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The Village logo was designed to be representative of not only historical Bethalto, but also the newer and more progressive era.

The old Village Hall at the top was built in 1874 and is now listed on the National Historical Register as the oldest, still standing, and functional municipal building in Madison County. The building was chosen to represent the historical roots of our community. It originally housed the official offices and also served as the "jailhouse". The upstairs meeting room was home to our public library for a considerable period of time. The building currently is the location of our historical museum.

The coal truck and train represent the rich coal mining industry that dominated the early days of the village. The coal was shipped out of town on the railroad, which bisected the village running east and west. Most people know the old train track area as Plegge Boulevard, now affectionately called the "Expressway".

The arboretum was developed in 1966 (the land was part of the railroad right-of-way), and was one of few in the area. It represents the growth and progressive nature of the community. A directory of the trees and bushes is available in the mayor's and clerk's offices. A beautiful place to stroll or power walk, its maturation only makes

the experience more pleasant each time you visit.

The airport signifies growth and the ability of Bethalto to take flight



and continue to soar to be the best community in which to live and work. Its small beginning, and continued steady growth, has developed it into one of the more highly recognized and economically important airports in the St. Louis metro area.

The center portion depicts the logo of our civic organization known as Bethalto Spirit. Spirit is a diverse group of citizens coming together to better the quality of life in our fine town. The trunk of the tree is a hand raised in volunteerism, the leaves represent the citizens of our village, and the jet is soaring into the sky to show progress.

Welcome...

Perched upon the edge of the rolling Illinois prairie is your new home - the Village of Bethalto. Low green hills and picturesque farms frame this attractive community of nearly 10,000 residents. We are a bedroom community and one of the three fastest-growing communities in Madison County.

The peaceful setting and relaxed lifestyle make

Bethalto an ideal place to raise a family. Yet, it's close proximity to the rest of the St. Louis metropolitan area



means that your family will never exhaust the tremendous variety of cultural opportunities and entertainment nearby.

Bethalto is home to the St. Louis Regional Airport, where an office and industrial park's expansion in the last few years has helped pour thousands of dollars into the tax base of the Village. The Village also boasts a beautiful arboretum - home to trees and plants from around the world, a boon to the nature



buff. Just south of the Village Hall is an extensive public library containing more than 30,000 volumes of books, as well as videotapes, cassettes, magazines,

and computers.

Through the week, it's common to find a variety of activities occurring at the community senior citizen's center. A van is available for transporting seniors to and from doctor's appointments, beauty shop appointments, grocery shopping, etc. Reservations can be made by calling 377-5859 a day in advance. Activities include pinochle, potlucks, dinner dances (requiring reservations at least a week in advance), and line dancing lessons offered twice a week.

Bethalto is home to several parks - the largest of which is located on Culp Lane. A three-quarter-mile walking path encircles a stocked fishing lake, children's playground and pavilion, with ample green space. Behind the Village Hall rests the Village Park where weddings take place at the gazebo, summer concerts are performed at the bandstand, the Jaycees

play host to the annual Country Fair, the Rotary Club

holds it's annual Easter Egg Hunt, and the Homecoming Association



holds it's annual Labor Day Homecoming.

The Village also cares a great deal about its youth. We have a municipal swimming pool, lighted tennis courts, skateboard park, a soccer field, a newly remodeled basketball court and a number of ball diamonds where more than 2,000 boys and girls participate each year in summer games. We have an active Boys & Girls Club, Rainbow Girls, 4-H Clubs, and of course, Girl Scout and Boy Scout Troops.

Bethalto's Public Schools are second to none. From pre-school to a four-year comprehensive university, our region offers a multitude of educational opportunities. The local school district offers an excellent high school, middle school, and neighbor-



hood grade schools. In addition, there are two parochial schools located within

village limits - Roman Catholic and Lutheran. Nearby is Lewis and Clark Community College, a two-year junior college, whose vocational graduates are employed throughout the area. Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, a four-year institution offering bachelor, master and doctorate degrees in many fields, is only minutes away. Within a 15-minute drive, you can learn dentistry, become a beautician, learn to dance or take flying lessons. The spiritual needs of our community are served by churches of varying denominations. A listing is found in this publication.

