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The President's Message

I am pleased to table this annual report to Parliament, *Crown Corporations and Other Corporate Interests of Canada 2007*. This report is tabled each year in accordance with the provisions of the *Financial Administration Act*.

This report is a unique source of information for parliamentarians and for Canadians on the Government of Canada's corporate holdings. It provides comprehensive information on the activities of all Crown corporations and their wholly owned subsidiaries, as well as Canada's other corporate interests.

This year, the Treasury Board approved the new *Policy on Reporting of Federal Institutions and Corporate Interests to Treasury Board Secretariat*. The Policy authorizes the gathering of more comprehensive information on the institutions and corporations that comprise the federal government. Further, to better reflect how Crown corporations fit into the larger scheme of government, this year's annual report provides an expanded view of all federal institutions and corporate interests.

The *Federal Accountability Act* passed by Parliament last year also introduced important changes to the management of Crown corporations with:

- increased transparency through application of the *Access to Information Act* to Crown corporations and their wholly owned subsidiaries;
- strengthened Crown corporation governance through requirements such as increasing most board members' maximum terms to four years, splitting the Chairperson and Chief Executive Officer (CEO) positions in three corporations, and requiring the independence of audit committees from management; and
- enhanced public confidence through new requirements for CEOs of Crown corporations to make available information about disclosed wrongdoing in their organizations.

Crown corporations continue to play a vital role in serving Canada and Canadians, in sectors ranging from transportation to agriculture and from culture to communications. These corporations affect the daily lives of many Canadians. I encourage you to review this report to learn more about these important yet very diverse institutions.

Introduction

This annual report to Parliament, Crown Corporations and Other Corporate Interests of *Canada 2007*, is prepared in accordance with sections 151 and 152 of the *Financial Administration Act* (FAA). These sections require that the president of the Treasury Board table annually a consolidated report on the businesses and activities of all parent Crown corporations. The president is also required to indicate when reports and summaries were due to be tabled in each House and when they were actually tabled.

This year's report presents additional information, including a description of the federal institutional forms that make up the Government of Canada as well as an inventory of such institutions, collected pursuant to the new *Policy on Reporting of Federal Institutions and Corporate Interests to Treasury Board Secretariat*. This policy was introduced to assist in the collection of information concerning the current composition of the Government of Canada as well as federal participation in mixed and joint enterprises, international organizations, and shared-governance corporations.

This report comprises the following chapters:

Chapter 1: Overview of Federal Government Institutions, which identifies and briefly describes the different types of federal government institutions and provides a listing of institutional forms by ministerial portfolio.

Chapter 2: Crown Corporations, which highlights policy developments affecting Crown corporations during the 2007 reporting period, outlines the various types of reviews and audits that Crown corporations have been subjected to, lists parent Crown corporations and their subordinate interests by ministerial portfolio (noting changes since last year's report), and provides consolidated financial and employment information. In addition, corporate profiles on each Crown corporation have been included in this chapter as well as the required report on the timely tabling of Crown corporation documentation.

Chapter 3: Other Corporate Interests of Canada, which describes shared-governance, mixed, joint, and international corporations, any corporations or shares held by the government as a result of the provisions of the *Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act*, and compares changes in corporate interests since last year's report. This chapter also includes basic information on the composition of the boards of directors of companies in which the federal government holds an interest.

Chapter 1: Overview of Federal Government Institutions

Crown corporations are but one form of government institution. This chapter provides an overview of the federal government of Canada, which is made up of a number of different institutional forms. These institutions and the portfolio in which they have been placed can periodically change. This chapter includes a listing of these institutions, grouped under their ministerial portfolios, accurate as at July 31, 2007.

1.1 Overview of Institutional Forms³

Federal organizations are grouped into various institutional forms. Under the *Financial Administration Act*, these various institutional forms are grouped into schedules as follows:

- ▶ departments (FAA, Schedule I);
- statutory and other agencies (FAA, Schedule I.1);
- ▶ agents of Parliament (FAA, Schedule I.1);
- departmental corporations and service agencies (FAA, Schedule II); and
- ▶ parent Crown corporations (FAA, Schedule III, although nine⁴ additional parent Crown corporations are not grouped under schedule III, and each has its own constituent legislation).

