

WE LOOK TO LIBRARIES TO UNFOLD THE STORIES THEY HOLD, TO STIMULATE OUR SENSES AND TANTALISE US WITH A MARKETPLACE OF RESOURCES, IDEAS AND INSPIRATION.

As a repository of the familiar, as well as a collector of the exotic and the unknown, libraries are ubiquitous and naturally evolving. However, as with all evolution, growth cannot occur without the cultivation of those first all-important seeds. The American Poet Laureate and Pulitzer Prize winner Rita Dove said 'Libraries are where it all begins' and the State Library's legacy begins with the 'originals' - those initial stories, voices, people and collections.

An original, by its very nature, is a trailblazer, a pioneer, and as such, a source of inspiration to those who follow. In this issue, we reveal and celebrate the independent spirit, determination and foresight of people such as Margaret Lawrie, whose groundbreaking work resulted in a collection of such unique and unparalleled distinction, that it has been declared part of UNESCO's Australian Memory of the World Register. Without it, many Torres Strait Islander myths, legends, stories and culture may have been lost forever.

As custodians of heritage, we also look to libraries to provide various accounts of what has gone

before. Original items carry with them the strength of authenticity. As a primary source, they offer a glimpse of the time and place in which they first existed. In 2009, The White Gloves Tour: Treasures from the John Oxley Library travels to venues across regional Queensland, offering the opportunity to experience, first hand, a selection of original heritage objects from the John Oxley Library Collection. The value of these artefacts lies not simply in the fact that they are irreplaceable, one-of-a-kind 'treasures', but that they provide a direct and genuine link to the past. Through such tangible objects, historic events and individuals are reflected and brought to life. Each original item carries with it a personal story and is possessed with an intrinsic sense of identity and honesty.

The wonder and excitement elicited by such items are vividly recalled in Olivia Robinson's article in this issue, which recounts her experiences at the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of the American Indian in the USA. Her work examines how we address the survival of intangible heritage and culture of Indigenous peoples. Working closely

with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders, through the network of Indigenous Knowledge Centres and programs such as Keeping Culture Strong, the State Library seeks to reconnect and share original knowledge and language. Authentic voices, traditions and stories are at the heart of creative and exciting initiatives to preserve cultural treasure, not just for Indigenous peoples, but for all Queenslanders.

'Originals' constitute a beginning. Independent and creative in thought, action and vision, they present an insight into what has come before as well as inspire future innovation. Their power is undeniable, and we hope our originals continue to provoke, inform and delight.



THE LORIS WILLIAMS SCHOLARSHIP

THE STATE LIBRARY IS DELIGHTED TO ANNOUNCE TANIA SCHAFER AS ONE OF THIS YEAR'S RECIPIENTS OF THE LORIS WILLIAMS SCHOLARSHIP.

Loris Williams worked at the State Library and was the first Aboriginal person from Queensland to gain professional archival qualifications. Unfortunately, Loris died of cancer in 2005. The scholarship was established in her memory to assist Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students in their archival studies with \$3,000 towards books or computing costs and access to a mentor scheme. Delighted to receive this prestigious accolade, Tania said "This is a great honor for me, as Loris Williams was a friend of mine. My mentor is Del Cuddihy who has worked for a variety of government agencies as well as in East Timor with a United Nations agency. I am very much looking forward to being mentored by him. Loris Williams was my mentor for several years and the experience enriched my life."

MODERN TIMES

Don't miss our exciting new exhibition *Modern times: the untold story of modernism in Australia*, which reveals how modernism transformed Australian art and life across a period of five decades from 1917–1967. With more than 250 objects spanning art, design, architecture, advertising, photography, film and fashion, this fascinating exhibition encompasses diverse themes from international exchanges, the modern body and so-called modernist 'primitivism', to the city, modern pools and the Space Age. SHANGHAI WEEK AT THE STATE LIBRARY

IN 1989, SHANGHAI AND QUEENSLAND FORMALLY BECAME SISTER STATES. THE AIM OF THIS RELATIONSHIP HAS BEEN TO DEVELOP BILATERAL TRADE, ECONOMIC AND CULTURAL LINKS, AND SUPPORT AN ETHOS OF MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE RESIDENTS OF BOTH PLACES.

2009 marks the 20th anniversary of this relationship, which has benefited not only economic and trade relations but also education, culture and recreation. The State Library will play a key role in Shanghai Week celebrations held in Queensland from **24–30 June 2009**. Planned activities will celebrate the relationship between this important Chinese central-eastern coastal municipality and the State of Queensland.

This year's Shanghai Cup, organised by Education Queensland, will be held at the State Library on 26 June. An invited audience will witness Queensland students practising their language skills to compete for the coveted prize.

TOM BURNS COLLECTION

THE STATE LIBRARY HAS RECENTLY RECEIVED A COLLECTION OF PRIVATE PAPERS FROM THE LATE HONOURABLE TOM BURNS AO, KINDLY DONATED BY HIS WIFE, ANGELA BURNS.

Tom Burns was Queensland's beacon in establishing political, governmental and commercial links with China from the 1970s until his passing in 2007. He visited China more than 50 times, with the rare distinction of meeting four generations of Chinese leaders. In 2001, Burns was awarded an Officer in the Order of Australia for his contribution to Australia-China relations. In the same year, he received the Gold Magnolia Honorary Award from the Shanghai Government for his contributions to Chinese-Australian relations. *The Tom Burns Collection* will be showcased in display cases in the John Oxley Library Reading Room, level 4 during Shanghai Week.

GREAT WALLS OF CHINA

In a gesture to celebrate the close relationship between Shanghai Library and the State Library of Queensland, the State Library's Queensland Terrace's usual display of an eclectic mix of tea sets is replaced with a uniform mass of willow-patterned tea sets installed in the wall cabinets to create our own Great Walls of China. Through the 'Window of Shanghai' Memorandum of Exchange and Cooperation, these libraries exchange library materials and expertise, sharing service resources, and reciprocal visits by library staff. The Great Walls of China reflect long-held traditions of drinking tea, a ritual that takes place in different ways in different cultures but is universally symbolic of comfort, familiarity and friendship. The stunning display of blue and white willow-patterned porcelain represents 'the foreign made familiar' - hinting at tea parties, afternoon teas, shared intimacies, memories and companionship.

