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
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

THE 2008 SEASON AHEAD

The Charlotte 49ers Athletic Media Relations Department sat down with Jeremy Gunn to get his thoughts on the 49ers men's soccer program and the 2008 season. Last season, the 49ers reached their first-ever Atlantic 10 Tournament Championship game.

Gunn guided the 49ers to 12 wins, which is ties him for the most wins by a first-year coach at Charlotte. How did your first season at Charlotte go and where does the program go from here?

Year one went very well when you consider where we were in the Spring of 2007. We graduated eight starters; three were keepers off the 2006 team. Therefore, last season could have been a real tough time. We made solid progress in the first half of the season and then had an absolutely tremendous second half of the year. Overall, I was extremely happy with last season. As we look forward to the 2008 season, we can afford to be optimistic.. As a coach, I have learned so much about how to do a preseason here, it's a little different in the heat and humidity that what I was used to coming from Colorado. I'm really excited about the upcoming season. So much happier with where we are as a program, but obviously, the results are what everyone else on the outside judges you by, so its important to get off to a better start than last year.


What are your goals for the season?

We'll always set our goals high. The important thing is that we want our guys to come in fit and hungry. If they do that we can have a great preseason and be much more prepared for the early season than we

were last year. The goal is to compete to get an at-large NCAA bid through our performance throughout the season. We want a good A-10 season and to win the regular season championship. We want to be in position where at the end of the season we are playing good enough soccer to put together three wins and win the A-10 tournament. Once you get into the NCAA Tournament you need to play well and anything can happen. You look at 2008 College Cup participant UMass. We beat them at home last year and we were the better team. They deserved to beat us in the final where we just didn't have the depth to play with them. The run they had was unbelievable. The better you are, the loftier your goals can be, but certainly we are capable of reaching all those goals. It is important to get off to a great start this year.

The 49ers reached their first-ever Atlantic 10 Tournament Championship game. They lost to Massachusetts in the Championship game and UMass went on to play in the College Cup. What does it mean to the returning players to have experienced a conference tournament championship game?

From year to year you always have to hope that you are inspiring your players to want to improve. I just feel as though we have a wonderful air of optimism in the program, the players are very excited. The four seniors that we lost were great guys and were a tremendous help to me as a coach in transition. I couldn't have wished for a better group of leaders to help me out. Graham Tatters was a tremendous leader in the back, he was monumental. He'll be a big loss, not only for his work and his desire, but on all set pieces. In the air he would win everything. It's, tough to replace a guy like that but as long as find someone to fill Graham's shoes, we should be in a position to keep getting better.

The 2008 schedule features three regular-season tournaments including a home tournament with UAB, Davidson and Winthrop. The 49ers also have non-conference home games against Central Florida, Elon and UNC Greensboro. The 49ers conclude the non-conference portion of their schedule at national power Maryland. Charlotte also plays five A-10 home games against Dayton, Duquesne, St. Bonaventure, Saint Louis and Xavier. What do you think about the 2008 schedule?

It's very tough. We've managed to beef up the schedule again. We've added a couple of strong opponents. One of my goals for the program each year is to qualify for the NCAA Tournament with an at-large bid, strengthening our schedule is a big step toward achieving this goal. In order to accomplish that goals, you have to have a really strong schedule. Last year we were in the top 30 or 40 in the country in regards to the number of wins, but our strength of schedule wasn't as high as some of the stronger programs. Our non-conference schedule prepares us for a really tough A-10 season where ultimately we want to be regular season champions and A-10 Tournament Champs. For our home games, we would like to bring the best collegiate teams in the country here and we also want to go play those teams. We are going to College Park to play Maryland, which is one of the most decorated programs in the country over the last ten years. That's really exciting for me as a coach and for the players because we want to compete again the best teams in the country.

THE 2008 SEASON AHEAD

The Atlantic 10 Conference has sent two teams to the NCAA Tournament in each of the last two years including 2007 College Cup participant Massachusetts. What do you think about the Atlantic 10 Conference?

The Atlantic 10 is a tough conference to be in. There are some fantastic soccer playing teams and there are physical teams that are very difficult to play against. We have 14 teams, so the odds are already stacked against you. This coming season I know now what to expect in conference play which will be a major improvement from last year. More importantly our young team will know what to expect. As a coach there is only so much you can do to prepare a team, and there is nothing better than having seasoned warriors who are going into battle. They can respond much better. I truly believe that you have to have experience within an environment before you can be successful.


Despite the graduation of Tom Woollard, who scored seven goals last season, the 49ers return players who accounted for 24 of the team's 37 goals led by first-team All-Atlantic 10 selection, Chris Salvaggione. What do expect from your forwards?,

Chris Salvaggione had a great first year here and was certainly a force to be reckoned with. He is one of those players that catches the eye of the opponent because he is quite sharp and always very lively. We are hoping that he can have another great year. Andres Cuero, who was a freshman last year, is a special soccer player and I'm positive that he'll

score goals for us. Andres looked very sharp in the spring. We really expect him to have a breakout year this season. We have other options, Kevin Fox and Kent Long can go up front, redshirt freshman Aaron Kepler had a good spring and we're hoping he'll compete for time. We are also very excited about addition of Evan James, who proved at the club level that he can score a lot of goals.

The 49ers entire midfield returns, led by juniors Adam Gross and Luke Exley. Those two players combined for six goals and five assists in the midfield. What do you expect from the midfield this season?

Luke and Adam return after having good seasons last year. We are also hopeful that seniors Kent Long and Jeff Favitta go out in style with a strong season. We have recruited some quality midfielders who will give us many more options across the middle than last year. Owen Darby, a local product from Charlotte's South Mecklenburg High School, is a very tenacious central midfielder. Jason Hawes will compete for a spot in the middle of the field. Julien Brown Latham is a very speedy wide midfielder. Justin Tucker and Matt Weston are two guys who will play out wide as well. Isaac Caughran is another central midfielder who will push for playing time. Redshirt freshman Matt Wallace can play anywhere across the midfield. Last year we had a starting

lineup without much competition for playing time. This year, we expect to have many more options at every position.

The 49ers will try to replace All-Atlantic 10 Tournament selection defender Graham Tatters, who was a senior last season. The 49ers return three of their four starting defenders that anchored a 49ers defense which limited 14 foes to a goal or less. What is your thought on your defense?

Graham was a big loss, he was a leader in the back, vocally, but his ability to win the ball in the air was tremendous. Nathan Mathers, Tyler Duncan and Josh Norwood are returning starters. Three of our back four as well as our starting

goalkeeper returned which means that we should have a solid foundation defensively. We have a lot of new players vying for playing time in back. Isaac Cowles had a tremendous academy season and he is already physically mature and may be that enforcer in the back. Charles Rodriguez is another defender and is more of a Rolls Royce. Alexander Deitz can play anywhere along the back and is a great competitor. Ryan Swain gives us another experienced player in back. Kellen Frye gives us another option at left back. Again, we've got lots of options back there and we really should have the players competing for time and competing for places.

Two-year starting goalkeeper David Martin has the program's second lowest career goals against average at 0.96. What do you think about your goalkeeping situation?

When we look at how we prepare as a program, last year I didn't feel that David had done his homework in the summer. He didn't come into preseason sharp and fit like he should have done. The great news is that he played himself into form and had a tremendous second half of the season. David has been in town most of the summer and he is going to be fit and sharp and as a result we are going to be much more

prepared for this year. He has two tremendous seasons and has a lot of experience under his belt. The hope now is that you can hit the ground running and play well from day one so that you can put yourself in a position to get an at large bid to the NCAA Tournament. Hopefully he'll have another great year. He has been a tremendous asset to the team, he has been rock solid, and hopefully we can see that again. Coming in to compete with him are Jonathan Frances, a transfer from Rutgers University-Newark and Robert Propst, a local kid from Concord's J.M. Robinson High School.

The program according to Jeremy Gunn...

What would you tell someone that has never been to a Charlotte 49ers men's soccer game to expect to see when they come?

They will see that we are well organized, we are well disciplined, and we certainly play as a unit. We defend in a way that is very tough to break down. Meanwhile, when we are winning the ball, we try to go for the jugular. We want to go at people, we want to take chances, and we want to look to score goals. We want to play exciting soccer where the ball moves very quickly and the players move off the ball quickly. Teams I've had in the past have been capable of being among the nation's leaders in goals scored as well as goals against. We want to be good at both ends of the field, but definitely, we want to play a high tempo soccer that is exciting to watch and gets people excited in the stands.

After being at Charlotte for a year, what do you like about being a coach here at Charlotte?

The administration here is fantastic. The facilities and the way that the players are treated is absolutely first-class. The players are treated well. The training field is immaculate. The game stadium (Transamerica Field) is beautiful. Charlotte, North Carolina is a wonderful part of the world to live in. Its very simple to say, the goals need to be the same as everything that surrounds us. Two things are quite simple. There will never be any excuses from me. It takes time to create a squad that you want to compete with. The reality is we have every opportunity to have one of the best teams in the country, and that's what we'll be looking to do.

What are some of the things you look for in a prospective Charlotte 49ers men's soccer player?

There is an awful lot of parity and a lot of vanilla soccer players out there that are quite good technically, quite sound, but are fairly average. I like to see players that have a little bit of an edge to them, who are competitors. If people have a little bit of that guile then you can work with them, because you can work on some of the technical aspects through their career, but you can't teach savvy and having something special about you. We definitely want quick, sharp soccer players who can play a fast, attacking brand of soccer. The type that will move and think quicker than their opponents. I also want to work with student-athletes with a personality.

On the field we reached the Atlantic 10 Tournament Championship game for the first time, and narrowly missed out to UMass for our first-ever A-10 crown.





THE COACHING STAFF



Head Coach Jeremy Gunn

Record At Charlotte: 12-7-2 (1 year) Career Record: 135-42-19 (9 years) A new era in Charlotte 49ers men's soccer began, December 26, 2006, when Jeremy Gunn became the sixth coach in the program's history.

In his first season with the 49ers, he guided Charlotte to their first-ever appearance in the Atlantic 10 Tournament Championship game. In 2007, the 49ers won 12 games

which tied Gunn with Frank Kohlenstein (1989) for the best record by a coach in their first season with the 49ers in the program's history.

At Fort Lewis College...

Before taking over the reins of the 49ers men's soccer program, Gunn spent eight years as head coach at Fort Lewis College in Durango, Colorado. He guided the Skyhawks to three NCAA Div. II Championship games in those eight years, including each of the last two years. Fort Lewis won the 2005 NCAA National Championship and finished as the NCAA runner-up in 2006 and 1999. Gunn was named Div. II National Coach of the Year in 2005 by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) after leading the Skyhawks to the National Championship and an unbeaten 22-0-1 season.