There are two secondary institutional forms not listed in the FAA:

- special operating agencies, found within a department or agency; and
- wholly owned subsidiaries of Crown corporations.

Other kinds of corporate entities in which the federal government has an interest but that are not part of government are as follows:

- ▶ shared-governance corporations;
- mixed enterprises;
- joint enterprises;
- international organizations; and
- corporations under the terms of the *Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act*.

Departments

Departments are created through legislation, typically with mandates covering a broad area of public policy (e.g. Industry, Justice, Health). Departments are organized in different ways to meet various policy and administrative needs. As entities listed in Schedule I, they are all subject to the FAA and are financed through parliamentary appropriations.

Special operating agencies are units within a department or agency providing a particular operational function or service that have a separate or distinct identity. They are not listed in the FAA as separate legal entities but are considered part of the host department.

Statutory and other agencies

Statutory and other agencies listed in Schedule I.1 of the FAA are similar to departments in that they are usually financed through appropriations but often serve an operational purpose (e.g. an administrative, supervisory, advisory, regulatory, or adjudicative function).

Agents of Parliament

Agents of Parliament are a unique group:⁵ they are independent statutory officers who serve to scrutinize the activity of government and report directly to Parliament rather than to government or an individual minister. As such, they exist to serve Parliament in relation to Parliament's oversight role. Agents normally produce a report to Parliament in order to account for their own activities and, typically, their institutional heads are appointed through special resolutions of the House of Commons and the Senate. The degree of influence by the executive arm of government is minimal, thereby maintaining their independence.

Departmental corporations

Departmental corporations, listed in Schedule II of the FAA, are specialized entities for delivering services or performing research or regulatory functions. Departmental corporations are created through legislation as corporations, are financed largely through appropriations (and some user fees), and typically each have a governing council or other form of management board.

Service agencies are a specialized form of departmental corporation, also created through tailored legislation and with a very operational function or service, usually for which there is no private sector competition. Service agencies are financed through appropriations and user fees.

The governing management boards and individual organizational arrangements and responsibilities are specified in legislation; the degree of autonomy therefore varies with each entity.

Crown corporations

Crown corporations are government organizations that operate following a private sector model but usually have a mixture of commercial and public policy objectives. Parent Crown corporations are those directly owned by the Government of Canada and are created by legislation, by letters patent, or by articles of incorporation under the *Canada Business Corporations Act*.

Subsidiaries are entities owned, in whole or in part, by one or more parent Crown corporations and can be incorporated through provincial, rather than federal, legislation. Except in cases where a wholly owned subsidiary has been directed by the government to report as a parent Crown corporation, ⁶ all subsidiaries are managed by and report to their parent Crown corporations and other shareholders but not to the government.

Chapter 2: Crown Corporations

2.1 Introduction

Current federal Crown corporations operate in many sectors of the Canadian economy. The corporations vary in size and in their reliance upon government appropriations. Each has its unique public policy interest.

Every parent Crown corporation is a legally distinct entity wholly owned by the Crown and managed by a board of directors. Either the constituent legislation for the parent Crown corporation or the articles of incorporation under the *Canada Business Corporations Act* set out the corporation's name, mandate, powers, and objectives.

As at July 31, 2007, there were 44 parent Crown corporations and two¹⁴ wholly owned subsidiaries that have been directed to report as parent Crown corporations for the purposes of the *Financial Administration Act*.