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

THE FUN OF THE EKKA

ONE OF QUEENSLAND'S BEST-LOVED EVENTS, THE ROYAL QUEENSLAND SHOW, OR THE EKKA AS WE FONDLY KNOW IT, IS CAPTURED IN A SERIES OF 20 ORIGINAL DRAWINGS BY DISTINGUISHED AUSTRALIAN ARTIST WILLIAM ROBINSON AO

The drawings, recently acquired by the Partners of the State Library, through the Queensland Library Foundation, celebrate the 75th anniversary of the John Oxley Library.

Collectively known as Ekka Series 1-20, they evocatively capture the timelessness, rich history and grand traditions of the iconic, annual event and depict one of our important institutions, The Royal National Agricultural and Industrial Association of Queensland (RNA). This significant acquisition

complements the RNA records already held within the John Oxley Library, which provide an ideal contextual background to the intriguing new artworks.

Born in Brisbane, Robinson spent much of his early career as an art teacher, before making the decision in 1989 to concentrate solely on painting - a decision that richly paid off. Today, his work is represented in the National Gallery of Australia as well as all state and many regional galleries. Robinson has won several prestigious art awards, including the Archibald Prize for portraiture in 1987 and 1995, and the Wynne Prize for landscape painting in 1990 and 1996. Robinson was also recently honoured by the Queensland Government as one of Queensland's greats.

The Foundation takes this opportunity to thank the Partners for being such willing custodians of our documentary heritage.

TOURING TREASURES

The Manifesto of the Queensland Labour Party and an authentic account of the search for 34 survivors of a shipwrecked brig in 1872, are just two of the historic documents, journals and photographs currently touring Queensland with The White Gloves Tour. Treasures from the John Oxley Library – an unmissable opportunity to see, touch and inspect rare state treasures close up. The tour also reunites artefacts separated by the course of time. In 1848, midshipman and clerk, Charles James Card kept a journal documenting the events onboard HMS Rattlesnake. His captivating, intimate glimpse of life at sea reveals the intriguing discovery of Scotswoman Mrs Thompson shipwrecked and marooned on Cape York for some years. Also onboard HMS Rattlesnake was Oswald Brierly taking sketches. In Townsville this April, The White Gloves Tour brought the journal and sketches together for the first time since the actual voyage more than 150 years ago. The White Gloves Tour will visit Mackay, Cairns, Rockhampton, Mount Isa, Barcaldine, South East and Western Queensland. THE FIRST FIFTY YEARS

IT'S HARD TO IMAGINE A TIME WHEN QUEENSLAND DIDN'T EXIST, BUT THAT IS THE STARTING POINT FOR A NEW VIRTUAL EXHIBITION, WHICH IS PART OF THE STATE LIBRARY'S Q150 CELEBRATIONS. **BECOMING QUEENSLAND** EXPLORES THE STATE'S BEGINNINGS FROM PROCLAMATION IN 1859 TO THE 1909 JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS AS A DYNAMIC 'WORK IN PROGRESS'.

The beauty of the exhibition is that, being virtual, you can visit it again and again, from the comfort of your own home. A simple click of your mouse takes you to stories about people, places, institutions, and lifestyles that have made Queensland unique. These are woven around the themes of 'Hope', 'Taking Shape', 'Queensland Style' and 'Turning Fifty'. The unfolding stories move back and forth between bygone days and today, showcasing beautiful things that intridue and amaze.

There are many stories to tell about the making of *Becoming Queensland*. As its curator, I decided to involve staff from the State Library's Heritage Collections. Their expert knowledge would enrich the telling and bring to light items only they knew of. At our first 'show and tell', I saw how vividly they brought history to life and decided to add their accounts to the exhibition.

Every item in *Becoming Queensland* has its own story to tell. Some show how little times have changed. Others contain secret stories within them for us to unravel. And there are those that make us exclaim, 'Aha! So that's what happened!' Everywhere we find memories, surprises, emotions and mysteries.

There is the pamphlet from 1898 that invites young British women to move to Queensland with the same government spin used today to encourage newcomers to the Smart State. The Illuminated Addresses presented to visiting political dignitaries follow the familiar lobbyists' ploy of coating hidden agendas with flattering words.

A surprise for anyone who thinks Queensland was an isolated backwater, is the flow of international writers, intellectuals, activists and entertainers who visited our state to share ideas, enjoy our special brand of hospitality, tuck into some unique local recipes and relax on the long cool verandahs. Even the verandah came from another part of the British Empire – India.

To look at the mingling of images of Queensland and Germany in the Lorenz albums is to understand the dilemma of all immigrants who carry old and new homelands deep in their hearts. Then there is the bushman's story recorded by a father for his daughter in Scotland as he sailed through the Red Sea on his way home to a lonely pastoral station in North Queensland.

The beautiful Nicholson Album proudly documents the family's voyage to Australia in 1864 and its growing fortunes in Brisbane. But what mystery lies behind the lock of a child's hair hidden in the back pages of the album?

Anyone who spent hours in school drawing the Queensland border will be intrigued to read of the


struggles that determined its iconic shape, including that awkward western corner. There is the terrible story of Australia's worst natural disaster, Cyclone Mahina, which killed more than 400 people in 1899. You can also find out what shearers were reading during the 1890 strikes, as well as seeing the famed *Labour Party Manifesto*.

Behind all these stories is the tragedy of the deaths of thousands of Indigenous people during those 50 years of becoming Queensland. Yet their descendants remain a vital force today. On a slip of paper is a 100-year-old poem describing their passing. Next to it is a link to YouTube showing a 'modern tradition' of Aboriginal people walking proudly on their country.

A SETTING FOR ART AND LIFE:

THE VAL VALLIS HOUSE BY KARL LANGER

The home at Indooroopilly in Brisbane where Queensland poet, teacher and critic Val Vallis lived for more than 40 years was an extension of his personality. It was comfortable and welcoming, unpretentious and open, and filled with books, paintings and opera recordings. It was a place where friends gathered and people 'dropped in' to enjoy the owner's bountiful hospitality.