"We are thrilled to have someone of Jeremy's caliber leading our program," said Director of Athletics Judy Rose. "We had tremendous interest in this position from all over the country and the quality of applicants was very strong. Jeremy has enjoyed immense success as a head coach and is driven to bring that type of success to Charlotte. He was highly-successful as a player who has a great passion for the game and high expectations for our program."

A 1993 graduate of California State University, Bakersfield, Gunn had been head coach at Fort Lewis for eight years, winning six Rocky Mountain Conference (RMAC) championships, three NCAA Mid-West Regional titles and advancing to the NCAA National Championship game three times. He was named the 2005 NSCAA Div. II National Coach of the Year and the Mid-West Region Coach of the Year in 1999 and 2005. He boasts an eight-year record of 123-35-17 and led the Skyhawks to the RMAC Championship in each of the last three years.

In 2006, the Skyhawks posted a 21-2-1 record, finishing second in the 2006 NCAA Tournament and second in the NSCAA national poll. The Skyhawks were led by Daktronics Div. II National Player of the Year John Cunliffe, who scored a school record 29 goals. The three-time all-America scored 75 goals in his four-year career.

A five-time RMAC Coach of the Year, Gunn began his coaching career at his alma mater as an assistant coach in 1993. He served as an assistant coach with Cal-State Bakersfield's men's and women's soccer programs from 1993-1999. Cal-State Bakersfield won the 1997 NCAA Div. II National Championship and advanced to the 1995 NCAA Final Four. While serving as the men's assistant coach, Gunn also performed duties as the acting Head Women's coach during the women's program's first two seasons. Gunn was named CCAA conference women's coach of the year having led the Roadrunner women to a conference championship and national ranking in only their second season.

Gunn's Mentors...

Gunn attributes much of his success to the great mentors that he has had during his coaching career. At Cal State Bakersfield he spent ten years with a former NSCAA coach of the year, Head Coach Simon Tobin.

"When I arrived as a player at Cal-State the team had struggled to survive — Coach Tobin had inherited a team that had been 1-59 in conference," Gunn said. "Ten years later we had won five conference titles and a National Championship. I had the invaluable experience of being a part of something growing from start to

finish. I learned the value of immense hard work, dedication and a sheer desire and ambition to be the best."

Moving on to Fort Lewis College Gunn found US National Staff Sports Psychologist, Dr. Dan Friegang as a mentor.

"Danno was incredible in helping me to mature as a leader and communicator, as well as teaching our players how to make the most of their abilities," Gunn said. "Coaches often emphasize and understand the physical training of athletes, but I felt our players benefited so much more from becoming mentally strong preparing for and coping with the stress and excitement of high level competition. Our work with Danno not only enhanced our performance on the field, but also translated into our student-athletes being successful, happy, confident people in general."

The biggest coaching influence on Gunn's career came recently working for three years with former Arsenal Football Club of England Youth Coach, Andy McDermid.

"It was quite humbling working with someone who has coached at one of the biggest professional clubs in the world," Gunn said. "Andy's knowledge and experience in the game are second to none in the United States, and so I couldn't have wished for a better education in coaching. Through Andy's guidance I really felt we created a far superior training environment than what most collegiate players experience."

Gunn also draws experience from a highly successful playing career. Growing up in England he was a youth player at Grimsby Town F.C. and Scunthorpe United F.C., while representing the North Region as an English Schoolboy. A first team all-American at Cal-State Bakersfield, Gunn played professionally from 1993-95 with the Chico Rooks Pro Soccer Club in Chico, Calif., the North Bay Breakers in Rohnert Park, Calif.; and in 1998 with the Nashville (Tenn.) Metros and the Charleston (S.C.) Battery of what is now called the United Soccer League (formerly the A-League).

Community Involvement...

Gunn has already shown a geat commitment to developing youth soccer in the Charlotte area. The team are very visible with coaching camps and clinics at the young recreational ages, while Gunn and his staff are all involved in the United States National Academy Program. Our commitment to youth soccer is important for a number of reasons. We want our student-athletes to be quality role models, and hope that in turn we will gain greater community support. At the older ages I feel it is important that we share the "Charlotte Way" so that college prospects can judge the excitement surrounding our program for themselves.

Now, at Charlotte, Gunn is excited to put his wealth of experience into practice in a new environment with new challenges. The opponents and the geography have changed for Gunn, but the philosophies that have taken him to five final fours will stay the same.

"Many players and coaches feel that you have to make the choice between being a hard working winner or just having fun and enjoying yourself," Gunn said. "It is my job as a head coach to allow players to train and play in an environment where they can do both."

The Harrogate, England native graduated from Cal-State Bakersfield with a degree in Business Administration, Management Information Systems. He earned a Master's Degree in Business Administration, Management Information Systems, in 1999 from Cal-State Bakersfield.

Kevin O'Brien has been a member of the 49ers coaching staff since the 2002 season and is in third season as the program's top assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. O'Brien married his wife, Shannon, a former University of Arizona women's soccer player and former Charlotte Lady Eagle, on April 12, 2003. They reside in Charlotte and have a one-year old daughter Keely.