This chapter presents the following sections:

- ▶ Crown Corporations Overview (section 2.2), which highlights relevant policy developments, summarizes the reviews and audits that occurred in Crown corporations, and presents the total costs of audits and examinations during the 2007 reporting period.
- ▶ Overall Crown Corporation Performance (section 2.3), which provides consolidated financial and employment information.
- ▶ Crown Corporations' Corporate Profiles (section 2.4), which provides contact information, the mandate, and major activities of each parent Crown corporation, as well as a description of whether the corporation is an agent of the Crown or a non-agent (and outlines the implications of this status) and when and how the corporation was incorporated.
- ▶ Crown Corporations' Corporate Holdings (section 2.5), which presents an alphabetical listing of parent Crown corporations and their subsidiaries, legal partnerships, and associates, as well as a summary of the changes that occurred to that listing during the 2007 reporting period.
- ▶ Tabling of Crown Corporations' Documents in Parliament (section 2.6), which presents a record of annual reports and summaries of the corporate plans and budgets tabled in Parliament by the responsible ministers. The information reported in this section was audited by the Office of the Auditor General of Canada. For ease of reference, the audit statement has

been included following the introductory text for this section, which precedes the tabling statistics.

2.2 Crown Corporations Overview

2007 year in review

This section highlights new legislation, policies, and structural changes affecting federal parent Crown corporations that came into effect or were under development during the reporting period, from August 1, 2006, to July 31, 2007. The section also summarizes other relevant activities, including audits and special examinations of Crown corporations undertaken (and for the first time includes their total costs) as well as progress toward implementing measures to strengthen Crown corporations' governance regimes.

Structural changes—creation and dissolution of Crown corporations

Crown corporations are created through either an act of Parliament (typically, constituent legislation) or by articles of incorporation under the *Canada Business Corporations Act*. Since last year's report, one new parent Crown corporation, the Corporation for the Mitigation of Mackenzie Gas Project Impacts, was created and one deemed parent Crown corporation, the Cape Breton Growth Fund, reverted to subsidiary status.

The *Mackenzie Gas Project Impacts Act* came into force on November 10, 2006. This Act created the Corporation for the Mitigation of Mackenzie Gas Project Impacts. The Corporation is a non-agent Crown corporation, governed by Part X of the *Financial Administration Act*. Its mandate is to provide contributions to regional organizations with respect to projects that mitigate the existing or anticipated socio-economic impacts on communities in the Northwest Territories arising from the Mackenzie Gas Pipeline Project, consistent with criteria established and made public by the Corporation.

In addition, the Cape Breton Growth Fund Corporation, a wholly owned subsidiary of the Enterprise Cape Breton Corporation, saw its deemed parent Crown corporation status revoked by the Governor in Council on June 7, 2007. The subsidiary is preparing for dissolution because it has carried out its mandate to promote and assist economic development in the area, beyond coal mining.

Legislative changes affecting Crown corporations

A number of legislative provisions affecting Crown corporations came into effect during the year.

Tabled in February 2005, the *Review of the Governance Framework for Canada's Crown Corporations* outlined 31 measures to strengthen the accountability and transparency of Crown corporations. Since that time, action has been taken to implement most of the measures, through a combination of legislative and policy changes, with responsibility shared among the Treasury Board of Canada Secretariat, the Privy Council Office, the Canada School of Public Service, and Crown corporations.

The *Federal Accountability Act*, which received Royal Assent on December 12, 2006, addressed several of these 31 measures. The Act:

- permitted appointment terms for directors to be increased from three to four years;
- ensured that all audit committee members are independent from management;
- ▶ provided for the separation of the positions of chairperson and CEO in three Crown corporations¹⁵ where statutory amendments were necessary to effect the change; and
- extended the *Access to Information Act* and the *Privacy Act* to cover all Crown corporations¹⁶ that were not already subject to these Acts, as well as to all wholly owned subsidiaries.

The passage of the *Federal Accountability Act* also introduced or reinforced a number of other requirements affecting Crown corporations.

- ▶ The *Financial Administration Act* now includes offences for fraud and penalties for the misuse of public money or money of a Crown corporation;
- ▶ Amendments to the *Auditor General Act* permit the Auditor General of Canada to inquire into the use of funding under funding agreements, including those made by Crown corporations;
- ▶ The *Public Servants Disclosure Protection Act* now requires that the CEOs of Crown corporations publicly report on disclosed wrongdoing; and
- ▶ The newly created *Conflict of Interest Act* establishes in statute the existing obligations set out in the *Conflict of Interest and Post-Employment Code for Public Office Holders*.