Val Vallis was lecturing in philosophy at the University of Queensland in 1958 when good friend Kathleen Campbell-Brown persuaded Val to approach the eminent Viennese émigré architect Karl Langer to design him a 'cheap' house. Karl wanted to prove that he could produce a design and have it built for a lower cost than the very basic homes then being constructed by the Queensland Housing Commission – an elegant house, incorporating crisp lines and efficient use of space, featuring Australian timber floors and roof beams; a dwelling exuding its own sense of beauty, comfort and livability. And Karl succeeded.

Val Vallis loved Karl's creation and dwelt there happily until the great flood of January 1974 when the nearby Brisbane river flowed right through the house, submerging it to the roof-line. After this, the house was raised a level and elevated into the surrounding trees.

In the 1980s, the John Oxley Library received a donation of a large collection of original Karl Langer plans, including the designs for the Val Vallis house. These plans provide an insight into the architect's method of working and reveal the personal touches that he envisaged, which (in one or two cases) appear not to have been completed.

Val Vallis died in January 2009, leaving a legacy of published works and the memory of his personality cherished by generations of students. In March 2009, as part of the State Library's ongoing interest in developing its collections, especially biographical material on interesting and representative Queenslanders, staff paid a visit to the house to document its unique architecture, garden and interiors. 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THE ORIGINAL VAL VALLIS

A REMINISCENCE BY W. ROSS JOHNSTON

Val Vallis was a Queensland original. Many older students will remember studying a Vallis poem during their school years, such as his tribute to his father Michael, wharf-lumper and fisherman.

... So Michael spoke,

Translating sea things to my earth-tuned ears, Till the green light, crested with sunlit panes, Was the depth of a quiet sea ...

As a poet, Vallis revelled in words and began 'dabbling' in poetry during World War II. Encouraged to develop his style, he became a published author in 1944, with many more books of poetry to follow.

Although he firmly asserted it was 'people not places' that matter, paradoxically it was place that mattered so much to Vallis' philosophy. Gladstone – and the sea! They expressed the heart of Val Vallis,

even though for much of his life he lived in Brisbane. Perhaps this sense of place might be seen as an early example of what today would be called an 'environmental consciousness'.

At the University of Queensland, first in the Department of Philosophy, later in English, Vallis was an infectious teacher, encouraging students to discover their poetic spirit and romantic soul. As well as poetry and aesthetics, he promoted the teaching of Australian literature, at a time when it was both ignored and underrated.


His originality also shone through as a critic, especially of music. He relished this role, and avidly pursued his early love of opera on trips to London with enthusiastic pilgrimages to Covent Garden, Sadler's Wells and The Coliseum.

A parting reminiscence is of Val sitting smiling in his lounge room, the Australian Opera is on tour from Sydney and he is entertaining cast members. The chateau cardboard rosso flows, Morag Beaton has just finished a performance of *Turandot*, exhausted, then suddenly she somehow finds energy to fill the quiet suburban eve with her rich voice. It is a happy melange of friends and students, colleagues and singers, all savouring the experience of the beauty of life

Val Vallis is honoured as a Queensland icon on the Literary Trail (1996); look for his footpath plaque in Albert Street, near Adelaide Street, Brisbane.

THE MARGARET LAWRIE COLLECTION

THE MARGARET LAWRIE COLLECTION OF TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER MATERIAL IS PART OF THE JOHN OXLEY LIBRARY'S ORIGINAL MATERIALS COLLECTIONS. SUCH IS ITS NATIONAL IMPORTANCE, THAT IT IS PART OF UNESCO'S AUSTRALIAN MEMORY OF THE WORLD REGISTER.

The culmination of a life's work by pioneering Queensland researcher Margaret Lawrie, this valuable collection documents the history, languages, genealogies and cultures of the Torres Strait Islanders. Of special significance are the myths, legends and clan stories, amassed from the four geographical regions of the Torres Strait.

Developed predominantly during the 1960s and 1970s, much of the material is now only found and accessible through the collection, making it, arguably, the most significant collection in the world relating to the Torres Strait region since work undertaken by British anthropologist and academic Alfred Haddon in 1890. Together, The Haddon Collection, held at Cambridge University in the United Kingdom, and Queensland's Margaret Lawrie Collection provide a unique opportunity for researchers to compare the Torres Strait Island people's history and culture across two time periods separated by nearly 100 years. Today, the Margaret Lawrie Collection is also heavily used by Torres Strait Islanders, as a means of viewing and interpreting their history and culture.

Comprising material across a wide range of formats, including art, manuscripts, photographs, language tapes, transcriptions and objects such as children's traditional toys, the collection also holds rare

manuscripts and research notes for two of Lawrie's major works: *Myths and legends of the Torres Strait* and *Tales from Torres Strait*. The former was published in both Australia and the United States, and although both are now out of print, they are still keenly sought by researchers and are considered iconic works.

Margaret Lawrie worked at a time when Indigenous affairs were still very much subject to the vagaries of government policy. Australian society had yet to evolve towards an acceptance and understanding of the important place and role of Indigenous peoples. It can be argued that her commitment and work, reinforced by her subsequent publications, assisted in influencing a gradual shift within Australian Indigenous affairs, and Australia in general, towards increased inclusiveness.

WHO WAS MARGARET LAWRIE?

Born in New South Wales in 1917, Margaret Lawrie was a contemporary of noted Aboriginal poet Kath Walker or Oodgeroo Noonuccal. She was invited by the Queensland Government to travel with Noonuccal to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island communities and report on children's health. Lawrie developed close and long-standing relationships with many prominent elders and community members and is widely regarded as a pioneer of the study and documentation of the Torres Strait Island people and their culture.

WHAT IS AN ORIGINAL?

The State Library of Queensland is well known as a repository for published items such as books and journals. Less well known is that we are also very active in collecting original or unpublished materials including: letters and postcards; photographs and slides; home movies and amateur film footage; oral histories and digital stories; artworks; business records, station records and church records; and personal papers of prominent Queenslanders.

