Tops in Blue member makes Tucson show a memorable homecoming

Davis-Monthan Airmen and Tucson community members packed the Tucson Convention Center Wednesday night when Tops in Blue, the Air Force's premier entertainment group, performed — featuring Tucson's own Tech Sgt. Chandra Smith, from the 162nd Fighter Wing's F-16 Alert Detachment on base.

Among the 30 performers from around the country, Sergeant Smith took center stage to sing for her hometown crowd.

Cheers, whistles and applause from the audience said all eyes were on her, when she sung solos during the group's sixth performance of the 2008 season, and Sergeant Smith's first-time performing for her hometown crowd.

"I feel great!" She said after the show. "I was a bit nervous for this performance, because I wanted it to be perfect for the people from my church, my unit and all of the friends that came out to see us.

"Our mission is to enhance the morale of servicemembers, and to strengthen ties between military bases and their surrounding communities, so it was really exciting for me to do that for my community here in Tucson," she said.

Those in attendance saw a two-hour program covering several styles of music. The 2008 Tops in Blue theme, Déjà Blue, compiled performances from past seasons and included music from movies, pop, country, Latin and patriotic genres.

Sergeant Smith had two solo performances during the evening. She sang Sugarland's country hit "Something More," and Gloria Estefan's "Rhythm Is Gonna Get You."

AEF evolves to reflect dwell-ratios stressed career fields

LANGLEY AIR FORCE BASE, Va. (ACCNS) - Air Force officials here will soon implement an amendment to the air and space expeditionary force deployment cycle that will better reflect the deployment-tempo of stressed career fields.

Currently more than 45 percent of the 35,000 Airmen fighting in the war on terrorism are deployed out of their scheduled AEF deployment cycle because of high demands and minimal manning.

"We have been living under the current circumstance with

and if you're going to live with an exception to policy for a very long time, it should at that point be a part of your policy," said Col. Matt Erichsen, the Air Combat Command operations division

The original AEF cycle is divided into five pairs designed to have all Airmen on a 1:4 dwell ratio for deploy-


many exceptions to policy, ment. In other words, during contingencies, Airmen should expect to deploy for 120 days and return home for 480 days. Manning for almost half of the Air Force career fields make it impossible to maintain the 1:4 ratio in current circumstances.

> Under the new construct, called AEF Evolution, each career field will fall into a different category of deploy

ment cycles. Career fields in higher demand will have smaller dwell ratios (or more frequent deployments). The deployment categories are called tempo bands. Air Force officials have created five tempo bands: A through E. Tempo Band A reflects the original AEF cycle of a 1:4 dwell ration based on 120-day deployments.

Bands B through E are

D-M captain leads Airmen up highest peak

hen Capt. Mark Uberuaga hits the fitness center's treadmill, he wears five pound weights around his ankles and a 50 pound expedition pack on his back.

"I prefer the old gym at Davis-Monthan because the treadmills have fans built right into them. I get really hot during these training sessions, and the fans help quite a bit," said Captain Uberuaga, a Pavehawk pilot with the 55th Rescue Squadron here.

Captain Uberuaga's training is intense, but so is the challenge that lies ahead of him. A journey, which began May 28, will ultimately end at the highest point in North America as Captain Uberuaga has started lead a group of Airmen to scale Mount McKinley, Alaska, to raise money for the Special Operations Warrior Foundation. Mount McKinley, also known as Denali, will be the fourth summit on the way to completing the U.S. Air Force Seven Summits Challenge.

The Seven Summits Challenge was the brainchild of Captain Uberuaga and his climbing partner, Capt. Rob Marshall, 8th Special Operations Squadron, Hurlburt Field Air Force Base, Fla., while they were roommates stationed at RAF Mildenhall, United Kingdom.

"We had just become roommates in March 2005 when Wrath 11, an MC-130H Combat Talon II, crashed killing nine Airmen from the 352nd Special Operations Group. It was a very difficult time for the families as you can imagine," said Captain Marshall.

