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HEALTH & SOCIAL CARE

APPLIED GCE (SINGLE AWARD)

Examining Board: AQA Length of Course: 2 years

No prior study of Health & Social care (or related subjects) is required for this qualification. This single award is studied over a 2 year period.

Course Content Year 1

Unit 1 - Effective Caring (assessed by exam)

This unit introduces you to a selection of services provided for clients in Health and Social Care. It also introduces some of the factors which are required for a good quality of life and some of the skills and techniques carers can use in order to treat people well.

Unit 2 - Effective Communication (assessed by coursework portfolio)

This unit is designed to enable you to learn about basic communication skills used in health and social care settings. It should improve your confidence and competence in written, oral and non-verbal communication skills.

Unit 3 - Health Illness & Disease (assessed by coursework portfolio)

This unit is designed to improve your knowledge of health, illness and disease and to develop understanding of the different factors which affect health and well-being.

Course Content Year 2

Unit 11 - Working in Health and Social Care (assessed by coursework portfolio)

This unit aims to increase your understanding of the world of work in Health and Social Care. It also helps you to reflect on your own suitability for different job roles.

Unit 15 - Clients with Disabilities (assessed by exam)

This unit introduces you to the courses and effects of a range of disabling conditions and to a range of services and provisions including aids and adaptations.

Unit 21—Research Methods and Perspectives (assessed by coursework portfolio)

This unit introduces you to some of the research materials used by researchers in the field of Health and Social Care. This unit enables you to increase your understanding of research methods by choosing, designing and carrying out a simple study in this field.

C.L.C PRACTICAL DETAILS

The schools involved are the four post-16 schools in Carrickfergus ie

Carrickfergus College Downshire School Carrickfergus Grammar School Ulidia Integrated College

The subjects offered in our partner schools will take place either on:

- Wednesday mornings (9.00 11.00),
- Thursday mornings (9.00 11.00) *and*
- Friday mornings (11.30 12.30), *or on*
- Monday mornings (11.30 12.30),
- Tuesday mornings (9.00 11.00) and
- Thursday afternoons (1.30 3.30)

These times have been chosen as a compromise between our various timetables.

Pupils will travel in taxis between schools during the day, with each journey being prearranged with the driver, but make their own travel arrangements for 9.00 am.

All pupils from each school will be in normal uniform and are the responsibility of their own school coordinator, who is the person to contact in case of absence, illness or other problems or queries.

They will be expected to abide by the standards of the school they are visiting (and their own, of course)

Classes will take place in specific areas in all schools, which the pupils will visit during the induction day in early September. (*Date to be confirmed*)

Exams will be taken in the school in which the subjects are being studied.

Parents will be expected to attend an introductory Parents' Evening on Wednesday 3rd September 2008 for those whose children are in the scheme.

BTEC National Award in Sport (Sports Development & Fitness) = 1 A Level

BTEC Nationals are designed to provide specialist work-related qualifications in a range of sectors. The BTEC National Award in Sport has been developed to provide preparation for employment in the world of sport.

- Students are expected to become actively involved in the Ulidia Sports
 Development Unit, assisting with sports activities within the Carrickfergus
 community.
- Students will have the opportunity to work with qualified coaches, working in partnership with the University of Ulster.
- Students will become involved in the preparation of sports teams, understanding the importance of both physical and mental aspects of their performance.
- Students will become actively involved in the design of training programmes and testing the athletes involved.

Course Content:

The BTEC National Award in Sport (Sports Development and Fitness) consists of two core units plus four other specialist units:

- 1. Sport in Society
- 2. Ethics and values in Sport
- 3. Fitness Testing
- 4. Principles of Coaching
- 5. Sports Development
- 6. Practical Sports Study

Entry requirements:

Entry for CLC students is first and foremost, entry to their host school. Sports Studies students should either have a **GCSE grade C or above** in Physical Education and/or be a participating member of a sports club.