DAVID SCHLEE MEMORIALA WARD

David Schlee was Charlotte's first-ever four-year letter winner, a key figure in Charlotte's rapid soccer development. From the initial year that the 49ers fielded a team (1976), when the program struggled to a 3-10 record, to the year he graduated (1979) and helped the Mean Green post a 16-7-1 record, Schlee was always ready to go, ready to make the extra tackle or extra run. The soccer program is earning national attention and Schlee's a winner who will be remembered as a dedicated individual who helped lay the groundwork for the 49ers' success.

Schlee was tragically killed in a motorcycle accident on the eve of the 1980 Sun Belt Conference Tournament. An annual memorial award in his name has been established, thanks primarily to former Athletic Foundation Board of Directors' member Dick Dunn and his son, David, a three-year letterwinner. An award is presented at the end of each year to the 49er soccer player that best exemplifies David Schlee's desire to succeed.

THE HISTORY

1976 - First season. The team went 3-10 under coach Ike Gardner. The program's first win was over Barber Scotia College 10-0.

1977 - The program doubled their win total from the previous season with six wins. The program competed in the Sun Belt Conference for the first time. Jimmy Koutsokalis became the program's first all-conference performer. Ahmed Fashola became the first 49er to hit double figures with 13 goals.

1978 - The team again doubled their win total by winning 12 games. Fernando Sosa paced the Niners with 19 goals in his freshman season to earn first team All-Sun Belt Conference honors.

1979 - The team won 16 games, a record that would stand for 16 years. Fernando Sosa set the single season goals scored record with 28. Sosa scored a school record six goals against Newberry, Oct. 20. For the second straight season Sosa and Jimmy Koutsokalis each finished with double figure goals. Ike Gardner was named Sun Belt Conference Coach of the Year.

1980 - Ike Gardner's final season as coach. The team won 10 matches. Fernando Sosa earned first team All-Sun Belt Conference honors for the third straight season.

1981 - Steve Parker took over as coach. Four players were honored that season with All-Sun Belt Conference honors. Fernando Sosa ended his career as the school's all-time goal scoring leader with 66.

1982 - Bob Warming took over as coaching. He led the team to 11 wins, which was the fourth time in the last five years the team reached double figure wins. Warming won his first of three Sun Belt Conference Coach of the Year awards.

1983 - The program won their first ever conference championship by winning the Sun Belt Conference Tournament. The Niners beat Western Kentucky in the first round. They tied South Florida (but advanced on a shoot-out) and Old Dominion (won after six overtimes on a shoot-out) to capture the tournament championship. Bob Warming was named Coach of the Year again. Craig Brown was named Sun Belt Tournament MVP.

1984 - Tommy Kay and Marty Apple each collected 10 goals. John Griffith and Ray Leone each collected 10 assists.

1985 - The team won 11 games for third time in Bob Warming's first four seasons. The Niners won six of their first eight games. They lost in the Sun Belt Conference semifinals to South Florida. Goalkeeper Matt Martus registered a 0.83 goals against average. 1986 - David Cooper lead the team with 10 goals including four game winners. The Niners ended the regular season by winning three straight games.

1987 - Finished with an 8-7-2 record.

1988 - Bob Warming won Sun Belt Conference Coach of the Year in his final season at Charlotte. The Niners beat Memphis 3-0 in their first ever meeting, September 3.

1989 - Frank Kohlenstein's first season at the helm of the Niner soccer program. Gabe Garcia scored 13 goals and collected 34 points to lead the Niners.

1990 - Final season in the Sun Belt Conference. They finished with 11 wins which was the third straight season of double figure wins. The Niners defeated Notre Dame, 3-0, and Philadelphia Textile, 1-0, to capture the FIU/Southern Bell Classic title. Gabe Garcia was named Sun Belt Conference MVP.

was named Sun Beit Conference MVP.

1991 - The program reached the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history. They lost to North Carolina, 1-0, in overtime, Nov. 17 in the NCAA Tournament. Gabe Garcia scores 10 goals en route to earning second team All-American honors. He becomes the program's first All-American. Goalkeeper Aidan Heaney set the school record for goals against average in a season at 0.40. Began the season by going 13-0-2. Garcia and Heaney became the first Niners to be named first team All-South region.

1992-Made the NCAA Tournament for the second straight season. Tied Davidson, 2-2 before a crowd of over 4,000 fans, in the first round of the NCAA Tournament but Davidson advanced on penalty kicks, November 15. The Niners did not lose a home match as they finished with a 10-0-1 record at home. The Niners collected their second conference championship by winning the Metro. Frank Kohlenstein won his second straight Metro Conference Coach of the Year award. Mike Rock earned Metro Conference Defensive

1993 - Beat #4 Clemson 3-2, Sept. 8. Won 10 games for the sixth straight season of double figure wins. Doug Pratt was named first team All-Metro as he lead the team with nine goals and eight assists

1994-Tied the school record for wins in a season with 16. Frank Kohlenstein earns his third Metro Conference Coach of the Year award. Mac Cozier becomes the first Niners soccer player to be named first team All-American. He leads the team with 14 goals and 11 assists. Cozier also was named the Metro Conference Offensive Player of the Year. Randy Sheen was named Metro Conference Defensive Player of the Year. The Niners upset #1 South Carolina on the road, 3-1, to win the Metro Conference and finish the regular season ranked first in the South Region. The Niners fell to College of Charleston, 1-0, in overtime in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. 1995 - John Tart takes over the coaching reins of the Charlotte soccer program. The Niners fall 2-0 to Saint Louis in a snowstorm in the inaugural Conference USA Tournament championship game. The team registers double figure wins for the eighth straight season.

