#### THE RECTOR

So much about St Aloysius' is about being a community of friends. On Saturday night Fr Provincial, Steve Curtin blessed the new Dalton Hall. Some 650 people attended the Parents' and Friends' Commencement Cocktail Party. Thanks to all who helped make this night so enjoyable. Many commented positively on the experience of being part of the Aloysian family.



The next day, the Heads' and Rectors' of the Jesuit-owned and Jesuit-partnered schools met in Sydney. It reminded me that we are also blessed to be part of a wider Jesuit family. In Australia this includes ministries in (a) education (4 Jesuit-owned and 5 partnered schools), (b) social (Jesuit Mission, Jesuit Refugee Service, Jesuit Social Services, and indigenous activities), (c) pastoral (11 parishes and migrant chaplaincies), (d) mission formation (4 retreat centres and formation in spirituality), and (e) communications and development (fundraising, electronic and print-publishing).

The Heads' and Rectors' meeting included people from Xavier College Melbourne, Xavier Catholic College Hervey Bay, Saint Ignatius' College Adelaide, Saint Ignatius' College Geelong, Saint Ignatius' College Riverview, Loyola Senior High School Mount Druitt, Loyola College Watsonia and John XXIII College Perth. Fr Chris Gleeson, the Provincial Delegate for Education was also present. Chris is the Chair of the Jesuit Schools' Commission which assists the Provincial in guiding the schools ministry. Students from the Jesuit-owned and Jesuit-partnered schools bond with each other through sporting carnivals, leadership formation, shared immersion experiences and debating festivals. Our Staff also connect through Ignatian formation experiences, pilgrimages, and curriculum development.

At St Aloysius' we join a huge network of people in the Jesuit family. The Jesuits are a worldwide religious order of about 19,000 people in some 120 countries today. They are the largest religious order in the church today. The Jesuit network is not just the Jesuits and it never was! Today we speak in terms of Jesuits and our companions in mission. In Australia, we are not just a Province of 150 Jesuits but rather of 2,000 companions and more if we include all our students.

The quality of education has improved as Jesuit lay collaboration has developed. Lay people assuming positions of leadership has resulted in more talented people contributing their gifts. The mission for us all is to be welcoming, discerning and courageous.

When the Jesuits were founded in 1540, they grew quickly and were renowned for their missionary endeavour and educational work. Jesuits were highly mobile and innovative in an era of European expansionism. They went to India, Ethiopia, Malaysia, Japan, Mexico, Argentina, Colombia, Brazil, Paraguay, Peru, China, Canada, Mozambique and other places within the first generation. They set up schools beginning in Gandia in Spain in 1546 and Messina in Sicily. Within sixty years there were 500 colleges in Europe and beyond. The early Jesuits established a school system that spread through Europe, the Americas and parts of Asia. It was an organization of individual schools in close contact with one another, deliberately reviewing and evaluating their experience, both classroom and administrative, on a large scale, and sharing teachers who moved around according to their own capabilities, and as the needs of the institution demanded and permitted. This was a multinational group responding vigorously to a global market.

When the Jesuits were suppressed in 1773, over 700 educational institutes were disbanded and 250,000 students had to make other arrangements. Jesuits survived their suppression and in 1814 were again involved with schools and colleges. Most were well regarded and prestigious in their contexts. During the 1960s in Latin America and throughout the world, many in Jesuit schools questioned whether they were educating the elite and perpetuating cycles of social inequity. Students at Jesuit Colleges were encouraged to recognize that privileges bring responsibilities; to assist those on the edge rather than become prospective victimizers.

Today Jesuits have a range of educational pursuits. Popular education in parts of Latin America is not structured around formal colleges as in other parts of the world. Nativity schools in the United States educate and motivate inner-city middle-school students in a supportive environment. In increasing numbers our educational institutions are accessible to students from economically disadvantaged groups. The Jesuits willingly share their educational heritage with others when asked. The partnered schools of our province are a special gift.

In the coming months, Jarjum College will commence in Redfern. It is trying to respond to an educational need among urban Aboriginal children who are not participating or coping in mainstream schools as a result of difficult domestic circumstances. Jarjum (the name for 'children' in the Bundjalung language) will try to support children who are not attending school and have fallen behind in education for various reasons of disadvantage, by engaging with families and motivating these children. Aunty Beryl Van-Oploo, an Elder in the Redfern area, believes Jarjum will "fill the gap". As well as offering learning programmes with a curriculum appropriate to their needs, Jarjum will provide breakfast and lunch, washing facilities and health

care, after-school activities and family community gatherings. One aim is to help support children to a level of education that would enable them to transfer effectively to a local school.