APPLIED I.C.T

APPLIED GCE (SINGLE AWARD)

Examining Board: CCEA

Length of Course: 2 years

No prior study of ICT is required for this qualification as all necessary skills will be taught by a team of experienced teachers. As this course is primarily assessed by a portfolio of evidence students with a grade lower than a C in GCSE English may struggle to gain a good grade in the written work and students should consider this fact before choosing this subject.

AS Course Content

- Unit 1 Information and Communication This unit will focus on the nature of information in organisations and how it is used.
- Unit 2 Software Application and Tools This unit will develop skills and understanding of the most commonly used software applications and communication technology.
- Unit 3 Organisations and Information Systems This unit will use a CCEA set case study which will help develop an understanding of organisations and the information systems that are necessary for their support.

A2 Course Content

- Unit 7 Investigating Systems In this unit students will learn why it is important to fully understand the systems development process, the role of Systems Analysis and Design and the importance of the User.
- Unit 8 Database Development This unit will examine database technology and develop database and modelling concepts.
- **Unit 9 Website Design and management** In this unit students will learn how to develop and design websites using appropriate tools.

From September 2008 we plan to introduce **A2 Unit 10 Multimedia Technology** as an alternative to one of the optional A2 Units.

Software used is of Industry Standard e.g. Adobe Dreamweaver CS3 and Adobe Flash CS3

ASSESSMENT

AS Unit 2 is assessed as a 2 1/2 hour externally marked computer based examination A2 Unit 7 is assessed as a 2 hour externally marked written examination

All other units are 'Coursework' based with the student building a 'Portfolio of Evidence' which is internally marked and externally moderated.

PERFORMING ARTS

BTEC NATIONAL

Examining Board: EDEXCEL

Length of Course: 2 years

About the Course:

This course is designed to provide a specialist work related qualification. Students studying Performing Arts will organise projects/events that will provide them with practical understanding of the skills required to develop careers within the performing arts and related industries.

It provides a pathway into Higher Education, principally BTEC Higher Nationals and Degree courses in Performing Arts.

Units studied in Year 1

- Contemporary Theatre
 Performance
- Acting 1
- Devising

Units studied in Year 2

- Theatre in Education
- Rehearsing
- Performing

Entry requirements:

At least **4 GCSEs** Grade C or above. A GCSE qualification in Drama is not essential but a keen interest in performing is.

Students studying Performing Arts are expected to become actively involved in extra-curricular performances and will be required to attend rehearsals out of class time.


AS/A2

FILM STUDIES

Examining Board: EDEXCEL

Length of Course: 1/2 years

This course consists of six modules studied over two years. The three units taken in the first year, leading to a Advanced Subsidiary (AS) qualification. The final three units are studied in the second year to complete the A Level.



Entry Requirements:

Students who have achieved Grade B or above in GCSE Higher Mathematics may apply for a place on this course.

Available to study at Ulidia Integrated College



Examining Board: WJEC

Length of Course: 2 years

This course runs as a Distance Learning (Video Conferencing) course in Carrickfergus College. Tutorials are 1 hour per week with an additional minimum of 4 hours of private study per week. Pupils following this course must have access to e-mail facilities at home and in school and be proficient in using e-mail.

Course Content Year 1

AS Level students will engage with a wide range of films from both British and World Cinema, which will be studied and analysed textually and contextually. It will include the historical study of film and consider various theorists and film critics as appropriate.

Assessment at AS Level

Two written examinations and one coursework module

Course Content Year 2

A2 Level students will consider the world market and the influences of British and American film. This year is designed to deepen the student's understanding and appreciation of the filmmaking process and its role in the world market place.

The analysis of film text will be involved learning of the language and the consideration of the messages and values embodied within the narrative. Students will engage with a wide range of films, from Japan, Spain and Hollywood.

Assessment at A2 Level

Two written examinations and one coursework module

BENEFITS:

- The Film Studies course deepens student understanding and appreciation of the film making process—the significant art form of the 21st Century
- The study of this subject is designed to be culturally and contextually expansive, encompassing film as a social and economic institution. Learning the language of film and communication encourages debates and discussions that will raise awareness and stimulate critical thinking about the world of communication.
- AS and A2 Level Film Studies gives students an advantage and the essential skills necessary when studying this subject or related subjects in higher education, e.g. Drama and Theatre Studies.

