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# Princeton Men's Soccer 2006—Q&A

## Tigers begin centennial season Sept. 1 vs. Stanford

### What's the story in 2006?

An unusually large and experienced group of eight seniors played their final game in a Princeton uniform last November against Yale, so the makeup of the Tiger starting 11 against Stanford Sept. 1 will certainly be a bit new.

A closer inspection, however, reveals that plenty of 2005 experience is back. Three 2005 All-Ivy picks should be starters, and several more are legitimate candidates for those honors this season.

"Maybe there isn't the same pressure with this group because it's a bit more unproven, but we're really excited about this season," says 11th year head coach Jim Barlow. "If you take some of the play we had later in the year and add a good incoming class, it gives us plenty of reason for optimism."

### Who wears the armband?

Princeton's team captain in 2006 is senior Jame Wunsch, who has started all of Princeton's 51 games in his first three seasons. The prototypical center back at 6-feet-2, Wunsch was a second-team all-region and first-team All-Ivy pick a year ago. In addition to his marking abilities, Wunsch's height and athleticism allow him to be a factor on set pieces.

"He's really our anchor back there," says Barlow. "He had a great year last season and a terrific spring and is a very deserving captain."

### Where is the experience?

On defense, where Barlow can count on a group that features two returning All-Ivy performers in Jame Wunsch and Matt Kontos and another defensive midfielder type in Matt Care, also an All-Ivy pick as a rookie. Add in junior Robbie Morgenroth, who missed several games last season due to injury, and senior Zach Schwarz, an experienced player who will likely move to defense in 2006, and the Tigers feel confident in their ability to contain opposing groups.

"We have a strong nucleus defensively," said Barlow, whose team allowed just six goals in eight Ivy League games a year ago. "It's a good group with several leaders, and we're confident in their abilities."

### Who's the man in goal?

Whoever it is, it's a player who has never seen action in a varsity game prior to the 2006 season. Princeton enters the year with two goalies on its roster in senior Justin Oppenheimer and sophomore Joe Walter, both of whom watched All-Ivy goalie Bobby Guelich play every minute of every game last season.

"It will be a situation where those two guys are competing for a spot," says Barlow. "In the spring, both of them made a lot of progress and showed great potential. We'll use the preseason to see who will be in there during the year."

### Who's up top?

Kyle McHugh returned to Princeton in 2005 after a year away and was extremely active in his attacking role, leading the team with 39 shots. With the graduation of attacking players like Darren Spicer and Adrian Melville, McHugh will be counted on to be a finisher for the Tigers in 2006.

"Kyle is terrific with the ball at his feet," says Barlow. "He had an excellent spring and has a chance to have a great season."

Barlow also feels that his attacking group will have greater depth in 2006, with as many

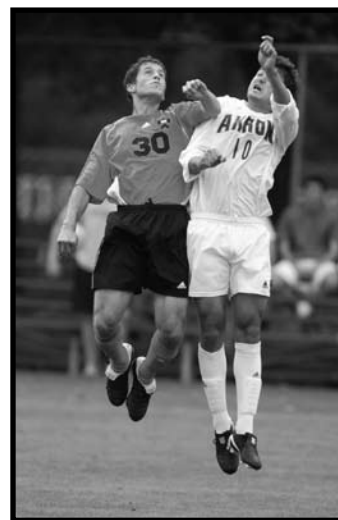

as six players vying for time in a two-attacker formation. Sophomore Jason Adams and junior Ted Wolfson, each of whom played significant roles last season, are candidates for starting positions on attack in 2006.

### Is it really all about family?

Two current Tigers, sophomore Jason Adams and freshman Max Hare, are each the third members of their family to play at Princeton for Barlow. Another Tiger sophomore, Pat Farrell, is the sister of Meghan Farrell, who plays for Princeton's women's team.

# Q&A continued...

## Will there be something new about the home of the Tigers?

Plans for a new "soccer park" facility at Princeton were unveiled recently, and the facility is expected to be fully complete by 2008. Permanent stands will be constructed on three sides of the current Lourie-Love Field, which will be lowered to create a bowl-like effect.

## Who's on tap?

Princeton's home schedule is a good one in 2006, beginning with an opening matchup with Stanford and highlighted by an excellent stretch of games midway through the season.

That four-game homestand includes night games at Lourie-Love Field against BIG EAST powers Saint John's and Seton Hall and Ivy League matchups with Dartmouth and Brown, each of whom earned an Ivy championship a season ago.

"We're fortunate to have such quality opposition coming to play here this year," says Barlow. "It's certainly a challenging schedule, but it's nothing we're not used to."

Perhaps the biggest challenge will be a six-game stretch away from home in September, including games at Rutgers, Yale and Bucknell in a seven-day span.

## Who's new?

Six members of the Princeton class of 2010 will join the Tigers in 2006, a group that features talent all over the field from all over the country.

Coming the shortest distance is midfielder Ben Harms, who played at Barlow's alma mater, Hightstown High School, just a few minutes away from Princeton. Coming the furthest is Danny Steiner, a defender from outside Los Angeles.

Those two will be joined by Hare, from Richmond, Va., Dion Bubar-Hall, from Colorado, Nate Krinsky, from New Hampshire, and Devin Muntz, from Pennsylvania.