Working closely with local Aboriginal people, St Aloysius' staff, friends and council members have helped shape this vision carefully. The Board of Studies has given initial registration. The Archdiocese has given the St Vincent Catholic Church Presbytery for the school. This church is at the heart of Aboriginal history in Redfern. Some years ago this was burnt down, so we have undertaken to refurbish

this to build the school on this site. Architects have developed a plan which will go to tender for the building in the coming weeks. We have appointed Beatrice Sheen as Founding Principal of Jarjum. Beatrice is an Aboriginal woman from the Gamilaroi Nation and has a background of fine educational experience. This school will rely on the support of the St Aloysius' family and can I encourage your participation. It is an important initiative.

#### THE PRINCIPAL

Last Saturday night saw the Blessing of Dalton Hall by the Jesuit Provincial, Fr Steve Curtin SJ. A large number of guests witnessed the historic occasion. It was an opportunity to thank our donors, the building team from Prime led by former parent, Mr Phil de Gail, the architects from Gardner, Wetherill and Associates (including the Lead Architect, Mr Greg McGuirk, from the Class of 1988) and our Project Manager, Mr Uhar Havukainen. We were also able to acknowledge Mr Eric Goodwin, our former Chair of Council, whose generous

commitment in time and expertise in the building industry played such a big part in getting this project up and running. The contribution of the Federal Government through Building the Education Revolution programme was also acknowledged. Dalton Hall marks a new step in our journey as a school, in this our 132nd year. It is fittingly named after the founder of the school. It reflects our commitment to the future and the nature of the holistic education at Aloys. It will be a wonderful resource for the boys and the school.

Most of the guests at the Blessing of Dalton Hall then crossed Upper Pitt Street to join the Parents and Friends Commencement Party. The large turnout of parents was witness to the strength of parental

involvement and to the energy of the Parents and Friends Association under Mr Michael Morgan. With over 650 people in attendance, the night was very well catered for. It was pleasing also to note the presence of so many members of staff.

It was pleasing to see many of the Senior boys assist with both the Blessing, and the Parents and Friends Commencement Party. The College Captain, **Declan Johnston**, read the gospel at the Blessing (and even shed his blood on the commemorative plaques!). **Luke Spano**, the Chair of the SRC, read the prayer of blessing. The Senior

Jazz Ensemble and the Chamber Choir provided the music for the ceremony. Many of our Senior student leaders also assisted with the serving at the Commencement Party. **Tom Morrison** and **Leo Hennessy** even helped with the cooking on the night. The College is grateful for the boys' support and assistance.

This week sees the launch of the My School 2.0 websites by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA). The website profiles of schools and information about

schools such as numbers of students and staff, attendance rates and results from the national literacy and numeracy tests for Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in 2010. The website shows comparisons Aloysius' NAPLAN between results and those from schools having students from statistically backgrounds similar across Australia. For the first time, the site includes information relating schools' finances (2009 recurrent income and capital expenditure displayed broken down by the source of funding).

Comparisons will be made and League tables will undoubtedly be drawn up later in the week. Broadly speaking, we are very happy with our results, though it should be said that they are to be

Broadly speaking, we are very happy with our results, though it should be said that they are to be expected as we are a partially selective school. We are not selective in the sense of a James Ruse High or Sydney Grammar, because, while we do have an entry examination as a factor in the selection process due to our more limited curriculum in the Senior years, academic performance is only one of the criteria used in the selection process. Regularly, some of our best performing students in the entry examinations are not offered places at the school due to the mix of criteria used in selections. Moreover, we do not offer any academic

scholarships (one way that schools have of maintaining a certain level

of HSC results). It could also be argued that many other schools are *de facto* partially selective through their interview process and the fees they charge. Additionally, one could note that Aloys has relatively large class sizes and more modest resources than some of the bigger, more expensive schools, though of course we compare well in resources to the majority of schools.

The material relating to NAPLAN on the site is useful to the school, especially as information accumulates over a number of years. It might enable us to recognize relative weaknesses in our programme in a particular area, or a relative weakness in a particular cohort that needs more attention. The ability to compare ourselves to other schools that we judge as relevant to our style and population is of more use than simply having our statistics compared to a generic State average.

As the site's intention is to better inform parents, it is important that parents should be fully aware of its limitations and of the problems that may be associated with a publicly accessible site and the attendant league tables.

Firstly, in terms of accountability, I would argue that schools such as ours provide consistent, hard evidence of what is, or is not, working. The national NAPLAN testing of literacy and numeracy in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9, the Year 6 Religious Education test in Sydney, the numerous University-sponsored competitions we enter, the fifteen formal school examination periods from Years 3-12, the School Certificate and the HSC, all give specific feedback to parents on their sons' academic progress.

Secondly, the comparative feature within My School – that is comparing each school with numbers of like schools – appears to fail the common sense test. The ICSEA (Index of Community Socio-Educational Advantage) measure exposes the difficulties in any broad socio-economic model as a basis of comparison (or of funding for that matter). The press will highlight various incongruities in comparisons between very unlike schools. I doubt whether this aspect of the site has any real educational value. Another agenda is at play.

Thirdly, what will be largely ignored is perhaps the biggest issue in public education, especially in NSW, namely the relation between Government selective and comprehensive schools. The data clearly identifies this as being the biggest range in results between schools.

It must be admitted that My School may serve a purpose where it appears that local schools (two or three public, or in some, two or three Catholic) in the same town or suburb, which on appearances would seem to have real similarities, yet their scores are substantially different. Here would seem to be a real sharp point of pressure, and maybe questions must be asked of schools.

The downside to this competitive, public outing is that schools may focus strongly on teaching to the NAPLAN tests. Anecdotal accounts already point to some schools heavily focusing on this testing, even though unlike say the HSC, such tests were not intended for such use. They are meant to be diagnostic tools for identifying issues with students and teaching, and not as mechanisms of assessment. Tutoring and coaching and undue focus in the classroom will distort such results. At Aloysius' we seek to ensure that students are familiar with the style of questions, but the tests are fitted into our normal programme. Who could blame schools in the fairly predatory climate created by league tables even at Year 3 level for making such tests a core object of teaching (especially where it may influence enrolments and fundraising)? It is ironic also that the one measure of academic achievement that might adequately reflect school performance - the ATAR measure derived from Year 12 examinations and assessments - is the one measure not included in My School.

In relation to schools teaching to the NAPLAN tests, it might be noted that such a narrow focus in teaching may impact adversely on the teaching of the creative arts, science, social sciences and the like. Another factor that has received little mention in the analysis is that of gender. The fact that NAPLAN examines four language rich components and only one numeracy component might seem to favour girls, and therefore girls' schools or those with a large number of girls, given that there appears to be some difference in attainment

between boys and girls, especially during the primary and early secondary years of schooling.

The publicity surrounding My School carries too much ideological colour. Much coverage will be framed around government versus nongovernment schools, often with inaccurate or superficial detail. Such reports are often linked to comments on Federal Government funding of non-government schools, ignoring the fact that only 20% of all government funding goes to non-government schools that educate one in three Australian students. The new financial reporting carries real limitations. Comments will be made on staff/student ratios, and in particular disparities between schools over Support Staff, as a factor in academic performance. There is little realisation that non-government schools, and in particular independent schools, need development offices, and large finance and maintenance staff because they charge fees and do not have large government bureaucracies that are responsible for capital works, procurements etc. Education Department work forces are not included in Support Staff for government schools. Differences between schools in relation to cocurricular programmes (sport, music, drama, debating and cadets) are not accounted for. The figures shown relate to income but do not give a breakdown of expenditure. Comparisons will be drawn between spending by schools on each student, ignoring the fact that apples aren't being compared to apples in comparing independent schools with those in systems, whether State or Catholic Systemic.

The issue of funding remains a hot issue. My recent article on State aid in *The Gonzagan* was published this week in Melbourne's *Age* newspaper. In contrast to the statistics and fairly locked in arguments, an SBS documentary, *Two of Us*, was televised on Sunday. Parts were filmed here at Aloys and it relates the amazing stories of Anh Do (SAC 1994) and Khoa Do (SAC 1996), two refugee boys who graduated from the College. They follow in the footsteps of Sir Gus Nossal (SAC 1947), and a reminder of the historic role played by Catholic schools in the history of Australian immigration.

