Principal's Message

Season's Greetings! We're moving into the last few weeks before the semester finishes and we move into the last half of the school year. This is also a time when some families choose to extend vacation trips into school time. While we recognize the opportunity for travel is typically a chance for students to learn about and appreciate other cultures, we also need to remind families that the best learning with regards to school subjects happens in the classroom with the teacher. If you are planning an extended vacation, please provide ample warning for the teacher, ask for an outline of outcomes which will covered during the absence and be prepared to travel with texts if learning outcomes are to be met while on the trip. The November Report Card measuring student success for the first 11 weeks of the semester showed some very satisfying data:

Grade 9 cohort: 49% of students earned Honour Roll status (GPA of 4.01 or greater).

17% of those students earned a perfect 5.0 GPA

Grade 10: 46% on Honour Roll with 9% earning perfect 5.0 Grade 11: 48% on Honour Roll with 15% earning perfect 5.0 Grade 12: 40% on Honour Roll with 10% earning perfect 5.0

Well done to all our students – Good luck on the January exams and Semester 1 final report.

December also brings with it many opportunities for our students to demonstrate their Social Responsibility and Citizenship in the realms of giving and thinking of others. Please check this newsletter for notices regarding December food drives, "sock bombs" and in the New Year students will be organizing a coat and warm clothing drive.

Many elementary, middle and high school students and teachers across the province paused at 11:00 a.m. to read for twenty minutes — ideally an article or book of personal choice.

Many studies have proven the link between daily recreational reading — material of personal choice and improved performance in all subject areas, including Math and Science. Twenty minutes per day is time well spent, not to mention fun as well!

NEW ONLINE RESOURCES

The library recently acquired Canadian Points of View Reference Center — the companion database to Points of View Reference Center.

Like the latter, it is useful for research on controversial issues and help for writing an essay, but it focuses on issues of special interest to Canada and also draws upon more Canadian source material.

The library has also acquired different versions of the World Book Advanced Encyclopedia — a World Book Student and World Book Kids, available in the Encyclopedias link of the Lambrick Park Library web page.

World Book Student will appeal to grades 9 & 10 students while World Book Kids will help students who need extra support in reading.

GRADE 12 NEWS

POST-SECONDARY APPLICATIONS

Christmas Break is an excellent opportunity for students to take some time to investigate post-secondary options, complete their Scholarship Resumes and work on post-secondary applications. Links for post-secondary pursuits including colleges, universities, apprenticeships and other training opportunities are all available online at the Lambrick Park Career Education website. Note: Students can provide their transcript information to a number of post-secondary institutions by filling out a Post-Secondary Institutions Form (PSI) online starting January 2009. It will be available at: http://www.bced.gov.bc.ca/transcript/transcript_psi.htm

LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY INDEX (LPI) 2008-2009

Most universities in BC, including UVic, UBC and SFU, require that prospective students write the LPI. Students applying to university in BC (and possibly elsewhere) <u>must</u> write the LPI exam UNLESS THEY MEET THE CRITERIA FOR EXEMPTION (see Ms. Dietiker for confirmation).

2009 sittings before September are: UVic—Feb. 21, April 25, May 9, June 13, Aug. 15; Camosun—Jan. 10, March 14, July 11. The cost is \$57.00. It is important to register well in advance for your preferred date. See Ms. Dietiker or the website for more information. LPI website: http://www.ares.ubc.ca/LPI/. Workbooks to assist in preparing for the LPI are available for loan in the Career Centre.

GRADE 12 OPTIONAL PROVINCIAL EXAMINATIONS

Grade 12 Provincial Examinations, with the exception of English 12 and Communications 12, are optional. This year, students are being asked to declare their intention to write—or not write—their optional Grade 12 Provincial Exams. Students who do not write an optional exam will receive their school mark as their final mark for the course.

British Columbia public universities and colleges, including the University of Victoria, UBC & Camosun College, encourage students to write provincial exams. For both admission and scholarship selection, these institutions will only use examination results if the result increases the applicant's admission average. However, a significant number of out-of-province Canadian institutions will count the provincial exam mark if the student chooses to write. Students & parents are strongly advised to check with the specific institution.

Students must write optional provincial exams to be eligible for BC Provincial Examinations Scholarships. Students who are Canadian citizens or permanent residents, achieve at least a B in English 12, and attain scores of 86% or better on 3* Provincial Exams will be awarded a \$1000 scholarship. Provincial Exams are not required for Entrance Scholarships for BC public universities & colleges, including UVic, UBC and Camosun College. (*Some exceptions apply.)

Students should be aware that results for optional provincials they write will count for 40% of their final grade for the course and will be included on their Ministry of Education official transcript. If writing an optional provincial exam causes a student's final grade in a course to drop below 50%, the student will not receive credits for the course, and graduation status may be affected.

UNIVERSITY OF VICTORIA

Self-reporting Phase 2 is from January 2 - March 31, 2009. Students are expected to have PREDICTED grades for Semester 2 courses. It is recommended that Lambrick Park students wait until late February or early March to self-report. Students must self-report during Phase 2 to be eligible for Entrance Scholarships based on grades. To be considered for Entrance Scholarships based on marks and other criteria (such as community service), students must complete the online UVic Entrance Scholarship application by March 31, 2009.

CAMOSUN COLLEGE

Starting this academic year, Camosun will be giving conditional seat offers to high school applicants as their applications arrive, without waiting to receive final or interim grades. Grade 12 students are welcome to apply anytime between September 15 and May 15. If they apply before February 28, their Grade 11 an 12 marks (including all final marks plus interim marks from 2nd semester of Grade 12) will be electronically transferred to Camosun. To authorize the electronic transfer, students must include their Personal Educatin Number on the application, and complete the online PSI form required by the Ministry of Education. GRAD TRANSITION



Completion of the Grad Transition Package is mandatory for all graduating students. The Grad Transition package is comprised of three components: Daily Physical Activity - DPA (log 150 minutes of physical activity per week), Employability Skills Log (30 hours of work experience and/or community service) and Grad Transition Plan. Each grade 12 student should check in with their respective Grad Tracker (as noted on your report card) soon and needs to budget their time in order to meet these

requirements in a timely manner. Students who do not know to which Grad Tracker they have been assigned, can see Ms. Burnett in the Career Centre. For more information on the Graduation Program, check the Ministry of Education website at:


