

Welcome to the February edition of the Beacon. We have important news of further public and private investment being planned over the next few years. This month we urge our readers to complete the enclosed questionnaire on their opinions of the future of Ryde. The findings of this questionnaire will feed into the community



plan which will act as an action blueprint for the new Ryde Town Council due to be created in 2008. The greater the response, the greater the political power of the survey. If the response is large, it can enable new sources of funding to be accessed in addition to the local tax, which is currently mostly spent by County Hall. This is all money to be spent on the continued regeneration of our unique town. Use the prepaid envelope to explain what the town's priorities need to be.

We are now starting to get an idea of the sports and cultural events of the forthcoming year. This year's Skandia Cowes Week will coincide with the bi-annual Fastnet Race which is being developed this year with a complementary round-Island and cross Channel "Super Zero" races. In other places the Extreme Sports is moving into August, a new Folk and Blues Festival will take place in September, an all year programme is growing around the April Jazz Festival, and the IW Festival and Bestival are continuing to develop the Island's role as a centre of 21st century musical culture.

I think of February as the quietest time of the year but here we are busy planning our seventh Beacon title which will eventually extend our deliveries to Ventnor, Bonchruch, St Laurence, Niton, Chale, Whitwell, Godshill, Rookley and Wroxall. This will take the Beacon to 97% door to door coverage of the households of the Island.

However big our coverage, what makes the Beacons special is the fact that they are local, with local news, dates and information. To keep that news and information fresh we rely on our readers in each area to keep us up to speed. 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RYDE TOWNSCAPE HERITAGE INITIATIVE 1





Despite the effects of two World Wars and many years of economic hardship, Ryde provides one of the best examples of Regency (1800-1820) urban architecture on the Island, and is one of the best preserved Georgian-Victorian towns on the south coast of England.

In recognition of this special interest, and building on previous regeneration schemes in Ryde, the IW Council and Ryde Development Trust joined forces to secure partnership funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund for the Ryde Townscape Heritage Initiative.

Between now and 2010 this scheme will further Ryde's regeneration by contributing to a distinctive high quality town centre environment which is better for residents and more appealing to tourists who bring vital money into the Island's economy. It will do so by providing grants to help repair and bring back into use significant buildings which give the town its distinctive character and by improving tired looking public areas.

The recent St Thomas's Square enhancements provide a good example of how a public area can be revitalised using traditional methods and materials creating a better space for people which is in keeping with 21st century living but in keeping with Ryde's rich heritage.

Allied to this, the churchyard of neighbouring St Thomas's, a listed building, will be enhanced by a future project, creating a pleasant and safe environment for people to retreat to from the busy town centre. Also in the pipeline is the repair and re-use of Vectis Hall, in Melville Street. This will ensure that this currently decaying two-hundred year old building (the first free school in Ryde) is brought back into use and contributes to the character and appearance of this part of Ryde's conservation area.

The Ryde Townscape Heritage Initiative scheme also recognises the shortfall in the craft skills which will be required to carry out these specialist refurbishments. To address this, Ryde Townscape Heritage Initiative is working in partnership with the Isle of Wight Training Group and Island Build, enabling traditional craft skill training schemes to take place using lime mortars, render and plasters. The benefits of this training will be felt Island wide as the skills gained are put to use in the repair of historic buildings.

TELL US WHAT YOU THINK OF RYDE

Enclosed in this copy of the Beacon, you will find a survey form and Freepost envelope from Ryde Town Management Committee (RTMC). The committee was set up last April to prepare the recreation of a town council. Once Ryde Town Council is established, hopefully in April 2008, external funding could mean up to a million pounds extra would be available to be spent annually in Ryde, based on the current precept of £25.50 for a Band D property.

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The RTMC, consisting of the town's elected councillors and co-opted individuals would like every household and business in Ryde to take part in the survey, so that they can find out the likes and dislikes of residents, and get their thoughts on how to make Ryde a better place in which to live and work. The results will be compiled into a Community Plan.

