Port of Houston Authority (PHA)



Prominent Business Leader Will Serve Fourth Term Jointly Appointed by Harris **County and City of Houston**

By unanimous votes, the Harris County Commissioners Court and the Houston City Council today jointly reappointed Jim Edmonds as Chairman of the Port of Houston Authority Commission. The county commissioners and city council members gathered at Houston City Hall for the reappointment vote.

Initially appointed to the port commission in October 1996, representing Harris County, Edmonds was first appointed chairman in 2000 by the city and the county. He also is a member of the board of commissioners for the Houston Pilots Association. PHA commissioners serve two-year terms without pay. In addition to Edmonds, the other PHA commission members include Commissioner Kase Lawal, Commissioner Steve Phelps, Commissioner Jim Fonteno, Commissioner Jimmy Burke, Commissioner Janiece Longoria and Commissioner Elyse

"Jim Edmonds has demonstrated exceptional leadership in dealing with the numerous aspects of the Port of Houston Authority," stated Harris County Judge Robert Eckels. "From security and small business development, to the Bayport Container and Cruise terminal construction, numerous transportation projects, and revenue and tonnage increases, the port authority has experienced record-setting performances under Edmonds' leadership. I look forward to another two years of achievement with Jim Edmonds at the helm of the Port of Houston

Houston Mayor Bill White stated, "Jim Edmonds has stewarded Houston's port at a time of critical growth and progress. He understands that the port is vital to Houston as a source of jobs and economic strength. And he also understands the importance of the port being a good neighbor in the area."

The Barbours Cut Container Terminal and Central Maintenance Facility are the first of any U.S. port facilities to develop and implement an innovative Environmental Management System that meets the rigorous standards of ISO 14001. Additionally, the port is an approved delivery point for Coffee "C" futures contracts traded on the New York Board of Trade's Coffee, Sugar & Cocoa Exchange. 



Financial Focus: How Will You Pay for Health Care When You Retire?



When you retire, some of your regular expenses are going to go down. But others are going to go up - and topping the going up list is health care. Well before

you retire, make sure you've got the resources necessary to deal with those doctor's visits and prescription drugs.

How expensive will health care be for you during your retirement years? Here's a number to consider: A 65-year-old couple retiring today will need, on average, \$200,000 set aside to pay for medical costs in retirement, according to a recent study by Fidelity Investments. And this number doesn't even include the cost of over-the-counter medicines, most dental procedures and, most importantly, longterm care (such as in-home health care or an extended stay in a nursing home).

Of course, the \$200,000 figure is just an average; your costs may be considerably different. For example, you might have retiree health coverage from your former employer, although this seems to be becoming less likely, given the fact that more and more companies are scaling back on precisely these benefits.

To prepare yourself for the six-figure sums you might need to pay for health care, consider these suggestions:

Stay healthy. Obviously, you can neither prevent all illnesses nor suspend the natural aging process. However, by eating right, exercising regularly and reducing stress, you can improve your health and possibly reduce the odds of incurring high medical costs in retirement.

Contribute to a Health Savings

Account (HSA). If you have access to this type of plan at work, consider using it. Your money has the potential to grow tax deferred, and you can withdraw funds from your account tax free, provided withdrawals are used for qualified medical expenses. Keep in mind, though, that the contribution limits to HSAs are relatively low, so your savings will probably not grow enough to cover all, or even most, of your medical costs. Yet, every dollar can

Plan ahead for long-term care. If you are fortunate, you will never have to enter a nursing home or require the services of a home health care professional. Still, you never know. People who reach age 65 have a 40 percent chance of entering a nursing home, according to a study by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services - and in some areas, just one year's stay in a nursing home can easily cost \$100,000. To avoid incurring these catastrophic expenses, consider putting a long-term care protection plan in

Boost your savings. It's easier said than done, but try to put away as much as you can while you're working. Fully fund your IRA each year, and put as much as you can afford into your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan. If you max out on your IRA and 401(k), you might want to invest in an annuity, which provides the potential for tax-deferred growth of earnings and can be structured to pay an income stream that you can't outlive.

No one can predict the future. But by recognizing the likely costs of health care during your retirement years, and by taking the steps necessary to deal with these expenses, you can hopefully avoid some unhealthy surprises down the road.

Promises, Promises: When Your Pockets Run Deep, Talk Ain't Cheap

We all do it in varying degrees . . . we always have and probably always will; we make promises about any number of things. Of course, some of us are better than others in following through. Depending on the type of promise and the circumstances under which it is made, being a prolific promissor and paltry performer can land you on the wrong side of a lawsuit.

When a person promises to do something and then fails to follow through, the recipient may have legal recourse. To that extent, failed or false promises can give rise to liability for breach of contract or fraud. Specifically, the mere failure to follow through on a promise can give rise to a breach of contract claim whereas a more culpable refusal, without any intent to follow through from the beginning, can subject a promissor to a fraud claim.

In order for the recipient of a prom-

ise to prosecute a breach of contract claim, there must be (1) a meeting of the minds as to what was promised or agreed-to, and (2) consideration. As to (1), the parties must be on the same page and as to (2), there must either be an exchange of promises or the recipient must pay money or give something of value. For example, if your pickup breaks down and one of your buddies promises to come by next week and fix it - and then fails to show-up - you, the recipient, have no legal recourse; there was no exchange of promises or other consideration. Taking that example further, however, if you promised to do your buddy's taxes in exchange for him repairing your truck, and you followed through but your buddy then failed to show-up to repair your truck, you would have a breach of contract action and could compel your buddy to fix your truck. The bottom line: a gratuitous promise - without any reciprocal promise or payment in exchange – is

Another form of regulation on promises is the "Statute of Frauds." This law requires that certain types of promises or agreements be in writing in order to be effective, including: (1) a promise by one person to answer for or pay the debt of another, (2) the promise/agreement of marriage, (3) an agreement for the sale of real estate, (4) an agreement to lease real estate for longer than one year, (5) an agreement which cannot be performed within one year from when the agreement is made, (6) a promise or agreement to pay a commission for the sale or purchase of an oil or gas lease, royalty, or mineral interest, and (7) a promise or agreement to cure someone via medical treatment/services. This list is not exhaustive, so there are many promises or agreements which are enforceable without written confirmation. In fact, the Texaco v. Pennzoil case was essentially based on the breach of an oral agreement.

Beyond a potential contract claim, a promissor who fails to follow through can also be accused of fraud. In civil law, fraud occurs when a person makes a material misrepresentation, which he knew to be false, with the intent to induce the recipient to rely on it, and the recipient relies on it, and suffers harm. Basically, fraud is when a person makes a promise with no intention

of following through, knowing that the recipient is relying on the promise. Obviously, what distinguishes a simple breach of contract from fraud is that the latter involves a promissor who knows from the outset that he/she will not follow through but simply lies and makes the promise anyway. Another difference is the absence of any give and take requirement, i.e., in the context of fraud, it is not necessary for the recipient to make a return promise or pay money. But the recipient must rely on the false promise and suffer harm as a result.

People make promises every day and the law flexibly strives to regulate and provide remedies for a vast array of situations. This article should not dissuade you from making gratuitous promises or following through. In fact, basic decency and being true to your word will go a long way toward avoiding a battle over the legal intricacies of false and failed promises. And you would also be well-served by keeping in mind an apt phrase: "We promise according to our hopes and perform according to our fears."

"Go big or stay home" applies whether you're a skateboarder or talking to Congress on their own turf.

Also, elected officials and representatives from cities and counties join the group to voice the impact NASA has to their communi-

Finally, students and educators attend the trip to discuss the value NASA provides in encouraging youth to continue their education and be involved in science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

The Vision for Space Exploration calls for the return to regular flight of the space shuttle, completion of the International Space Station, development of the next generation spacecraft and returning to the moon, going on to Mars

"This year's trip was the largest and most successful we have ever had. We heard repeatedly from members of the Congress about the importance of being in Washington and supporting the Vision for Space Exploration," said Bay Area Houston President Jim Reinhartsen.

