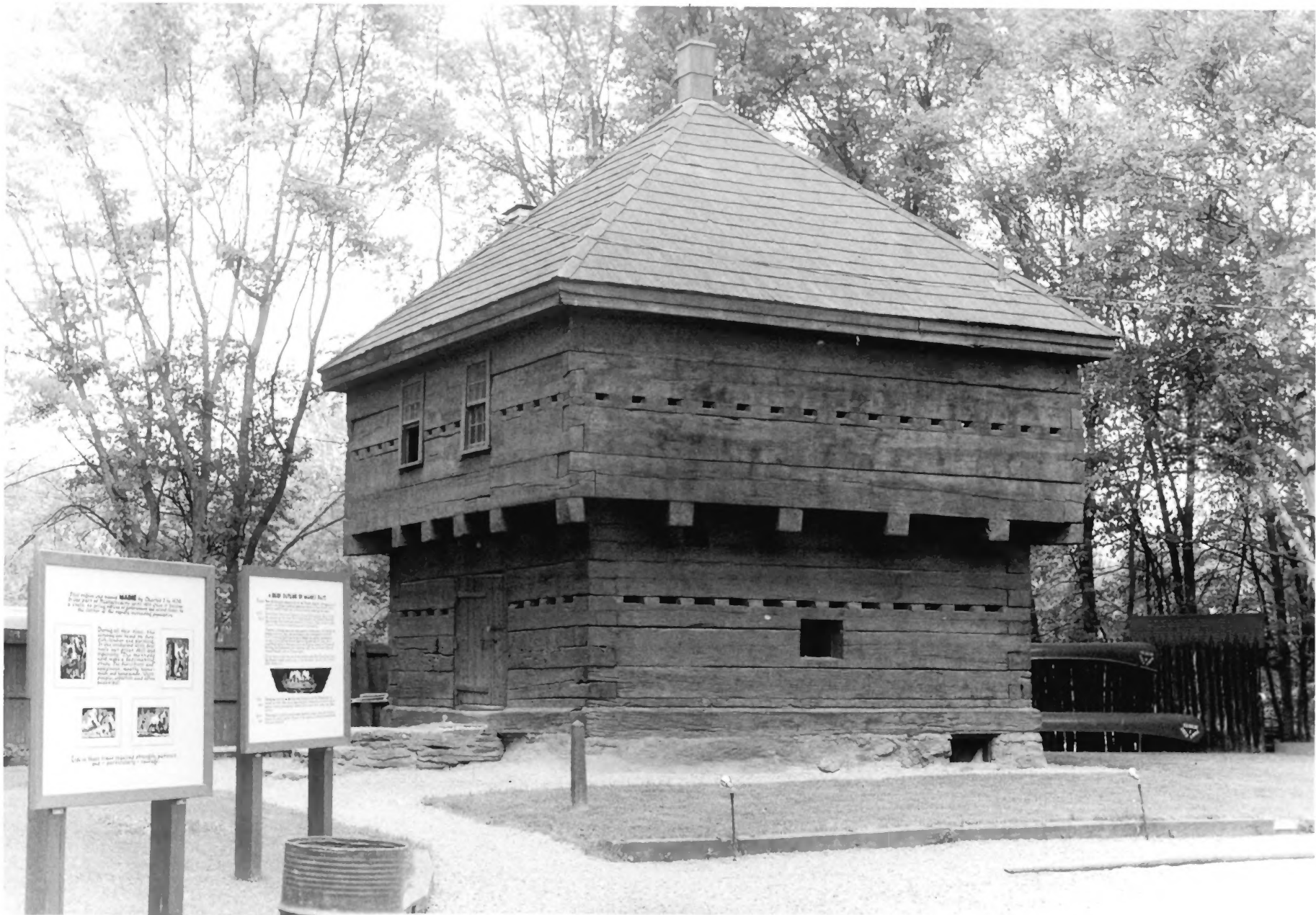

This structure was named **NAAME** by Charles F. Smith in 1878. It was built on the site of a log cabin that was destroyed by fire in 1878. The site is now a National Historic Landmark.

A BIRD HOUSE IN NAAME HUT

The bird house in the Naame Hut is a small, square, wooden structure with a gabled roof. It is built into the side of the log cabin. The bird house is made of wood and has a small entrance hole. It is a good example of the craftsmanship of the log cabin builders.