Brian Harris, chairman of the RTMC Community Plan working group, explained: "Ryde is the largest town on the island, and we need to know that its residents are proud of, and care about, the area they live in, and what they want to happen. The anonymity of the survey allows people to be completely candid with their thoughts, so please, tell us what you really think!"

"By doing the survey, we are following Government guidelines on public consultation, and it will help in our aim to become a Quality Council" said Wayne Whittle, Chairman of Ryde Town Management Committee. "That will enable us to unlock extra money from the Government that would not otherwise be available. Whatever you may think of councils in general, we want to know how you feel about Ryde, and to reflect your wishes as far as possible. The town hall question, for instance, could come up with answers we hadn't thought of."

The clerk, Tony Gordon, said that the community survey is an essential part of Ryde becoming a Quality Council. "Other Quality Councils, such as Brading, have been very successful in getting extra funding for their projects. The amounts can be three or four times the amount raised by the local precept, so it's really important that we get a good response to this survey from residents of Ryde."

As an incentive for people to return the form, Ryde Business Association, which represents many of the shops and small businesses in Ryde, is offering a voucher to be won in a draw. Although the survey itself is anonymous, with just the name of the resident's street required for analysis purposes, there is space for a first name and contact number for entry into the draw. This part of the form will be detached on receipt at Ryde Help Centre, before the answers are looked at.

Please complete the form and return in the Freepost envelope to Ryde Help Centre by 14th February. The thoughts and wishes of respondents, and the winner of the draw, will be published in a future edition of the Beacon.

REDEVELOPMENT PLANS FOR RYDE ARENA

Major plans to demolish and rebuild Ryde Arena are being revealed. Plans feature a full-size ice pad with modern facilities, apartments, a number of bars, plus a hotel. Ryde Arena's owners Planet Ice say they will finance plans themselves and they hope to submit a planning application by March with a view to getting full permission by September. If given the green light to go ahead, it is hoped that construction work would start by 2009.

It may mean the Wightlink Raiders ice hockey team would have to temporarily relocate to Gosport's ice rink for a short time while construction work is completed, but the end result would mean the team would have a top-class facility to play in.

The Beacon Eating & Drinking Guide

MRS BEACON'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH: HONEY-GLAZED GAMMON

2 tbsp piccalilli

1 tsp honey

4 sage leaves

black pepper

salt and ground

vegetable stock

1 tsp Dijon mustard

½ lemon, juice only

150ml/51/4fl oz meat or

Ingredients:

60g/21/40z butter 2 tbsp olive oil 4 gammon steaks

1 clove garlic, chopped 1 onion, finely chopped

1 apple, peeled, cored and diced 30g/1½oz flour

500ml oz dry cider

Method:

1. Place a large casserole dish on a low heat and melt the butter with the olive oil.

2. Add the gammon steaks and fry until golden on both sides which will take about ten minutes. Remove the gammon and place to one side.

3. Add the garlic, onion and apple to the casserole and cook until the onion is translucent. Add the flour and cook for one minute

4. Add the cider, bring to boil and reduce by half. Add the piccalilli, honey, sage leaves and mustard, then cook for five minutes. Season.

5. Put the gammon steaks back into the casserole, squeeze in the lemon juice and pour in the stock. Add another pinch of salt and pepper, cover and simmer for a further twenty to thirty minutes.





THE BENEFITS OF **EATING FIBRE**

Foods containing fibre provides us with many vitamins and minerals that have positive health benefits. The recommended daily intake of fibre is 30 gms per day. Many people in the UK do not manage to achieve this. Children under two years should not be encouraged to have too high a fibre intake, as high fibre foods replace those that provide energy for growth. It is unlikely that you can consume too much fibre but studies have shown that in individuals who have excess raw wheat bran, absorption of certain minerals is prevented.

