Adlington in Context

At the National Census in 2001 Adlington had a population of 5,270 which shows a decline of 383 since the last National Census in 1991. It is likely that the current house building on several estates in Adlington will raise the population significantly in the next eighteen months. Adlington is the fourth largest parish in Chorley, the largest being Clayton le Woods with a population of 14,528 in 2001 followed by Euxton with 8,318 and Coppull with 7,637. Heath Charnock was 10th with 2,065 and Anderton 14th with 1,206 out of a total of 23 parishes. At the other end of the scale the smallest parish is Anglezarke with a total population of 23, exceeded by Cuerden with 77 and Rivington with 144.

The Parish Precept for 2004/05 has remained relatively stable in Adlington which is 18^{th} out of 23 (the same as last year) in the amount raised per household and 9^{th} in the total amount raised overall (again the same position as last year).

Adlington Circular Walk was the subject of discussion at a meeting between Groundwork of Wigan and local interested parties on 29th June last. Groundwork have already secured a grant of £7,000 from Barclavs but more is needed. Lancs County Council are spending £250,000 on upgrading the canal towpath between Chorley and Adlington to cater for walkers and cyclists and will also prioritise some of their work on the walk such as stiles, footbridges and clearing. Groundwork intend to work on footpath surfaces, access, stiles, hedge laying, signage, information and promotion of the walk.

Are you annoyed at receiving unwanted telephone calls/faxes from bogus organisations?

It is now illegal for these calls/faxes to be made to you if you have registered with the Telephone/Fax Preference Service on 0845 0700 70 70. It is a busy line. Be patient and hang on! Most unwanted calls/faxes should cease after 28 days. There is no charge for this service. If you continue to receive calls/faxes after the 28 day period you can report this to the Preference Service and they have the power to prosecute.

Do you pay for parking at Chorley

Hospital? I am reliably informed that if you are visiting a patient on a long-term basis, you can obtain an exemption pass for the car park. Ask the Ward Sister for a letter to give to the General Office. For short term patients, if you are visiting more than once per day you only need to pay once. So if you feel that you may be eligible for free parking, don't get stressed out and annoyed, **ASK!**

The problem of dog waste has been raised recently. Please, if there is not a dog waste bin in the area, carry your plastic bag with you until you reach a suitable bin. Problems have been caused recently by dog owners throwing their dog waste bags under the hedgerows when in the countryside. This is not acceptable. FAIRTRADE

Reverend Downing addressed the July meeting of the Town Council to enlighten the Councillors on the purpose of Fair Trade who's aim is to tackle poverty by enabling disadvantaged producers from poor countries to receive a better deal, through encouraging support for the FAIRTRADE mark.

If you shop in the Co-op in Adlington, you will probably have seen the Fair Trade chocolate, amongst other things. Adlington Town Council wishes to voice its support for the ethos of Fair Trade and encourage residents of the village to use these products where possible. Also, the Council would like to see other outlets giving the choice of fair trade goods to the consumer. If you go into a shop, perhaps you could ask if they stock any Fair Trade produce. If you go for a meal the restaurant may be able to give you the option of Fair Trade coffee or tea after your meal. Fair Trade products could be used in the workplace.

Only by requesting the choice from the shop or restaurant will they be made aware that people want to buy these products. Adlington Town Council will be working with the local Fair Trade steering group to raise awareness of trade issues and would welcome any feedback or offers of help from villagers. A Message from Lancashire County Fire Service

Just a year ago, three young brothers lost their lives in a house fire in Blackpool. The fire was so intense that its exact cause may never be known. The boys had played with fire in the past but it was only one of many possible causes.

What was certain, however, was that no smoke alarm was fitted in the home and that the tragedy would most probably have been averted had one been fitted.

In the three years from 1st April 2000 to March 2003, 49 people in Lancashire could have been saved if simple fire safety measures had been adopted in the home. In over a third of cases fires started when cigarettes or matches were disposed of carelessly, followed closely by chip pan fires, other cooking related fires, clothes or other combustibles left too near to a heat source, fires started by faulty electric blankets and electrical faults as the main causes.

Out of the 43 incidents that led to these deaths, 29 properties were not fitted with a smoke alarm. Of the 14 remaining that were fitted with an alarm, 10 alarms failed to operate, 8 of them because the battery had been removed.

The message is obvious. Fit a smoke alarm and if you already have one, or more, make sure that the device is working. Test it monthly and replace the battery at least once a year.

TOP TIPS

When you're cooking, keep on looking

- Locate candles and oil burners away from curtains and

- furnishings, don't let a candle snuff you out.
- Keep yourself covered, regularly check your electric blanket for faults
- Electrical safety leads to fire safety
- Make sure cigarette stubs and matches are disposed of safely if you must strike a light, do it right