On Sunday, the College's chapter of the St Vincent De Paul Society conducted the Vinnie's Buddies Day. Eleven of our Year 11 and 12 students (James Crouch, Andrew France, Christopher Anderson, Patrick Furlong, James Evans, Nick Surman, Timothy Humphreys, John Booth, Blake Cohen, Jacob Dolores and James Paton), assisted by Ms Emily Moran and Mr Michael Cronin, hosted 25 children from a number of refuges at Balmoral beach with swimming and other games and activities. The boys also regularly help with Night Patrol on Friday nights.

In sport, highlights included wins by our Firsts in Cricket, Tennis and Water polo. The spin twins formed the backbone of our batting in the Firsts against Barker, with **Grant Jansson** (Year 11) making 67 and **Dom Thomson** (Year 11) making 50. **Alec Cornelius** (Year 12) took 3/47. An unbeaten 65 by **Cassian Hand** (Year 10) in the 10As, the 9As' bowlers and **Alex Favotto** (Year 7) with 65 were standouts. In Basketball, wins were scarce, with the 10As keeping the flag flying. Our Tennis continues to dominate, though Captain and raconteur, **Harry Kelleher** (Year 12), conceded his firsts singles' loss of the season. The Firsts' win over Scots (7-2) means that they play Riverview in the final match of the season, with the winner premiers in the combined CAS/GPS competition.

Congratulations to **Harry Kelleher** (Year 12) and **Robin Pfister** (Year 10) on their selection in the NSW Combined Independent Schools' team of eight.

On the cultural front, the College Theatresports competition entertained on Friday evening. Our Drama production "To Be or Not to Be" is gearing up for its season in three weeks' time. Debating has begun and the first round of the Fr Christopher Willcock Music competition was held on Monday night.

#### THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

An SRC initiative has led to the Canteen being open each day after school from 3.10-3.30pm for those last minute purchases before training. Students who attend training after school have traditionally been asked to change back into their school uniform for their return journey home. Previously, with no specific training uniform, we asked boys to change back to be well presented and easily identifiable on public transport. Now in the era of almost every sporting activity having a training uniform, I have decided to reconsider this expectation and rule and am happy for boys to go home in training uniform from their various venues. The expectation to be well dressed is ever present and does not change. For the winter months, when sports gear can end up wet or muddy, we ask and encourage boys to bring their tracksuit along too, so they can change into that for the journey home.

CAS Swimming at SOPAC next Thursday commences and ends earlier. As a result, Years 10, 11, 12 will be bussed to SOPAC at 2.30pm. Boys should return to school by bus by about 8.00pm. A reminder, too, that the following day (next Friday), all Senior School boys may take advantage of a late start. A staff meeting from 8.20-9.20am will lead to classes commencing with Period 2 at 9.25am.

Boys using USB drives to store files are encouraged to save a file on the drive with their name – eg *johnsmithyear9.docx*. This is a simple suggestion which may save much anxiety and assist in the return of lost drives.

Dalton Hall usage has been tremendous in the early weeks of term. Each morning, over 50 boys arrive at 6.30am for early morning strength and conditioning, supervised by Mr Greg Austin and Mr Paul Luchi. At lunch, the pool is open to all boys for lap swimming, supervised by both Mr Austin and a Year 11 Bronze Medallion holder. Specialised basketball training is offered at lunch, too, and Years 11 and 12 are welcome to play three-on-three games if space is available. Years 7-10 continue to have access to the old gym at lunch for the same. Strength and conditioning boys must train in a change of clothes, use a towel and are encouraged to shower after their session. Swimmers also have access to showers. Basketballers need not change but must have a change of shoes. Any visitors to the Dalton facility are asked to respect the rule that no food or drink be brought into the centre. Similarly, all visitors are requested to stay on the edges of the basketball court and not walk on the playing surface in anything but runners. We have a wonderful new facility available for our boys and wish to preserve and respect it appropriately.

I am delighted to see that the Junior School has more than its fair share in the use of the new pool and the gymnasium at every available opportunity. The cocktail party that followed the Dalton Hall opening was a fitting and enjoyable way to celebrate this occasion, as well as the commencement of another year. Thank you to Mr Michael Morgan and his P&F committee on organising a wonderful party to kick start the year.