Reviews

While 2 of the 44 parent Crown corporations (Business Development Bank of Canada and Export Development Canada) are required by their enabling legislation to undergo specific regular reviews, ¹⁷ **mandate** reviews are conducted under the auspices of the responsible minister, subject to the approval of the prime minister, given his prerogative with respect to the machinery of government. These reviews typically assess the current mandate, the continuing need for the corporation, its record of cost-effective performance in meeting its objectives, and the consistency of those objectives with its mandate. One mandate review was completed in 2006–07.

The minister responsible for the National Capital Commission (NCC) announced a mandate review of the Corporation in April 2006. The review covered, among other things, the NCC's functions and purposes, funding and cost of operations, and governance regime. The final report was published in December 2006.

Special examinations

Pursuant to section 138 of the *Financial Administration Act*, every five years¹⁸ each Crown corporation¹⁹ that is subject to Part X of the FAA is required to be the subject of a special examination. This examination is conducted by the external auditor(s) of the corporation (typically the Auditor General of Canada), and its purpose is to determine whether, in the period under examination, the corporation's financial and management practices and controls provide

reasonable assurance that assets of the corporation are safeguarded and controlled, resources are managed economically and efficiently, and operations are carried out effectively.

Since last year's report, the Auditor General of Canada carried out special examinations of the following Crown corporations:

- ▶ the Canada Lands Company Limited;
- ▶ the Canadian Air Transport Security Authority; and
- the Canadian Museum of Nature.

Costs of audits and special examinations

In addition to special examinations, Crown corporations are required to maintain proper financial statements and to undergo annual audits. This year's report includes data on the costs of these activities for the first time. Because cost data are not available for the 2007 reporting period, however, 2006 cost data are used. Total costs of annual audits and special examinations for the 44 reporting parent Crown corporations and two wholly owned subsidiaries—the Jacques Cartier and Champlain Bridges Incorporated and the Seaway International Bridge Corporation Limited—for their fiscal years ending on or before March 31, 2006, amounted to about \$19.44 million. Of this amount, the Auditor General of Canada costs totalled \$16.10 million, and \$3.34 million was paid to private sector auditors.

As at March 31, 2006, the Auditor General of Canada had completed special examinations for 11 Crown corporations at a total cost of \$6.9 million, and the private sector completed one special examination for the Public Sector Pension Investment Board, at a cost of \$348,340.

For this period, private sector firms carried out audits jointly with the Auditor General in the case of six Crown corporations, and were the sole auditor for three Crown corporations, as summarized below.

Achievements and awards

On January 19, 2007, the Treasury Board of Canada Secretariat held an awards and recognition event to celebrate achievements and highlight the dedication of public service employees who worked to achieve the targets set out for the Government On-Line and Service Improvement initiatives. Outstanding teamwork was also recognized in the case of two Crown corporations, Export Development Canada and the Canadian Commercial Corporation, each of which won an award of excellence in electronic client relationship management.

2.3 Overall Crown Corporation Performance

The *Financial Administration Act* requires that employment and financial data, including aggregate borrowings of parent Crown corporations, be included in this report. Accordingly, this section provides a graphic depiction of the overall performance by Crown corporations in each of the following areas:

- employment;
- assets;
- budgetary appropriations; and
- debt obligations.

As well, financial information on individual Crown corporations is presented in a table format, by ministerial portfolio as follows:

- each corporation's employment and financial position; and
- each corporation's operating results and financing.

Information about individual Crown corporations may be found in the Corporate Profiles section of this report as well as in the respective annual reports and corporate plan summaries of the Crown corporations.

Wherever possible, the data presented here cover all Crown corporations. Where data could not be included, an explanation has been provided.

It is also noteworthy that the figures in the accompanying graphs and tables have been rounded for ease of presentation.

When comparing individual Crown corporations' reports with the data presented here, note that the corporation may have restated certain financial data to reflect changes in their accounting policies. Readers should be aware that no attempt has been made to apply such changes to the data in this report beyond correcting any errors that may have occurred in previous annual reports to Parliament on Crown corporations.

