On page 10, you can read about how we are performing in your part of the city. Page 11 gives you details of your local councillors who are there to represent you in the Council and make sure concerns are heard by other public sector bodies. Please use them to make sure your voice is heard.

Bridging past and future

PUBLIC art will reinforce the historic surroundings of a new footbridge that will span St Alkmund's Way.

The old footbridge to St Mary's Church has been taken down and the new bridge will be in place in early autumn.

The bridge will be wide enough for both pedestrians and cyclists, and will incorporate public art features to acknowledge the history of the area. It will illustrate the industrial heritage of the nearby Silk Mill with two stainless steel bobbins at either end of the bridge, each with lines of stainless steel 'silk' unravelling from them.

The bridge will also have lighting incorporated in its design, and we're currently exploring the possibilities of using movement-activated sounds on the approach towards the bridge from King Street, to echo the sounds of looms from the Silk Mill and of choirs from the Cathedral and St Mary's.

The scheme – part of a national charity and one of nine in Derby – has more and more people attending its activities, which include a weekly lunch club and coffee morning.

To help entertain the older people it supports, it was awarded over £350 from the Council's Area Panel 5 to buy games and materials, such as large-print bingo cards, sets of dominoes, a gentle exercises tape and a large quiz book.

Since then, the screen's been busy showing a whole range of programming, from sports events to music concerts.



The alien couple introduced themselves to the crowd and spent most of the day hugging, shaking hands and giving high fives to the crowd.


Cycle Derby is delivering Derby's Cycling Demonstration City status. Derby is one of six Cycling Demonstration Cities and Towns sharing £8.4 million of Government funding over the next three years, which councils and partners have to match locally. This investment aims to encourage more people, particularly youngsters, to take up cycling. We would like to quadruple the number of students, pupils and younger workers travelling to school or college by bike.

The Cycle Derby website – *www.cyclederby.co.uk* – went live on launch day. If you register with the site, you can keep up to date with the goings-on of Shift and Sprocket, and take advantage of their online educational downloads.

Cycle training is also booming. In the last few months, we've trained over 400 Year Six pupils, and schools have been keeping the training hotline very warm indeed!

A better **class** of building

DERBY will be joining the national Building Schools for the Future (BSF) programme this September, which aims to bring all secondary schools up to 21st century standards.

Already, two of the city's 13 secondary schools (da Vinci Community College and Merrill College) as well as three primary schools have been rebuilt as part of a £48.3 million Private Finance Initiative. Sinfin Community School is also being rebuilt following a devastating fire.

The Council is currently working on its strategy for BSF and what this will mean for schools in your local area, which include Woodlands and Saint Benedict.

Why our healthy schools are a shining example

WORK with local schools has led to a prestigious award for the city's Healthy Schools team.

The team, a partnership between the Council and Derby Primary Care Trust, has been awarded Beacon status, which means it is one of the top projects in the country, and will now share its good practice with others aiming to get children and young people healthy.

The team works with pupils, staff and local communities to achieve the national Healthy School Standard and already 96% of schools are working towards this demanding award.

The aims of the programme are to:



b-active this summer

b-active is about getting more children and young people involved in and doing more sport and physical activity.

Being active is really important for young people as it helps improve their health, controls their weight, improves social development, helps them do better at school and makes them feel good about themselves.

Some of b-active's achievements so far are:

- five primary schools and two secondary schools have signed up to become b-active schools
- 158 pupils at West Park Community School have been taking part in dance classes and an after-school dance club has been set up

- 163 young people have signed up to the V-Project – a volunteering scheme for 14 to 24 year olds – and 42 are currently working with local sports clubs
- a free b-active family fun day has been organised for Saturday 28 July in the city centre
- the Steve Bloomer Artificial Turf Pitches on the Racecourse site opened for community use.

Barn storming!

DERBY'S first outdoor pursuits centre is on course to open in September.

The Darley Barn Outdoor Centre will offer a range of sports and conservation activities for schools, youth and community groups, local residents and businesses.

The building of the Barn uncovered some surprises along the way when a mystery wall was discovered, believed to be an original wall of the abbey that gave the area its name. Archaeologists and historical experts were quickly on site to check out the find and believe it was the original wall.

Although this caused some delay, building work is now back on track. The Barn cost £777,000 and was funded by a Big Lottery grant and the Council. It will include changing rooms, a kitchen, storage space and a lounge area. Users will be able to take part in canoeing, orienteering, survival training, Duke of Edinburgh Award training and conservation work.






Schools

IN 2006-2007, we spent £131.0 million on the day-to-day running of schools in Derby and £13.3 million on major building projects.

The results...