Wednesday next week marks the commencement of a special period in the Church's calendar and the life of this school. It's Ash Wednesday, the first Day of Lent. This 40 days season of Lent leading up to Easter will be marked by a number of activities with a focus on "giving" and "giving up". The emphasis will be on generosity through words and deeds, in giving of ourselves and giving up something that restricts us from being the best people that we can be. We will be asking the boys and their families to give what they can to the Project Compassion Appeal for Caritas Australia. Following the Shrove Tuesday Pancake morning tea (freshly cooked) for the day before Ash Wednesday, boys will be taking Project Compassion boxes home. We will encourage boys to place their loose change or what they can spare by giving something up for Lent (like chocolates, lollies, soft drinks, etc) and ask them to bring the boxes back to school at the end of Lent. One day during the Holy Week, we will invite boys and teachers to participate in a 'mini fast" (such as foregoing recess or part of their lunch) to experience in a small way what it is like to go hungry for a day, something that nearly half the children around the world experience almost on a daily basis. What they do not spend for morning tea or lunch that one day in Lent, we will urge them to give, so their hungry brothers and sisters in another part of the world might be fed. I would like to stress that participation in these activities is totally optional and voluntary.

Last week's Cross Country Carnival was a successful afternoon, with Owen House, led by Captain James Lawrence and Vice-Captain Anthony Sleiman, taking the overall honours. Well done to the boys, all of whom participated in one of the two categories. This is a website with units of work on different study skills topics, as well as facilities to ask study skills questions, download podcasts about how students can improve their results as well as other resources and planning templates. A great idea at the start of every term is to print off the term planner. This can be found by clicking on the 'For Students' tab, then on the 'Things to Print' button. You will find term planners as well as weekly planners at the bottom of this page in both WORD and PDF format. Simply fill in the dates for the term, and place the term planner somewhere visible at home – for example above your desk on a noticeboard.

As you are told about a test or assignment, write these onto the appropriate date on the term planner. Highlight tests in one colour and assignments in another colour so they stand out clearly. Cross off each day as you go, so you have a clear picture of how the work is spread out over the term and how long until things are due. Writing these due dates in your diary as well is essential of course, but it does not give you the overall picture like a term planner does. This is a good thing to do at the start of every term right from the start of secondary school through to the end (and beyond to university as well!). Lent is the Christian season of preparation before Easter. In Western Christianity, Ash Wednesday marks the first day, or the start of the season of Lent, which begins 40 days prior to Easter. Lent is a time when many Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline. The purpose is to set aside time for reflection on Jesus Christ – his suffering and his sacrifice, his life, death, burial and resurrection.

Lent is a season of soul-searching and repentance. It is a season for reflection and taking stock. Lent originated in the very earliest days of the Church as a preparatory time for Easter, when the faithful rededicated themselves and when converts were instructed in the faith and prepared for baptism. By observing the forty days of Lent, the individual Christian imitates Jesus' withdrawal into the wilderness for forty days.

At St Aloysius' College we will begin Lent with Ash Wednesday Services. The day before, Shrove Tuesday, pancakes will be sold to raise money for Caritas. Please look for the flier later in this issue for more details. Caritas is the Catholic Agency for International Aid and development. A guest speaker from Caritas will speak at the Year 7 Assembly next week. Year 7 is traditionally the year responsible for the collection of donations for Caritas, through the Project Compassion Boxes, during the Season of Lent. #### **CO-CURRICULAR NEWS**

#### THE DIRECTOR OF CO-CURRICULA

The highlights of CAS Round 9 against Barker College were the performances of our 1sts teams in cricket, tennis and water polo. All three teams had wins, and now the 1sts cricket and 1sts water polo, along with 1sts volleyball, are all playing for possible premiership honours this Saturday, which is a marvellous achievement in itself. 1sts tennis has already secured the CAS title for a fourth consecutive CAS season with their victory over Knox two weeks ago. Overall, tennis was our best performing sport again last Saturday throughout the age groups. Last week, our swim team competed at the annual Oakhill carnival which is a three way meet involving Saint Ignatius' College Riverview, Oakhill College and ourselves. The team competed very successfully at the carnival, winning three of the four trophies on offer, including the Junior and Senior Division and overall points score trophy. For the first time ever, the College swim team has won all four lead up carnivals to the CAS Championships. Congratulations to all coaches, staff and team members on such a fantastic achievement.