1996 - The finest season in Charlotte soccer history as the team becomes the first Conference USA team in any sport to reach the National semifinals. The Niners won a school record 19 games. They went 7-1 in Conference USA to capture the regular season title. The Niners defeated College of Charleston, Notre Dame and Hartford to reach the national semifinals before falling to Florida International before 20,269 fans in Richmond, Va. Goalkeeper Jon Busch becomes the Niners second first team All-American after recording 12 shutouts and a 0.89 goals against average. Busch also earned Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year honors. John Tart was named Conference USA Coach of the Year.

1997 - The Niners reached the NCAA Tournament for the second straight season. The team won 12 games which made it 10 straight seasons of double figure wins. Ben Parry becomes the fourth Niners to earn All-American honors as he was selected the second team. Matthys Barker, David Hughes and Ben Parry all earn first team All-Conference USA honors. Jim Kunevicius, who earned with All Parry is a first the second straight season.

second team All-Conference USA honors, was selected GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-American for the second straight season.

1998 - The Niners win 11 games and reach the semifinals of the Conference USA Tournament. The team posted a win on the road at nationally ranked Wake Forest. For the second straight season three Niners earn first team All-Conference USA honors as Jon Mabee, Christian Lund and C.J. Robinson were selected.

1999 - The Niners captured the Wake Forest Nike Classic. Dusty Reineke, who scored the game winning goal in sudden death overtime to give the Niners the Classic title with a win over Richmond, was named Classic MVP. His efforts in the classic earned him a spot on Soccer America's National team of the Week. Charlotte athletic department hosted the College Cup for the first of two consecutive seasons.

2000 - Charlotte posted road wins over nationally ranked South Carolina, Saint Louis and Marquette. They had six All-Conference USA selections.

2001 - The 49ers advanced to the Conference USA Tournament semifinals. Five Charlotte players earned All-Conference USA honors. Goalkeeper Lucas Mackanos earned Conference USA Defensive Player of the Week honors three times.

2002 - The 49ers won the Big Four Classic for the second straight season with victories over NC State and Duke. Defender Joe Lampert was named to Socccer America's Team of the Week for his efforts in the Big Four Classic.

2003 - Reached the finals of the Conference USA Tournament for the second time in school history. Defeated regular season champ #20 Cincinnati in the C-USA Tourney Semifinals. Tied #6 Saint Louis, 2-2, in the finals but lost the tournament championship on penalty kicks. Four players earned All-Conference USA honors.

2004 - Won 11 games which was the most victories by the 49ers since 1998. Juniors Floyd Franks and Adam Ruud earn first-team All-Conference USA honors. Ruud scored 11 goals which was the most by a 49er since 1996.

2005 - Seniors Floyd Franks and Adam Ruud garnered first-team all-conference honors for the second straight season when they claimed the honor in the 49ers first season in the Atlantic 10 conference.

2006 - Seniors Evan Harding, Michael Rose and Pete Palomino earned All-Atlantic 10 honors. Freshman goalkeeper David Martin finished the season with a 0.81 GAA which is the third lowest in school history. Martin was named to the A-10 All-Rookie team.

2007 - Jeremy Gunn took over the coaching reigns. Won 12 games, which is the most winsby the 49ers since 1997, and reached their first-ever Atlantic 10 Tournament Championship game. Chris Salvaggione earned first-team All-Atlantic 10 honors after leading the league in assists with nine. Will Shull was named to the A-10 All-Rookie team.





THE ATLANTIC 10

On March 2, 1975, the idea of what is now the Atlantic 10 Conference was conceived. What started as an eight-school, men's basketball-only affiliation has grown into a 14-university, 21-sport league that is universally hailed as one of the best conferences in the country.

That growth and prominence is a direct result of the ideals and commitments of the member institutions of the Atlantic 10 - the

University of Dayton, Duquesne University, Fordham University, The George Washington University, La Salle University, University of Massachusetts, University of North Carolina at Charlotte, University of Rhode Island, University of Richmond, St. Bonaventure University, Saint Joseph's University, Saint Louis University, Temple University, and Xavier University.

On June 2, 2008, Bernadette V. McGlade was named the fifth full-time commissioner in Conference history, replacing Linda Bruno, who held the position for 13 years. McGlade's experience in collegiate athletics as a student-athlete, coach and administrator spans more than thirty years.

"Bernadette's deep experience with arguably the class-act athletic conference [Atlantic Coast Conference] in the country makes us incredibly excited to be bringing her on board as commissioner of the Atlantic 10 Conference," said Father Michael Graham, Xavier University president and president of the Atlantic 10 Presidents' Council.

The presidents and chancellors of Atlantic 10 institutions have made a strong commitment to making the academic and athletics equation work. Over the years, the league membership has strived to better recognize the academic accomplishments of its student-athletes. The Commissioner's Honor Roll, which cites every Atlantic 10 student-athlete with a 3.5 grade point average or better, recognized 1,247 student-athletes in the Fall 2007 while 1,106 were named to the Spring 2008 Honor Roll.

The league sponsors Academic All-Conference teams in each of its sports and honors one student-athlete per sport as the A-10 Student-Athlete of the Year. In 2007-08, 192 student-athletes earned Academic All-Conference recognition. Moreover, the Atlantic 10 provides four postgraduate scholarship grants to qualified student-athletes.