How to eat more: Aim for at least five portions of fruit and vegetables per day. Try a wholegrain breakfast cereal - add fresh or dried fruit to this to further increase the fibre content. Eat wholemeal or granary bread or rolls instead of white. Use brown or wholegrain/pasta rice instead of white. Add lentils, beans or pulses to stews, soups and casseroles.

Increase the amount of fibre in your diet slowly otherwise you could suffer from abdominal discomfort. Also ensure you are having an adequate fluid intake.

Evidence over the last thirty years has also led us to believe that dietary fibre also has a protective effect against colorectal cancer.



DOES YOUR PROPERTY HAVE REGISTERED TITLE?

Did you buy your property before the 1st April 1986? Did you inherit your property or was it given to you before 1st April 1998? If so in all likelihood your property has unregistered title.

The Land Registry has stated their intention that title to all property in England and Wales will be registered within the next few years. At the moment it is only when there are dealings with the property that title has to be registered. The Land Registry has said that in 2012 a system of compulsory registration will be put in place.

In June 2007 new regulations are due to come into force with regard to the sale of properties which means that sellers will. by law, have to provide a Home Information Pack when putting the property up for sale. Part of that Home Information Pack will consist of evidence of a seller's right of ownership. If your property already enjoys registered title, then it will be considerably simpler and faster to put together the Pack.


To encourage homeowners to register titles that are currently unregistered, the Land Registry offers a 25% discount on the registration fee, which is based upon the value of the property.

The advantages of registering your title include:

- Clarification as to the boundaries of your property. This is particularly important if you own a large area of land such as farmland or woodland.
- You will have the benefit of the discounted fee for voluntary registration.
- * It will be easier and quicker to prepare the Home Information Pack if you are selling your property.

We strongly recommend that you find out whether your property has registered or unregistered title. If it turns out that your property still has unregistered title, we would be happy to advise and assist if you decide that it would be to your advantage to register title to your property now, rather than wait until compulsory registration is introduced or until you decide to sell your property.

What is going to happen to interest rates? This is the question I am hearing most especially since the surprise rise in rates last month. And, like everyone else, it came unexpectedly and caused a lot of nervousness in the mortgage markets.

It is always hard to predict the future of interest rates. Although they have raised the Bank of England base rate to 5.25% compared to the not so distant future when the rate was much higher, this is

still a fairly low rate overall. However, this is not much comfort to those who, because of the high house prices currently, have had to take their maximum mortgage borrowing in order to buy their property and are now struggling with another increase in their monthly outgoings.

If you are on a tracker or variable rate mortgage and have a penalty period still ongoing with your existing lender, you may well have to grit your teeth and ride out the higher monthly payments until that period ends. If, however, you have no penalties or very low penalties left on your variable mortgage, then it might be a good time to consider a re-mortgage to a fixed rate instead.

The fixed rate option gives you peace of mind that you can budget over a set period for your monthly mortgage payment without concern if the rate changes during that period. Yes, you will miss out if rates fall, and I heard on the business grapevine just yesterday that they may indeed fall again shortly, but you do have stability, which, for many of us is more important.

The housing market is still buoyant in spite of interest rate hikes, which still means that most people are having to borrow to their maximum allowable and therefore it is sensible to choose the fixed rate option.

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Homes & Gardens GARDENING IN RYDE BY MIKE SANTER

It is not too late to plant garlic! Last September as part of the IW Food Festival I visited the Garlic Farm at Newchurch. A very interesting day was spent learning about the types, history and cultivation of garlic and a chance to taste the different varieties. One particular variety of garlic was said to do best if planted in spring, up to mid March, as opposed to the usual autumn planting. The variety is Solent Wight,



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a soft-necked type which has better keeping qualities. Garlic will grow on most soil types except acid and will also grow well in pots. Break bulb into individual cloves taking care not to damage them, plant six inches apart and deep enough so that there is one inch of soil above the top of the clove. Keep well watered until three weeks before harvest. Garlic is also recommended for keeping pests away from roses, plant individual cloves around the base of your rose and the smell will deter those irritating little beasties. If you have a heated greenhouse or a warm windowsill you can sow tomato seeds now in trays. Cover with a polythene bag until the seedlings are visible and three or four weeks later transfer to three inch individual pots. Plant into borders or growbags in May.