As in the previous week, our 1sts cricketers had to play at their best to withstand a strong challenge from the Barker 1sts. Batting first, we scored 193 runs with Grant Jansson contributing 67 runs and Dom Thomson 50 runs. In response, Barker got very close to our score, being finally dismissed for 179 runs. Alec Cornelius was again amongst the wickets, collecting 3/47, along with Tom Goh (3/31). This was the 1sts seventh win of the season but still leaves the team in second placing on the competition table to the undefeated Knox team. The team will be watching with great interest the outcome of the Knox/Cranbrook fixture next Saturday at Hordern. If we were to beat Waverley and Knox lose to Cranbrook, then we would win the CAS title for the first time in many years. The 2nds had another heart-breaking loss to Barker in the last over of the day. Both teams were playing for second position on the unofficial competition table. The 2nds scored 135 runs with Tom Morrison hitting 34 in the total. Barker achieved the total with only four balls left. Chris Skinner was the pick of the bowlers. The 3rds had their chance to win this week but once again their batting let them down. Ellis Freed however managed to score an unbeaten 28 runs. In the bowling, Mitchell Arnold took 3-12 and Campbell Duffy 3/19. Barker was a little too strong in the 4ths fixture.

Cassian Hand scored an unbeaten 65 runs in the 10A loss to Barker. James Begbie maintained his consistent form of late with bat (23 runs) and ball (2/24) in the 10B match. The 9As had another excellent win. The team dismissed Barker for 81 runs following a superb bowling and

fielding display. The 9Bs had a terrific win with James Goodman standing out in the bowling amongst many others. Ben Wilkinson scored 38 runs in the 9Cs' loss. Barker dominated the 8s' age group. Many of their boys play representative cricket right through the grades. Matthew Kell was again amongst the runs, hitting 31runs in the 8Cs. Our 7As fell just ten short of passing the Barker total of 103 runs. Alex Favotto was the main contributor with 65 runs.

Our 1sts basketball team has been running hot and cold this term. The team performed superbly against Cranbrook the previous week but could not repeat the effort against Barker last Saturday. Both teams were playing for third position on the competition table but Barker outplayed us and fully deserved the win. Alex Perkins was the pick of our players. The 1sts hopefully can finish on a high this week against Waverley College. In the previous encounter with Waverley, the team posted 123 points!! The 2nds went down 35-68 in disappointing circumstances. Unfortunately we were not able to win any other Opens games this week.

The 10As however did record an excellent 29-27 win at the Brick Pit. In the 10s' age group, the other best performing team was the 10Es who lost narrowly 23-26. The 9s' age group was very competitive despite not winning any games. Barker was too strong in the 8s' age group. The 7As played one of their better matches, though going down 29-39.

Overall, tennis has been our most successful sport this term. Last Saturday against Barker, we won nine of the twenty matches played. The 1sts played their toughest opponents in Barker in what is always an excellent fixture. Despite winning 7-1 on sets, the 1sts were tested by a very competent Barker team. Harry Kelleher lost his first singles game of the season while Robin Pfister won only narrowly in a tie breaker. Three of the team, Harry Kelleher, Robin Pfister and Matt Rowland will be trying out this Wednesday for possible selection in the CIS team. The 2nds are on track to remain undefeated too this season after a 6-2 win. Not to be outdone, the 3rds too have had a wonderful season, losing only one match.

In the 10s' age group, both the Bs and Cs drew on sets but lost narrowly on games. In the 9s' age group, the As were our best performing team, drawing on sets but losing on games. Our 8s and 7s' age groups were impressive, winning three matches in each age. The 8Bs, 8Ds and 7Bs all had big wins.

In water polo, the 1sts had a sound 7-2 win over Scots College. The team is still undefeated this season and, like last year, play the unbeaten Saint Ignatius' College at the Gartlan Centre at 9.20am this Saturday to determine which school wins the competition. It should be a wonderful game, with both schools boasting Australian reps and some outstanding talent. The 2nds, despite losing 2-6 to a strong opponent, displayed some of their best form of the season. Scots was too strong in 16s' fixtures. The 14As lost only 2-5 in their encounter. Congratulations to both 13s' teams who had narrow but impressive wins.