The group's bottom-line message was to educate members of the Congress on the importance of fully funding of NASA's budget request for 2007 and support for the Vision for Space Exploration for a myriad of reasons including benefits to research and development, strong returns on investment from spinoff technologies, continued U.S. leadership in the world, and inspiration to the next generation of engineers and scientists.

The group also expressed concern about "The Gap," the time between the shuttle's retirement and the first launch of the next generation spacecraft. The Crew Exploration Vehicle will carry America back to the moon and on to Mars. Funding NASA's budget at the requested levels will keep "The Gap" to a min-

While in Washington, the travelers attended a breakfast sponsored by the Space Alliance Technology Outreach Program to thank and recognize the efforts of NASA and its contractors in assisting America's small busi-

Through SATOP, professionals in the U.S. space program and their contractors help business owners overcome technical challenges and allow them to become commercially successful.

A local small business, Tyrell, Inc., was assisted by the program in 2005. The company produces an over-the-counter acne treatment device and implemented a highly specialized part recommendation that drastically reduced production costs. The company hit the \$10-million sales mark in May 2006, thanks to the work of SATOP engineers.

The Citizens for Space Exploration also hosted a reception at the Library of Congress. Speakers at the reception included Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison, Senator John Cornyn, Congressmen Tom DeLay, Congressman Ron Paul and Congresswoman Sheila Jackson Lee.

Citizens for Space Exploration presented an official report on the trip to NASA Johnson Space Center Director Michael Coats at Space Center Houston last month.

During that report, Bay Area Houston Economic Partnership Chairman and President of United Space Alliance, Mike McCulley said he learned about the importance of talking to lawmakers as a young enlisted man in the Navy when he was seeking support for service academy appointments.

Inside Out

When I was a little boy, I heard that if you inadvertently put an article of clothing on inside out, it was lucky and you'd be in for a pleasant surprise that day. Sometimes, I thought of deliberately putting an undershirt on inside out in order to ensure that surprise. But a voice inside me said "No. You've got to do it by accident" and I didn't know how to do it that way.

I hadn't thought about that in years, until I saw a movie, "Everything is Illuminated," which refreshed my memory. In one scene of the movie, an American youth tells a young Ukranian man that his shirt is inside out. Because of his limited knowledge of English, the Ukrainian youth couldn't comprehend or translate "inside out." Initially, it seemed an irrelevant event because the movie dealt with a man who, after his grandparents' deaths, went to Poland to discover their roots. In the course of his travels, he not only discovered his own history, he helped those who accompanied him: a translator and a driver, to discover

The message conveyed by the film struck a chord in me. It was that, in order to fully understand where we are, we need to look at where we came from. Not the geographic location, the social class or the conditions in which we lived, although they're all of importance, but, instead, the emotional forces that direct us throughout the course of our lives. It suggested that too often, seemingly insignificant factors that contributed to where we are now are overlooked. We never notice them or fail to hold onto their memory. Instead, we focus on what's on the outside - the houses, people or their possessions. In addition, the world we live in encourages us to pay more attention to what's ahead and to where we want to go, rather than where we came from. Because of these factors, many important insights remain hidden in our past.

The movie, however, strongly suggests that we need to hold onto old memories and to our histories in order to fully understand the emotional dynamics that contributed to who our parents were and what we have

Many of you will ask "Why dwell on the past or dig up old hurts?" The answer is because avoiding the past is a form of denial, a way of running from you. If your past includes sadness, misfortune, mistakes, shortcomings or hurts, so be it. They add to the total picture of who you are. Once they're exposed, the energy and effort you previously expended to build walls and hide from or obscure the real you from you and others are no longer necessary. That energy can now be put to more positive use - constructing a new you on your old foundation. If that foundation is weak or lacking, the knowledge you have gained from the past allows you to install reinforcements that can support you in the future. With your newfound knowledge, you can build more constructively. Without it, your energy is expended uselessly in defending against the insights you need to recognize and incorporate into your being. It's much like therapy; when you're hurting, you open up your emotional wounds. You express your feelings. You give credence to your past and, by doing so, you neutralize its power to frighten or intimidate vou.

