

PREFACE

This publication has been prepared to consolidate in one source a historical overview of executive council appointments to the British Columbia Cabinet for its first 115 years. The period covers the interim council formed when British Columbia joined Confederation in 1871, to the end of the William R. Bennett administration in 1986.

Most of the information contained in the volume has been scattered intermittently throughout various historical documents and government publications in the Legislative Library's collection, such as the *British Columbia Gazette*, *British Columbia Sessional Papers*, newspaper articles and library clipping files. Access to the information has therefore been generally restricted to those individuals who were able to visit the Library personally. Librarians have for a long time felt the need to respond to requests from Members of the Legislative Assembly, their research staffs and academics to produce a consolidated work of the information, in order to facilitate research on the Executive Council.

The work was assisted by the Library's earlier research for the *Electoral History of British Columbia 1871–1986*, which was published in 1988 by British Columbia's Chief Electoral Officer and Registrar General of Voters, Mr. Harry Goldberg. More importantly it is the result of the determined research efforts of members of the Library staff. Special recognition goes to Frederike Verspoor who saw the potential for a volume to supplement the *Electoral History of British Columbia* and dedicated her efforts to its production even after she left the staff of the Legislative Library. With the assistance of librarians Judith Bennett and Vivienne Bruce she has produced a work of immense value to present and future researchers who will benefit from the meticulous and detailed effort which has gone into compiling the volume. Linda Stinson patiently typed the various drafts and the final manuscript and has in the end made the publication of *Executive Council Appointments* possible. It is to these people that the volume is dedicated.

INTRODUCTION

This document is a history of appointments to the Executive Council of British Columbia from the first, interim Council formed after British Columbia joined Confederation in 1871 to the end of the W.R. Bennett Ministry in 1986. To a certain extent, it is also a history of the portfolios themselves. Until now, two major sources have existed for Executive Council appointments and for terms of office for the Premiers: the *Annual Report* of the Provincial Secretary for 1973, 1974 and 1975 and the Ministry of Attorney General *Annual Report*, *1981–82*. They provided useful starting points. Further research, particularly into primary sources, yielded additional information. Dates and other details have been made as accurate as possible, variations and sources noted, background supplied for new portfolios, and explanations provided for resignations and dismissals.

The information has been divided into two parts. Part One deals with appointments (and terminations): names, dates and portfolios. They have been organized in three sequences: chronologically by Government (with Ministers listed alphabetically and their portfolios chronologically), alphabetically by Minister (with portfolios grouped chronologically by Premier, then arranged alphabetically), and alphabetically by portfolio (with Ministers listed chronologically and references made to related portfolios). The third sequence covers only 1871–1903; 1903–1986 is included in the first sequence, i.e. by Government. This arrangement was chosen because of the increasing size and complexity of Governments after 1903 as well as a feeling that grouping this sequence by Government after the introduction of formal party lines would be useful. The majority of the notes concerning sources, explanations and added information are to be found in the Appointments by Government section.

Part Two provides an alphabetical list of portfolios, together with the dates of their existence, which covers the entire period, i.e. 1871–1986. This list can be used as a guide to trace a particular portfolio through successive Governments. The second part also includes a list of Premiers with their dates for quick reference, a list of Legislatures and general elections to place the various Governments in context, a list of amendments to the Constitution Act which governed the size of the Executive Council, and a list of the sources used.

It is hoped that this document will serve both as a reference tool to obtain specific information and as an interesting look into a significant part of British Columbia's political history.

APPOINTMENTS BY GOVERNMENT

Dates

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Determination of appointment and termination dates has not been a simple matter. This is especially true of the early period, before the introduction of party government in 1903¹, but difficulties also exist for the later period. In some instances an arbitrary decision has been made but the reasons and alternatives have been noted. The sources themselves are partly responsible for the problems. The major ones used were the Oath Book (from 1871), the *British Columbia Gazette* (from 1871), Orders-in-Council (from 1873, but not consistently), and contemporary newspapers.