Bethalto was founded in 1834, incorporated April 19, 1869 under a special charter and again in 1873 under the State of Illinois' general law. It is governed by a Village President and six (6) trustees elected at large.

We are pleased that you have chosen to locate in Bethalto and we hope you and your family will be too. Contact information for your elected officials is listed in this publication. Don't hesitate to call any of them if you have a problem.

History

Three words sum up the early history of Bethalto: grain, coal and trains. The first settlers in the area arrived in the early 19th century and found a land

blessed with rich soil and various outcroppings of coal. The construction of the Alton-Terre Haute Railroad in the mid 1850s ensured Bethalto's destiny as a farming and mining center.



It was around 1809 when large numbers of settlers arrived in this area -- many of them Dutch and German settlers who came to farm. Indians were also found in the area, so numerous at one time along Indian Creek that there were Kickapoo villages, and that creek became named after the Indians. Many Indian relics have been found in that vicinity. Block houses were built in case protection might be needed, but there were few problems and only one recorded massacre in 1814.

Bethalto was favored in many ways to become an early settlement. It had good soil for growing grain and all needed food. There was a good vein of coal which had outcroppings that were discovered at an



early date.

hickory, walnut and other trees suitable for making building materials. The roads were also better than usual in a time when trails were the roads and ferries were the bridges. Game was plentiful, with an abundance of squirrels, rabbits, turkey, prairie hens and other game.

About the time that the railroad was being constructed in the 1840s and 1850s, the population

had grown to the point that it was necessary to plat further development. The first plat was laid out by Joe Starkey and was recorded on June 23, 1854. This is considered to be the humble beginning for Bethalto.

At one time, a railroad track was located where Erwin Plegge Expressway is today. The railroad, the second one built in Madison County, passed through the center of town and was responsible for the growth of Bethalto. The town consisted of four blocks facing the railroad -- West Main and Sherman Streets on the south and Mill and Third (now Central) to Oak Street on the north.

The railroad, built between 1854 and 1856, was extended to St. Louis and was known as the St. Louis & Terre Haute. Later, it was taken over by the Big Four and then the New York Central. Railroads were the major transportation before the days of the car. Therefore, most towns were located near a railroad.

The railroad linked Bethalto to the Mississippi



River so the people could market flour and coal. The opening of the rail line through Bethalto enabled the coal

milled here to be transported to a dock on the Mississippi River near what is now the town of Hartford. From there, coal was carried by steamboat to towns throughout the Midwest. This encouraged the development of more mines. At one time, there were at least 40 mines in or near Bethalto.

Yankee Diggins, one of the largest coal mines in the state of Illinois, was located in Bethalto. During the Civil War in 1861-1865, mine production was down. Following the Civil War, coal production rose; but by 1900, almost all the mines were gone. One by one, they closed during the first decades of the 20th century as the coal supply was deleted and the market diminished. Today, there are no coal mines operating anywhere in Madison County.

Mills also formed a very important part of Bethalto's early history. Construction of the railroad through the Village proved to be as pivotal for the milling industry as it had been for coal mining. At one time, Bethalto was one of the most important flour milling towns in the nation and was home to the largest mill in Illinois. As the 20th century progressed, Bethalto underwent a gentle transformation. Flour milling and coal mining gave way to corn and soybean farms and industry. Transportation remained a major factor in the

Village's development, however, the methods changed.



Construction began in 1946 on what was

then called Walston Aviation. Now known as St. Louis Regional Airport, subsequent expansion and addition of an office and industrial park are helping to propel Bethalto, into the future.

The railroad era ended for Bethalto in 1966. The right-of-way was offered to the Village by the New York Central Railroad Company, which last operated the line. The Village did not have the \$15,000 the rail company was asking for the 32 acres of land, so Bethalto National Bank stepped in and provided assistance for the purchase. This made possible the cross-town Expressway, a new home for the bank and a park and arboretum for the Village.