The corporate data in this section largely reflect either the 2006 calendar year or the 2006–07 fiscal year. For Crown corporations with fiscal years ending on or after July 31, 2007, however, this report displays the financial data for the previous fiscal year. Accordingly, for the Canadian Dairy Commission and the Blue Water Bridge Authority, this report includes data for the periods ending July 31, 2006, and August 31, 2006, respectively.

A glossary of the financial and employment terms used in this report is provided at the end of this section.


Employment

During the past year, Crown corporation employment increased by 10,530 employees, rising from 79,872 last year to 90,402 this year (a 13% increase). The largest fluctuations can be attributed to:

- ▶ Canada Post Corporation—increase of 9,579 employees (19% increase, mostly resulting from the change in status of contract employees to full-time employees);
- ▶ Atomic Energy of Canada Limited—increase of 531 employees (15% increase); and
- ▶ Business Development Bank of Canada—increase of 133 employees (8% increase).

Exhibit 5 shows the changing trend over the last five years.

Note that employment data for all Crown corporations are included in this analysis.

Assets

Data in this section *exclude* financial data for 17 corporations for the following reasons:

▶ The Bank of Canada, the Canada Pension Plan Investment Board, and the Public Sector Pension Investment Board, both because of the unique nature of their operations and because the total asset holdings of these organizations would not be available to the Government of Canada should it choose to dissolve these Crown corporations.

- ▶ The Corporation for the Mitigation of Mackenzie Gas Project Impacts and the First Nations Statistical Institute are newly established Crown corporation and are not yet fully operational. As such, no financial information is available for inclusion in this year's report.
- ▶ The Canada Council for the Arts, Canadian Commercial Corporation, the Canadian Museum of Civilization, the Canadian Museum of Nature, the Canadian Race Relations Foundation, Defence Construction (1951) Limited, the International Development Research Centre, the National Gallery of Canada, the National Arts Centre Corporation, the National Museum of Science and Technology, the Standards Council of Canada, and Telefilm Canada, because their respective audited financial statements were not available to the Treasury Board Secretariat in time for inclusion in this report.
- ▶ Since the data from the above-named 12 Crown corporations were not available, previous amounts for these corporations have been removed from this report to allow for accurate year-over-year comparisons. Last year, the assets of these 12 Crown corporations totalled \$1.527 billion and accounted for 1 per cent of total assets.

The total assets for the 29 Crown corporations²³ being reported on this year increased by \$28.546 billion, rising from \$156.619 billion last year to \$185.165 billion this year (an 18.2% increase). The largest fluctuations are noted for the following:

- ► Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (including the assets of the Canada Housing Trust²⁴)—increase of \$23.125 billion (22.9% increase);
- ▶ Export Development Canada—increase of \$3.096 billion (15.7% increase);
- ▶ Farm Credit Canada—increase of \$1.258 billion (10.0% increase); and
- ▶ Business Development Bank of Canada—increase of \$0.493 billion (4.8% increase).

Five Crown corporations accounted for 95 per cent of the total assets reported in 2006–07: Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation, Export Development Canada, Farm Credit Canada, Business Development Bank of Canada, and the Canada Post Corporation. The same five corporations also accounted for 95 per cent of the total assets last year.




Exhibit 6: Total Assets of Crown Corporations, 2002-03 to 2006-07

Budgetary appropriations

Total parliamentary funding for Crown corporations increased by \$0.036 billion over the previous year, rising from \$5.026 billion²⁵ in 2005–06 to \$5.062 billion in 2006–07 (a 0.7% increase). The largest fluctuations in funding were noted for:

- ▶ Ridley Terminals Inc.—decrease of \$0.005 billion (74.7% decrease);
- ▶ Atomic Energy of Canada Limited—decrease of \$0.055 billion (34.2% decrease); and
- ▶ Canadian Museum of Nature—increase of \$0.009 billion (34.2% increase).

Total budgetary appropriations for the five-year period from 2002–03 to 2006–07 are shown in Exhibit 7. The reported figures include data from *all* Crown corporations because this information is disclosed in the Main and Supplementary Estimates of the Government of Canada. Of the total 46 parent and deemed parent Crown corporations, 24 received appropriations during 2006–07.





