Qalay-I-Naw city is the provincial capital of Badghis. The district is renowned for it's pistachio forests. The northern part of the district is hilly and the weather is very hot in the summer and mild in the winter. The southern part of the district is mountainous and the temperatures can drop to -10 degrees in the winter. The majority of the population of the District engage in livestock production and cultivation. The security situation is stable and has been stable since at least early in 2002. No specific security incidents relating to IDPs or returnees were raised at any interviews with the UNHCR Missions while in Qalay-I-Naw.											
Many people continuously identified food scarcity as a major concern. Interviewees near Qalay-i-Naw expressed their concern that continuing IDP returns to village's places an additional burden on the current food resources. Food distribution is organised through WFP.