## What else is news?

- The Tigers will celebrate the "100 Years of Princeton Soccer" in 2006, featuring a commemorative logo and several special events throughout the season. Princeton's first game came in 1906, when the Tigers defeated the Merion Cricket Club. The Tigers' first game against an intercollegiate opponent came the next year, when Princeton faced its oldest rival, Columbia.

- Jim Barlow, who took over the Princeton program at the age of 27, is now in his 11th year as head coach. Barlow, 76-68-28 in his first 10 seasons, now needs nine victories to move into third place all-time at Princeton behind 29-year coach Jimmy Reed (132) and Bob Bradley '80 (92), Barlow's collegiate coach.

- Due to the new NCAA tournament schedule, which begins a week earlier than in previous years, Princeton's season ends a week earlier than in recent years. The Tigers' matchup with Yale, which has been their final regular-season game for the last 10 years, will be played in September this season.

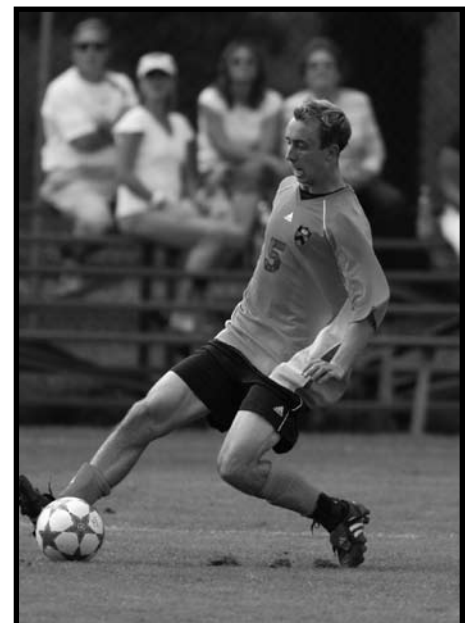

**Jim Barlow**  
**Head Coach**  
**11th Season**  
**Princeton '91**

Jim Barlow '91, a former Tiger standout who earned both Ivy League Player of the Year and Rookie of the Year honors during his

playing career, has led the Princeton men's soccer team to a 76-68-28 record and two NCAA tournament appearances in a decade as head coach at his alma mater.

Barlow, 37, now in his 11th season on the bench, trails only Brown's Mike Noonan in terms of length of tenure among Ivy League men's soccer coaches.

He has led the Tigers to two Ivy League championships, in 1999 and 2001, and five of his former players at



Princeton are either currently competing or have competed for Major League Soccer (MLS) clubs. The Tigers annually play a schedule that not only features some of the top teams in the region but also nationally, preparing the team for its always tightly-contested Ivy schedule.

"As a player here at Princeton, I learned what it meant to put yourself on the line every day for a group of people that you really care about," says Barlow. "I hope I have continued to create that type of environment as head coach."

Barlow compiled 22 wins over his first three seasons at Princeton before coaching the 1999 Tigers to an 11-5-2 record, an Ivy League title and a subsequent berth in the NCAA tournament. The Tigers earned their first outright Ivy championship since 1960 that season and took Virginia to triple overtime in postseason play. Princeton's 11 wins in 1999 marked the second highest single-season victory total in program history.

Two seasons later, the 2001 squad finished with an 10-3-5 overall record and shared the Ivy League title with a 5-1-1 conference mark. During that year, Barlow coached Mike Nugent, Princeton's first Ivy League Player of the Year since Barlow won the award in 1990, while Matt Behncke took home the Roper Trophy as Princeton's top male athlete. Both Nugent and Behncke were drafted by Major League Soccer later that year.

The Tigers finished 3-2-2 in Ivy play in 2004, staying in the hunt for the league title until the season's final weekend, and Darren Spicer '06 was named the program's third Ivy League Player of the Year after scoring a league-high 12 goals.

In 2005, Princeton rebounded from a slow start to finish 3-1-1 in its final five Ivy League games and 6-8-3 overall. The Tigers played a schedule that featured several teams ranked in the top 10 in the NSCAA poll, including an Akron team that would eventually be ranked No. 1 nationally.

Barlow, a native of nearby Hightstown, N.J., was named Princeton's head coach in 1996 at age 26 after his collegiate coach and mentor, Bob Bradley '80, left the Tigers to become an assistant coach for MLS's D.C. United. Previously, Barlow had spent four years as an assistant coach at American University in Washington, D.C., where he also earned a master's degree in education.

At Princeton, Barlow, a midfielder, became the Tigers' first Ivy League Player of the Year during his senior season of 1990. In 1989, he helped the Tigers reach the NCAA tournament for the first time since the 1979 season, and he was the 1987 Ivy League Rookie of the Year as a freshman.

He earned first-team All-Ivy honors three straight seasons—1988, 1989 and 1990. Barlow earned a bachelor's degree in history from Princeton in 1991.

A prep standout at Hightstown High School, Barlow was named the 1986 New Jersey Soccer Coaches Association Player of the Year and was later named to the first class of inductees in the Hightstown High School Hall of Fame. He also captained the 1988 Under-19 national champion Union Lancers.

A 1999 inductee into the Mercer County Soccer Hall of Fame, he was also recently honored as a 2005 inductee into the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association (NJSIAA) Hall of Fame.