Exhibit 7: Total Budgetary Appropriations, 2002-03 to 2006-07

Six Crown corporations accounted for 81 per cent of the total appropriations received by Crown corporations. These were the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC), the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, the Canadian Air Transport Security Authority, VIA Rail Canada Inc., the Canada Council for the Arts, and the Canada Post Corporation. The largest recipient (CMHC) had an increase of 0.082 billion to its appropriation. A total of 74 per cent of this additional funding went to a non-profit housing program that provides assistance to public or private non-profit organizations who agree to build or buy housing for low- and moderate-income households.

Exhibit 8 provides a summary view of the 2006–07 recipients of budgetary appropriations. Percentages shown in the following table are based on the total number of corporations receiving appropriations.

Others

Debt obligations

Debt obligations, consisting of debts payable to either Canada or to the private sector, for the 29 Crown corporations being reported on this year, increased by \$24.4 billion over the previous year, rising from \$119.7 billion last year to \$144.1 billion this year (a 20.4% increase). This overall increase consists of the following:

- ▶ a decrease of \$0.2 billion (or 4.0 per cent) of debt to Canada (dropping from \$5.0 billion to \$4.8 billion); and
- ▶ an increase of \$24.6 billion (or 21.5 per cent) of debt to the private sector (rising from \$114.6 billion to \$139.2 billion).

The debt obligations of the Canada Housing Trust, as part of the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation, increased by \$23.0 billion (or 31.5 per cent), as it issued additional Canada Mortgage Bonds in response to demand from investors. While there is notable increase in debt for this corporation, there is also a corresponding increase in assets, as was shown in the Total Assets table previously.

Other significant changes in total debt obligations were noted for the following:

- ▶ Export Development Canada (EDC)—increase of \$1.5 billion (10.3% increase); and
- ▶ Farm Credit Canada (FCC)—increase of \$1.0 billion (9.4% increase).

Exhibit 9 shows the debt payable to Canada, the debt incurred in private markets, as well as the total debt obligations over the last five years. Readers should again note that historical figures do

not include the debt obligations of the 17 Crown corporations whose data were not included in this year's analysis.




Exhibit 9: Total Debt Obligations of Crown Corporations, 2002-03 to 2006-07

The four largest debtors for 2006–07, and their respective proportions of the overall debt obligations of \$144.1 billion were the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation, including the Canada Housing Trust (74.9 per cent), Export Development Canada (10.4 per cent), Farm Credit Canada (8.5 per cent), and the Business Development Bank of Canada (5.7 per cent). The same four Crown corporations were also the largest debtors last year.

Exhibit 10 presents the respective debt loads of the four largest debtors in 2006–07 as compared to those of 2002–03. For the purposes of illustration, the Canada Housing Trust is presented separately.




Exhibit 10: Comparison of Largest Debtors in 2006-07 and in 2002-03

Glossary of financial and employment terms used in this report

All financial data are extracted from the Crown corporations' audited financial statements for the most recently completed fiscal year. Because the financial statements do not always consistently display the same information, certain values are adjusted as required to provide a meaningful basis for comparison. Items are listed in the order in which they appear in the summary exhibits.

Exhibit 11 terminology

Total assets represents all assets reported by the corporation in its audited financial statements.

Current liabilities represents all current year liabilities due within one year, as reported by the corporation in its audited financial statements.

Long-term liabilities represents all long-term (over several years) liabilities reported by the corporation in its audited financial statements, including deferred capital funding.

Equity represents the equity of Canada. For some corporations, the excess of assets over liabilities is not deemed to be equity of Canada because of the nature of their operations (e.g. marketing boards).

Employment represents the number of full-time employees as at July 31 of the reporting year, as submitted by the Crown corporation. The figure includes the full-time staff and others employed outside of Canada by the parent corporation and its wholly owned subsidiaries. The two exceptions are the data for the Canada Development Investment Corporation, which relate to the parent corporation only, and the data for the four pilotage authorities, which include contracted pilots.

