SAFARICOM SEVENS 2010

Safaricom made a grand entry into rugby when they sealed a three-year sponsorship deal worth Sh90m for the Safari Sevens with the Kenya Rugby Limited. Safaricom chief executive officer, Michael Joseph, handed over a cheque of Sh25m to Kenya Rugby Football Union (KRFU) Chairman, Richard Omwela for the 2010 championship. From the package that was unveiled on Friday 23rd October at Safaricom House, Sh22m will go directly to the organisation of the event while Sh3m will be used to set up a modern media centre at the Rugby Football Union of East Africa, the traditional venue of Safari Sevens.

Joseph explained that Safaricom Foundation will join venture with KRFU to refurbish the RFUEA grounds to the required international standards. He also noted that Safari Sevens has over the years grown in leaps and bounds to be Africa's premier sevens event hence his delight to partner with KRFU in giving it a push to further heights.

Close to 12,000 people attended this year's Safari Sevens giving the Union a profit amounting to Sh15m from the event. Mr. Omwela explained that Sh7m has been used as a down payment to enable them purchase the Unga grounds that are adjacent to the RFUEA and the drilling of a borehole at the same venue. The Union requires Sh60m to purchase the ground for constructing an ultra-modern stadium for rugby.

Invitations to next year's event had already gone out to all the teams that participated in this year's tournament, including South Africa, Fiji, and France, Zimbabwe, Tunisia, Uganda, Japan, Kenya, Tanzania, Zambia, Bristol University and Greenoble of France.

RUGBY IS BACK IN THE OLYMPICS

The global Rugby family are celebrating the announcement that Rugby Sevens will be included at the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro.

An overwhelming vote in favour of inclusion by the International Olympic Committee members at the 121st Session in Copenhagen means that the world's top men's and women's Rugby players will have the opportunity to compete for an Olympic Gold medal, the pinnacle of sporting achievement.

Bernard Lapasset, President of the International Rugby Board, said: "This is a historic moment for our sport and for the global Rugby community, who were united in support of our campaign."

"We are excited and honoured to be joining the Olympic Games and I would like to thank the IOC members for believing in our Olympic vision and our values and recognising that Rugby Sevens is a perfect fit for the Olympic Games."

"The Olympic Games will be the pinnacle of the sport for all our athletes and the Rugby family. The best men's and women's players in the world are excited to be able to showcase their talent on the world's greatest sporting stage."

"We are now looking forward to working in partnership with the IOC to develop and implement a Rugby Sevens tournament in Rio that will reach out to new audiences and inspire a new generation of sports fans around the world," added Lapasset.

Special care must be taken to honor Kenya Rugby Football Unions Policy and Procedures for the welfare of young people in Rugby Union. KRFU has done all in its power to assist with the growth of age grade rugby in Kenya; it has therefore extended its mandate by taking an opportunity to seek assistance from the Ministry Of Sports to promote rugby at primary level. It has also played a bigger role of supervising, proper care of funding and taking care of medical insurance for the under-age players during match day tournament and club training session.

The Union wishes to promote the 'spirit of rugby' by providing safe environment, enjoyment and team sport that values effort as much as achievement for the game of rugby. Adults involved in developing Age grade Rugby in KRFU are Fred Ollows (Development Manager), Erick situma (Project Co-ordinator), Adelaide Nasambu and Sarah Otieno both (Faciliatators).

The adults named above have promoted a win, culture to the exclusion of the wider values of the game which include enjoyment, teamwork and respect for the effort of others



COACHES AND REFS BENEFIT

The International Rugby Board in conjunction with the Kenya Rugby Football Union sponsored local coaches and referees to the Level Three educator training in South Africa.

Four coaches and two referees benefited from the three-day programme. "The six will come back and train colleagues, thus improving the game here," said KRFU General Manager, Auka Gecheo.

The four coaches who jetted off were Kenya Commercial Bank's Michael "Tank" Otieno, Nondies' Paul Odera, Impala's Bill Githinji and Strathmore's Mitch Ocholla. The two referees were Godwin Karuga and John Boscoe Muamba. Kenya was allocated only three slots but managed to fight for six and this will really help uplift the standards of the game.