The Atlantic 10 Conference had 34 teams among the 712 Division I sports teams honored by the NCAA with public recognition awards for their latest multi-year Academic Progress Rate scores. These teams posted multi-year APR scores in the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sports. Saint Louis and Xavier led the Atlantic 10 in the number of high-performing squads receiving awards with six teams each. In twenty of the twenty-one sports sponsored by the Atlantic 10, the league's Academic Progress Rates (APR) were at or above the conference average nationally according to the most recent data released by the NCAA.

The Atlantic 10 Conference, with a total population of nearly 74 million people within its geographic footprint of eight states and the District of Columbia, will crown champions in 21 sports this season: baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, men's golf, women's lacrosse, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track & field, women's rowing, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming & diving, men's and women's tennis, and women's volleyball.

2007-08 REVIEW

For the 14th time in Conference history and fifth since 2000, the Atlantic 10 Conference earned multiple at-large berths to the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament as league champion Temple was joined by Xavier and Saint Joseph's in the field of 65. Xavier advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament for the second time in program annals and became the 11th team to reach the Elite Eight as a member of the Atlantic 10. XU ended the year ranked eighth by ESPN/USA Today and 12th by the Associated Press. Charlotte, Dayton, Massachusetts and Rhode Island earned NIT bids, with Dayton advancing to the quarterfinals and UMass reaching the finals.

In women's basketball, George Washington reached the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for the second straight year and was joined in the tournament by Temple and A-10 champion Xavier. It marked the third time in four seasons that three teams from the Conference received NCAA berths. Charlotte and Dayton also represented the league in postseason play as they garnered WNIT bids.

In men's soccer, A-10 champion Massachusetts reached the semifinals of the NCAA College Cup and ended the year ranked fourth in the final NSCAA/Adidas top 25, while Saint Louis made its second consecutive NCAA appearance and earned a No. 12 ranking in the NSCAA/Adidas poll at the end of the season. Charlotte seized its first-ever A-10 women's soccer championship and third NCAA Tournament berth.

Charlotte climbed to 18th in the national baseball polls during the regular season and defended its A-10 title, while Temple took home its first league championship in women's lacrosse since 2004. In cross



country, La Salle won its fourth consecutive women's crown while the Explorers' men's team won their sixth title in the past seven years. Massachusetts captured its first A-10 field hockey championship since 2001 and downed Princeton in NCAA play.

Charlotte defended its league title in men's golf and earned the school's first-ever No. 1 ranking in any sport during the regular season. The 49ers finished in a tie for eighth at the NCAA Championship and ended the year ranked in the top 10 in every major poll.

Charlotte defended its women's indoor and outdoor track & field titles, the 49ers' men's team captured the indoor crown while Rhode Island won its third consecutive outdoor track & field championship.

In all, 437 teams have represented the Atlantic 10 Conference in postseason play since the 1976-77 campaign.

Massachusetts' Zack Simmons, a member of the College Cup All-Tournament Team, was named a third-team men's soccer All-America and the Umbro/Soccer News National Player of the Year. Calum Angus of Saint Louis garnered second-team men's soccer All-America acclaim and Charlotte women's soccer standouts Whitney Bryant and Sam Huecker earned fourth-team freshman All-America honors.

Charlotte catcher Chris Taylor, the Atlantic 10 Co-Player of the Year, earned third-team All-America baseball honors, while Billy Barber of Richmond and Charlotte's Corey Shaylor and Joe Yermal garnered freshman All-America accolades.

Teammates Jonas Enander Hedin and Corey Nagy of Charlotte garnered third-team and honorable mention All-America golf honors, respectively, with Enander Hedin being tabbed a finalist for the prestigious Byron Nelson, Ben Hogan and Jack Nicklaus National Player of the Year awards.

Atlantic 10 student-athletes thrived in the classroom as well. In all, 12 Atlantic 10 student-athletes were named to ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America teams. First-team Academic All-America honorees were Lamarra Currie of Charlotte (women's track & field), St. Bonaventure's Randy Moley (baseball), Lindsey Ozimek of Charlotte (women's soccer) and Fordham's Mary Beth Puccio (softball). Second-team Academic All-Americans included Paul Amess (men's golf) of Temple, St. Bonaventure's Brianna Bricker (softball), Jonas Enander Hedin (men's golf) of Charlotte, Dayton's Laura Matthews (softball) and Doug Rappaport (men's soccer) of Massachusetts. Those named third-team Academic All-Americans included Kaelyn Caldwell (women's soccer) of Massachusetts, George Washington's Sarah-Jo Lawrence (women's basketball) and Katelyn Murray (women's basketball) of St. Bonaventure.

Charlotte's Lindsey Ozimek (women's soccer) was named to the Lowe's Senior CLASS All-America first-team. The Lowe's Senior CLASS Award recognizes student-athletes for great achievement during competition and in the classroom while celebrating the loyalty of seniors who honor their four-year commitment to their universities. The acronym "CLASS" stands for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School.



DR. PHILIP L. DUBOIS CHANCELLOR



Dr. Philip L. Dubois is the fourth chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, returning "home" in July, 2005 after serving as president of the University of Wyoming and professor of political science since 1997. Prior to that, Dr. Dubois was provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs and professor of political science at UNC Charlotte from 1991-1997.

