Museum Facts

Why Have a Naval Museum in the Indian Wells Valley?

The U.S. Naval Museum of Armament and Technology joins only 11 others across the country in telling the story of the U.S. Navy in peace and war. The museum is a place to learn about the Navy's precision-guided weapons essential to our nation's defense. Visitors also learn the story of China Lake — the “secret city” that for more than 60 years has developed, tested, and evaluated many of these weapons.

As our museum grows, it provides benefits to the community around it, attracting increasing numbers of visitors to Ridgecrest, where they spend their money and learn the benefits of our high-desert community.

The museum will bring the following assets to our community:

- A repository for historically significant artifacts
- A source for reference material
- A recruiting and educational resource
- A visitor orientation center
- Facilities for meetings and special occasions

History of Collection

- 1955 — Nucleus of collection established in one-room Weapons Exhibit Center.
- 1963 — Exhibit area expanded and moved to geodesic dome behind Michelson Laboratory. Expanded collection based on extensive rocket displays, set up for June 8, 1963, visit of President John F. Kennedy. (Rocket display can still be seen on southwest wall of today's museum.)
- 1973 — Major Mich Lab expansion and modernization caused relocation of exhibits to less accessible locations. Exhibits allowed to deteriorate.
- 1989 — Milt Burford spearheaded collection-expansion effort. “A lot of people were telling China Lake management that it would pay to be able to show visiting dignitaries the products of the center — both historic and modern,” he explained. Burford also led efforts to establish nonprofit educational museum foundation.
- 1989 — Capt. Douglas W. Cook, commander of Naval Air Warfare Center Weapons Division, approved establishment of Weapons Exhibit Center in recently closed Commissioned Officers' Mess.
- March 1993 — China Lake Museum Foundation held its first meeting.

- July 1993 — Capt. B. J. Craig, first Naval Air Weapons Station commanding officer, chartered China Lake Museum Committee to provide command liaison and oversight to China Lake Museum Foundation.
- 1994 — Foundation opened gift shop, began selling gift items unique to the Navy's desert facility.
- 1998 — Foundation took over the day-to-day operation and staffing of the facility, with foundation volunteers available to answer visitors' questions.
- May 12, 2000 — Secretary of the Navy Richard Danzig signed SECNAVNOTE 5755, making U.S. Naval Museum of Armament and Technology at China Lake official — first official Navy museum in more than 20 years.
- November 2002---Sidewinder 50th Celebration and new Sidewinder Exhibit.
- October 2004---SHRIKE 50th Celebration and new SHRIKE Exhibit.

China Lake Museum Foundation Support

- The Museum relies on support from the Foundation for operational support and the funding for new exhibits, new facilities, educational and community outreach programs.
