





*Issues Forum: Genetically Modified Organisms (GMOs)*7 p.m. Thursday, May 1 ■ Loucks Auditorium

With the discovery of DNA and the unraveling of the genetic code it contains, molecular biologists have finally come close to understanding what determines the form and function of organisms and can use this to design organisms at will. A genetically modified organism (GMO) is an organism whose genetic material has been altered using genetic engineering techniques. Some see genetic engineering opening up great opportunities in agriculture, food and medicine, as we learn to harness the power of the gene. For others, it is a threat to something very basic about us and the natural world and is unnecessary, harmful, unethical, and benefits big business at others' expense.

The Issues Forum is free and open to the public and features a panel of experts who will share a variety of insights and perspectives on GMOs. A time for questions from the audience will follow.

Salem Public Library teams with Project C.E.O. to offer free Job Readiness Training for youth

Arbor Education & Training (Arbor E&T) will offer Project C.E.O., a week-long job readiness training program in May 2008, with the sponsorship of the Salem Public Library. The program helps youth, ages 17-21, with their education and employment needs.



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


