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

Michael Beach '08 Scores 36 on ACT




Michael Beach '08

Michael Beach, of the St. Edward High School Class of 2008, earned a perfect score on the ACT college entrance exam. Beach is only one of two students, of a total 43,500 in Ohio who took the test in October 2007, to score a 36. Furthermore, he is just one of 63 of the 500,000 who took the October exam nationwide, to earn a perfect score.

Beach is also a National Merit Finalist. He graduated with an accumulative grade point average over 4.0 and will attend The Ohio State University after participating in an internship with NASA this summer.

His accomplishment caught the attention of the local media, as he spent the week after the announcement fielding interviews from local television stations and newspapers.

Keehan is Vice President of Sales and Marketing for

His team won the Texas State Football Championship in 2005, after finishing as runner-up in 2004. Keehan and his family have been generous supporters of the Pre-Engineering Program, and toured the facility before meeting with the students.

Peter J. Elliott is a veteran

law enforcement official who currently manages a staff of more than 300 as the U.S. Marshal for the 41-county Ohio Northern District. Since being appointed Marshal in 2003, Elliott has developed a number of successful nationwide programs, including Fugitive Safe Surrender, the Northern Ohio Violent Fugitive Task Force, and GREAT (Gang Resistance, Education and Training).

Ivan T. Hofmann is a veteran of the transportation industry, and former Executive Vice President and COO of FedEx Ground. After joining FedEx Ground in 1985, he

played an integral role in building the company into a major competitor in the business-tobusiness, small-package market, bringing annual revenues above \$1 billion. Now retired, he serves on the Edgeworth Borough, PA town council and the Carnegie Natural History Museum Board of Directors.

The successful alumni shared their personal experiences with the seniors and offered advice and insight for the graduates as they prepared to

head to college and the workforce.

Swim Team Produces Five Academic All-Americans


Five members of the St. Edward High School Swimming & Diving Team have been named to the Academic All-America Team by the National Interscholastic Swimming Coaches Association of America.

Honorees include Jung Hoon Yang, Zachary Turk, Alex Street, George Shiekh and Samuel Geiger.

Over 286,670 students are involved in aquatics at the high school level in over 14,500 programs for boys and girls. Approximately 2 percent of those students are recognized as high school All-Americans.

The team's collective GPA is 3.390.

The team enjoyed great success in the water as well, placing first at the Lakewood Sectional Meet and 5th at the Cleveland State University District Meet.


Hot temperatures and swirling winds highlighted the day on the

Scott Luke '08 Earns Man of the Year Honors

2008: The Year of **Many Championships**





wim 2.4 miles. Bike 112 miles. Run 26.2 miles. That's what it takes to be an Ironman. On June 22, Kaleb Kaschalk '07, will be the youngest competitor (19 years, 2 months and 5 days) to test human physical limits during the Ironman Triathlon in Nice, France. With most competitors seasoned athletes in their mid-30s, Kaschalk, who just finished his freshman year at Youngstown State

University, has chosen to do something extraordinary not only to challenge himself, but to raise awareness and money for the Jimmy V. Foundation for cancer research, having lost his grandfather to the disease in 2006.

Kaschalk is committed to doing whatever he can to raise awareness for cancer research, as he has felt the impact in his own life, and knows it will impact the lives of so many others.

"Fifty percent of Americans are diagnosed with some form of cancer at some point in their lives," said Kaschalk during the interview for this article. "That means, of the two of us

sitting here, one will have cancer at some point."

So far, in his quest to do something unusual to honor his grandfather, and fight for a cure of a widespread disease, Kaschalk has raised more than \$3,000 and has caught the attention of his peers and the media.

He uses publicity, like features on Cleveland's Fox 8 News, the CBS affiliate in Youngstown, and The Vindicator, Youngstown's daily newspaper, to help raise funds that he will donate to the Jimmy V. Foundation, once he has completed the race.

To finance traveling halfway around the world to compete, he is using excess funds from a student loan, ensuring that every dollar of his \$10,000 goal will go toward finding a cure and honoring his late grandfather.