WHEN TO SELL YOUR PROPERTY

At this time of year we are frequently asked to give homeowners, who are considering a sale, advice on how best to market their property. Beyond issues such as value and production of appropriate marketing material, timing is an aspect on which vendors frequently seek our advice.

Whilst some people need to get on with a sale whatever the time of year (due to a job move, or seeing the house of their dreams appear on the market) others have the choice of when to put their house on the market. The introduction of Home Information Packs on 1st June 2007 may well result in more properties coming onto the market in the first half of the year. In summary if the pricing and marketing are right the prospects for a sale look good for now.

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ISLAND STORY

An Artist's View of the Wight in the 1790s

In 1791 four artists made a perilous crossing to the Island to undertake a memorable holiday, seeking inspiration and pleasure amidst bucolic beauty and spectacular coastal landscape. In their drawing and painting they pictured both a lost pre-industrial world and the very beginnings of the tourist revolution that has defined the Island ever since. An exhibition of seventeen watercolours by Thomas Rowlandson (1756-1827) is now on display at the Guildhall, Newport and a limited edition of reproductions now available.

In the summer of 1791 Thomas Rowlandson boarded a ferry at Lymington bound for Yarmouth. With him were three friends and fellow artists, Henry Wigstead [1760-1832], with whom he had made an earlier painting tour of the Island in 1784, his brother-in-law Samuel Howitt [1756-1822] and possibly John Bannister.

Rowlandson was a well known London satirical artist, 35 years old, a lean bachelor with a taste for the pleasures of life. He had travelled widely in Britain and Europe. His incisive artwork makes him a kind of photojournalist of Georgian Britain.

In the 1790s the Tourist Revolution which defines modernity and industrialisation of the Isle of Wight had already begun. "Parties of Pleasure were frequently made to it" wrote J. Hassell in A Tour of the Isle of Wight published in 1790. The visitors enjoyed the ivy covered ruins of Carisbrooke Castle and the wild spectacular coastline. Pictures of both subjects appear in the collection of 112 pictures by Rowlandson, Howitt and others made on different painting trips of the 1790s from which this exhibition is drawn.

Tourism was still in its infancy and still dangerous. Some of Rowlandson's pictures show the kind of vessel their ferry was, a small open decked sailing ship which was now blown off course by "very tempestuous" weather. "Landed at Shalfleet" shows Rowlandson and his three companions disembarking and looking worse for wear. The next picture [right] shows them relaxing in the happier surroundings of the New Inn, with drinks and smiling countenances, Rowlandson sketching.

In the next picture the travellers resume their broken journey in "Conveyance to Yarmouth". If modern ferries are one advantage of modern tourism, roads are another. The rough cart in which the gentlemen are travelling is seen negotiating a track over a stream. For their dignity they have each been seated on a dining room chair on the back of the cart.

Yarmouth was the Island's second official town but had shrunk in importance since the Middle Ages. It had a population of 350, about half that of the parishes of Shalfleet or Calbourne. However unlike the "rotten borough" of Newtown, tiny Yarmouth was still a real town. There were inns and tradesmen, a small garrison in the castle, fishermen and a market. Yarmouth was a natural point for the new tourists to hire trips to visit the spectacular western coast. Rowlandson's view of Quay Street, [above] like that of the New Inn, despite the obvious differences is comfortingly familiar over two centuries on.

Upriver of Yarmouth lay the tiny hamlets of Freshwater and the scattered farms of Totland. Under 600 people lived west of the Yar. Rowlandson's party painted marine and landscape views, the church, and the Cabin Inn at Freshwater Bay, a drinking haunt of

Rowlandson's friend, the artist George Morland.