Barlow has also served as the head coach for the Under-15 U.S. National Team after serving for five years as an assistant coach and traveling with that group both domestically and abroad, including trips to Bolivia and Mexico. In addition, he has coached the Under-18 Princeton Union team in the Princeton Soccer Association. Barlow has also served on the USYSA Region I staff and coached New Jersey and Maryland Olympic Development Program teams. He also has earned U.S. Soccer's "A" coaching license.

Barlow is married to Patty Kennedy, an instructor in the Princeton University Writing Program and formerly an assistant women's lacrosse coach at Princeton. The couple resides in Montgomery.



**Arron Lujan**  
**Assistant Coach**  
**Second Year**  
**Colorado College '94**

Arron Lujan, a former All-America player and prolific scorer at Colorado College in the early 1990's, is in his second year on Jim Barlow's staff at Princeton as an assistant coach.

Lujan came to Princeton in the spring of 2005 after two seasons as an assistant coach at Virginia Wesleyan in Norfolk, Va. He helped lead the Marlins to a second-round appearance in the NCAA Division III tournament in 2003 and a 27-9-3 overall record in two seasons.

Starting in the summer of 2002, Lujan served as a Virginia ODP District Coach for the Under-16, Under-14 and Under-13-year-old boys divisions. He was responsible for recognizing and developing players for the five-month state identification selection period. Lujan was also the head coach of the Beach FC Hurricanes Under-17 Boys Premier team in 2004.

Prior to entering coaching, Lujan played seven years of professional soccer, completing that stint in 2002 with the A-League's Hampton Roads Mariners. He also won back-to-back amateur national championships while playing for the Denver Kickers in both 1994 and 1995.

A native of Las Cruces, N.M., and a 1994 graduate of Colorado College with a degree in drama, Lujan finished his career as the school's all-time leading scorer with an impressive 200 points (69 goals, 62 assists). A first team All-America in 1994, Lujan also received the college's Van Diest Award for achievement in citizenship, leadership and athletics.

Lujan and his wife, Heather, welcomed a baby boy, Vaughn, earlier this year.



**Tom Moffat**  
**Assistant Coach**

Tom Moffat, a standout player at both Mercer County Community College and Glassboro State College (now Rowan University) in the 1970's, joins the Princeton men's soccer staff in 2006.

Moffat has recently been a trainer/evaluator for the Princeton Soccer Association and coach for the Hamilton/Hiberian United club program. He also assisted Princeton head coach Jim Barlow with the Princeton Union Under-17 team in 2003-04.

He spent 12 years as a Building Official for West Windsor Township, managing a staff of township inspectors, before become a sales representative at Cordstrap USA in 2005.

Moffat was an all-conference player at Glassboro and played for a Mercer team that won a region title and was a national finalist in 1976. He also played for a state champion Steinert High School team in 1975.



**Don Betterton**  
**Assistant Coach**  
**Dartmouth '60**

A coach for the Princeton soccer teams for parts of five decades, Don Betterton, often referred to as the "Shot Doctor," will serve as a volunteer assistant coach for the men's soccer team for the 19th consecutive year in 2006.

At the 2004 Princeton Varsity Club Banquet, Betterton was honored as the recipient of the Marvin Bressler Award, given by the Department of Athletics for contributions to both education and athletics at Princeton.

Betterton first coached the men's junior varsity and freshman teams for 10 years and then coached Princeton's first women's soccer team for three years until it attained varsity status in 1980. He then assisted with the women's program until 1988, when Bob Bradley asked him to join his staff on the men's side, and he has continued in that role since Jim Barlow took over as head coach in 1996.

His primary role at Princeton had been as the University's Director of Financial Aid, a position he held from 1974 until retiring after 32 years at the end of the 2005-06 academic year. Under Betterton's direction, Princeton assumed a national leadership role in facilitating the enrollment of low- and middle-income students at high-cost institutions, most notably with the success of its unique "no loan" policy.

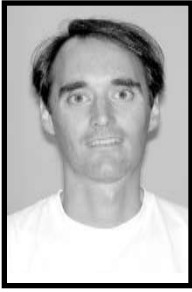
Betterton, who operated what many consider to be the preeminent aid program among U.S. colleges, has been a trustee of the College Board, a chairman of the Policy Committee of the Consortium on Financing Higher Education, and a member of the Ivy League Policy Committee. He wrote two books on financial aid, "The Insider's Guide to Paying for College" and "How the Military Will Help You Pay for College," and another on college trivia.

Betterton graduated magna cum laude from Dartmouth in 1960 with a degree in history. He led the Big Green soccer team in scoring in each of his varsity seasons and, in his senior year, was a first-team All-Ivy and regional All-America selection. He later received his master's degree from Rutgers in 1972.

A Naval Aviator for 23 years, Betterton originally came to Princeton in 1965 as an instructor in the NROTC unit. He retired from the service in 1984 with the rank of Captain.

Betterton and his wife of 43 years, Pamela Finegan, have three children - Connie (Princeton '88), Tom (Dartmouth '90), and Ann (Duke '93) - and five grandchildren.





**Russ Steves**  
Athletic Trainer  
Pittsburgh '83

Russ Steves, Princeton's Director of Physical Therapy, has worked with the men's soccer team for 19 of his 21 years in two different stints at Princeton.

He also works with the Tiger men's and women's tennis teams and the men's track and field team and is the coordinator of physical therapy for Princeton's non-athlete student population.