Exhibit 12 terminology

Net income represents after-tax income, where applicable, and any extraordinary items. It includes parliamentary appropriations where the corporation has included these in the computation of net income. In some cases, net income is the "excess of parliamentary appropriations over cost of operations" or "excess of proceeds over expenditures." A negative net income (i.e. a net loss) is shown in parentheses.

Borrowings from the private sector include short- and long-term borrowings, capital leases, and any other debt-like instruments. For the Canadian Dairy Commission and Freshwater Fish Marketing Corporation, loans may include payments accruing to dairy producers and fishers.

Borrowings from Canada include short- and long-term borrowings, advances from the Government of Canada for working capital or other purposes, and other debt-like instruments.

Budgetary appropriations refers to parliamentary funding for capital and operating purposes. The amounts exclude grants and contributions paid to Crown corporations where they qualify as members of a general class of recipients. Budgetary appropriations increase the expenditures of Canada and thus have a direct impact on the amount of the government's surplus or deficit.

Dividends represents those declared by the corporation during its fiscal year. This figure includes cash recoveries by Canada (where applicable) and other types of payments or contributions made to Canada (excluding repayments of debt-like instruments). Dividends may be paid by the corporation to the Government of Canada before or after the corporation's year-end.

2.4 Corporate Profiles

Introduction

The corporate profile for each parent Crown corporation identifies the key individuals responsible for the corporation and the corporation's location, mandate, and major activities as at July 31, 2007.

The profile also names the legislative authority under which the corporation was incorporated, notes the corporation's inclusion under the *Financial Administration Act*, and confirms whether or not the corporation is an agent of Her Majesty. Agency status enables the corporation to access the same immunities, privileges, and prerogatives enjoyed by the Crown and results in the corporation's activities being binding on the Crown.

Wherever possible, the corporate profile also briefly describes how the corporation came to be, why the corporation was created, and how the mandate and activities may have evolved over the years as a result of changing public policy objectives.

Readers wishing for additional information on these Crown corporations, including more details on their performance over the past year, are encouraged to refer to the individual corporations' annual reports and summaries of their corporate plans²⁸ tabled in Parliament pursuant to subsection 125(4) of the *Financial Administration Act*. These reports can be accessed from http://www.canada.gc.ca, the individual corporations' websites, or by contacting the corporations directly.

The Bank of Canada also promotes the safe and efficient operation of the country's financial system, helping Canada's payments system function smoothly, and keeping accounts for the country's largest deposit-taking institutions. The Bank of Canada identifies the clearing and settlement systems that could pose systemic risks and oversees the efficient management and control of these risks. The Bank of Canada is the federal government's fiscal agent: it acts as banker and manager for Canada's debt and reserves; it manages the government's exposure to financial risks; and it handles the deposit accounts of the Receiver General for Canada. It also provides operations and systems support for the government's retail debt.

The RCM owns two facilities—one in Ottawa and the other in Winnipeg. The Ottawa facility houses the corporate head offices, the gold and silver refineries, and the production facilities for numismatic and bullion coins, medals, and medallions. The Winnipeg Plant, which includes a plating facility, produces all of Canada's circulation coins (2,237 million coins in 2006), as well as circulation coins for certain foreign countries (727 million coins in 2006) on an export basis.

2.6 Tabling of Crown Corporations' Reports in Parliament

A report on the tabling of Crown corporations' reports is required under subsection 152(1) of the *Financial Administration Act* (FAA). The report must indicate those corporate plan summaries and annual reports that were required to be tabled in Parliament by July 31 and confirm those that were actually tabled.

Crown corporations report to Parliament through three key documents; namely, the corporate plan summary, one or more budget summaries, and the annual report. Unless the corporation is exempted,⁵⁵ the responsible minister must table at least a capital budget summary and possibly an operating budget summary⁵⁶ as well. Thus, the tabling data respecting 37 Crown corporations (out of a total of 46 Crown corporations) has been included in this chapter.

