
ATALE OF TWO HOSTS

Continuing to work through the ranks, she was eventually given her shot on TV. Her first appearance was on BCTV. Finally, she moved to Sportsnet, where she eventually became the first female to host a prime time sports program.

First Interview

Her first interview was done for the radio. It was of a young, local hot shot snowboarder named, Ross Rebagliati. It took place early in 1996, before the first ever World Cup event at Whistler. Then of course, only a few short years later, he would go on to win the first ever gold medal in the event.

Best Moments

Among her favorite sports interviews include a funny Carlos Delgado, Wayne Gretzky, and Mike Weir. She spent a whole day with Gretzky in 1999 when he launched his clothing line, and spent the day with Weir after he became the first Canadian to done the green jacket.

Another big moment for her was being home in Vancouver to help announce the winning Olympic 2010 bid.

Women in Sports

Increasing numbers of women are challenging men's leagues, and Vance thinks this is great. Why shouldn't women respond to the highest level of competition and challenge? Especially in sports, like golf, where physical prowess is less effective, women are going to continue to excel.

Women as Sports Broadcasters

Vance has faced some difficulty in her trailblazing role. She understands that viewers are more likely to question a women, she has earned the respect. She is just glad she was able to make her mistakes on local television.

She likes to challenge people to take her job, because she feels by the time they get there, she will have moved on again...



Women in Sports

The standards for women in sports and sports broadcasting are set significantly higher, but Van Horne knows they are up to the challenge, and more will follow in the footsteps of Vance and others.

Amateur Sports

For national broadcasts, there is just too much content to cover, and it is a matter of the bottom line. Sports need to capture the imagination of the viewer, and all local sports have legitimate stories- they just need to be found by a willing local mediawho should be responsible for its coverage.