Steves graduated from Pitt in 1983 with a B.S. in physical therapy and a certification from the athletic training program. He began working at Princeton two years later and joined the men's soccer staff in 1987, when Bob Bradley was the coach and Jim Barlow was a freshman. Steves would then earn his M.Ed. from Virginia in 1997 before returning to Princeton.

His work with Princeton soccer helped him become the Director of Medical Liaisons for the ChampionsWorld U.S. Tour as well as the team liaison for Manchester United's U.S. tour for two summers. This past summer, he was the team liaison for English Premier League champion Chelsea during that club's visit to the U.S. to play in the Major League Soccer All-Star Game. In the summer of 2005, he served as the team liaison for the famous Italian club AC Milan during their two-week trip to the United States.

Steves is a self-proclaimed "crazy soccer fan," having traveled to watch games in London (Tottenham Hotspur), Birmingham (Aston Villa), Leeds (Leeds), Liverpool (Liverpool) and Manchester (Manchester United) in England, Milan (San Siro) in Italy and Cologne (FC Koln) and Leverkusen (Bayern Leverkusen) in Germany.

Steves was born and raised in western Pennsylvania and now resides in Princeton.



**Angie Brambley**  
Strength Coach  
Pittsburgh '00

Angie Brambley is in her fifth year at Princeton as assistant varsity strength and conditioning coach. She earned a B.A. in exercise science from the University of Pittsburgh and a M.A. in sports administration and recreation from Temple University in 2002.

Brambley is a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) who also earned certification as a USA Weightlifting Level I club coach. She is also a member of the nationally-ranked Keystone Rugby Club.



**Jeff Stout**  
Academic Athletic Fellow  
Brown '72

Jeff Stout came to Princeton in 1972 for graduate work in religion, joined the faculty in 1975 and received his doctorate in 1976. He has been associated with the men's soccer team since current head coach Jim Barlow took one of his religious ethics courses in the late 1980's.

Stout was the chair of Princeton's religion department for seven years (1992-1999), and he served as acting chair in 2002-03. His books include *Ethics after Babel* (2001) and *Democracy and Tradition* (2004), both published by Princeton University Press. He is a contributing editor to the *Journal of Religious Ethics* and was co-editor of the Cambridge Series on Religion and Critical Thought.

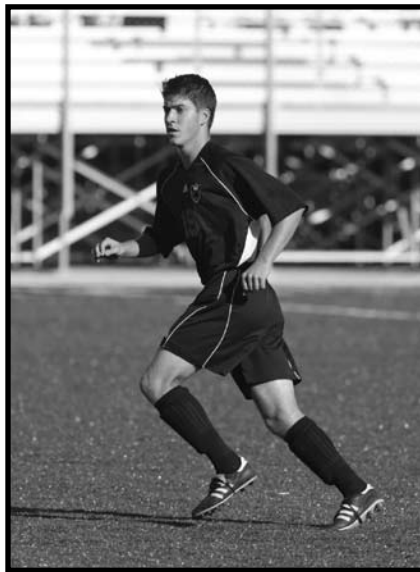

# 2005 Season in Review

## On the Rebound

Princeton began its 2005 Ivy League season with losses on the road at eventual Ivy champions Dartmouth and Brown but rebounded to finish 3-1-1 in its final five league games. The Tigers allowed only three goals in those final five Ivy games.

## An Unexpected Break

Inclement weather and unplayable field conditions forced an unusual 11-day span between games for Princeton in mid-October. Games against Northwestern and Columbia were both postponed to later in the season, giving the Tigers seven games in the final 21 days of the season.

## Quite an Invitational

At the Princeton Invitational Sept. 17-18, the Tigers played two teams ranked in the top 10 nationally at the time of the game. First, No. 7 Fairleigh Dickinson scored two early goals and held on for a 2-1 win over the Tigers. The next day, No. 9 Akron, a team that would be ranked No. 1 later in the year, scored with less than three minutes left to defeat the Tigers 1-0.

## Adding Spice

Darren Spicer concluded his outstanding career in 2006 by earning first-team All-Ivy and second-team all-regional honors and leading the Tigers with seven goals and 17 points. Spicer, the 2004 Ivy Player of the Year, finished with 26 career goals, 10th all-time at Princeton. He was later drafted by Chivas USA in February's MLS Supplemental Draft.

## Road Warriors

Princeton won its first three road games in 2005—at American, Drexel and Adelphi—and four of the Tigers' six wins came on the road. In contrast, the Tigers were winless in their first five home games before defeating Cornell at Lourie-Love Field Oct. 29.

## Big Play Bob

Bobby Guelich only started for one season in goal for the Tigers, but it was an excellent season that saw him earn second-team All-Ivy honors. He led the Ivy League with 85 saves and had four shutouts and also earned Academic All-Ivy honors.

## Thriller Under the Lights

After not playing in 2004, Princeton and Rutgers returned to the field in 2005 and played a classic, finishing 110 minutes with a 1-1 tie at Lourie-Love Field. Kyle McHugh scored early in the second half to give Princeton the lead, only to have Rutgers tie the score on a penalty kick with under five minutes left in regulation. Guelich helped preserve the tie for Princeton with a diving save in the first 10-minute overtime. The teams were playing for the 51st time.

## Taking Care

Freshman midfielder Matt Care began the season on the bench but ended the year as a second-team All-Ivy choice. Care, who ended up starting 13 games, was the Ivy League Rookie of the Week after scoring the game-winning goal for Princeton against Cornell Oct. 29.

