As many of you know, I am an L.A. native and proud of it. I was born at Good Samaritan Hospital and baptized at old St. Paul's Cathedral, so I like to think that gives me dual citizenship as a native Angeleno and a cradle Episcopalian. So growing up as I did, I never had to ask what industry they meant when someone said they were "in the industry." It was also a kinder, gentler age where "they're shooting down the street!" didn't mean there had been a drive-by event, but that one of the

neighbors had a movie or TV crew camped out on their front lawn. But, as I found out recently here at All Saints Church, growing up with "lights, camera, action" in the neighborhood is no guarantee against being as star-struck as the next person.

Jaded, industry savvy native that I am, I found myself hanging out the office windows just like everybody else, gawking as the crew set up to shoot the pilot of a maybe-going-to-be-on-NBC-in-the-fall show called *The Book of Daniel*. I was intrigued not only by the transformation the crew brought to the Rector's Office and the sanctuary, but by the honest to goodness "movie stars" wandering around our very own quad lawn: Aidan Quinn, Ellen Burstyn and (oh my goodness!) Phyllis Diller! And I was even more intrigued by the story line of this pilot episode: a young liberal Episcopal priest (Aidan Quinn) finds himself

butting heads with his conservative bishop (Ellen Burstyn!) while he tends his flock—which includes the aforementioned Phyllis Diller—and who talks to Jesus (not just in prayer but in *person!*). Only in L.A!

I don't know if the show will make the fall lineup it would sure be fun if it did. But I do know it's just one more indicator of how much issues of faith and religion are "in"—and it's just one more opportunity we at All Saints Church have to proclaim the Good News we have been given to

share. How cool is it that a progressive Episcopal priest has a shot at being a primetime drama protagonist? How surprising might it be to many who tune in to find out there actually IS a church where women can be bishops, clergy can be

human, and there's enough Good News around to extend to everybody? And how exciting is it that we get to be part of that process!

We do have Good News to share and—one baby step at a time—the media is starting to take notice. On Good Friday when we had a local news crew here for an interview, it was with *great* relief and excitement after it was over that there hadn't been a *single* question about schism, sexuality or Gene Robinson. It was all about faith, about the media, about the spiritual hunger of those seeking exactly what All Saints has to offer. And that's very Good News, indeed!

What Were Aidan Quinn, Ellen Burstyn, Phyllis Diller and Jesus Talking About on All Saints' Lawn?

with screenwriter Jack Kenny All Saints is a stage—on Sundays for the great drama of liturgy, and occasionally during the week for the comedy and drama of film or television. Most recently, shortly after the Holy Week/Easter pageantry, the campus hosted the filming of a television pilot, The Book of Daniel, featuring an Episcopal priest, played by Aidan Quinn, who talks to Jesus. Ellen Burstyn plays a bishop, and Phyllis Diller, a patient in the hospital. Appearing on the stage of the Rector's Forum this Sunday is Jack Kenny, who wrote the script. Kenny trained at the Juilliard Theatre Center from 1978-82, and gathered acting credits on and off Broadway, on television and in film. He has written for several television shows and created the series *Titus*, which played on the Fox network for three years. Children's Center Selected for Early Launch Program

Il Saints Children's Center was one of two centers in the Pasadena area to be recently chosen to be part of Los Angeles Universal Preschool's Early Launch Program. Guided by a 10-year plan, LAUP's goal is to make high-quality voluntary preschool available to every 4-year-old child in Los Angeles County, regardless of family income. Before being selected, the Children's Center underwent an extensive evaluation of elements like the teachers' qualifications, parent involvement, and the overall quality of the learning environment. Staff members demonstrated their ability to manage and run an effective program with great teachers, developmentally appropriate activities and a commitment to quality. LAUP funds will be used to recruit and retain good teachers, coordinate other social services for children and families, pay for field trips, improve the curriculum, pay for teachers' continued training and education, and reduce costs to parents.