One of our most popular Original Collections is the Photographic Collection held in the John Oxley Library, which contains nearly two-million historic and contemporary images in the form of photographic prints, slides, negatives, daguerreotypes, ambrotypes, glass negatives, transparencies and


digital photographs. Of these, nearly 50,000 have been digitised on *Picture Queensland*, which can be accessed directly from the State Library website.

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FROM SMALL THINGS, BIG THINGS GROW

IN THE YEAR THAT WE CELEBRATE THE 150TH ANNIVERSARY OF SEPARATION FROM THE COLONY OF NEW SOUTH WALES, WE ALSO MARK THE 160TH ANNIVERSARY OF LIBRARY SERVICES IN QUEENSLAND.

In 1849, the state's first library was established as the North Brisbane School of the Arts Library. This first subscription-based library was rapidly followed by many other subscription services in the later half of the 19th century. Tellingly, the word 'subscription' shows, that in the early days, Queensland libraries were the preserves of those who could afford to join.

The first free Queensland library was opened on 1 August, 1938, as the Townsville Municipal Library. This was the start of things to come. From one library almost 71 years ago, Queensland now boasts a strong network of 341 free public libraries, including 17 Indigenous Knowledge Centres, spread across the state.

Public libraries are owned and operated by local government with the State Government supporting their operation with grants and the provision of book exchanges, training and other services valued at approximately \$20 million a year. They serve populations as large as Brisbane and as small as the recently opened Stonehenge Library in Barcoo Shire, a town of just 40 residents.

Public libraries are an amazing resource, with most of their services available for free. Your membership can get you: reciprocal borrowing for Queensland residents (so if you are heading off on a Queensland holiday, you can borrow a book whilst away – just remember to return it before you leave for home); local-history collections; family-history resources; books and resources including foreign language, audio, large print, the ever-popular adult and children's fiction and non-fiction; reference materials; internet usage; meeting rooms and much more; and let's not forget the knowledgeable and helpful staff who offer advice, not just about library services, but about their town, community and region.

There are two easy ways to find your local public library – through the State Library's state-wide library directory **libraries.slq.qld.gov.au/home/services** or through your council's website. Happy reading!

THE ORIGINAL STATE LIBRARY

The origins of the State Library can be traced back to the establishment of the Brisbane Public Library, William Street in 1896. Subsequently renamed the Public Library of Queensland six years later, it only formally became the State Library of Queensland in 1971.

ANOTHER COUNTRY

OLIVIA ROBINSON'S EXPERIENCES IN THE USA AS QUEENSLAND'S 2008 SMITHSONIAN FELLOW, EXPLORED INTERNATIONAL APPROACHES TOWARDS SHARING AND PRESERVING INDIGENOUS KNOWLEDGE, AND REVEALED THE STATE LIBRARY OF QUEENSLAND AS A GLOBAL LEADER IN ENGAGEMENT PROGRAMS FOR INDIGENOUS PEOPLE.

Sitting Bull's drum stopped them in their tracks. It was one of more than 800,000 objects that adorned the collection shelves of the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian (NMAI). To the group of eight 15–17-year-old St Labre Indian School students, it was an awesome moment; over the years their Elders had told them so many inspiring stories about Sitting Bull's defeat of Lieutenant Colonel George Custer and his army at the *Battle of Little Bighorn* in 1876. They now stood at arm's length from the medicine drum that Sitting Bull owned and through their eyes those stories became reality.

The students, mainly of Crow and Cheyenne heritage, had travelled more than 3,300km from Montana to Washington DC in the United States to spend one week exploring the collections of the NMAI, researching, creating interactive imagery, and designing websites as part of a Virtual Museums Workshop. I had the privilege to share in their journey of discovery – of the NMAI Collection and themselves – and witnessed how each student reclaimed their histories and heritage through the experience.

The Virtual Museum Workshops were just one of many innovative Indigenous engagement-strategies that I researched from March to September 2008 across the NMAI's three facilities situated in Washington DC, Suitland in Maryland, and New York. The immersive 26-week opportunity was part of a Queensland-Smithsonian Fellowship, made possible

by the Queensland Department of the Premier and Cabinet, the State Library of Queensland, and the Smithsonian Institution – the world's largest museum and research complex

The research, a combination of paper-based analysis, focus interviews, and practical experience working on NMAI projects, linked closely with the State Library's efforts to engage in meaningful ways and to improve library services and collections for Queensland's 146,000 Aboriginal people and Torres Strait Islanders. The dynamic range of the State Library's initiatives is delivered mainly through public libraries and a network of Indigenous Knowledge Centres, located in Cherbourg, Cape York, and the Torres Strait, and including kuril dhagun, the Indigenous Knowledge Centre at the State Library in Brisbane.

I was impressed to find a range of engagement strategies that exemplify good practice in Indigenous outreach services, cultural-heritage management, education, training, employment, public programs, and library services and collections. I was inspired to learn that the State Library is a global leader in engaging with Indigenous people, and through initiatives such as the *Queensland Indigenous Languages Project* and *Keeping Culture Strong*, helps support individuals to address critical issues, like the survival of their intangible heritage. Valuing Indigenous knowledge, giving a voice to Indigenous

people, acknowledging cultural ownership of heritage material held in collections, and skilling Indigenous people to participate in the digital age, are just some ways libraries, museums, and galleries can empower Aboriginal people and Torres Strait Islanders.


In many Queensland communities, the State Library is working closely with Aboriginal people and Torres Strait Islanders to give them the opportunity and skills to reconnect with, preserve, and share their Indigenous knowledge and heritage. The new knowledge gained through the Queensland-Smithsonian Fellowship will help contribute to enhancing these outreach services, and inspire other people to share ideas, think creatively and responsibly and, ultimately, make a positive impact on the life of an Indigenous person.

As a Bidjara person, whose traditional country is in southwest Queensland, and as the first Indigenous Fellow, I urge Aboriginal people and Torres Strait Islanders, as well as other Queenslanders, to consider applying for the rich and rewarding experience offered by a Queensland-Smithsonian Fellowship.