## More Spice

Four of Darren Spicer's seven goals in 2005 were of the game-winning variety. He won a game for Princeton in the final minutes of regulation, scoring in the 86th minute to help Princeton win at Penn, and he also won a game for the Tigers in overtime, scoring a goal on a rebound attempt against Adelphi.

## Quick Start

Adrian Melville scored Princeton's first three goals in 2005, including both of his team's goals in a big road win at American early in the season. Melville finished second on the team with 12 points despite missing some time due to injury in midseason.

## Old School

The Tigers had eight seniors on their 2005 roster, and seven of those eight players started at least three games. Three of them (Neil Chaudhuri, Bobby Guelich, Darren Spicer) started all 17 games, while Ben Young started all but one game and Adrian Melville and Alex Reison every game but three.

# 2005 Season in Review

## Perfect 20

Princeton's thrilling win at Penn Nov. 5 extended the Tigers' unbeaten streak against the Quakers to an amazing 20 consecutive seasons. The Tigers have an 18-0-2 record against the Quakers since their last loss in the series back in 1985.

## Pulling Rank

Including Akron and Fairleigh Dickinson, the Tigers played four games against nationally-ranked opposition in 2006. Princeton also played No. 20 Seton Hall and No. 25 Yale. Brown was also ranked in the top 25 during the season.

## Extra Time

Princeton played five overtime games in 2005, including three straight from Sept. 24-Oct. 2 and consecutive games on back-to-back days against Harvard and Northwestern in October. The Tigers finished 1-1-3 in extra time, winning at Adelphi but losing at Dartmouth in the conference opener.

## More Old School

The last nine Princeton goals or assists in 2005 were scored by seniors. Ben Young and Adrian Melville each had a goal and two assists in that time, while Darren Spicer had two goals and an assist in that five-game stretch.

Matt Kontos earned honorable mention All-Ivy League honors as a sophomore. He started all 17 games for Princeton on defense in 2005.

## Anchor Man

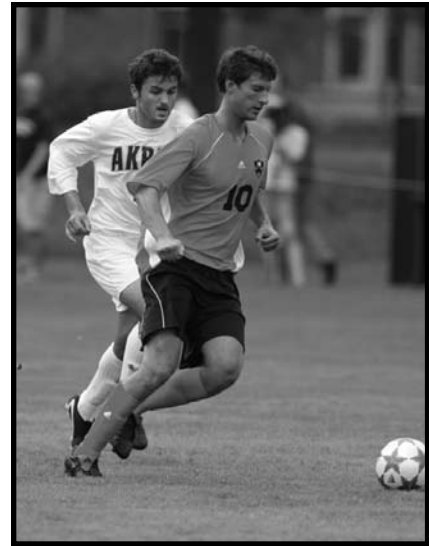
Jame Wunsch was both a first-team All-Ivy pick and second-team all-regional choice in 2005, and he was named team captain for the 2006 Tigers following the season. Wunsch started every game at center back for Princeton, and he also scored a goal on a header on a corner kick situation in a tie with Northwestern.

## Movin' On Up

Head coach Jim Barlow won his 75th career game at Princeton when the Tigers defeated archrival Penn 2-1 Nov. 5. Barlow's 76 wins as Princeton coach entering the 2006 season are tied for fourth all-time in program history behind 29-year mentor Jimmy Reed (136 wins), Bob Bradley (92), Barlow's coach at Princeton, and Bill Muse, who won 84 games between 1973-83.

## We're Honored

Bobby Guelich won the team's Dr. William Trevor Trophy, honoring the team's most improved player, while Darren Spicer was the winner of the David Hackett Memorial Cup as the team's Most Valuable Player. Adrian Melville won the Myslik Memorial Award, first awarded following the 2002 season.

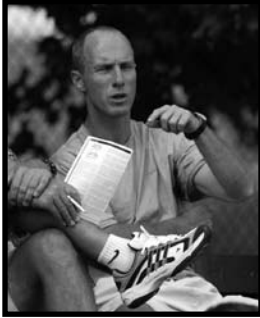

# Princeton and the MLS

## Bob Bradley '80

Bradley is the head coach of MLS's Club Deportivo Chivas USA. With more than 100 wins, he is the winningest coach in American professional soccer.



He had been the head coach of the N.Y./N.J. MetroStars in 2004-05 and was previously the head coach of the Chicago Fire, where he earned Coach of the Year honors after leading the team to MLS and U.S. Open Cup titles.

He was also an assistant coach for former U.S. national team coach Bruce Arena at D.C. United in 1996 and 1997.

At Princeton, he led the Tigers in scoring during his senior season of 1979, when the team advanced to the second round of the NCAAs. He began coaching the Tigers in 1984 and in the next 12 seasons built the team into an Ivy League and national powerhouse. Princeton won two Ivy titles and earned three NCAA tournament bids from 1984-95 and advanced to the NCAA final four in 1993 for the first and only time in school history.

Bradley started his coaching career at Ohio University, guiding the Bobcats to a 10-5-2 record in 1981 before joining Arena's staff at Virginia, where the Cavaliers posted a 32-7-2 record from 1982-83.

## Charles Stillitano '81

Stillitano was a venue director at the Meadowlands for the 1994 World Cup and then later became the general manager for the N.Y./N.J. MetroStars.

