
Hayti Heritage Film Festival Feature Films Schedule

Algeny: The Genetic Factor


Director - Andrew Burroughs Feature Genre:Drama/Suspense Length 97 min.


Belly of the Basin


Streetballers

It's Jesse's new detective partner and his father (Antonio Fargas – Foxy Brown, Starsky & Hutch, Everybody Hates Chris) who must team up in order to piece together the clues and save Jesse from the evil forces

Renaissance Village

Director - Gabe Chasnoff Feature Genre: Documentary Length: 85 minutes

Renaissance Village is the untold story of the largest FEMA trailer park set up after Hurricane Katrina and Rita devastated the Gulf Coast. In the wake of the storms, with more than 120,000 families left homeless, FEMA built emergency housing



sties, one of which, their largest, Renaissance Village lay in the rural city of Baker, Louisiana. Eighteen months after the storms,1700 of the original 3000 evacuees still lived in Renaissance Village with no where to go. After one resident died and others begin to get sick, allegations of formaldehyde poisoning in the FEMA travels sparked national attention. With mounting

pressure from the media and Congress, FEMA began to close the parks even though residents had nowhere else to go. Poetic and un-romanticized, this film follows the personal struggles of five characters to reclaim their lives after nearly three years in the park.

Bloodline: AIDS and Family


Director - Kristen Ashburn Genre: Mixed Media Photography and Live Action Drama 12 minutes