BOZZIE'S BIRTHDAY BIKE

The buzz of excited voices tells me that school is out for the day in Kubin. Each weekday afternoon, small groups of seven or eight primary-school students come to the Mualgau Knowledge Centre for their turn to join a reading session, play games or use the internet through the single public-access PC available in the village.

This week offers a change to the routine as students learn to make videos and edit sound recordings as part of the State Library of Queensland's new programme *Keeping Culture Strong*. Staff and community members throughout regional Queensland are being supported through training and access to equipment, to create and share original stories about traditional and contemporary community life.

One such project is a collaboration between the State Library and Tagai College. Students from years 5 and 6 were encouraged to write and illustrate their own stories about life in Kubin. This resulted in *Bozzie's Birthday Bike*, an original book that highlighted the unique challenges of life on an island in the Torres Strait. The children then worked to record and edit different voices for each of the characters. By scanning each page of the story and linking the audio together in Microsoft Moviemaker, the story was brought to life

as a short film and uploaded to a blog shared by the Indigenous Knowledge Centres for everyone to enjoy.

The Indigenous Knowledge Centre network blog (ikcnetwork.blogspot.com) is growing in popularity as a space for sharing videos, photos and stories by community members who use their local knowledge centres for more than just borrowing books. Links to useful sites, an interactive map and community calendar are just some of the tools shared through this online space.

Information literacy offers community members the skills to enjoy contemporary information learning, as well as the potential to embrace the joys of participating in the creation and sharing of information. Facebook and Bebo are two other social-networking tools that are rapidly being adopted by Queensland's remote communities. An increasingly mobile population is able to take advantage of the network of knowledge centres to access books, DVDs and magazines, check email, transfer money with internet banking and see what their friends and family are up to, no matter where they may be.



VOICES KEEPING THE PAST ALIVE

IMAGINE WALKING INTO A ROOM TO BE GREETED BY PEOPLE SPEAKING IN TEN DIFFERENT LANGUAGES. THEN, IMAGINE DISCOVERING THAT THESE WORDS ARE NOT FROM OTHER CONTINENTS AND COUNTRIES, BUT INSTEAD, FROM LANGUAGES, SPOKEN SINCE ANCIENT TIMES, FROM DIFFERENT PARTS OF QUEENSLAND.

This is the daunting experience for those attending a gathering of the Queensland Indigenous Languages Advisory Committee, which meets to plan its work at the State Library of Queensland. The committee, made up of people from community-language projects around Queensland, offers advice on a wide range of topics concerning languages and culture and, of course, is vitally concerned with the preservation of both.

There are approximately 100 different Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander languages in Queensland alone, many of which have not been heard for years. However, for a growing number of communities, work is gathering pace to locate the speakers and keepers of the disappearing languages, and to encourage the recording and teaching of the languages to ensure that they are not lost forever.

The Queensland Indigenous Languages Project, which is run through the State Library, is linked closely with the work of the Indigenous Languages Committee, and ensures that its direction and activities are guided by the people doing the work in the communities

One of its main focuses is to help students learn how to make recordings of community members authentically speaking and using the language. They are trained to use audio and video recording equipment, as well as still cameras, and to recognise the importance of collecting valuable data to complement the recordings.

Innovative ideas and projects help keep the languages alive, such as the work underway with the Butchulla people in the Hervey Bay area. Here, students attending language classes at the local Korrawinga school, compose songs in the language, which are then performed to the community. At the end of the school year, the teacher holds auditions for the students to travel to Brisbane and record their songs in a studio. CDs of their original work are then available for sale through the Korrawinga Aboriginal Corporation. This inventive and rewarding project has been running in Korrawinga since 2006. HOLDING OUR TONGUES

Australia has the highest rate of language extinction on the planet according to UNESCO, which warns that language diversity is, like species diversity, rapidly declining. KURIL DHAGUN: INDIGENOUS KNOWLEDGE CENTRE

kuril is the native water rat found on the site of the State Library on the Brisbane river. dhagun means earth, place or country. The name is literally translated as 'kuril's place.'

kuril dhagun explores different ways of understanding, creating, collecting and storing Indigenous knowledge, and is located in the corner of the State Library of Queensland on the ground level closest to Kurilpa Point.

Enhancements to kuril dhagun will soon offer

a more distinctive and userfriendly space for learning and engagement with Queensland's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and knowledge. The first stage of works will introduce timber and ply joinery to frame an organic interior landscape. Carefully structured shapes, forms and floor-level changes will subtly create a range of spaces for gathering, group activities, research or quiet contemplation.

New furniture, story-telling

carpets and audio-visual installations will then be introduced to enhance visitor experiences.

kuril dhagun will be closed from 29 June while the building works take place. During this time, kuril dhagun events will continue with online Indigenous resources available at the Infozone on level 1. Enquiries can be made at the Information Desk on level 1

DANCING THE LINE

SINCE THE 1950s THE TORRES STRAIT ISLAND COMMUNITY HAS CONTRIBUTED CONSIDERABLY TO THE CREATION OF AUSTRALIA'S RAIL NETWORK. A SIGNIFICANT OCCASION IN THE RAILWAY'S HISTORY TOOK PLACE ON 8 MAY 1968.

Whilst constructing Australia's first iron-ore tracks at the Port Hedland to Mount Newman line in Western Australia, the front steel/back steel gang, which consisted mainly of Torres Strait Islanders, smashed the previous World Heavy Haul Track Laying Record. They laid, spiked, and anchored 7.25km of heavy track in less than 12 hours. To this day, their record has never been broken

Stories such as this one, along with music and songs are being gathered by The Torres Strait Railway History Group, the former Torres Strait rail workers and their families, to feature in an exciting musical-theatre production called *Dancing the Line*. Audiences gain insight into what life was like for the men working on the railway, and their families, through breathtaking choruses, touching visuals and anecdotes.