## Dave Vaudreuil '88

Vaudreuil played indoor and outdoor professional soccer immediately after graduation. In the MLS, he played with the Colorado Rapids, D.C. United and Chicago Fire.

## Chris Unger '90

Unger played with the N.Y./N.J. MetroStars and then worked for the team as an assistant general manager. He was a leading scorer at Princeton and also played on the U-20 national team.

## Joe Thieman '94

A former player for D.C. United, Thieman was a driving force behind Princeton's run to the final four in 1993. A four-year starter in the center midfield, he is second on Princeton's all-time list with 25 career assists and on the single-season list with 10 assists in 1993. Thieman was a 1993 All-America selection and was awarded the Roper Cup, given annually to Princeton's outstanding male senior athlete.

## Jesse Marsch '96

Marsch began his pro soccer career as a developmental player for D.C. United in the first MLS college draft. 10 years later, he is one of the most respected veterans in the league.

Now playing for his college coach, Bob Bradley, with Chivas USA, he played eight seasons with the Chicago Fire (1998-2005). He became the first player in Fire history to play in 100 games and is the team's all-time leader in that category. Marsch helped the Fire capture the 1998 MLS Cup Championship and the 1998 and 2000 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Championships.

In 215 appearances in his first 10 MLS seasons, Marsch had 23 goals and 32 assists. He also played for the U.S. national team in a World Cup qualifying match against Trinidad & Tobago in 2001.

Marsch was an All-America player at Princeton, where he totaled 29 goals and 15 assists in four seasons. He finished 1994 and 1995 as the Ivy League's leading scorer and was on the All-Ivy team both years. He led the Tigers to an NCAA appearance during his senior year, when he scored 16 goals.

## Andrew Lewis '98

Lewis played for the Chicago Fire and N.Y./N.J. MetroStars. At Princeton, he helped the Tigers advance to the final four in 1993. A tenacious defender with a great ability to break up plays and dominate the back, he also spent time with the U-20 U.S. National Team. He played in the A-League after concluding his MLS career.



## Matt Behncke '02

Behncke was selected in the second round (18th overall) of the 2002 MLS draft by the Dallas Burn and saw action in three games during his first season. He made his first MLS start against Colorado when he played for 90 minutes, and started again in the final game of the season. In 2003, he played in 13 games and started a career-high nine matches. He later played for Real Salt Lake in MLS.

Behncke earned Ivy League Rookie of the Year accolades in 1998, won his first league title in 1999, was named second-team All-Ivy during his first two seasons and was a first-team All-Ivy and all-region selection in 2000. He finished off his career with a unanimous first-team All-Ivy honor.

## Mike Nugent '02

The Chicago Fire drafted Nugent in 2002 but a torn meniscus limited him to just four games that year. After surgery in June 2002, Nugent later joined the Metrostars as a developmental player.

Nugent graduated from Princeton tied for fourth all-time in career goals and sixth in career points. He led the Tigers to an Ivy League title his senior year and was honored as the Ivy League Player of the Year, a first-team Mid-Atlantic Region selection and a second-team NSCAA All-America pick.

## Doug Hare '05

Upon graduation, Hare earned a spot on the Metrostars reserve team. Hare was a solid rock in the Princeton defense during his four-year career. After serving as a reserve his rookie season, he dramatically stepped up into a larger role his next two years, capping off his campaign with honorable mention honors from the Ivy League as a senior.

## Ryan Rich '05

Rich earned a place in history with his goal in the opening seconds of the Yale contest in 2004, tying the NCAA record for fastest goal in a game at eight seconds. Rich scored two goals his senior season and tallied five assists. He joined Hare on the Metrostars reserve roster after graduation.

## Darren Spicer '06

Spicer, the 2004 Ivy Player of the Year, was chosen by Club Deportivo Chivas USA in the MLS Supplemental Draft in January 2006.

Spicer scored 26 career goals at Princeton and was twice an all-region and All-Ivy pick. He had 12 goals as a junior in 2004.

He was the closest thing to a rock star Princeton athletics has seen in a while. Known simply and universally by only his first name, he'd turn heads everywhere he'd go on campus, heads belonging to everyone from football players to physics professors.

There he is, they'd say. There's Yasser.

They were a group of nine women who preferred to be away from the spotlight, who preferred to be known by one name as well, only in their case that name was the collective "Princeton" rather than Caroline, Devan, Jackie or any of their other actual names. While they were largely anonymous, they were no less impressive, no less dominant, no less history making.

In a remarkable 2005-06 athletic year at Princeton, two stories really stood out not only for their accomplishments in their respective venues but also for the way that they represented the very core elements of what Princeton athletics are supposed to be. Yasser El Halaby, the greatest collegiate squash player of all time, and the Princeton women's open crew varsity 8, who quite literally cruised to the NCAA championship, committed themselves early on to achieve at the highest levels of scholarship, citizenship and, of course, athletics.

By any standards, Princeton's 2005-06 athletic year was one for the ages. Princeton teams won 13 Ivy League championships, the fourth-highest total in league history, and 20 of the 33 teams that compete in Ivy League sports finished either first or second in the league standings.

Princeton also produced no fewer than 32 All-Americans and 12 Academic All-Americans. The 2005-06 season marked the 20th straight year that Princeton won the Ivy League's unofficial all-sports points championship, and the 38.5-point margin was the second largest during that streak. It was also the 20th straight year that at least one Princeton team or individual won a national championship.

