











# Canadian Federal Politics

Survey Report Project 12426-017 Date of publication: September 26, 2009

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### Methodology

- > In order to best represent the Canadian electorate, the data presented here are the result of a hybrid study, comprised of both online and telephone research methodologies.
- For the online portion, data was gathered using the LegerWeb access panel, composed of over 300,000 Canadian households. The LegerWeb panel was built and is maintained using sophisticated random selection and it is based on a rigorous double opt-in system. Confidentiality, privacy and security remain the foundation of solid online panel management. In total, 2,593 interviews were conducted online between September 22nd and 25th, 2009, across all regions of Canada, with eligible voters.
- The survey also included a telephone (CATI) component, in order for the results to fully represent both the online and offline populations of Canada. A specific screening question on Internet usage was used to adequately represent all sub-segments of the Canadian electorate. In total, 1,009 interviews were conducted from Leger Marketing's call centre between September 22nd and 25th 2009, across all regions of Canada, with eligible voters.
- ➢ In total, this research was conducted among 3,602 respondents. The maximum margin of error, for a fully probabilistic sample of the same size, would be +/- 1.6%, 19 times out of 20.
- > Final data were weighted according to gender, age, region, education level, and language.