Exam Structure

AS1 - Making and Appraising Music (64%)

(AO1) Solo Performance

Pupils must create a balanced performance lasting between 5 and 8 minutes which will be externally assessed.

(AO2) - Composition Task

Students must compose one piece of music lasting between 1½ and 2 minutes, which will be externally marked. They may choose their own brief, compositional style and resources. Their composition must be submitted in the form of a recorded performance.

AS2—Responding to Music 1 (36%)

(AO3) - Test of Aural Perception

Module 1 - Music for Orchestra, 1700 - 1900

Module 2 - The Musical, 1900 - Today

Pupils will be assessed in their listening skills by way of a written examination lasting 75 minutes which will be externally marked. Pupils should develop knowledge and understanding of music for orchestra from 1700 - 1900 through a study of representative works. They should in addition develop a knowledge and understanding of the Musical during the period and be able to comment on a range of appropriate musical examples.

AS1 - Making and Appraising Music (30%)

(AO1) Solo Performance

Pupils must create a balanced performance lasting between 10 and 12 minutes which will be externally marked. They must sing and/or play an instrument of their choice. Their performance should be at a level equivalent to at least Grade 6 of the accredited music examination boards.

(AO2) - Composition Task

Students must compose one piece of music which uses tonal harmony lasting between 2 and 3 minutes, which will be externally marked. They may choose their own brief, compositional style and resources. Their composition must be submitted in the form of a recorded performance.

AS2—Responding to Music 1 (20%)

(AO3) - Test of Aural Perception

Module 1 - Music for Orchestra in the 20th Century Module 2 - English Secular Music from 1580 - 1600

Pupils will be assessed as follows:

- (a) One test of aural perception lasting approximately 1 hour
- (b) One written examination lasting 90 minutes

The examinations will test the students ability to make critical judgements about unfamiliar music: the use of musical elements, structures and resources across a range of styles, genres, periods and traditions

Students should be of GRADE 6 MUSICANSHIP, NOT including the Rock School syllabus, and WILL be expected to become actively involved in extra-curricular residentials and performances requiring attendances at weekly rehearsals outside of allocated class time

Examining Board: CCEA

Length of Course: 1/2 years

About the course:

This course deals with the making and analysis of moving image (that is anything you see on a TV or cinema screen). It encourages first hand experience of production and aims to develop critical and creative skills through experimentation , technical exercises and looking at other film makers' work.

Units studied in Year 1 - AS Level

- Creative Production ~ (Foundation portfolio)
- AS Critical Response ~ (on-line examination)

Units studied in Year 2 - A2 Level

- Creative Production and Research ~ (Advanced portfolio)

Entry requirements:

At least 4 GCSEs Grade C or above. Basic ICT skills are necessary in order to complete this course, and a keen interest in cinema and TV production.

In addition to the entry requirements for the host school a grade C in PE/Sports studies would be expected. Evidence of contribution to Sport in the curriculum or outside school would also be beneficial.

Length of Course: 1/2 Years

Overview

At AS, all candidates will study both Financial and Management Accounting. In each area of study, candidates will develop and apply knowledge and understanding of the purposes of accounting, its concepts, techniques and procedures.

At A2, all candidates will develop further their understanding of financial accounting techniques required for the preparation of final accounts.

Overview

This Biology specification enables pupils to study living organisms, including their structure, functioning, origin, evolution, classification, interrelationships and distribution. Pupils will also address the spiritual, moral, ethical, environmental, social and cultural issues which arise from this study and which are met in certain parts of the specification.

Pupils will develop skills in investigational and practical problem solving, in application of number, in team work, in interpreting data, in using ICT and in communication

This subject allows pupils to obtain a prerequisite qualification to gain entry to Higher Education in the field of Biology, or prepare for direct employment in the fields of science, engineering, medicine, communication, education etc.