The field hockey team went 7-0 in the league, regaining the title after a year absence and winning for the 10th time in 11 years. The Tigers then hosted second-ranked Duke in an opening round NCAA tournament game that might have been the single-greatest game involving a Princeton team this year. Playing against a heavily-favored Blue Devils team that would eventually reach the NCAA championship game, Princeton extended Duke to a second overtime before falling 2-1.

The men's and women's swimming and diving teams both entered the 2006 league championships as underdogs – and both came away with the championships. For the women's team, it was its fifth crown in the last six years, while the men

have won two of the last three and three of the last five. Swimming in the pool of a Harvard team that had easily defeated Princeton during the regular season and was the defending champion, the Princeton women pulled away right from the first event and won by 135 points. The men's 106-point win over second-place Harvard was perhaps even more amazing, considering Princeton did not win a single individual championship at the meet.

The women's hockey and women's basketball teams were both highly successful in the 1980s, but neither had won a league championship this decade – until this year, that is. The women's hockey team skated to its first Ivy title since 1995, winning the sixth championship in program history, while the women's basketball team won its seventh overall and first since 1999.

The men's squash team won a share of the league title with Harvard and Yale, as injuries prevented the Tigers from fielding their top lineup until the postseason. Once there, Princeton came within a hair of adding the national title, falling 5-4 in a packed Jadwin Gym against Trinity, nearly breaking that team's 131-match winning streak.

The spring is traditionally Princeton's most successful season, and 2005-06 was no different. Princeton saw three traditional powers follow the lead of the field hockey and women's swimming teams and regain the league championship that got away a year earlier, while four other teams also won Ivy titles.

The men's lacrosse team, dominated by freshmen and sophomores, earned a share of the league title and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament; this came one year after Princeton went 5-7 and saw its 10-year streak of Ivy titles and 16-year streak of NCAA tournament appearances come to an end.

The women's lacrosse team also earned a share of the league title, giving the Tigers five championships in the last six years.

The baseball team had won 10 straight Gehrige Division championships before the 2005 season, and an 0-7 start in the 2006 Ivy season might not have been the start the Tigers wanted. On the other hand, a big-time charge from that point saw Princeton win 11 of its final 13 league games and then sweep Harvard in two games to win the Ivy League championship series.

The softball team needed no such dramatics, as the Tigers led wire-to-wire to win the league race for the fourth time in five years.

The men's heavyweight crew spent much of the year ranked No. 1 nationally and defeated Harvard in Cambridge for the first time since 1957 before rolling to the Ivy title at Eastern Sprints. After that, Princeton would finish second nationally at the IRA championships.

In addition to those championship teams, Princeton also had dominant performances in a wide spectrum. The open crew completed a perfect season that stamped the 2006 Princeton varsity 8 as one of the greatest boats in women's college rowing history. Princeton won the Ivy title by almost eight seconds over Brown and then won the final at the NCAA championships by the margin of six full seconds. That performance, as well as that of El Halaby, transcended what was already an amazing year. El Halaby finished his career with four individual collegiate championships, becoming the first male player ever to accomplish that feat. He won all four of his championships three games to none.

Lightweight rower Michael Broache won the Class of 1916 Cup as the senior athlete with the highest academic standing. El Halaby was the winner of the Roper Trophy as the outstanding senior sportsman, while soccer player Emily Behncke, runner Cack Ferrell, fencer Jacquelyn Leahy, rower Caroline Lind, softball player Erin Snyder and lacrosse player Lauren Vance shared the von Kienbusch Award as the outstanding senior sportswomen.

Princeton's main campus covers 600 acres, and its more than 135 buildings exemplify a wealth of architectural styles, ranging from colonial buildings to collegiate Gothic dormitories to modern structures by eminent architects.

Coeducational since 1969, (women comprise about 45% of an average freshman class), Princeton enrolls approximately 6,400 students (4,600 undergraduates and 1,800 graduate students). Coming from all 50 states and from more than 70 foreign countries, Princeton students are an unusually talented and diverse group that represents many economic, ethnic, social, cultural and religious backgrounds.

Students are apt to choose Princeton for the strength of its academic program, its relatively small size combined with the resources of a major research university and the personal attention its undergraduates enjoy. Men and women who seek a quality education in the liberal arts, architecture, engineering or public and international affairs will discover that Princeton has much to offer.

Princeton offers an abundance of extraordinary resources, including a library system that holds almost five million books and almost 35,000 current journals and periodicals — nearly all on accessible open-stack shelving; an art museum that exhibits works from its own and other outstanding collections, complementing courses in art and archaeology; a natural history museum; a computing center and clusters of microcomputers throughout the campus; and outstanding recreational and athletic facilities.

Living up to its motto "In the Nation's Service and in the Service of All Nations," Princeton University has educated thousands of individuals who have dedicated their lives to public service, including two U.S. Presidents (Woodrow Wilson and James Madison); hundreds of U.S. and state legislators (the House of Representatives, for example, has housed a Princeton alumnus every year since it first met in 1789); and 44 governors, including 11 New

Jersey governors. Each year more than 2,500 members of the student body, faculty and staff volunteer in community service projects throughout the region. Reflecting this public service spirit, the University as an institution supports many service initiatives.