Dr. Dubois began his academic teaching career in 1976 when he joined the University of Cali-

fornia, Davis as acting assistant professor of political science. He steadily advanced to assistant professor (1978) and associate professor (1982) before attaining the rank of full professor in 1987. He received the Magnar Ronning Award for Teaching Excellence in 1982.

Dr. Dubois also held several administrative positions throughout his 15 years at the University of California, Davis including Faculty Assistant to the Vice Chancellor of Academic and Student Affairs (1982-1983); Assistant Vice Chancellor – Academic Programs (1983-1988); Associate Vice Chancellor – Academic Programs (1988-1990); and Executive Associate Dean, College of Letters and Science (1990-1991).

Among his many awards and accomplishments, Dr. Dubois was named the 2004 District VI Chief Executive of the Year for higher education by the Council for the Support and Advancement of Education. District VI encompasses colleges and universities in Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, North and South Dakota, and Wyoming.

As the 22nd president of the University of Wyoming, Dr. Dubois led development and implementation of a comprehensive five-year academic plan for the research-extensive University serving more than 13,000 students. He provided the critical and transformational leadership to strengthen state and federal governmental relations; stimulate state economic development; increase private fund-raising; guide capital construction and building renovation; and enhance the institution's intercollegiate athletic programs. Dr. Dubois also served as one of five presidents principally responsible for the formation of the Mountain West Conference and was elected as the first Conference president (1998-1999). During 2004-2005, Dubois served as the Conference representative on the NCAA Board of Directors.

Dr. Dubois earned his A.B. in Political Science from the University of California, Davis, graduating with highest honors as a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He earned both a master's and Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of Wisconsin – Madison.

Among his academic honors, Dr. Dubois served as a Ford Foundation Fellow and also received the Edward S. Corwin Award from the American Political Science Association for best doctoral dissertation in the field of public law 1978. He is a member of the Mortar Board, Phi Beta Delta and Golden Key three national honorary societies. Dr. Dubois is the author of two books, the editor of two others, and the author of numerous academic papers and articles

Dr. Dubois and his wife, Lisa Lewis Dubois, have three children – Logan, 25, Taylor, 22 and Ali, 18. He is the first chancellor to reside in the Bissell House on the UNC Charlotte campus.

Charlotte 49ers Director of Athletics Judy Rose is one of the most successful and wellrespected Athletics Directors in the nation.

At the time of her appointment in 1990, she was just the third female to be put in charge of a Division I program. In 1999-2000, she became the first female to serve on the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee. She also served as 2003-04 President of the National Association of College Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

With the 49ers, she has overseen the 49ers

moves from the Sun Belt Conference to the Metro Conference to Conference USA and onto the Atlantic 10 in 2005-06. She has helped raise monies for new athletic facilities, including the James H. Barnhardt Student Activity Center (Dale F. Halton Arena), the Miltimore-Wallis Athletics and Academic Training Center, the Irwin Belk Track and Field Center (Transamerica Field), the Wachovia Fieldhouse and Robert and Mariam Hayes Stadium (Baseball).

At the same time, it has been under her leadership that the 49ers athletics program has enjoyed its best success. The men's basketball program has copped nine NCAA bids under her reign and men's soccer has enjoyed five bids, including a trip to the 1996 National Semifinals. Baseball, women's basketball, women's soccer, men's golf and men's tennis have all notched their first-ever NCAA bids during her tenure and the 49ers have landed their first-ever individual NCAA qualifiers in indoor and outdoor track and field. In addition, the 49ers have nabbed first-ever conference championships in men's tennis, men's golf, men's and women's cross-country, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field and softball. The men's golf program has enjoyed back-to-back top ten finishes at the NCAA Championships. Since she became A.D., 14 of the school's athletic programs have either won league titles or been represented in NCAA play, or both. In addition, it is under her watch that the 49ers department has expanded to include opportunities in women's soccer and men's and women's track and field.

Along the way, Rose has reaped her share of awards, most notably the 2001 NACDA Southeast Region Athletic Director of the Year Award. Other awards have included the Pegasus Award in 1999, the 1996 Bob Quincy Award by the Charlotte Sportsman Club, and the 1996 Charlotte Regional Sports Commission "Sixth-Man" Award for city-wide athletic achievement. She was selected the 1996 Woman of the Year in Charlotte and was named the 1997 Citizen of the Year by the University Chamber of Commerce. In 1986, she became the first female inducted into the Blacksburg (S.C.) Hall of Fame and she received her 25-Year Service Award from UNC Charlotte in 2000.

She was inducted into Winthrop's Athletics Hall of Fame, was named one of the city's Top Businesswomen by the *Business Journal* and was recognized with the Judy Wilkins Rose endowment at the University YMCA under Y Pathways program in 2007.

Chancellor J.H. Woodward appointed Judy Rose director of athletics at UNC Charlotte, July 1, 1990. But Rose's commitment to Charlotte's athletic program started well before that. Rose joined the program in 1975 as women's basketball and tennis coach.

She was promoted to assistant athletic director in 1981 and was named associate director of athletics in 1985 as chief administrator to then-athletic director and men's basketball coach Jeff Mullins. In 1990, Mullins was asked by the UNC Board of Governors to relinquish his dual role. Upon that recommendation, Dr. Woodward promoted Mullins to Associate Vice Chancellor/men's basketball coach and Rose was named director of athletics.