The Oath Book was not always signed the same day as the effective date of the appointment as given in the *Gazette* and/or Order-in-Council. The *Gazette* and Order-in-Council dates sometimes disagreed with each other. Early *Gazette* notices were dated but these dates were not necessarily the appointment dates, only the notice dates. After 1976, Ministers were sometimes sworn in as Members of the Executive Council but not assigned to a portfolio until the following day. Not all appointments were recorded in official sources, again primarily in the earlier period.²

Termination dates (resignations, dismissals, deaths) are even more problematic. In the early years there was frequently no official rescinding notice, only an appointment notice for the new Minister. When no other information was available and there were no indications that the position had been vacated earlier, it has been assumed that a Minister retained that position until a new Minister took over. In some cases a resignation was handed in but not accepted or given official recognition (in the *Gazette* or by Order-in-Council) until later. When this occurred, the resignation has been considered effective on the later date, and the earlier one (usually derived from the newspapers) noted. If official acknowledgement was absent, or not found, the 4 date provided by the newspapers, which may or may not be the actual termination date, has been used and the source noted. From 1913 to 1966 termination dates were frequently added as handwritten margin notes in the Oath Book but cannot be considered official or completely authoritative. Indeed, there appear to have been some errors. In those instances where a date has been inferred from indirect evidence, square brackets [] have been used to indicate uncertainty and the reasons given. The same applies to inferred appointment dates.

One position on the Executive Council, President of the Council, presents a particular problem for the early years. It is not a portfolio as such and was not specified in the Constitution Act until 1899. It is not always clear who was appointed, or when. At times it appears that no one individual was designated; there was no appointment notice and Orders-in-Council would be signed by different Cabinet members at different times as President (or Presiding Member). Since Bowser, with the exception of Tolmie, the Premier has filled the position and in 1973 this arrangement was formalized in the Constitution Act.

Dates for the beginning and end of a Government, or Ministry, also present some problems. Sources have been supplied in all cases and, where they are not straightforward, an explanation as well. A Government has been considered for our purposes here to begin when the Premier is sworn in and end when the Premier leaves — be it by resignation, dismissal or death. By popular convention, the appointments of members of the Executive Council come to an end with the departure of the Premier. In practice, however, and also constitutionally, a Minister's term of office can continue.³

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There have, in fact, been instances when appointments appear to have continued into the next Government, i.e. no new appointment notices appeared and no new oaths were sworn. This occurred in 1874 when George A.B. Walkem succeeded Amor de Cosmos as Premier two days after the latter had resigned. All retained their portfolios, including Walkem, as if the Government had not changed. Indeed, both De Cosmos and Walkem initially took this position and were taken to task by the Victoria Colonist for their "ignorance of constitutional government".⁴ A similar situation occurred in 1889 when Alexander E.B. Davie became Premier upon William Smithe's death and again in 1927 when John MacLean took over after John Oliver died. On this latter occasion, there was also some public controversy. MacLean, who had already been chosen as party leader by the Liberal Party a month before to replace the ailing Oliver, was not sworn in - by his own choice - until after Oliver's funeral, three days after his death. He was sworn in as Premier and President of the Council but refused the resignations offered by the Ministers, and retained the Cabinet intact. Only one Minister, Pattullo, took a new oath. As in 1874, the constitutional validity and propriety of continuing the appointments was discussed in the local press.⁵ More recently, in 1986, when William N. Vander Zalm succeeded William R. Bennett after having been chosen as the new Social Credit Party leader, he took over the Cabinet virtually unchanged. Appointment notices appeared only for the two new Ministers and only they — and Vander Zalm — were sworn in.

On the other hand, there have also been cases where, under circumstances similar to those described above, new oaths were sworn and formal appointments made although the portfolios remained the same. This occurred in 1895 when John H. Turner replaced Theodore Davie, in 1902 when Prior succeeded James Dunsmuir, in 1918 when John Oliver became Premier five days after Harlan C. Brewster's death, and in 1947 when Byron I. Johnson was chosen by the Liberal Party to take the place of John Hart who had resigned. For the sake of consistency and to avoid any more confusion than is unavoidable, all appointments have been treated as terminating upon the resignation, death or dismissal of the Premier. Those instances, however, when Ministers appear to have continued in office, have been noted. As well, when a Minister retained a portfolio from one Government to the next, whether reappointed or not, an * precedes the portfolio(s) retained.

Two types of appointments and resignations have been omitted. Occasionally, in order to facilitate major changes during a Premier's term, the entire Executive

Council would resign. Some Ministers would receive new portfolios but others would be reappointed to the same ones. In the case of the latter, neither resignation nor reappointment dates have been given. As well, virtually all those acting appointments to replace a Minister who was temporarily absent from Victoria have been excluded. Acting appointments have been included only if there was an actual vacancy or if a lengthy absence was involved.