The State Library of Queensland has been a proud supporter of this project for two years. In August, the Torres Strait Railway History Group will present the first of three professional script-development readings of *Dancing the Line* for community input and approvals.



ORIGINAL STORIES

HISTORY WAS MADE WHEN PRIME MINISTER KEVIN RUDD DELIVERED AN APOLOGY TO AUSTRALIA'S INDIGENOUS PEOPLE ON 13 FEBRUARY 2008. IN THE GROUNDSWELL OF EMOTIONS PROCEEDING THIS SIGNIFICANT EVENT, AUSTRALIA'S COLLECTING AND MEMORY INSTITUTIONS ASKED HOW THEY COULD CAPTURE THE REACTIONS AND SENTIMENT AROUND THE APOLOGY.

The State Library of Queensland commissioned the Queensland University of Technology to work collaboratively on a project collecting oral-history interviews and digital stories. Seven people shared their thoughts and stories relating to the apology, including the Hon. Anna Bligh, Premier of Queensland and Her Excellency Ms Quentin Bryce AC, former Governor General of Queensland, and now Governor of Australia.

Nadine McDonald-Dowd, Program Coordinator for kuril dhagun, describes her trip with her parents to watch the apology and the anxieties her mother, a member of the Stolen Generation, felt before the event. The day turned out to be a healing moment for Nadine's mother and many others. All seven digital stories, including Nadine's, are available on the State Library's digital stories website www.qldstories.slq.qld.gov.au.

LITTLE AUSSIE BATTLER

Ginger Meggs was the cartoon that brightened Sunday mornings for many Australians. But incredible as it may seem, Australia almost lost Ginger Meggs, everybody's beloved 'Little Aussie Battler'.

Not long after 1921 when Jimmy Bancks launched the comic *Us Fellers* in Sydney's *Sunday Sun*, an American tried to lure him, and Ginger, to America with promised fame and money. Over there, popular cartoons sold papers and created movies. Fortunately, Bancks got a very handsome counter offer, which, in time, probably made him the highest-paid illustrator in Australia.

Ginger Meggs took off.
The comic was soon
syndicated all over Australia
and, by 1929, even overseas.
By the 1930s almost half
the population of Australia
read the cartoon. Ginger, his

brother Dudley, Benny, Minnie Peters and Eddie Coogan were the readers' surrogate neighbourhood gang. Simple escapades were their style, not all that naughty, but definitely not parentally approved. But then there was Tiger Kelly, of whom Ginger was terrified. Tiger was real trouble – the kind in which the police might be interested.

.....

Despite rejecting the full-blown fame offered by America, Jimmy Bancks cut a figure of considerable power in Australian publishing. Comics sold papers here too. So when the owner of the Sydney *Sunday Sun* decided to start the *Sun News-Pictorial* in Melbourne in 1922, he got Bancks to go over to the new Melbourne paper with *Us Fellers*. The venture failed, and Bancks' heart remained in Sydney, so about six years

later, to the delight of its readers, Bancks returned to the *Sunday Sun*. During the war, at long last the name *Us Fellers* was changed to the obvious *Ginger Meggs*.

After Bancks' death in 1952, other fine illustrators carried on with Ginger but it is Jimmy Bancks who deserves a big thank you for the joy and happy memories the 'Little Aussie Battler' still brings. A big thank you must also go to Robert MacPherson who never stopped collecting Ginger Meggs material, which he kindly donated to the John Oxley Library in memory of his wife, Elenor MacPherson-Senior.

Three *Ginger Meggs* books, along with a woollen rug with a Ginger Meggs design, currently feature in the exhibition *Bold but Faithful: John Oxley Library at Work* until 11 October.

TWO WARS, THREE CITIES, FOUR GENERATIONS

EVERY COMMUNITY HAS A MEMORY OF ITSELF. NOT A HISTORY, NOR AN ARCHIVE, NOR AN AUTHORITATIVE RECORD ... A LIVING MEMORY – AN AWARENESS OF A COLLECTIVE IDENTITY WOVEN OF A THOUSAND STORIES.

For Anh Donald (nee Nguyen), Brisbane is the third city she calls home. Originally from Hanoi where she lived until Vietnam was divided in 1954, she arrived in Australia in 1964 through a study scholarship. The digital story of four generations of the Nguyen/ Tran family uncovers her parents' escape to Australia as refugees in 1977. Bringing with them Anh's eight-year-old nephew and five-year-old niece, the family thought the children's parents would follow in a few weeks. It took them three-and-a-half years. During that time Anh juggled the many roles of new mother, daughter, wife, aunt and public-service employee.

Anh's inspirational story is one of five digital stories collected from Queensland's Vietnamese community to mark the 30th anniversary of Vietnamese refugees settling in Brisbane. These monumental challenges and personal journeys became the starting point for the travelling exhibition *Water, Trees and Roots: stories from the Vietnamese community,* which was developed through a rich program of community consultation, collaboration and feedback.

Reflecting issues faced by many of Queensland's new migrants and refugees, the exhibition highlights and addresses common concerns, such as maintaining Vietnamese language and culture.

Water, Trees and Roots is touring regional public libraries throughout 2009. As one of a number of public programs delivered through public libraries, it highlights the role public libraries play in meeting the needs and interests of diverse communities and contributing to social change through the mutual development and understanding of those communities.

LOMER'S BRISBANE

WHEN LOOKING AT EARLY PHOTOGRAPHS, WE SEARCH FOR SOMETHING FAMILIAR OR IDENTIFIABLE TO GROUND OUR INQUISITIVE GAZE.

In a world saturated with images, it is easy to forget that photography is less than 200 years old. The State Library's current exhibition *Panoramic Queensland*'s view of a bygone era reveals just how much our cityscapes and landscapes have developed in that time.

Little is known about the 19th-century Queensland photographer Albert Lomer; however, he was active in a number of states from the 1860s to the early 1900s, and today his work is represented in the collections of the State Library of New South Wales, State Library of Victoria and the National Library of Australia, as well as the State Library of Queensland. As such, he is one of a handful of early Queensland photographers with an interstate, if not national, profile.