The 1sts volleyball unfortunately suffered a very untimely loss to Barker. The team lost in five sets which could cost them the CAS premiership. The team will now be keen to beat Waverly College this Saturday and hope that Barker beats Trinity this week for a slice of the premiership. Trinity is outright competition leader after our loss on Saturday. The 1sts play in Dalton Hall at 1.30pm this Saturday, following the 1sts basketball fixture. The 2nds won their game against Barker 2-1 whilst the 3rds went down 1-2 in their last match of the season.

On 10 March at 11.00am in the College Hall, our CAS swim team will be presented to the school. The CAS Championships are on that afternoon at SOPAC Homebush. The first event has been brought forward to 3.45pm with the last event scheduled for 7.05pm. All students in Years 12, 11 and 10 must attend. Boys will be bussed to the venue and back. Buses should return to Bradfield Park by 8.15/8.30pm approximately. Boys can however be picked up by 7.20pm at the venue. Students do not need to be at school until 9.20am on the following day because of a staff meeting.

In chess news, congratulations to Henry Clarke, Sean O'Shea and Conor O'Shea on their wins last Friday against Barker College.

#### WATER POLO NEWS



Last Saturday saw matches against Scots for all teams. All teams except the 13s played in the very large Ashfield pool. Our Firsts were successful (7-2), but looked flat for the first three quarters, only coming alive in the final quarter of the game. Three

tough training sessions this week should see them ready for "the match of the season" against Riverview on Saturday. The match is at 9.15am at the Gartlan Centre at Riverview and a huge crowd of Aloysian supporters will hopefully witness a dream come true – three consecutive combined CAS/GPS titles to Aloys – a feat not yet achieved by any school in the long history of Water Polo. This is the sixth year we have been playing for the title in the last match of the season. In true Aloysian spirit the boys will play beyond expectations against a tough opposition.

The Seconds went down 2-6 in what was a good display against Scots. The boys have certainly improved throughout the season and it's been great to see all boys giving a huge effort each week. Our 16s' teams both went down to superior Scots' teams – the 16As 1-12 and 16Bs 1-14. The boys found the large pool too much to handle on the day. The 14As went down in a close tussle 2-5 and the 14Bs were soundly beaten 0-10. The 13s SAC Blue played the Scots College Gold team and had an exciting, come-from-behind 7-6 victory. SAC Blue played well but missed some early chances with the game 1-1 at quarter time and 3-3 at half time. Scots ended the third quarter leading 4-5 and scored early in the fourth. Down 4-6, SAC Blue rallied and scored the last three goals of the game. Sean O'Shea backed up from SAC Gold and gave great effort in attack and defence. His two goals were matched

#### CAS Swimming Championships - Years 10, 11 & 12


Boys in Years 10, 11 &12 will be attending the Championships as per the College diary.

On the following day, Senior School boys are not due at the College until 9.20am due to a staff meeting.





Feedback from my visit to the University of New South Wales 18 February: As mentioned in Fr Middleton's column in the last edition of The Gongazan, he and I attended a special breakfast with Vice-Chancellor Prof Fred Hilmer. He gave us his vision for the future of UNSW, which began in 1949 and is the only Australian university established with a specific scientific and technological focus. It is widely acknowledged for its large and highly regarded Engineering and Business faculties and it defined internationally by its recognised research and strength, focusing on contemporary and social issues in professional and scientific fields. We were reminded that they offer campus tours every Friday afternoon and I strongly urge students to go and have a look see well ahead of making about UAC choices www.campustours.nsw.edu.au. Prof Richard Henry drew attention to the fact that often HSC students don't arrange their UAC preferences as they should and how important it is that they become aware and understand the way things work.

Internal Transfer: Demand for places at unis are at an all-time high and it gets more competitive each year. If a student misses out on their choice of course at UNSW it is better not to go to another university but to have another course/s listed at UNSW – begin this course and do an internal transfer – this is the easiest way for a student to get into what he wanted and he doesn't go back through UAC to make this transfer. For example, in 2010, students who missed out on combined Law started either Commerce or Arts at UNSW – if they achieved a certain level of result they were able to transfer at the end of their first year into Combined Law – so this year, 130 of these UNSW students have successfully done this thus leaving no places for students from other universities to transfer into UNSW through UAC system.