While Bethalto has moved forward, the Village has not forgotten its past. The old Village Hall, built

in 1873 and enlarged in 1885, is a two-story brick Victorian/Italianate town hall. It is the oldest governmental building still in use in Madison County. Recognizing its historical significance, it was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1987 and serves as our Bethalto Museum. The city's tiny one-room jail can still be seen today. The Museum contains exhibits on Bethalto's past including the role of its citizens in World Wars I and II. Other exhibits include the founding of the town, the annual Homecoming Celebration, and a recreated classroom from the past.

In 1998, a fire at a local home revealed a perfectly



protected log cabin within the structure. State historical preservationists estimate that the cabin was built in the mid-1800s. Bethalto's

school children were asked by the Bethalto Rotary Club to help raise the funds needed to move and restore the cabin to its present site next to the Museum. The "History Makes Cents" campaign collected more than one million pennies (\$10,000.) The Bethalto Log Cabin stands as a symbol of the village's pioneer past as well as the resourcefulness of its present youth.

The village offices are located at 213 North Prairie Street. There you will find the offices of the mayor, village clerk, and zoning administrator. The police, fire and civil defense departments are also located at this address. The mayor and clerk's offices are open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Services include:

- dog tags
- notary service
- building & occupancy permits
- business licenses
- zoning requests
- burn and garage sale permits
- and reservations of the Community Room and Senior Citizens Center.

Police Department

Bethalto is proud to have a fine full-time police department serving the community. An officer is sent to the local grade schools for the D.A.R.E. program. An officer also serves as the school resource officer at the high school. The animal control officer is also based at the police station and may be reached by dialing 377-5266. Sponsorship of Explorer Post 500 allows the youth of the community to become involved with the aspects of law enforcement at an early age. The department provides a multitude of services including: bicycle registration, checks of

residences while owners are out of town, disposal of old ammunition and firearms, and installation of car seats for children.

Public Works

The Public Works Department office at 101 S. Prairie Street., houses both the water and street department. Office hours are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

WATER SERVICE: Water service may be obtained in your home or business by completing an application at the public works department. You will be billed monthly for water, sewer and refuse. An afterhours drop box at the front of the building is available for payment of your bill. There is also a drive-up window for your convenience. EMERGENCY CALLS ONLY after 5 p.m. and before 8 a.m., and the entire weekend at 972-6274.

LARGE ITEM DROP OFF AREA: The public works department provides a place where residents may drop off large items (sofas, chairs, old appliances, etc.) at 1100 Albers Lane. A public works employee will be available to unlock the gate, Monday through Thursday. Please call the water office first.

SPRING AND FALL CLEANUP: Each spring and fall, the village provides a major cleanup free to its residents. At that time, on your first weekly trash pickup day, our trash hauler will provide curbside pickup of old furniture, etc. Watch for the notices on your water bills, in the newspapers, and on the sign board in front of village hall.

BRUSH PICKUP: The village provides one (l) hour per year of free brush pickup and chipping. Any time beyond an hour is charged at \$50.00 per hour in one-half hour intervals. Call the public works department at 377-8013 or 377-2310 to be placed on the brush list.

LEAVES: Weather permitting, the public works department will provide curbside vacuuming of leaves from October through January and again in April. If you do not wish to use the vacuum, you may contract with our waste hauler, Allied Waste, directly at (618) 656-6883. The hauler requires that the leaves be

bagged in biodegradable paper bags. No plastic bags will be accepted.

SNOW REMOVAL: When two inches or more of new snow has accumulated, plowing operations will begin. When snow removal begins, all parked cars must be removed from the streets marked "snow route" until the street surface has been completely plowed.

TRASH COLLECTION: The village has contracted with Allied Waste (618-656-6883) to collect trash twice weekly. There is also curbside recycling pickup on the first day of your weekly trash pickup. Billing for trash collection appears on your water bill.

Fire Department

The Bethalto Volunteer Fire Department is located at 213 N. Prairie St. Each member of the fire department is trained in firefighting, emergency medical care/treatment, hazardous materials and technical rescue abilities.

Members of the department train weekly to keep their skills up to date and focus on training for new technologies, first responders. They also participate in regional trainings as available. Members of the department also play a part in the Madison County Hazardous Materials Response Team and serve on many regional task forces. Due to the dedication of the fire department, the Village's insurance rating (ISO) is a 5.