Despite these possible rewards, making yourself vulnerable is an abnormal behavior. The normal reaction to pain is flight or fight. It's not to open old wounds or to reexamine past hurts. But if you don't, you never discover the good that may have come from those hurtful experiences. Nor will you rid yourself of the pain. Even more, it is the infusion of your past with the present that can create character and introduces richness to your life. It comes from the understanding and acceptance of what contributed to making you the person you are. Conversely, when you keep your past hidden inside, you lose the essence of what you and generations before you faced that helped to create who you are today.

All of which causes me to think that, possibly, our lack of concern with our history contributes to the chaos, confusion and conflict that often permeates our emotional lives. You see, when you are able to reconcile where you came from, your past becomes far more meaningful. It helps to connect you with your roots and, as a result, you better understand why you are who you are. These insights provide a profound understanding of self that mitigates the anxieties and stress underlying the conflicts, fears and anxieties so many people are plagued with. They can also contribute to a serene peace of mind that most human beings never experience in their lifetime.

Still another way to look at this is that by exposing your past, you bring your inside out. You allow others to genuinely know what you feel and think and, in the process, you let them know you. The benefit you derive is that you no longer have to hide. Thus, you can be sure that when others see you for who you are and still love you, their love is real. In effect, you wear your feelings inside out. They're no longer obscured from the people who are important to you.

Enjoy Life's Transitions

Transition: movement between one state or condition to another. Life is full of these periods of change. They can be wanted and planned or unwanted and dreaded. We can self impose these passages or life can hand them to us when we least expect it. Things such as marriages, deaths, graduations, divorce, child birth, job changes, aging, trauma, grandparenthood, retirement, promotions and success or failure are but a few of the transitions we can expect as we move through our lives.

This time of year many of us are dealing with graduations. Once the privilege of high school or college graduates, we now have multiple celebrations as our children move between various grades. The cutest, of course, is the graduation from kindergarten to first grade. Perhaps it is the juxtaposition of these little ones marching to Pomp and Circumstance, wearing caps and gowns that delights and sometimes saddens us. We become aware that in too few years, our precious babies will be receiving their high school diplomas and heading out into the world. For those of us who have recently graduated a high school student, the frenzy of activity has subsided and many of us are realizing that we will soon walk into that once messy room and find it clean and empty. Will our kids be okay? Will they make it in college or in the work place? All of those hours at Little League, soccer, recitals; the miles on our car transporting and traveling to events; the traffic of kids in and out; the late and broken curfews; the yelling, crying, laughing and daily hugging will soon come to a screeching halt as our young adults find their way in the world. Raising good kids is a full-time job in addition to the one that pays the bills. When our children become people that we like, suddenly they are gone. The hectic, busy rush of parenting abruptly stops and we are left with ourselves.

Part of what makes transitions difficult is that usually there is some sort of role change involved. This means certain behaviors and activities that we have identified with must be modified or discarded. Frequently, there is a void as we let go of these now unnecessary characteristics and say good-bye to our life as it was. For a period of time our lives are in flux and we may feel loss, emptiness, and uncertainty until we identify and move into the next phase of our life. We must recognize and accept that, like it or not, we are in a transition. We have to process the changes that are occurring and the associated feelings. This is how we build a bridge from how things were to new territory. Sometimes, we have to accept that we must change even if we don't want to. If we resist, we can become paralyzed and imprisoned in regret, loss and resistance. It helps to believe and to convince yourself that ultimately things usually work out for the best.