- We helped more children to achieve good GCSE results and became the most improved authority in the Midlands for Key Stage 3 results.
- Our healthy schools programme has been nationally recognised and awarded Beacon status.
- We are working hard to improve school buildings, with five new Private Finance Initiative schools completed in 2006.



WE spent £37.9 million on services improving the quality of life for children and young people in 2006-2007.

With our partners, we have:

• increased the number of young people aged 16-18 in education, employment and training



- opened seven children's centres to support children and parents/carers
- increased the number of out-ofschool childcare places.

Adult social care

WE spent £50.9 million on social services for adults during the last year to provide support and allow greater independence.

Creating a 'city for all ages'


OUR vision for Derby is to create a 'city for all ages'.

In 2006-2007, we spent £292 million to improve services in support of this vision – 23% of this is from Council Tax.

We regularly check how we are performing and how much services are costing to make sure that you are getting value for money.

These pages give you some examples of how much we have spent during 2006-2007 – and what improvements we have made to the services that you receive...

How spending on revenue services was paid for in 2006-2007



Central services

WE spent £7.3 million on central services, which includes the Register Office, elections, local tax collection and democratic management.

The results...

- On average, we carry out 660 weddings and 70 civil ceremonies.
- We webcast 30 public meetings.



Highways, roads and public transport

DURING 2006-2007, the day-to-day costs of running highways, roads and public transport services was £13.8 million.

The results...

- We have given cycle training to more children than ever before.
- We are also making excellent progress in achieving our Local Transport Plan.

Waste management and environmental services

A REALLY important priority for us is to make Derby cleaner and greener. We spent £16.6 million to help us achieve this.

Γhe results...

- We increased our combined recycling and composting rate to over 30%
- Helped by our new Neighbourhood Environmental Action Teams, we reduced levels of litter, graffiti and fly posting.
- We removed over 89% of abandoned vehicles within 24 hours of investigation.



Parks, sport/leisure, art and entertainment



WE spent £17.1 million on providing parks, sport/leisure, and arts and entertainment facilities.

The results...

- Satisfaction with parks and open spaces has increased by 5% since 2003.
- We improved our museums, and visitor numbers have increased by over a quarter.

Planning, development and regeneration

WE spent £3.4 million on the day-to-day running costs of planning, development and regeneration.

The results...

- Working in partnership, we continue to lead major regeneration projects in the city such as QUAD and Riverlights.
- The number of new homes on previously developed land increased from 58% to 74%.

Major investment in the city


WE are also investing in major developments such as schools, roads and housing which will be a legacy for the future. 2006-2007 spending included:

- Developments in the city centre £0.5 million
- Private sector housing improvements £6.0 million
- Council housing £10.2 million
- Highways, transport and flood defences £16.5 million

ONE of our key priorities is to give you excellent services and value for money. These are some of the ways we are doing this...

- We are improving customer service through our contact centre Derby Direct, which now deals with 2,000 customers every day.



These forums started in the priority areas of Normanton/Pear Tree; Sinfin; Stockbrook; Osmaston/Allenton and Austin neighbourhoods, each one with a local neighbourhood team.

The team is a partnership of local residents, Council, Derby Community Safety Partnership, Police, Fire and Rescue, Derby Homes and Primary Care Trust Staff. It aims to make these neighbourhoods stronger, safer and cleaner.

Because of the success of

these forums and teams, we are proposing to roll out this neighbourhood working across the whole city. This will mean transforming the existing five Area Panels into Neighbourhood Forums.

The forums will be led by local ward councillors while engaging closely with local residents.

The Full Council meeting considered these proposals on 18 July as we went to press so we will update you on the decision in the next issue of Your Derby in October.

Bringing history to life

WE have three great museums right here in Derby, each with its own very special character.

Why not take a step back in time and go and visit Pickford's House, the Silk Mill or Derby Museum and Art Gallery?

Pickford's House Museum of Georgian Life and Costume (pictured) is on Friar Gate, just the other side of the old bridge. The museum is a Georgian house, originally built for famous local architect Joseph Pickford, and is a fine example of a gentleman's home of the period. As well as the various personal and reception rooms to view, there has been a quirky addition to the cellars. It is a room fully equipped as an air-raid shelter of the 1940s.


The Silk Mill, Derby's Museum of Industry and History, marks the gateway to the Derwent Valley Mills World Heritage Site. It is on the site of the world's oldest factories, the Silk Mills, built by George Sorocold in 1702 and 1717. Today's Silk Mill tells the

story of the industrial heritage and achievements of Derby and its people. There are Rolls-Royce aero engines on display, as well as fascinating exhibitions about other local industries.