The Fire Department also participates in the community; playing an important role in the Bethalto Homecoming which is held every Labor Day weekend. Members of the fire department host various fire prevention activities during Fire Prevention Month in the October. Members also conduct fire safety and school inspections.

If you are interested in joining the fire department stop by on a Monday night during trainings at the fire station or call 377-6421.

Senior Citizens Center

Bethalto has one of the nicest senior citizen's cen-

ter in the area and it is always in demand. It is located at 100 East Central and is available for use by our residents and our close neighbors whose tax dollars help support the building.

Through Madison County, Fort Russell Township, Wood River Township, and the Village of Bethalto, the senior citizens have a handicapped-accessible van at their disposal for doctor appointments, hair appointments, trips to the grocery store, etc. To make arrangements for the van to pick you up, call 377-5859 before noon one day prior to your appointment. The van is for use by residents ages 55 and older.

The seniors are a lively group who have lots of fun, so don't hesitate to join their organization. The group holds monthly potluck meetings on the first Tuesday of each month. The Village Clerk's office maintains the calendar for rental of the senior citizens building, as well as all other public buildings. Please call the administrative assistant at 377-8051 if you wish to use any public facility.

Bethalto Swimming Pool

The Town & Country Swimming Pool is located at 325 E. Central Street. It opens Memorial Day weekend, weather permitting, and closes



the weekend before Labor Day. The pool is open from 1-8 p.m. daily. Swimming lessons are available during the morning hours. The pool may also be rented after closing for private parties

Bethalto Museum

The Bethalto Museum located at 124 W. Main Street served as the village hall until a new village hall was built. In 1987, it was placed on the National Register of Historic Places. After several years of renovation, it became Bethalto's museum. It is open Saturdays from l-4 p.m., or by appointment by calling Arvel Fowler at 377-9944.

Bethalto Library

The Bethalto Public Library is its own library district which includes Cottage Hills, Meadowbrook,

Moro, Midway, and other surrounding towns. It is located at 321 S. Prairie Street and is open daily. Library cards are issued free to all residents in the district. Over 30,000 volumes are available, as well as computers, an audio visual room, CD-ROM, a new popular materials section, a lower-level community room, and varied children's programs throughout the year. A monthly newsletter is available by mail by calling the library. Notary service, voter registration, income tax forms, and use of typewriter/computer and a fax machine is also available. Frequently Asked Questions

What are the regulations/requirements for pet owners? Is there a leash law in Bethalto?

Yes, the Village has a leash law. The owner or keeper of a dog or cat shall keep the animal under restraint or fenced at all times and shall not permit such animal to be at large. Every person owning a dog shall pay to the Village Clerk on or before May 1st. an annual fee of \$2.00. In residential zoning districts, a combination of not more than three dogs, cats, rabbits or other domestic animals may be kept as pets by the occupant(s) of a dwelling.

When do I need a building permit?

A building permit is required if you are building a new home, doing a room addition, finishing a base-

Permits are not needed for fences or the replacement of shingles on an existing roof. Permits are available at the Clerk's office. If you have any questions, call the Zoning Administrator at 377-7697.

Am I required to have a fence if I have a swimming pool?

Yes. Every swimming pool, including above ground pools that are more than two (2') feet deep, shall be enclosed by a wall or fence at least four (4') feet in height. The passage through such wall or fence shall be equipped with a self-closing lockable gate.

Do I need to acquire a permit for a yard/garage sale?

Yes. Garage and/or yard sales are permitted on single-family residential premises after receipt of a permit from the Zoning Administrator. Such sales shall be limited to not more than twice per calendar year for a duration not exceeding two days for each occurrence. All signs displayed for such sales shall be removed within 12 hours of the close of the sale. Permits are available in the Clerk's office.

Bethalto Community Unit #8 Schools

Our mission: to inspire all students to achieve their greatest potential.

Bethalto Community Unit District #8 serves the educational needs of the community with pride, providing a broad range of instructional programs, implemented by a concerned staff of faculty and administrators who are dedicated to bringing out the best in each student.