My "on the verge of a teenager" son commented that his barely double digit years on this earth seemed like such a long time. He couldn't imagine what it would be like to be around as long as his parents. Now the funny thing is that while my life has had its share of bumps and lumps, it doesn't really seem all long. While the book might be lengthy, it is broken down in chapters. Certain elements carry over from one chapter to the next, but some things get resolved. While they impact the story's development, they no longer are central to the plot. In the big picture of our life, transitions are like that. The things that are relevant change. Certain elements become incorporated internally as we move into the next phase, stage or chapter.

While our culture recognizes certain rites of passage, generally there is not a lot of validation from others as we go through many of life's transitions. Often these stages are personal and it is up to us to assess, grieve as necessary and build the next phase of our lives. There is no time frame for this process. It can take days, weeks, months or years depending on the issues involved. If we approach this rebuilding and redefinition process with curiosity and creativity then we open ourselves to possibility and are likely to successfully deal with life transitions. We then are receptive to what life offers and to our internal wisdom.

NASA – The Journey Continues

TEAM NASA continues to make a difference on Earth and in space

By the time you read this article, Discovery should have blasted off the launch pad at Cape Canaveral. The latest shuttle mission is scheduled for July 1 at 3.48 p.m. EDT.

This mission has been designated by STS-121 by NASA. Commanding the 12-day mission to the International Space Station (ISS) is Steve Lindsey. STS-121 crew members are pilot Mark Kelly, mission specialists Mike Fossum, Piers Sellers, Lisa Nowak and Stephanie Wilson and European Space Agency astronaut Thomas Reiter.

NASA senior managers cleared Discovery for launch in late June after the traditional Flight Readiness Meeting which included an intensive review of every aspect of the mission both in space and on-the-ground. "We had two full days of an intensive Flight Readiness Review," said Administrator Michael Griffin. "It was spirited and one of the most open, yet non-adversarial meetings I've seen since returning to NASA."

"We were really careful to evaluate everything as thoroughly as we could," said Associate Administrator for Space Operations Bill Gerstenmaier, who chaired the Flight Readiness Review. "But the review of the ice/frost ramp was one of the most vigorously discussed."

The mission of STS-121 includes testing of new hardware and techniques to improve shuttle safety. Supplies will be delivered and repairs made to the ISS and a third crew member, astronaut Thomas

Reiter of the European Space Agency, will arrive and stay on the ISS for several months.

Commander Pavel Vinogradov, a Russian Federal Space Agency cosmonaut, and flight engineer and NASA Station science officer Jeff Williams who began their six-month mission on the ISS on March 31 will welcome the Discovery crew aboard the ISS. The ISS crew has been preparing for the exchange of unpiloted Progress cargo carriers and mission STS-121. They also trained for a photo session planned during Discovery's predocking maneuver - where the orbiter does a back flip close to the ISS so that station crew members can photograph the shuttle belly. The photos will be sent back to Earth for examination for any damage to the thermal protection tiles. They also had the not-so-fun job of packing "the ISS Progress 20 with trash for its June 19 undocking, deorbit and incineration in the Earth's atmosphere." When astronaut Thomas Reiter arrives, the ISS will have a third crew member for the first time since May 2003.

As we've mentioned many times, NASA doesn't just make a difference in space. Team NASA works constantly to make a difference in the quality of life here on Earth as demonstrated recently by a group of NASA engineers from the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Alabama; these engineers volunteered their own time to help install and test a water purification system in the northern village of Kendala, Iraq. Two years ago, the

pump for the village's well failed causing the village population to reduce from nearly 1,000 to only 150 residents because there was no access to clean water. The remaining residents hauled muddy water from nearby creeks and dug shallow wells where the water had to be strained through fabric to remove dirt and debris.

As so often happens, just a few concerned people made a difference in a lot of people's lives. Todd Harrison who is the president of Concern for Kids which is a non-profit organization in Lawrenceville, GA that has provided aide in Iraq since 1992. Todd's sister is Robyn Carrasquillo who just happens to be the engineering manager for Environmental Control and Life Support System, or ECLSS, project at Marshall. The ECLSS system is designed to recycle air and water on the International Space Station. Todd knew that NASA engineers had developed technologies for water purification in the 1970s and 80s so he asked his sister if her team could help, via e-mail, to install and test a new water purification system for this struggling Iraqi village.