RUGBY PATRONS DIG DEEP

KRFU received a massive boost when the Rugby Patrons Society handed over a cheque for over Shs 1.2 million for the sinking of a much-needed borehole at the Ngong Road Grounds. The amount represents 60 per cent of the cost of the borehole. Members of Kenya's renowned Rugby Sevens team, including captain Humphrey Kayange were on hand to witness the ground-breaking ceremony. Chairman of the KRFU Ground Development Committee, Aggrey Chabeda, thanked the patrons and said their generosity would ensure that Kenya rugby would continue to have a venue befitting its growing status in the international arena.

The Rugby Patrons Society was established in 1953 and has worked over the years in many different areas, from developing rugby in schools to bricks and mortar projects and providing expertise and counsel. They are perhaps best known for being the masterminds behind the highly successful Tusker Safari Sevens, now in its 12th year.

Once a player in possession of the ball has been brought to ground by a tackler, they must release the ball immediately.

team-mate of the tackler can pick up the ball from the contact area as long as they are on their feet. However as soon as a team-mate from the ball carrier's side comes into contact with that player and the ball is still on the ground, the tackle then becomes a ruck.

None of the tackler's teammates can attempt to handle or pick up the ball once the ruck has formed. However they can use their strength to drive over the team in possession and attempt to win the ball. There are certain situations where tackles cannot be made.

If the ball carrier has been held by an opponent, but has not gone to ground, and a team-mate has bound onto them, a maul is formed. At that point a tackle cannot be made for safety reasons.



HUMPHREY KAYANGE'S OLYMPIC PUSH

October 9, 2009,

"The Kenya national sevens team captain, Humphrey Kayange, took to the podium at a hashed Bella Centre. This time not to lead his soldiers in devouring the likes of Fiji, New Zealand, England or South Africa as they had done before.

The 27-year-old international centre was to present a simple yet decisive case to the world on the need to have rugby back to the Olympic Games fold. The audience was not the cheering crowd that have always threatened to blow up the rooftop of the stadium as they rout for the Kenyan team but the attentive 121st IOC Session of 90 members in the city of Copenhagen, Denmark.

In him entourage to promote the IRB case were IRB chairman Bernard Lapasset; Augustin Pichot, former captain of Argentinian Pumas' third of the last Rugby World Cup; Cheryl Soon, the captain of Australian woman team that won the Women Seven World Cup last winter in Dubai; Anastasia Khanova, one of Kazakhstan's top female players; and New Zealand rugby legend Jonah Lomu. Kayange's articulate presentation prevailed, to earn rugby recognition as an Olympic Sport by a majority vote. Sevens received 81 votes for and eight against with one abstention, while golf had 63 for and 27 against with two members abstaining. Kayange could have captained Kenya's team to the fifth Rugby World Cup semi-final in Dubai last March, but winning the bid for rugby sevens was the best moment in his rugby life.

"I was out of this world since it was history in the making. I was elated and happy that the journey was worth taking," said Kayange. "It took months of hard work, commitment and research to come up with an absolutely fine presentation. It was such a happy feeling that rugby now is part of the Olympic."Kayange and Kenya played a pivotal role in the historic feat." It's a great life-changing experience for me, and it now makes the Olympics the top most target for us now. We shall now not just focus on athletics for medals but rugby too," said Kayange.

"God willing, I must be at the Olympics; if not as a player a coach, manager or in a personal capacity," he said.

Describing sevens as a "modern, youthful and skillful sport", Kayange explained that the Olympic Games was the pinnacle and dream for every sportsman or woman and that the memories that go along in winning the coveted medals leave a permanent mark.

Kayange noted that it was upon IRB and its affiliates to intensify its activities through its development programmes for the youth to ensure more of them take up the game. He said: "More should be invested in training facilities to cater for the increasing number of rugby players." **eastandard.net**