Rose graduated with her B.S. degree in physical education in 1974 from Winthrop University, where she lettered in basketball. She received her Master's in physical education from Tennessee in 1975. At UT, Rose was an assistant coach under Pat Summitt.

A native of Blacksburg, S.C., Rose and husband Ken were married July 19, 1986. They live in Denver, N.C.

The Charlotte 49ers Athletic Academic Center (AAC) prides itself on academic excellence. Housed in the Miltimore-Wallis Athletics Training and Academic Center, the center is equipped with Dell computer terminals, study hall facilities and a stock of

The AAC is committed to assisting all student-athletes in achieving academic and personal success at the university. The office provides support services designed to meet student-athletes' unique needs and ensures that they are in compliance with all university, Atlantic 10, and NCAA academic regulations. These services include orientation, study hall, tutoring, grade

monitoring, academic advising and registration assistance.

Lisa Hibbs serves as the Director of the AAC. Mark Verburg serves as an Assistant Director of the AAC and Life Skills Coordinator, Becky Cavaliere also serves as an Assistant Director and Tutor Coordinator, and Donna Bialosky is the Administrative Assistant. The AAC also employs an array of tutors that are available for student-athletes.

Hibbs graduated from Appalachian State in 1986 with a degree in communications/public relations and a minor in marketing. She then received her master's in speech communication from Wake Forest in 1987. After serving as assistant director of admissions at Charlotte for four years, she became the athletic academic director in March, 1993. She is married to Charlotte baseball coach Loren Hibbs; they are the parents of Lanie (8) and reside in Unionville.

Mark Verburg is in his seventh year with the 49ers' Athletic Academic Center after serving as the compliance and marketing intern with the Charlotte 49ers. Verburg earned a master's in sport management from Georgia in 2001. While at Georgia, he assisted student-athletes in the Academic Achievement Center. He earned his undergraduate degree in business administration from Missouri in 1999. Verburg and his wife Mel reside in Concord and are proud parents of Carson born February 2008.

Becky Cavaliere is in her third year with the 49ers after serving as the Tutor Coordinator/Athletic Academic Counselor for Football at Memphis for four years. She was previously at Virginia Tech as the Freshman Football Advisor and Indiana State as the Assistant Coordinator for Academics. Cavaliere earned her master's in social psychology of sport from Southern Illinois in 1998 and her undergraduate degree in psychology from Austin Peay in 1996.

Charlotte student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom during the 2007-2008 year. The Department's cumulative GPA was 3.043 after the spring 2008 semester. This is the 2nd year that the Athletic Department's Cumulative GPA reached the 3.0 mark. It also marks the 24th semester that the Athletic GPA exceeded the university GPA. The fall 2007 semester GPA of 3.059 and the spring 2008 semester GPA of 3.052 mark the 2nd straight year of 3.0 semester GPA's recorded by the Athletic Department. Fifty-one student-athletes have graduated since August 2007. Overall 89% of the student-athletes that have exhausted their eligibility at UNC Charlotte since spring of 1993 have graduated. 168 student-athletes received academic honors in the fall and 160 received academic honors in the spring. Forty student-athletes were named to the Chancellor's List by earning GPA's of 3.8 or higher for the fall semester and 33 student-athletes were named to the Chancellor's List for the spring semester. Twenty-three student-athletes had perfect 4.0's in the fall and 24 student-athletes had 4.0's in the spring. Seventy-nine student-athletes were named to the fall 2007 Atlantic 10 Honor Roll (3.5 GPA for the semester) and 80 student-athletes were named to the spring 2008 Atlantic 10 Honor Roll.

The AAC also administers the NCAA's Life Skills program at Charlotte. Since 1999, the Life Skills program has helped student-athletes become more well rounded individuals. Student-athletes are required to attend several events per year from a wide variety of areas such as study skills, career development, personal development, health and wellness, drug and alcohol education and community service. Through nationally acclaimed speakers, seminars specifically tailored for student-athletes and campus workshops Charlotte student-athletes gain knowledge and experiences that will aide them during their college years and prepare them for life after athletics.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

College athletics has evolved to the point where total physical preparation is necessary to be successful at the Division I level. Under the guidance of strength and conditioning coach Preston Greene with the assistance of assistant strength and conditioning coach Stacy Hummer and graduate assistant Darin Tyson, they oversee the strength and conditioning training for the 49ers 16 sports.

Greene is in his sixth season as head strength and conditioning coach. He is a 1999 graduate of Clemson University, where he earned a degree in Health Science/Pre-Professional Studies with a minor in Sports Management. He received his Master's of Education in Applied Kinesiology/Sports Management from the University of Minnesota in 2000. He has served as Assistant Strength, Speed and Conditioning Coach at the University of Arizona for two years before coming to Charlotte. Prior to that, he was a Graduate Assistant Strength, Speed and Conditioning Coach at Minnesota as well as a Student/Graduate Assistant Strength Coach at Clemson.

He has trained numerous professional athletes in football, basketball, baseball, hockey, and several other sports. Greene holds numerous certifications, including NSCA, USWF, Level 5 Poliquin Strength Theory, C.H.E.K. Program Design, Certified Flexibility Specialist Level 1 and Beyond, and numerous others.

Hummer returned to the 49ers in the spring of 2008, after a previous six-year stint with Charlotte 49ers Athletics. She was a four-year letterwinner for the Charlotte 49ers women's soccer program (95-98). She was a two-time team captain and earned All-Conference USA