Corporate plan and budget summaries tabled in Parliament are based on the approved corporate plan and budgets and cover the planned or future businesses, activities, and investments of a corporation and, where applicable, of its wholly owned subsidiaries. The Crown corporations' annual report in turn informs Parliament of the corporation's actual performance relative to the objectives, strategies, and activities approved by the government and previously tabled as corporate plan and budget summaries.

Deadlines for tabling in Parliament and results achieved

The deadlines for tabling these documents before each House of Parliament are provided in law as follows:

- ▶ Corporate Plan or Amended Corporate Plan Summary: Thirty sitting days after approval by the Governor in Council of the corporate plan.
- ▶ Capital or Operating Budget Summary: Thirty sitting days after Treasury Board approval of the budget.

Notably, where the operating and/or capital budgets are incorporated into the corporate plan, the deadlines are reported as the same as that for the corporate plan summary.

Annual report: Fifteen sitting days after receipt by the appropriate minister; receipt should occur, at the latest, within three months of the corporation's financial year-end.

Notably, deadlines for annual reports are calculated from the date on which the responsible minister acknowledges having received the report, if known, or three months following the fiscal year-end of the corporation, whichever is earlier.

Also note that all tabling deadlines in this report have been calculated based on actual sitting days occurring up to July 31, 2007.

Overall results

During the one year period ended July 31, 2007, 162 reports were tabled in the House of Commons and 158 in the Senate for a total of 320. Of these, 267 were tabled on time. A total of 91 of the required reports for this period had either not yet been tabled (38) or were tabled late (53). Almost half (42) of the 91 reports were only marginally late in that they were tabled within 15 days of the deadline.

The number of required reports not tabled or tabled late has increased this year (91 in 2007 versus 59 in 2006). Of these, 84 are attributable to two ministerial portfolios. TBS intends to work closely with officials responsible for parliamentary affairs in those two departments in hopes of improving their tabling data next year.

The information reported in section 2.6 was audited by the Auditor General of Canada, and her report is included as an appendix to this section.

Chapter 3: Other Corporate Interests of Canada

3.1 Introduction

Outside of the federal government, there exist a number of institutions in which the federal government has an interest or participates in its oversight. This chapter provides the details of these interests as at July 31, 2007.

Mixed enterprises

Mixed enterprises are corporate entities whose shares are partially owned by the Government of Canada with the balance of shares owned by private-sector parties. A minister represents the government as a shareholder, executing the corresponding rights and responsibilities.

Joint enterprises

Joint enterprises are corporate entities whose shares are partially owned by the Government of Canada with the balance of shares owned by another level of government. A minister represents the federal government as a shareholder, executing the corresponding rights and responsibilities.

International organizations

International organizations are corporate entities created pursuant to international agreements under which Canada either holds shares or has a right to appoint or elect some number of members to a governing body. A minister represents the government in executing the rights and responsibilities accorded to Canada through the agreement.

Shared-governance corporations

Shared-governance corporations are corporate entities without share capital for which Canada, either directly or through a Crown corporation, has a right to appoint or nominate one or more members to a governing body.

Corporations under the terms of the Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act

Corporations that fall under the terms of the *Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act* are partially owned by Canada following receipt by a trustee in bankruptcy.

3.5 Holdings under the Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act

As stipulated under section 147 of the *Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act* (BIA), each time a trustee in bankruptcy makes a payment to a creditor in response to a claim against a bankrupt private-sector corporation, the Superintendent of Bankruptcy is paid a levy.

A trustee in bankruptcy is a person appointed by a bankruptcy court to oversee the distribution of the assets of a bankrupt corporation to its creditors.

Although the levy is typically a dollar percentage of each claim (fixed by the BIA), in rare cases shares are provided in lieu of a cash payment. The Superintendent of Bankruptcy holds these shares on behalf of the Crown until all restrictions on their sale have expired and the shares are either sold for cash, transferred, or deemed worthless.

It is worth noting that most of the shares the Superintendent receives as a levy do not produce revenue for the Crown. Nevertheless, the Office of the Superintendent of Bankruptcy maintains records relating to all shares received as a levy. The current share holdings are listed below in order of the date on which the government took on shares and will remain listed until disposed of.