Ministers and the Legislature

Until 1929 Members of the Legislature who were appointed to a salaried position on the Executive Council after they had been elected were required to resign and run again in a by-election. This was often referred to as a "ministerial byelection". In most instances, there was little or no contest, and the Minister would resume his seat. Occasionally, however, the Minister lost the by-election and eventually resigned. As well, there were cases where individuals ran in a by-election to regain or gain a seat (one having been vacated for the purpose by a Government Member of the Legislative Assembly). This also met with mixed results. On one occasion a Premier who had been personally defeated although his party had not (John Oliver in 1924), successfully employed this strategy.⁶ Due to these situations, Cabinet Ministers were sometimes without a seat in the Legislature. If the period was a short one, due to the formality of a ministerial by-election, it has not been noted.⁷ If, however, a longer period of time was involved, or if a Minister did not hold a seat for the duration of his appointment, this has been pointed out. There were also a few Ministers who were never MLAs; they have been identified.

Terms

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In most cases the title attached to a portfolio is Minister but there are some exceptions: the Attorney-General, the Provincial Secretary and the Chief Commissioner of Lands and Works (later Lands). In speaking generally of a member of the Executive Council however, the term Minister has been employed.

A distinction should also be made between *portfolio* and *department* (since 1977, ministry). The first is the position, or responsibility, assigned to a Member of the Executive Council; the second is the arm of the civil service, established by statute, to fulfill certain administrative functions. The former can exist, and has, without the latter. A Minister of Education and of Mines for example, existed long before these departments were established. A *department*, on the other hand, cannot exist without being the responsibility of a member of the Executive Council (as specified in the enabling statute).⁸ Until 1973 most portfolios were named in the Constitution Act, thereafter only in Orders-in-Council. Additions, deletions and alterations to Executive Council positions have been noted and sources cited. In certain cases legislation dealing with the departments has also been included but this is by no means a history of *departmental* origins and changes (which is itself worth a separate study).

"Ministry" is used here in the sense of, and interchangeably with, "Government", rather than being synonymous with "department". "Cabinet" and "Executive Council" have also been used interchangeably although the former is sometimes considered a committee of the latter.

¹ British Columbia entered Confederation 20 July 1871. A Lieutenant-Governor, Joseph Trutch, was appointed as of that date but he did not arrive in B.C. until 13 August and was sworn in the next day (B.C. *Gazette* 19 August 1871, p. 1; Victoria *Colonist* 15 August 1871). In the meantime the former colonial officials retained their positions. Provision was made for a general election to be held but this would not occur until a few months hence. Trutch felt that in the absence of "constituted representatives from whom... a [responsible] ministry can be selected" it would be a "presumption" on his part "to anticipate the votes of the people of British Columbia by naming any one individual as possessing their confidence beyond others" (Victoria *Colonist* 19 August 1871). He recognized, however, that "for the Conduct of Public business" an Executive Council would have to be appointed but "on the clearly expressed understanding that their appointments are to remain only until the Election" at which time he would choose a responsible Ministry from among those elected (Trutch to John A. It is true that his earlier appointment had not been specifically designated as acting (see Interim Ministry, note 4).

Walkem apparently chose not to resign and to wait until the Legislature met.







GROWTH OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

This section traces amendments to the Constitution Act which governed the size and composition of the Executive Council from 1871 to 1980. Name changes as such are not included here but can be found in the Appointments by Government section. The number of portfolios or members specified at any given time does not, of course, necessarily correspond to the actual size of the Executive Council as Ministers often held more than one portfolio.

The text of the relevant section of the Constitution Act (at various times s.9 or s.10) begins — with some minor alterations in wording over the years — "The Executive Council of British Columbia shall be composed of such persons as the Lieutenant-Governor from time to time thinks fit to appoint, not exceeding . . .". After specifying the maximum number, portfolios are named. Before 1899 those named were fewer than the maximum; from 1899 the number of named portfolios corresponded to the maximum number of Executive Council members but a limit was put on the number who would receive a salary ("of whom not more than . . . shall receive any salary."). From 1973 portfolios (other than President of the Council) were no longer named in the Constitution Act and from 1980 the maximum size and number of salaried members were no longer specified.