His challenge to himself is more than just unusual. It is one of the ultimate physical tests that any athlete can put his body through - in constant motion for more than 17 hours, fighting heat, the waves of an unpredictable sea, and the rigors of hills that give professional cyclists fits during some of

the most difficult stages of the Tour de France.

Underfunded and nearly underage (19 is the minimum age for competing in an Ironman Triathlon), Kaschalk is relying on swimming abilities that he takes away from four years of training as a member of the swim team while at St. Edward High School, a used road bike that he purchased on

> Craigslist for \$500, and sheer will and determination, as he fights with his legs through the last stage, the marathon.

"Finish. Push myself to see how fast I can do it." says Kaschalk when speaking about his goals for the June 22 race. "It's me vs. mvself."

Kaschalk hadn't always had it in his mind to compete in such a rigorous triathlon, but while planning to run the Cleveland Marathon during his senior year of high school, he read the back of an Ironman T-shirt that a man was wearing at the state swim meet.

"Swim 2.4 miles. Cycle 112 miles. Run 26.2 miles."

"All of the sudden a marathon didn't seem like that big of a deal," says Kaschalk.

With motivation passed along from his grandfather, he began training

part time in December 2007, juggling his academic responsibilities as a freshman in college with the preparation to put his body through a severe physical and mental challenge.

With swimming as his strength, he focused on biking, the area in which he feels he is weakest.



For three hours a day, while he was in school, he trained - riding the bike for two hours and alternating his running and swimming for an hour daily.

Once on his summer break from school, he began to train in longer intervals, often spending up to five hours riding his

bike through the Cleveland Metroparks simply to get used to the idea of spending that much time on a bike.

Kaschalk admits that the cycling portion of the race has him most concerned.

"It's unnerving relying on a machine," he said, of a bike that is not even designed for a triathlete.

But, his inexperience biking is just one of the challenges that he will face during the race. Beyond the fact he will be competing against 2,700 other more-seasoned athletes, many professionals, he will be competing in a foreign country, where he doesn't know the terrain, and will be battling the impact that the time change has on his body. He will also be traveling alone, and forced to train in Paris, where he will be stay-

ing for the eight days leading up to the race.

"It's nearly impossible to simulate the race conditions," he said, mentioning that he trains late at

night to prepare his body for the time change.

But none of the challenges that lie ahead of Kaschalk has weakened his spirit, which is being fueled by the memory of his grandfather.

"The disease took him out so fast," Kaschalk said of his

grandfather, who passed away on April 22, 2006 after a five month battle with cancer. "I am going to fight for him, and take the pain."

With training habits he established as a member of the St. Edward swim team, and inspired by Team Hoyt, a father/son pair who compete in triathlons, with the father pulling his son, who is afflicted with cerebral palsy, Kaschalk can see the finish line more than 140 miles and 17 hours away. He knows that when he gets there, he will have made his grandfather proud, and raised funds that contribute to one day eliminating such a devastating disease.

Swim 2.4 miles

The start will be given at 6:30 a.m. on the emblematic Plage du Centenaire. The swim entails 2 loops, one of 1.5 miles followed by a second one of just less than a mile, with a short land exit of about 66 feet at the end of the first loop.

Bike 112 miles

The bike race of 112 miles will be accomplished in 1 loop starting at the Promenade des Anglais. Racers will ride through some beautiful communes and villages of the picturesque hinterland of Nice while cheered on by the public. The circuit will drive racers through St Laurent du Var, Gattieres, Carros, Le Broc, Bouyon,

Gréolières. The total climbing altitude is nearly 6,000 feet, for a bike cutoff of 10:45 after the start of the race. Eight aid stations will be prepared for racers.

Run 26.2 miles

The run course consists of a 6.5 mile loop that has to be run four times, along the absolutely flat Nice coastline. During the run racers will enjoy the wonderful view from the Promenade des Anglais. Three aid stations will get you through the marathon, so racers may stop to eat and drink 24 times!

HARUKI NAKAMURA '04 NFL DRAFT DIARY:

On Sunday, April 26, with the 206th pick in the 2008 NFL Draft, the Baltimore Ravens selected Haruki Nakamura '04, a one-time All-Ohio wide receiver and defensive back at St. Edward High School, and a celebrated football star at the University of Cincinnati.

