundation awarded eight new grants totaling more than \$870,000 under the Begin at Birth Initiative. Begin at Birth is an initiative designed to effect long-term improvements in the health status of children birth through three-years of age within the Paso del Norte region by providing high quality parent education and promoting professionalism for parent educators.

AVANCE: \$110,000 to expand its ninemonth Parent-Child Education Program to serve a total of 525 children birth to 3 years of age in 450 families. Service will be provided at 12 El Paso school sites and two sites in New Mexico.

Ben Archer Health Center: \$70,902 to improve parents' ability to raise healthy children and reduce the risk of child abuse by providing the Nurturing Parenting/Crianza con Cariño curriculum in Hatch, N.M.

Child Crisis Center: \$70,698 to continue its AMOR de Niños program, which offers comprehensive parenting classes and in-home visitation services in El Paso.

Child Crisis Center: \$325,123 to serve as the organizing agency for the foundation's Begin at Birth activities, including media coordination, oversight, calendar distribution in El Paso and Ciudad Juárez, logistical support for grantee sharing meetings and technical assistance, provision of quality assurance and coordination activities, and logistical support for community outreach and dialogue for planned initiative evolution.

Center Against Family Violence: \$42,507 to conduct their model parent education program The Middle Way. Parents enroll in a 15week program combining structured learning and support group participation.

Gente A Favor de Gente: \$69,190 to conduct a second year of their Help Your Child Grow Up Healthy program. Three hundred families with children birth to 3 years of age will be targeted in extremely impoverished neighborhoods of Aztecas and Oriente XXI in Ciudad Juárez.

Organizacion Popular Independiente: \$67,980 to improve child rearing skills in parents, as well as the quality of parent education interventions in the impoverished neighborhoods on the mountain slopes of western Ciudad Juárez.

Texas Tech Health Sciences Center – El Paso: \$116,052 to continue its joint venture with Thomason Hospital to improve breastfeeding success in their service population, through the implementation of the Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative, a WHO and UNICEF model program.

Lynx Exhibits showcases science, Rosetta Stone with new displays

Grossology: The (Impolite) Science of the Human Body opened Sept. 27 and will be on display until Jan. 4 at Lynx Exhibits, 300 W. San Antonio.

Based on the best selling book Grossology, this exhibition uses sophisticated animatronics and imaginative exhibits to tell you the good, bad and downright ugly about runny noses, body order and much more.

The Rosetta Stone exhibit opened Sept. 12 and will run through January.

A single stone linking ancient Egyptian language with modern-day Greek is the centerpiece of a new display at Lynx Exhibits. Written in Stone brings together a rare, authorized reproduction of the Rosetta Stone and authentic artifacts that together create a fascinating timeline of the world's oldest civilizations. The original has been on display in the British Museum since 1802, and few replicas have been authorized.

The stone - discovered in 1799 by Napoleon's army - was the key to deciphering Egyptian hieroglyphs. The inscription on the stone is a decree passed by a council of priests and written in three scripts, Egyptian hieroglyphs, Demotic and ancient Greek.

Soon after the end of the fourth century, when hieroglyphs had gone out of use, the knowledge of how to read and write them also disappeared. After discovery of the Rosetta Stone, scholars were able to use the Greek inscription to decipher them.

The museum is open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday;



Simon Youth Foundation offers Sunland Park Mall Academy

For most students, back-to-school time typically involves a trip to the mall for new clothes, shoes, and other accessories. For some local students, the mall is much more than a shopping destination: It's where they go to school.

Sunland Park Mall has been the setting for an alternative high school since August 2000. The school, called Sunland Park Mall Academy is part of a network of 21 Education Resource Centers nationwide that have been established by national non-profit Simon Youth Foundation.

SYF, now celebrating its 10th anniversary, develops schools in partnership with public school districts, Simon Property Group and the communities the schools serve. The ERCs provide an option for students at risk of not graduating due to teen pregnancy, different learning styles or social interaction problems, to name a few reasons. Locally, Sunland Park Mall Academy has maintained a graduation rate of 99 percentr, which is higher than the average state graduation rate, since it opened in 2000. In total, more than 256 students have earned their high school diplomas through the local ERC. And many graduates go on to a trade school or two- or four-year college, often with a college scholarship awarded to them by the SYF.

"Simon Youth Foundation is proud of its school in El Paso and the partnerships it has formed within the community," said SYF Executive Vice President Dr. Richard Markoff. "A high school education is essential and it's a truly special endeavor to provide ERC students with a second chance."

In 10 years, 5,000 students have earned their diplomas at an ERC and the national graduation rate is 89 percent. Additionally, SYF created a scholarship program in 2000 for ERC graduates and high school seniors across the country that has awarded \$5.9 million.

The success of the ERC program was recently recognized when SYF received a prestigious award from the Education Commission of the States (www.ecs.org) for its sustained commitment to, and significant investment in, improving public education in the United States. Members of the ECS include the governor and state superintendent of education from every state, education officials and community leaders who work to improve public education by facilitating the exchange of information, ideas and experiences.


