## CRIMINAL JUSTICE

## STATE LEGISLATORS SHOULD:

- End the drug war by regulating narcotics in the same way that liquor is controlled;
- Restrict drug sales to minors and arrest only those who pose a danger to others, such as those driving under the influence;
- Abolish plea bargaining, a procedure that prosecutors often use to coerce guilty pleas from the innocent and too often results in unwarranted leniency for violent offenders;
- Reform the indigent criminal defense system by establishing vouchers that would empower poor people to choose their own attorneys;
- Stop the militarization of police tactics by keeping SWAT units away from routine policing;
- Rescind asset forfeiture policies that let police departments keep the assets they seize in raids;
- Justly compensate innocent people who were wrongfully prosecuted and imprisoned.
