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## After the Midterm Elections <br> November 7-10, 2010

The 2010 midterm elections marked a historic loss for the President's party in a midterm election, and although the Republicans now control the House of Representatives, the public still wants them to work with the President and compromise in order to get things done.

## Desire for Compromise

Most Americans call for compromise in Washington, a view that is shared by majorities across all political persuasions. 72\% of Americans say the Republicans in Congress should make tradeoffs in order to get things accomplished; just $21 \%$ (and only $32 \%$ of Republicans) want Republicans in Congress to stick to their positions even if it means not getting as much done.

Even most Tea Party supporters - who overwhelmingly backed Republican House candidates want compromise, too, though $38 \%$ of them do not.

But Americans also want to see the President compromise. $78 \%$ of the public (and $88 \%$ of Republicans) want President Barack Obama to make compromises if that's what it takes to get things done; just $16 \%$ want him to stick to his positions.

## The President

President Obama's job approval rating has not changed in the wake of last week's midterm elections. 45\% now approve, and as many disapprove. Americans have been divided in their views of the President for months.

A similar percentage $-46 \%--$ approves of how he is handling foreign policy. 37\% disapprove.

## Views of the Parties

And last week's election results don't appear to have had an impact on Americans' views of either political party; the public continues to be divided in their views of the two major political parties. Despite the gains of last week, the Republican Party is viewed favorably by $42 \%$ of the public, while slightly more, $48 \%$, view them unfavorably. Views of the Democratic Party are slightly more positive, but still mixed.

This poll was conducted among a random sample of 1,137 adults nationwide, interviewed by telephone November 7-10, 2010. Phone numbers were dialed from RDD samples of both standard land-lines and cell phones. The error due to sampling for results based on the entire sample could be plus or minus three percentage points. The error for subgroups is higher. This poll release conforms to the Standards of Disclosure of the National Council on Public Polls.