Bethalto public schools provide educational services for students from the Village of Bethalto and the neighboring communities of Cottage Hills, Meadowbrook, and Forest Homes. The primary mission of the school system is to provide the best quality education for students so that they may assume their roles as knowledgeable and productive individuals who will serve the best interests of our democratic society.

Buildings throughout the district are attractive, well-maintained, and air conditioned. Each attendance center has a computer/media center, audiovisual materials, gymnasium (equipped with physical education equipment), and a commons/cafeteria area. Included at Civic Memorial High School is a theater auditorium.

Parents or guardians seeking to enroll a child in one of the district's schools must provide a birth certificate and proof of immunization. Physical examinations are required by the opening day of school for children entering kindergarten, fifth and ninth grades. A child who will be five years old on or before September 1st. may enter kindergarten.

Bethalto's elementary schools provide a program designed to encourage each student to achieve to the highest level of his or her ability. Reading and mathematics are stressed at all grade levels. Recognizing students' accomplishments and using methods and materials appropriate to the child's level of ability provide an environment which enhances students' self confidence and self respect. All of the elementary attendance centers provide an enrichment program for the academically gifted, as identified by testing and by their teachers. Federally funded Title 1 services are provided for remedial reading in schools that qualify for those services.

At the middle school level, the major academic emphasis is on language arts, math, science and social studies. Also included are encore classes Students take art, music and physical education classes and are offered the opportunity to take part in band and chorus. The gifted program continues, with accelerated math and English classes available to talented students. Title 1 reading services are also provided. D.A.R.E. programs at the intermediate level are designed to combat drug/alcohol abuse by helping students acquire good decision making skills, good communication skills and enhanced self-esteem.

To best prepare students with different interests, abilities and career plans, Civic Memorial High School offers three basic curricula: College prep, vocational/technical, and general. More than 100 different courses are offered. In addition, Civic Memorial utilizes the Block 8 schedule plan. Under Block 8, students attend class for 85 minutes on alternate day rotations. This system allows students the opportunity to earn credit in 8 different classes each semester.

The college bound student may take four years of English classes, some sections of which are designated as honors English and are designed to challenge the verbally gifted student. Math classes through the level of calculus and science courses including physics, biology and chemistry are offered. Computer classes provide the computer literacy essential in today's world. Two foreign languages - French and Spanish - are taught, as well as numerous social studies classes. Art, chorus, band, drama, journalism, public speaking - all these classes are available for the interested student. There are college level courses offered in english, math, and psychology which carry dual credit.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

The high school student who is oriented toward vocational training can take a variety of business, home economics and industrial occupation classes. Some shop classes and business classes offer college credit through Lewis and Clark Community College.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

Bethalto Community Unit #8 is one of 11 school districts which are members of Region III, Special Education Cooperative. The district maintains its own programs for mild to moderate disabilities and utilizes Region III programs for children with moderate to severe disabilities. The district also supports children with severe disabilities in day school programs and residential placements.

Resources include barrier free environments;

speech, hearing, physical and occupational therapists; social workers and psychologists; access to state and federally funded facilities and placement in day or residential programs.

Child find activities are conducted to identify children with special needs. Parents of children aged three to five may have their children assessed to see if the child is developing as expected. School aged children may be referred for individual evaluation. Hearing and visual screenings are provided yearly for students receiving special education services and at routine intervals for all other students.

 Please break boxes down and tie with twine (no larger than 2'X3').
- Mixed Office Paper (no metal clips, spirals, or binders)
- Junk Mail
- Newspaper & Gift Wrap (remove plastic sleeves from newspaper)
- Chipboard(cereal boxes, Soda cases, etc.)
- Magazines, Catalogs, Telephone & Paperback Books

ACCEPTABLE CONTAINERS:

- Aluminum and Tin Cans
- Glass Bottles (Green, Amber, Clear)
- Plastic Bottles (with #1,2,3,4,5 & 7 in the recycle symbol)
 Colored HDPE (Detergent bottles, Bleach bottles, etc.)

Please remove the caps from the milk, detergent, and soda bottles Please rinse all bottles and cans. Place them, loose, in the recycling bin