Derby Museum and Art Gallery, on The Strand in the city centre, is a treasure trove that includes porcelain of international importance, paintings, archaeology, history, geology and wildlife. The museum houses the largest collection of Joseph Wright's work in any public gallery in the world.

All Derby's museums have a changing programme of exhibitions and events for all ages and areas of interest.

Westfield takes centre stage

Westfield Derby is the largest development to open in the UK during 2007 – other Westfield centres opening recently across the rest of the world include San Francisco and Los Angeles in the US, and Brisbane in Australia.

The Derby centre is Westfield's first development to be completed in the UK and it will transform the city into a principal shopping and leisure destination for the East Midlands and beyond.

Westfield and cultural organisations across the city are planning a fantastic programme of launch events.

These will take place across the first few days of the centre's opening. The events will be themed around dance and dancers across the city. Both young and old, amateur and professional are getting involved with a range of events featuring styles of dance from ballroom to Bollywood, designed to showcase the wealth of talent in Derby.

Spaces and pathways across the city centre are being improved thanks to Derby's Public Realm Strategy, which was launched by the Council and Derby Cityscape at the end of last year.

The first improvement project has already begun on **East Street**, **Albion Street** and **Exchange Street**. It's costing £2.1 million and is forecast to be completed in time for the opening of the Westfield extension on 9 October.

We are decluttering the three streets by removing planters, bollards and benches. We are laying new paving and replacing existing trees with smaller ones that are more appropriate for the area. We are also moving the cycle lockers near the Morledge to elsewhere in the city centre and have already moved the parking spaces for disabled people at the Morledge end of East Street to Osnabruck Square, off Tennant Street.

The **Cathedral Green** project is next on the list, and improvements to this important green space in the city centre include new paving, terracing, seating, lighting and planting. We're aiming to create a contemporary, vibrant and safe public space that will provide a setting for people to relax and enjoy the surroundings. It will be a space used for a wide variety of events and

gatherings. As part of the works, which are costing a total of £3.8 million, a new footbridge will span the river, linking the Green to the business and residential developments on Stuart Street.

Another 'work in progress' is the replacement of St Alkmund's Way footbridge as part of the Inner Ring Road Integrated Maintenance Scheme. The new bridge, which will be in place by the start of autumn, will be wide enough for both pedestrians and cyclists, and will improve access to and from the city centre for people travelling from Strutt's Park, Darley Park and the Derwent Valley World Heritage Site. It will incorporate public art features that will reinforce the bridge's historic surroundings and the way it links the Churches of All Saints (The Cathedral) and St Mary's.

The design of the new bridge makes a positive statement about our changing city, acknowledging the city's past while looking towards the future, and incorporating both historic and contemporary features. The bridge is part of the Heritage Walk from The Spot to St Mary's Church – the route follows part of an ancient track, older than the city itself, that ran along the River Derwent and connected the River Trent to the High Peak.

All these improvements reinforce our belief in our city and contribute towards giving people who live or work in Derby the contemporary, safe and vibrant city centre that they deserve.

Time to talk

SUMMER holidays provide the ideal time to talk with young people about relationships and sexual health issues, says the city's Teenage Pregnancy Partnership.

The Partnership, which includes the Council and Connexions, is working to reduce teen pregnancies in Derby. Many parents and carers will be spending a lot of time with their sons and daughters, which gives them the ideal opportunity to discuss what is sometimes a daunting subject.

Sheila McFarlane, Teenage Pregnancy Co-ordinator for the city, said: "Talking to your sons and daughters about relationships and sexual health is something that many parents and carers find difficult and not a subject that they particularly want to approach!

"However, research has shown that the earlier parents and carers talk with their sons and daughters about relationships and sex, the more likely the young people are to delay their first sexual activity.



"Young people are also more likely to protect themselves from unplanned pregnancy and sexually-transmitted infections if and when they do have sex."

Recycling in our schools

WE are set to introduce a pilot recycling scheme for schools in Derby.

Numerous schools want to recycle the waste they produce by providing recycling facilities at their premises rather than sending rubbish such as paper, cans and bottles to landfill sites.



The Council is looking at setting up a pilot of eight to 10 schools to take part and already has some funds from the Derbyshire Constabulary and the Derby and Derbyshire Economic Partnership to set up a recycling scheme for schools.

The money comes from funding for clean-up activity across the county aimed at tackling anti-social behaviour. This project qualifies for support because it will help educate children at the schools about the importance of recycling and not littering.

The funding was agreed during Derby's Big Spring Clean in March in which several schools took part by carrying out litter picks and designing anti dog-fouling posters.

All waste from schools is classed as 'domestic', that is the same as the Council collects from all homes. This means that any recycling done by schools helps the city to meet its tough waste recycling targets.