Lomer first practised as a photographer in Melbourne in 1862, before moving to Sydney to open a studio, London Photographic Company, with Andrew Chandler. In 1875, he established the A. Lomer & Co studio in Brisbane's Queen Street, which continued to enjoy success for the next 30 years. Both opportunistic and enterprising, he extended his operations state-wide, opening branches in Mackay, Toowoomba and Ipswich.

Known mainly for family portraits and cartes-devisite, Lomer was also a keen landscape photographer, and his 1884 studio album of Brisbane photographs features early panoramic images of the fledgling capital city. Two can be seen in *Panoramic Queensland*, clearly charting Brisbane's growth and recording for posterity, the city's 19th-century architecture and urban development.

We can be assured that Albert Lomer intended a wide audience for his Brisbane panoramas. He exhibited at a number of state, national and even international exhibitions, and like many early Queensland photographers, produced albums and prints of views for purchase. Today, his desire to showcase work to public audiences is realised through *Panoramic Queensland*, and the John Oxley Library

Collection. Lomer's beautiful, sweeping images of Brisbane remain part of his photographic legacy to Oueensland.

THE GRIFFITH UNIVERSITY TONY FITZGERALD INAUGURAL LECTURE

WITH ARTHUR CHASKALSON

The Fitzgerald Report was a watershed in Oueensland and Australia's political history. In addition to the justice and governance reforms, the report and inquiry served as a catalyst and inspiration to many researchers and practitioners working in these fields. To mark 20 years since the release of the Fitzgerald Report, Griffith University is launching a new initiative: The Griffith University Tony Fitzgerald Scholarship Program and Lecture Series. The scholarship and lecture series will contribute to the capacity of future practitioners and researchers to maintain the Fitzgerald vision to keep parliament in its rightful place at the centre of the democratic system but with the law, community and media entrusted with an active role to keep the system honest and open. The speaker of this inaugural lecture is The Honourable Arthur Chaskalson, former President of the Constitutional Court and Chief Justice of South Africa until 2005. As member of former -President Nelson Mandela's defence team, he was a formidable opponent of the apartheid government and established a non-profit organisation to challenge apartheid by using the law to pursue justice and human rights. Arthur Chaskalson was appointed a member of the United Nations as a judge for the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia. In his 2005 State of the Nation speech, South African President Thabo Mbeki acknowledged Chaskalson as a 'giant among the architects of



our democracy.' *The Tony Fitzgerald Scholarship Program* will be announced and applications invited at this event.

POETRY SLAM

Slam is an explosive counter culture to the traditional idea that poetry is academic and cold. Energising, electric, evocative, engaging and entertaining – part live event, part poetry competition – slam is open to all and welcomes all forms of poetry: verse, comic, hip hop, spoken-word monologues, and beat. Each poet has two minutes to read one of their own poems, slamming their words to a live audience who act as judges.

David 'Ghostboy' Stavanger, coordinator of the Australian Poetry Slam Heats & Final presented by The State Library of Queensland, explains further "I first wrote poetry as a child. My mother had books by the Russian poet Yevgeny Yevtushenko, which had such a sense of words roaring of the page. He was a 'public poet', and was once charged for speaking out for 'individualism' by the literary establishment. This outlaw quality is the essence of my approach to art, and the underlying spirit of slam. Ghostboy, my alter ego, was birthed in 2004. Ghostboy loves the free-falling nature of live performance poetry or slam where the audience is part of the show, where you don't know if it is going to explode or implode at any

given moment ... It is where the true thrill lies for both artist and audience. Anything can happen. You have been warned!

David 'Ghostboy' Stavanger is Queensland's 'Slammaster', having popularised slam in this state with his work with ouTsideRs aRT Inc, as creator of the 'WordFood' Slam at Woodford Folk Festival, and as the coordinator (since 2007) of the Australian Poetry Slam Queensland heats and final. CONSERVING AN ORIGINAL COLLECTION

OUR EXPERT PRESERVATION STAFF USE SPECIALISED TECHNIQUES TO MAINTAIN, PRESERVE AND PROTECT ORIGINAL ITEMS, ENSURING THEY CAN BE USED BY FUTURE GENERATIONS OF HISTORIANS, RESEARCHERS, AND MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC. GAJENDRA RAWAT, PAPER CONSERVATOR, EXPLAINS THE STEPS INVOLVED.

In 2008, the State Library received a donation containing correspondence, diaries and photograph albums of Reverend Robert Hugh Wilson. The donated collection contained materials, some of which were more than 100 years old and in urgent need of repair.

A number of letters were particularly fragile, requiring immediate conservation. Although mostly written on one side of normal writing paper, a number were also written onto very thin and extremely delicate tracing paper. All the paper was made from machine-made wood pulp, which discolours and becomes brittle with age, due to the presence of lignin – a complex chemical compound found in the cells of plants and trees. Newspaper is an excellent example of a paper with a high level of lignin.

The documents were also mostly written in iron-gall ink. Once the most important ink in Western history, it was iron-gall ink that Leonardo da Vinci used to write his notes. Bach composed with it. Rembrandt and Van Gogh drew with it, and the Constitution of the United States was drafted with it. However, iron-gall ink is also inherently acidic and, upon oxidation, can render the paper so weak, it disintegrates. The oxidation of paper and ink can be further

accelerated by poor storage and environmental conditions such as high levels of light, humidity and temperature.

Before treatment, an extensive photographic record and written report were made. The bundles of letters were then humidified so that each single brittle sheet could be separated without cracking. Moisture was gently introduced to relax the paper fibre by carefully placing each bundle between damp blotters and polyester webbing. Beforehand, the ink's water solubility was tested and confirmed to be stable. After initial humidification, the individual sheets were safely separated from the bundle.

The single sheets were then dried between dry blotters and polyester webbing and pressed under weights. This took a number of days. Finally, tears were carefully repaired using thin Japanese tissue paper and wheat-starch paste. Each of the documents was then placed in a polypropylene sleeve and stored in archival folders.

The whole conservation process took more than 90 hours. As well as markedly increasing the longevity of a valuable and unique material, the treatment enabled the collection to be accessed and enjoyed in a way that would otherwise not have been possible.