Water Security Corporation in Reno, Nevada designed and manufactured the Concern For Kids filtration and purification

system using the same technology NASA developed and used on the space shuttle. Volunteers installed a 2,000-liter water tank in Kendala and began trucking in fresh water with the help of the U.S. Army Civil Affairs personnel. But there were problems. The water needed to be cleaned and a way to maintain healthy iodine levels had to be developed. The new water pump had not been properly configured and the iodine bed had dried out during transport so Carrasquillo's team came to the rescue and e-mailed suggestions and instructions to help fix the pump configuration problem and helped the field team in Iraq figure out how to rehydrate the resin bed. For the first time in two years the residents of Kendala village had safe, clean drinking water and Concern For Kids now plans to provide purification units to other Iraqi villages.

Carrasquillo is happy to have made a difference on Earth. "To see our system solve a down-to-Earth problem, especially in a place where there's such a serious need ... there's no greater reward than that."

If you are looking for the thrill of the pursuit and the act of catching trout, redfish, and flounder in the Galveston Bay Area you must call on Captain Coffee. This all-about-business fishing guide will take you to the most exhilarating and exciting fishing spots in the area such as the Texas City Dyke, Mosquito Island Reef in the upper bay, Hannah's Reef, Deep Reef in East Bay, Décor Island, and Confederate Reef in West Bay. This native born Houstonian has been fishing the waters of Galveston Bay for over 42 years, nine of which were spent as an Official Captain with his U.C.G. Certified license. "My father was a member of a men's fishing organization in Galveston called the Gaf Tops and he gave me my first rod and reel at 8 years old. I became pretty darned good at catching fish at an early age," says Coffee.

Coffee, a Yates High School graduate entered the U.S. Army to serve his country, and then began a career as a truck driver. However, fishing was always a part of his life. He has had to overcome many obstacles to pursue his dream of guiding and

teaching people to fish for Coffee was the first African American fishing guide along the Texas Coast. He does not dwell on the prejudices and the hardships he once encountered as the first black guide, rather he overcomes adversity to follow his dreams. "In the end, it has made me a stronger person and made me even more committed to my craft." Racism is not the only barrier this man has overcome, he also beat colon cancer. "The year I had colon cancer was an emotional rollercoaster and very tough on me, but I am so thankful to the many medical professionals who help me survive so I can still fish today!" says Coffee.

We journeyed to West Bay and found Confederate Reef filled with diving seabirds, and boiling with fish. Within minutes we had our limit. We fished with large live shrimp, and state of the art fishing gear such as Calcutta and Curado reels, the best of American Rodsmiths. "American Rodsmith's has the best blanks in the business," stated Coffee. Our next stop was Deer Island, and again within a few minutes we were into a host of predatory hungry trout. This fishing frenzy lasted under 15 minutes by which time we had once again reached our limit. The most impressive catch was caught by Marshum Sinegal a H.P.P detective who boasted catching a six pound trout. In less than four hours we were finished fishing

and it was back to the Galveston Island dock where Captain Coffee cleaned and bagged our fish. Don Lem, my fishing partner, and I threw back a few cold ones on this spectacular spring day while Coffee taught us a few trick of the trade such as following the birds and mullet, pay attention to bait, and know the weather and wind direction at all times.

According to Coffee the best fishing is in the months of May, June, September, and early October. This trout and live bait specialist can be hired from only \$350 for _ day with 2 people for 5 hours. A full day

consisting of 9 hours is only \$450. You may use his equipment consisting of Berkley Big Game 12lb line and 402 Alameda Rattlin' Corks which are black and orange at no extra charge, or you may bring you own. Your choice of live bait whether fresh large shrimp, croakers is at your expense and should be picked up at least 1/2 hour before fishing. Foreign Language Program Bridges Misunderstandings

As we approach the next academic year at University of Houston-Clear Lake, I would like to take this opportunity to tell you about the Foreign Language Program. You see, the Foreign Language Program is just completing its 20th anniversary of service to the Clear Lake area, and it has been an eventful 20 years.

