Reserve early! Reserve campsites, yurts, picnic shelters and the meeting hall two days to nine months in advance by phone: Reservations Northwest (1-800-452-5687). Campsites and yurts also are reservable online through www.oregonstateparks.org.

Sparkling freshwater lakes and the towering dunes just “next door” enhance the experience of camping in Oregon’s second largest state park campground.

Year-Round Camping

- 47 full hookup sites (sewer, electricity, water)
- 121 electrical sites with water
- 187 tent sites with water nearby
- 10 yurts and 1 yurt meeting hall
- Paved parking, picnic table, fire ring at all sites
- 6 group tent camping areas (Memorial Day–Labor Day) near Woahink Lake, each with fire pits, picnic tables and water
- Hiker/biker camp
- Flush toilets and showers
- Firewood for sale
- RV dump station (please use when dumping a full holding tank instead of a campsite connection)

Universal Access

4 campsites (18, 131, 159, 372) and 2 yurts (28, 404) are accessible to campers with disabilities.

Other Amenities

- Meeting hall (assembly up to 50)
- Nature center (near playground in F loop)
- Reservable picnic shelters
- Playground
- Amphitheater for evening programs
- Camp store at Cleawox (souvenirs, groceries and boat rentals Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day)

Camping Rates

Rates for state park campsites are subject to change. You can find up-to-date information by calling 1-800-551-6949, or visiting www.oregonstateparks.org.

Discovery Season

From October 1–April 30, you can rent a full, electric or tent site for less. At most state parks, including Jessie M. Honeyman, you can save \$4-5 off summer rates. Yurt rates are the same all year.

Yurts!

Enjoy the year-round comforts of a domed tent with structural support, a wood floor, lockable wooden door, lights, heating and beds with mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three, and a fold-out couch sleeps two. A fire ring, picnic table and paved parking are right outside.

Dunes North, Dunes South

The Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area stretches 47 miles from Florence to Coos Bay. Two miles of dunes separate the park from the shoreline. No marked trails lead to the beach. ATV’s enter the dunes off the South Jetty Road north of the park. Bring your own ATV, or take a buggy tour offered by commercial operators near the park. If you’re camping in H Loop during Discovery Season, you can wheel right onto the dunes (see map). Vehicles on the beach are prohibited during certain periods of the year (check the Oregon Highway Map). The Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area visitor center in Reedsport (18 miles south) has more information.

Freshwater Jewels

Both Cleawox Lake, west of U.S. 101, and Woahink Lake, east of the highway, offer boating and swimming. And, both are stocked with rainbow trout for anglers.

Cleawox Lake is a swimmer’s delight. You can also enjoy its dunes-bounded waters in a rented canoe or kayak, or by dangling a line from its fishing pier.

Anglers on Woahink Lake also can hook native cutthroat trout and largemouth bass. The lake is within viewing distance of the park’s meeting hall.

Reminders of the Past

The camp store building* is one of several structures built by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) in the 1930s. Others include three kitchen/picnic shelters,* the park’s administrative building* and stone curbing.

Hiking Through the Park

CCC crews originally developed some of the park’s trails, including the half-mile that connects the Cleawox picnic areas and the campground. This trail follows portions of the Cleawox and Lily Lake shorelines, which are bordered by a

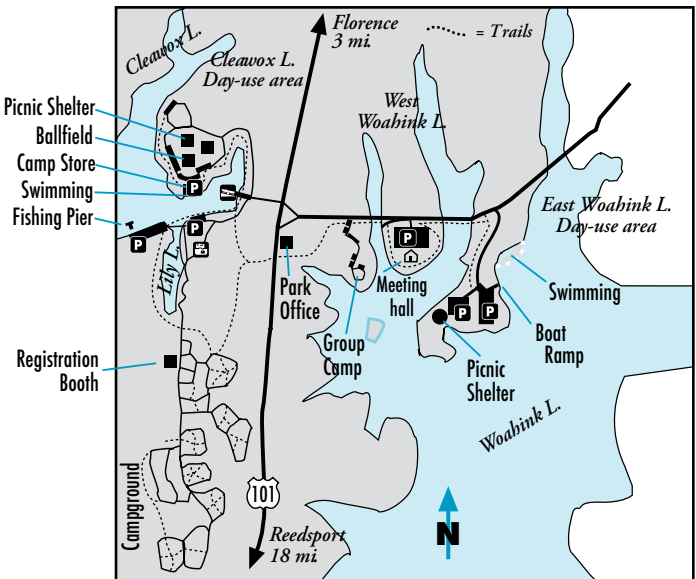
profusion of the park’s ever-present rhododendron bushes. Other trails link the campground and Cleawox Day-use area with the park’s group camp and Woahink Lake. A highway overpass makes the Connector Trail leading from the campground a safe and convenient route for both pedestrians and bicyclists.

Celebrate the Rhododendrons

Visit Florence in mid-May during its annual Rhododendron Festival. It’s a great time to camp at Honeyman with rhododendron bushes blooming almost everywhere.

Day-Use Area Fees

Day-use areas lie along the shores of both Cleawox and Woahink lakes. Their facilities include reservable picnic shelters as well as the park’s boat ramps and swimming areas. A day-use permit is required year-round in the Cleawox day-use areas and all other areas of the park west of Highway 101. You’ll need to display a daily permit, a 12- or 24-month permit, an Oregon Pacific Coast Passport or your camping receipt. Your camping receipt, which is equal to a daily permit for those days registered, should be displayed on the driver side of your dashboard. You may purchase a daily permit at a nearby yellow vending machine. The 12- and 24-month permits are sold at major state park offices.



Play it safe on the beach! Stay off logs, know the tide schedule and don't turn your back on the ocean.

Please help make camping here a safe and enjoyable experience by following these and other park rules:

- Campground quiet hours are between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- Vehicles must be parked on paved areas only.
- Bicycles are permitted on park roads, but ride them with the traffic flow. Riders under age 16 must wear helmets.
- Take all garbage and recyclable materials to our dumpsters and a recycling center near the registration booth. Do not leave garbage in restroom trash cans or in your campsite.
- Pets must be physically restrained at all times when not confined in a vehicle or tent. Leashes must be no longer than six feet. All waste must be properly removed. (See our "Pets in Parks" brochure for details.)

Check-in after 4 p.m., Check-out by 1 p.m.