ORIGINAL INSIGHT: ADDING DETAIL TO ANCESTORS' LIVES

PRIMARY REFERENCE MATERIALS CAN UNFOLD ANCESTRAL HISTORY AND PRESENT STORIES WITH REWARDING AND ENLIGHTENING CLARITY. PUTTING 'FLESH ON THE BONES', ORIGINAL DOCUMENTS BREATHE LIFE INTO WHAT HAS GONE BEFORE.

A shipping list showing our ancestors' arrival in Australia; a 19th-century newspaper article recounting an important family event; a document listing a convict's transportation and describing both his offence and appearance; a parish register pre-1856 showing the first Australian birth in the family; a newspaper photograph of a great-grandfather published before he embarked for duty in Word War I. These are all examples of a selection of original documents researchers seek out at the State Library.

These and other primary records not only provide valuable raw information, but also, because of the style, fashions and processes of the period from which they originate, a strong sense of the time and place in which they existed. They might also correct distortions or inaccuracies in information and stories passed down to us. Drawing us closer to the past, they provide a valued sense of immediacy and veracity in our

encounter with our earlier family. For example, the photographs of World War I soldiers published in *The Queenslander* are sometimes the only images that can be found of a family member.

The widespread use of technology and the internet has fuelled significant advances and interest in the field of genealogy. Microfilm makes it possible for researchers to find, examine and reproduce original documents, which, otherwise, would be too fragile and precious to handle. Good copies of microform can be reproduced on paper or saved to a memory stick or CD-ROM. These documents, with due regard for copyright, can then be imported into the family history, whether written or electronic.

The State Library of Queensland benefits from the latest microform equipment, along with a vast collection of microform and electronic records for both Australian and overseas research. See the website, library info guides, and NetLinks for further information.

EXPERIMENTAL TELEVISION BROADCASTING, BRISBANE, CA. 1930

In 1934, scientific body the Royal Society sponsored the first regular (although experimental) 30-line Baird system television transmissions in Australia. All television experimentation was soon to cease with the imminent outbreak of war.



OUT FOR A DRIVE IN THE MODEL T FORD, CA. 1920

The Trundle family in Hughenden get ready for an outing in their snappy 'any colour as long as it's black' Model T Ford. With simple, rugged construction and high clearance, the car was admirably suited to Queensland's rough road conditions.



TRAEGER PEDAL WIRELESS, 1929

Alfred Traeger, a Victorian engineer, invented the pedal wireless in 1929. The radio was designed for Reverend John Flynn's Royal Flying Doctor Service, whose operators were struggling with the difficult task of turning the handle of the radio to generate power, whilst simultaneously using the other hand to operate a Morse code key. Traeger overcame the problem by equipping the generator with pedals causing a major communications revolution by diminishing the social isolation experienced in the outback.



AUTOMOBILE SKATES, THE THOUSAND LEAGUE BOOTS OF THE 20TH CENTURY

This original invention is modelled by its Parisian inventor, M. Constantini. Powered by two small gasoline engines they could reach speeds of 40km per hour.



'POPUP GUN' FROM THE ENGINEER MAGAZINE

The idea of the popup, or disappearing gun, was that the barrel could be lowered near the ground for loading and the gun exposed only for the short time required to fire it. Similar guns were installed at Fort Lytton in Brisbane in 1881, though these are firmly anchored by tons of stone and cement rather than the top-heavy portable gun suggested here.



PDP-1 COMPUTER

This PDP-1 computer was the first stand-alone computer system, and the first computer to have a video game written for it. By modern standards it looks huge, but the PDP-1 was small and inexpensive compared to the monstrous corporate computers that had been used previously.

The State Reference Library holds historic and contemporary magazines, papers, articles, photographs and scientific journals detailing the history, usage and further aspects of these and many more inventions.

THE REAL MATILDA

THE STATE LIBRARY HOLDS THE FIRST PRINTED EDITION OF *WALTZING MATILDA*. HOWEVER, BY THE TIME OF ITS FIRST PUBLICATION IN 1903, THE SONG ALREADY HAD AN UNCLEAR AND COMPLEX HISTORY.

There are at least three different versions of *Waltzing Matilda*.

VERSION 1

An undated letter by Christina Macpherson to Thomas Wood recalling the events surrounding the creation of the song, has led to Christina generally being accredited as the first 'creator' of the music.

Christina was visiting her family at Dagworth Station near Winton, and whilst at the home of her friend, who was a popular pianist in town, picked out the notes by ear of a tune she had recently heard at the Warnambool races in Victoria.

Banjo Patterson, who was also staying at Dagworth Station and had accompanied her into town, wrote some lines to the tune there and then. It is thought that Christina's piano-playing friend was responsible for the early dissemination of the song.

VERSION 2

Waltzing Matilda had instant popular appeal following its composition and became folklore early in its history, with different tunes emerging in the transmission process. An example of this is the Queensland version. It is typical in oral-music traditions for the words to undergo only minor changes from person to person, whilst the tunes might change completely.

VERSION 3

The most popular version today is the version arranged by Marie Cowan in 1903 for James Inglis Co Ltd who imported Indian tea and sold it in Australia under the trademark *Billy Tea*. A picture of a 'swaggie' boiling his billy was featured on the tea packets. Using the billy-tea connection, James Inglis decided it would be good business to sell packets of tea with free copies of a new arrangement of *Waltzing Matilda* wrapped around them. Himself a poet and lover of bush poetry, Inglis had acquired the Patterson poem from Angus and Robertson in 1902. One of his directors, William Cowan, suggested his amateur musician wife, Marie, could set the poem to music.

It seems most likely that Marie Cowan adapted an oral version of the Macpherson/Patterson song already known to her. This is how the first published edition of *Waltzing Matilda* came into being.

The State Library of Queensland holds two copies of the first published edition. The first was purchased at an auction, for a fair but considerable price. The second was donated a few months later by an antiquarian sheetmusic dealer. He had just acquired a copy from a secondhand shop in western New South Wales for 20 cents!

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