TRAVEL AND TOURISM

APPLIED GCE (SINGLE AWARD)

Length of Course: 2 years

Examining Board: AQA

No prior study of Travel and Tourism is required for this qualification. This single award is studied over a 2 year period

Course Content Year 1

Unit 1 - Inside Travel & Tourism (assessed by exam)

This unit allows you to investigate a wide range of areas in order to answer the following questions: -

What is Travel & Tourism? Why do people travel? How/why does the industry change? Future development of the industry. Organisations involved in the industry

Unit 2 - Travel & Tourism ~ A People Industry (assessed by coursework portfolio)

This unit allows you the opportunity to investigate customer service in the industry. You will be able to identify what customer service means to an organisation and why excellent customer service is important. You will also be able to identify the needs of a range of customers and how to provide the services they require.

Unit 3 - Travel Destinations (assessed by coursework portfolio)

You will investigate a range of tourist destinations throughout the world. You will identify and explain the appeal of these destinations to a range of different tourist types. The destinations you investigate will be in Europe, North America and Australasia. The unit will develop your understanding of the tourist trade outside of your own country.

Course Content Year 2

Unit 8 - Travel & Tourism Project (assessed by coursework portfolio)

You will organise an event related to the Travel & Tourism industry. You will formulate a business plan that explains areas such as marketing/promotional techniques, resources required, staffing, legal aspects and time scales. You will work as part of a team therefore improving your communication and team working skills.

Unit 9 - Travel & Tourism ~ People and Quality (externally moderated assignment)

You will learn about the ways in which travel and tourism organisations manage customer service delivery. You will develop an appreciation of health, safety and security procedures and legislation. You will investigate how managers motivate teams in order to deliver high quality service.

Unit 10 - Current issues in Travel & Tourism (assessed by coursework portfolio)

You will carry out an in-depth investigation of one major current issue in travel & tourism, for example, the transmission of disease around the world or the on-going war against terrorism.

Length of Course: 1/2 years

About the course:

This course offers candidates a framework through which they can study the distinctive contributions which the mass media make to their understanding and enjoyment of the world in which they live. Through a variety of approaches to the changing media environment students will develop a critical and analytical approach to the range of media texts as well as the media institutions which create and circulate them. Candidates will further explore the kinds of relationships the texts propose with audiences through a range of research, pre-production and production activities.

Examining Board: EDEXCEL

A GCE in Chemistry allows you to develop a range of generic skills requested by both employers and universities. For instance, a successful GCE Level Chemist will be an effective problem-solver and be able to communicate efficiently both orally and with the written word. Handling data will be a key part of your work, allowing you to demonstrate information retrieval skills as well as use of numeracy and ICT. You will build up a range of practical skills that require creativity and accuracy as well as developing a firm understanding of health and safety issues. As Chemistry is a subject in which much learning stems from experimental work, it is likely that you will need to work effectively as part of a group, developing team participation and leadership skills.

Coursework

a) **Coursework one** This area of study builds up the pupils technical awareness of the subject in a number of key areas, the use of the SLR Camera, Darkroom practice and the use of computer software. Each unit will have a distinct goal, giving each pupil the opportunity to display their own creative response and understanding of the subject area, linked together within a core theme. Sept-Jan

Externally Set Project

Interpretation of a theme or response to a problem set by the examination body. Each pupil is given a six week period to prepare for the exam, researching, developing ideas and organising a final outcome to be completed within 8 hours.

The research to be completed by mid March and the final outcome by the beginning of April.

The Exhibition - You will exhibit both projects from May onwards.

A2 photography - builds and develops the technical and visual skills from AS Level

- * Aren't afraid of dealing with controversial matters.

What does the course lead to?

Obviously, anyone who would like to study politics further should be taking the subject for 'A' level. Anyone interested in careers such as Law, Journalism, the media, Social Work or any kind of public administration should consider studying politics.

Aside from preparing students for specific fields of employment, Government and Politics teaches many vital transferable academic skills such as the ability to properly formulate and communicate effective argument, along with the capacity to solve problems, think analytically, critically and logically.