Back in August 1985, we started a small program with three French classes, offered on a non-credit basis to anyone with a desire to learn. The theory was that adult learners in a small comfortable environment would learn better, and have fun at the same time. Somewhere along the way that first year a new slogan was born: "Learning a Foreign Language at UHCL is Fun!" It was true then, and it is still true now. And why not? Learning should always be fun!

Those three French classes were a great success and word spread to Johnson Space Center about the possibility of doing non-credit language programming. At that time in the late 1980s, some visionary folks at NASA Johnson Space Center realized that they would one day be working closely with Russian colleagues. Speaking to them in their own language would be a tremendous asset in building a productive working relationship. So, our second program in Russian was implemented initially onsite, and for a short time moved to another location to accommodate the community, and by 1989, all Russian classes were held at UHCL.

In the next few years German, Spanish and English Enhancement were added to the already growing list of classes. It may seem unusual that German was offered before Spanish. At that time, numerous people in Clear Lake had been working closely with the rocket scientists in Huntsville, Alabama. I recall enrolling them in our program and learning of their earlier exposure to German. Those were interesting stories!

English Enhancement was originally created to help non-native English speakers

at Johnson Space Center to communicate more effectively in the workplace. Soon after, our program was asked to provide English training to the first Russian cosmonauts who came to Johnson Space Center to prepare for STS 60 and 63. This was a really exciting time for me personally, as I was on the training crew for these two flights, and was able to learn about space flight and Russian culture, while helping the cosmonauts improve their English skills. To say that the Foreign Language Program at UHCL touched history at that time would be an understatement.

Spanish quickly became our most popular language and it comprises at least half of our student body each session. With the demographics changing so rapidly, we are seeing increased interest in learning Spanish everywhere, from Hispanic students who were not encouraged to speak Spanish as kids, to business travelers, as well as those who are avid soccer fans and salsa dancers!

The Oriental languages have been included as well, with both Japanese and Mandarin Chinese offered since 1994. In addition, we have occasionally offered Vietnamese on demand. In recent years, Italian, Brazilian Portuguese and American Sign Language have joined our family of languages, and have drawn more enthusiastic

learners on campus for the first time.

And who are our students, who keep coming back session after session, some for more than ten years? Our students represent all ages and educational backgrounds. What they have in common is a desire to learn to speak another language and to learn about another culture without the pressure of final exams. They achieve their goals at UHCL, while meeting similarly-motivated students.

Some of my fondest memories of our first 20 are those of students who worked together on their homework, and developed lifelong friendships at the same time...about the students who were planning to adopt a Russian or Chinese infant...or the mother who wanted to talk to her new Mexican in-laws...or the girl who was preparing to go into the Peace Corps in Africa...and of course there was the young couple in my class who met, fell in love and eventually married! It does not get any better than this!

Our fall sessions will begin on Aug. 21 and again on Oct. 9. 

Essure Permanent Birth Control procedure now available at UTMB Bay Colony Women's Health Center



The Essure® procedure is designed to provide permanent birth control for women who have completed childbearing and is now being offered at the UTMB Bay Colony Women's Health Center. Essure® is performed in the office with local anesthesia. Micro-inserts are placed in the fallopian tubes using a small endoscope. During the 3 months following the procedure, the micro-inserts cause the body to form a tissue barrier, blocking the tubes. While this process is occurring, another

form of birth control is used to prevent pregnancy. A special X-ray is performed after 3 months to make sure that the tubes are blocked. Once the tubes are blocked, the Essure® micro-inserts can be relied upon for birth control. "Patients like that this procedure can be done in the office and that they don't have to take a lot of time off from their daily activities," says Dr. Daniel Breitkopf of the UTMB Women's Health Center.

No incisions are required, and women are usually able to return to their normal activities within a day after the procedure. 