Southeast of Freshwater and south of the roadless "ridge of mountains running through the middle of the Island" the 'Back of the Wight' was even more remote and the only part of the Island not to be recorded in the collection. About 1,500 people lived in the five parishes between Brook and Chale, making a living from mixed farming, wreck salvage and smuggling.

From Yarmouth our intrepid travellers made the journey to Newport on tracks over a succession of fields, stopping to open and close over fifty gates.

Newport was the Island's capital and focus of the Island's population. Almost 6,000 of about 22,000 Islanders lived in the town and the parish of Carisbrooke. Newport had already developed a role we are familiar with today. In 1794 Henry Wyndham described it as "handsome and well built... the shops are numerous and as superbly stocked as they are in most of the English cities". But Newport was much more, a thriving tidal port, with a dozen watermills, workshops and bustling markets. One of these is shown frightl in Rowlandson's view of the Old Town Hall from St Thomas' with the traders' stalls where the museum is now and soldiers from Parkhurst barracks chatting up local women in the square.

If Newport had one serious rival it was its "suburb" of Cowes and East Cowes. Newport's town corporation controlled the harbour but on land the twin towns of the Medina estuary were rapidly developing. The parishes of Northwood and Whippingham which included the new settlements had a population of 3,800 by the 1790s. Hassell describes the narrow crowded streets as "indifferently built", but its inhabitants as "genteel and polite without being troublesomely ceremonious"

The new twin towns of Cowes made the easiest landing point on the Island from Southampton and one of the pictures (above) shows passengers landing at the Vine Inn at Cowes. Two of Howitt's pictures in the collection but not in this exhibition show infant Cowes already grappling with its future identity. In one picture are bathing machines reflecting the town becoming a fashionable resort. Another shows a shipbuilding yard where J.S. Whites would later develop.

The whole north-east coast of the Wight could not help but be affected by the development of Portsmouth and the Spithead as the greatest naval port and anchorage in the world offering shelter to all vessels using the Channel, the greatest trading highway of the world. The Island supplied food, drink and ships' spares and naval officers built gothic villas on the Island's coast. By the end of the century 1,500 people lived in **Brading and St Helens** and another 2,000 in the parish of Newchurch which included the villages of **Lower and Upper Ryde**. Rowlandson's painting of Brading is one the earliest known and Howitt's paintings of Lower Ryde capture the wooden beginnings of the modern town.


Rowlandson and his companions also travelled south, probably now on horseback, through the rich agrarian parishes of **Arreton** and **Godshill** which mustered 2,500 parishioners. Beyond the sheep runs on the surrounding chalk downs the spectacular eastern and southern coastline was almost totally deserted. There were barely 600 people living between Culver Cliff and St Catherines.

Where now stand the three towns of Sandown, Shanklin and Ventnor, there was just a fort, a smattering of longshoremen's cottages and the tiny village of Shanklin, "lost to the sight in a perfect wilderness" its church standing in the middle of the yard of Mr Jolliffe's Shanklin Farm, serenaded by "an uncommon number of singing birds".

Throughout this picturesque idyll the party rode from inn to substantial inn, showing that the tourist trade was already well established. Shanklin Chine had steps and a stone arch. The fisherman's cottage was so often used for the purpose that it became known as "Honeymoon Cottage".

Sometime between 1830 and 1837, 22 pictures by Howitt, 53 by Rowlandson and 23 by their companions were bound by William IV's bookbinder into two volumes which became the property of the Marquess of Bath. In 2002 they were purchased by the IW Council with help from the Heritage Lottery and Art funds. In 2004 details of some of the pictures were shown at Shanklin Chine Heritage Centre.

The current exhibition of 17 of Rowlandson's watercolours lasts to March 24th. The IW Council has also authorised specialists Maritime Prints and Originals to make a limited edition of just 350 of each of the pictures on show. 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
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
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


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