**Overseas Study Experience:** There is an increasing number of students who do this through three different channels.

Summer School Option: UNSW runs a third semester in December and January. Demand for this is increasing with the changing demographics. Some students take less than a full load due to their employment commitment and make up the subjects they miss during third semester. Others want to fast-track their degrees, eg BCommerce may be completed in two and a half years.

**UAC Admissions in 2011 to UNSW:** In January 2011, UNSW made 7146 Main Round offers. Students are eligible for HSC Plus even if they take a Gap Year. They can also receive HSC Plus for mid-year admission. It must be noted that Faculties annually review HSC Plus bonus points.

**Elite Athletes:** They received 463 applications of which 93 were unsuccessful. Bonus Points are given for a broad range of activities – application must be made online by the end of November.

**Deferring students:** They now re-apply directly to UNSW if they are picking up the course they deferred – they can defer for six months, one year or two years max. If they wish to change university and course they must do so through UAC.

**Scholarships:** There were 4500 applications online of which 1800 were submitted for consideration. There are 100 different types offered to high school students – 560 were awarded. 99% made online applications.

There is the problem that HSC students start application very late. **Apply early** – never mind that HSC Trial results are not available at the time. There is a perception that scholarships are only for very smart or students with financial difficulty – not true – there is a wide range of scholarships especially if you excel in sport, community service, etc. There is a new **UNSW All Rounder Scholarship** – good academics, extra curricula, leadership and community service. 20 will be awarded this year, worth \$5000 each.

**Triple A** (Academic Achievement Award = Dux) Nomination of the top performing student is made by the Principal. Applications for UNSW scholarships open 1 July and close 30 September – start looking at them NOW!

UNSW Co-op scholarships offer industry training experience, leadership, professional development, networking, mentoring and financial support for high achievers. Currently worth \$15,000 per year for up to 5 years = \$75,000. From 2012 it will go up to \$16,750 per year. For 2011 Co-op Scholarships, UNSW received 709 applications and 411 interviews were held (45% of applicants received interview from 143 different high schools). Finally, 90 scholarships were offered to students from 59 schools. 58% of successful students volunteered on a regular basis; 52% had part-time jobs; 42% were involved in Debating/Public Speaking; 36% had been Prefects; 22% had served on SRC in Years 11 or 12; 9% had done Surf Life Saving; 7% had Gold Duke of Edinburgh Awards; 7% had been sports captains/coaches; 3% were school captains; and 3% took a Gap Year.

From 2011 HSC Plus bonus points will no longer be considered for Co-op selection. Minimum ATAR for Co-op in 2011 was 96.00+.

**Psychology:** Psychology is the scientific study of human behaviour and mental processes and is extremely interdisciplinary – perception, learning and memory, behavioural neuroscience, developmental psycho, psychopathology, organizational psycho, clinical, etc. They want students to get training in scientific discovery and professional practice must be based on established psychological principles and findings must be generated by basic and applied psychological research. To become a psychologist one must be registered nationally. The four-year undergraduate degree includes Honours year plus two years' experience (usually done through Master's program).

New degree in 2011: BPsychological Science – ATAR 87.50 – it combines a major in a complementary subject based on professional or academic aspirations, eg from the Australian School of Business, ie marketing or Human Resource Management; from Art and Social Sciences, ie criminology, or from Science, ie neuroscience or anatomy. These graduates will have a unique combination of skills.

Actuarial Studies: Offers a dynamic and challenging career without boundaries – applies mathematical statistical methods to assess risk in insurance and financial industries with jobs in life insurance, health, pension and social welfare. There is strong job security through all economic cycles. This highly recognised profession provides skills transferable across multiple industries with secure and highly competitive salary and excellent benefits. Students suited to actuarial studies should be self-motivated, goal-orientated and have superior mathematical aptitude and communication skills. The UNSW Actuarial program is accredited internationally and they have 800 students in this course at any one time. Actuaries with five years' experience earn about \$150,000 per year.

Arts & Social Sciences – Studying Public Relations & Advertising: UNSW offers four different BMedia programs with an emphasis on social innovation, ethics, interactivity, sustainability, engagement and corporate communication.

**Advantage Program (advantage.nsw.edu.au):** This program has been developed to enhance and increase student engagement at UNSW – over 500 activities. Gives graduates advantage in workplace and employability.

**UNSW Supplementary Transcript:** They are the first university to issue it to give recognition for co-curricular activities/involvement.