Throughout his training for the draft, his brother Yoshi '97, kept friends, family and the St. Edward community up-to-date on Haruki's progress by passing along draft diaries that were being compiled by the Cincinnati Bearcat

Insider. They detailed the physical and mental preparation that goes into impressing coaches from the world's toughest professional sports league.

"Forget about size. That's something I can't do anything about. David Pollack told me that the most overrated thing in the NFL or football period is height," said Nakamura in one of his draft diaries. "It has absolutely no bearing on how you play the game. It's your desire and passion for the game and how much you really want it."

Baltimore Ravens Senior Vice President Kevin Byrne, a 1967 St. Ed's graduate, drafted Haruki Nakamura. Kevin shared his story with St. Edward Magazine:

"Ozzie Newsome, the Ravens' general manager and Cleveland Browns Hall of Famer, heads our draft. And, with that responsibility, Ozzie has the honor of calling a player and telling him that he is now a Raven because we have drafted him. Prior to this year's NFL draft, I kept kidding Ozzie that he had a chance to take a St. Ed's product and that he shouldn't pass up the opportunity. During the 5th round of the 2008 draft, I pointed to Haruki's placard that was still on our board: "Oz, he's still there." Newsome laughed and said: "If he's there when we pick in the 6th round. we'll take him."

With two teams ahead of us in the 6th round, Ozzie said: "Get your St. Ed's guy on the phone, and see if these teams are trying to get him." I talked with Haruki for about seven minutes when Ozzie got the word that we were on the clock. Newsome turned to me and said: "Let your guy know that he's a Raven." With that, I said: "Haruki, from one St. Ed's guy to another, welcome to Baltimore. We just drafted you. You're a Baltimore Raven. That was a proud and special moment for me. I thank the classy Ozzie Newsome for giving me that opportunity.

I was recently making a presentation to our rookies about working with the media and getting involved in the community. Couldn't help but notice that Nakamura was wearing a St. Ed's wrestling t-shirt. His brother Yoshi, among the great wrestlers on the annually outstanding Eagle teams, had been sending me information on his little brother Haruki for a year — and I kept passing that info along to our scouts. True Eagle brotherhood."

aul Bosley is fluent in the language of mathematics. His grasp on numbers is firm, and his usage is as smooth as a celebrated poet's way with the written word. It's his mastery that has translated into tremendous success in the classroom, as in the past decade more than 98 percent of his Advanced Placement Calculus students have earned a three, four or five on the end-of-the year AP exam, and college credit for their work. Seventy-percent of those students have earned the top score of five - unprecedented compared to other high school students across the United States. His success has made him one of the St. Edward community's most celebrated educators, a favorite among his students, and an asset to those preparing to tackle math at the highest levels in college.



He was hired into the math department, and began his tenure at St. Edward High School at the start of the 1989-90 school year.

Bosley is entering his 21st year at St. Edward High School as one of the institution's most experienced and most celebrated instructors. During his 20 years, he has witnessed the school change and grow.

"It's a different school," said Bosley,

recalling the differences since first joining the staff in 1989. "We are certainly more academically minded."

But, Bosley has seen the school from more than just as a teacher, serving as St. Edward High School's Dean of Men for four years, from 1994-1997.

"I think everyone should have to experience being an administrator," explained Bosley.

Experience it, he did. After former Dean of Men, Ray Golic, had a heart attack in the middle of the 1993-94 school year, Br. James Spooner called upon St. Edward Athletic Director, Don Bosley to serve as the Interim Dean of

is where Bosley has done his most remarkable work, and guided students to achieve so much.

During his third year as a teacher at St. Ed's, Bosley began teaching AB Calculus, preparing student for the AP Exam to earn college credit.

Shortly after, he took over the BC Calculus program, teaching the school's most gifted math minds, and tailoring the class so that more than 98 percent of his students earn college credit by scoring a three, four or five on the exam.

admitted that he was so disappointed with the results of his first BC Calculus class' AP test results that he wrote an apology to the students and the Principal, feeling that he had let them down.

They have certainly produced, with 231 of the 234 students he has taught in the past 10 years earning a passing score on the AP exam, including 164 earning the highest score.