Beyond the University's historic campus is the town of Princeton,

a community of 30,000 people. The Historical Society of Princeton, located in the colonial Bainbridge House, two blocks from the University's main gate, offers information on the town's early years. Princeton conscientiously preserves many of its historically and architecturally important buildings, making the town an unofficial museum of American architecture from colonial times to the present.

Within this historic setting, institutions and individuals, including many writers, artists, scientists and business executives, create an intellectual and cultural climate of unusual diversity. In addition to the University, Princeton is the home of the Institute for Advanced Study (where Albert Einstein spent the last 22 years of his life), Princeton Theological Seminary, Westminster Choir College of Rider University and Educational Testing Service. Cultural activities approach the variety ordinarily found in large cities; the town supports a resident repertory theater, several orchestras, a ballet troupe, several choral groups and an opera festival.

Although the Princeton community is small and semirural, it is far from isolated. Both New York City and Philadelphia are about 50 miles away and readily accessible by either bus or train.

Princeton also frequently plays host to traveling art shows, dance and musical groups and solo performers by virtue of its convenient location along the Boston/Washington, D.C., corridor.

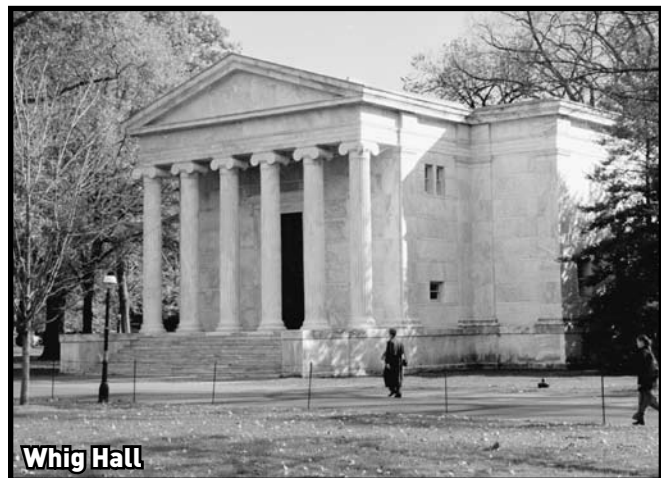

Princeton offers 38 varsity sports and nearly 40 club teams, and more than 2,300 students (nearly 50% of the undergraduate enrollment) participated in intercollegiate competition (varsity and club combined) during the 2005-06 school year. Over 600 teams played intramural sports.

To accommodate these programs, Princeton has a strong commitment to its facilities. They include:

**Princeton Stadium  
Weaver Track and Field Stadium**

The 27,800-seat Princeton Stadium and the adjacent Weaver Track and Field Stadium took the place of Palmer Stadium, which was torn down following the 1996 season.

Princeton Stadium made its debut in 1998, and the Princeton football team has averaged more than 15,000 fans in the first eight seasons at the stadium. The stadium concourses are always open, and the facility has served as a meeting and banquet area.

The state-of-the-art track facility features wide lanes and an excellent radius on the turns. The track's north straightaway has starting chutes at both ends so that sprints and hurdles can be run in either direction. The stadium, which has seating for 2,000, frames Freylinghuyzen Field, home of Princeton's sprint football team.

**Caldwell Field House**

The Caldwell Field House has also been the site of a significant overhaul. The venerable home to locker rooms and athletic training rooms has been expanded with a new area especially for the University's women's teams.

A plaza serves as the roof of the complex. Most of the 16,000 square-foot building is below the plaza, but a ground-level skylight provides natural illumination for the primary co-ed portion of the facility. The project also included an expanded athletic training area and renovated locker rooms in DeNunzio Pool.

**Jadwin Gymnasium**

Jadwin Gymnasium, with a capacity of 6,854, is the state's second-largest on-campus basketball arena. Its main floor also serves as a top indoor track and field facility, with a brand-new track laid down in 2004, as well as a practice facility.

The sublevels of Jadwin hold one of the largest fencing rooms in the world, two weight rooms and six tennis courts. A brand-new squash facility houses 11 international-size court and spectator seating.

**Dillon Gymnasium**

The Stephens Fitness Center in Dillon Gymnasium provides a centralized facility where men and women can pursue personal health objectives with trained supervision. (Dillon has facilities for aerobics, basketball, conditioning and weight training, dance, martial arts, swimming, squash, volleyball and wrestling.)

**Shea Rowing Center**

The University recently expanded and renovated its landmark boathouse and crew facilities, now known as the Shea Rowing Center. The crew programs use the University-owned Lake Carnegie and its Olympic racing course.



**Athletic Training Room**

Princeton student-athletes receive the best in preventative and rehabilitative care from the athletic training staff. The training room is spacious, encompassing nearly 3,000 square feet in the east wing of Caldwell Field House. Princeton has nine certified athletic trainers who work closely with its 38 varsity sports.

Recent modifications permit the maximum efficiency of space and movement. The room is divided into four zones: hydrotherapy, treatment, first aid and taping and rehabilitation.

**Other Facilities**

Other facilities include Baker Rink, named after Tiger hockey and football legend Hobey Baker '14, and is one of the oldest hockey venues in the country; Lourie-Love Field, a lighted facility for soccer; 1895 Field, a softball field; Clarke Field, home of the baseball team; the Lenz Tennis Center and DeNunzio Pool.