It was during the aftermath of the Wrath 11 crash that the captains first learned about the Special Operations Warrior Foundation (www.specialops.org), which provides free scholarship grants to the children of military personnel who were killed in the course of military duties.

As avid mountain climbers, the roommates saw an opportunity to channel their sadness over the loss of their friends and coworkers into something good.

"This challenge has evolved from just a fundraiser into a mission to foster a positive awareness around the globe of the United States Air Force and the United States military in general," said Captain Marshall.

The "seven summits challenge," according to Dick Bass, the first person to successfully summit the highest peaks on every continent, includes Mount Elbrus (18, 510 feet), Europe; Mount Kilimanjaro (19,340 feet), Africa; Mount Aconcagua (22, 834 ft), South America; Mount McKinley (20,3200 ft), North America; Mount Kosciuszko (7,310 ft), Australia; Vinson Massif (16,067ft), Antarctica, and Mount Everest (29,035ft), Asia.

Captains Uberuaga and Marshall climbed the highest peak in Europe, Mount Elbrus, Russia, in July 2005; and they lead a group of Airmen and civilians up the highest peak in Africa, Mount Kilimanjaro, in July 2006. Captain Marshall climbed to the summit of the highest peak in South America, Mount Aconcagua, in February 2007. In total, the U.S. Air Force Seven Summits challenge has raised nearly \$20,000 for the Special Operations Warrior Foundation.

With each climb, Captain Marshall said, the team tries to raise more money. This climb's goal is to raise \$30,000 more than all the past climbs combined.

While fundraising efforts are in full swing, Captain Uberuaga's focus as of late has been on the overwhelming coordination and preparation required to lead a team up Denali. Fortunately, Captain Uberuaga is well qualified for the job. He was a mountain guide during

college and has guided others to the summit of Mount McKinley four times.

"This is an intense climb, and it could take us up to a month to make the summit and return safely," said Captain Uberuaga. "We have a strong, young, healthy team though, and I am confident that we all have what it takes to make it to the top."

Along with Captain Uberuaga, other members of the Mount McKinley expedition include: 2nd Lt. Timothy Gannon, 354th Civil Engineering Squadron, Eielson Air Force Base, Alaska; Capt. Tavis McDevitt, 33rd Rescue Squadron, Kadena Air Base, Japan; Capt. Erin VanOOsten, 40th Airlift Squadron, Dyess Air Force Base, Texas; Airman 1st Class Christopher LaBerge, 97th Security Forces Squadron, Altus Air Force Base, Okla; and Capt. Graydon Muller and 1st Lt. Andrew Ackles, both of the 40th Helicopter Squadron, Malmstrom Air Force Base, Mont.

"The decision to participate in this climb takes dedication, personal sacrifice, and a spirit of adventure. We want to honor all acts of bravery and generosity by Airmen that go unnoticed across the globe every day," Captain Uberuaga said.

Financial Peace

In just more than three months, 34 Davis-Monthan community members saved \$31,775 in emergency funds, eliminated \$64,142 of debt and dodged \$1.7 million worth of credit cards offers, and they did it with hard work, commitment, and the lessons they learned from the Financial Peace University.

The base chapel offered the 13-week video-based program, which promotes debt-free living and building wealth, for the first time here at Davis-Monthan in January. The course concluded last month with incredible results, according to Chaplain (1st Lt.) Doug Hess, 355th Fighter Wing chaplain and FPU coordinator.

"The overwhelming response was ex-

tremely positive," Chaplain Hess said. "Many people lamented over the classes they did missed. Some even offered to finance an Airman to go through the course."

The program is a product developed by and featuring Dave Ramsey, New York Times best-selling author, nationally-syndicated radio host and personal money management expert. According to Ramsey's Web site, https://www.daveramsey.com, more than 500,000 have attended the FPU courses, and that on average, families eliminate debt, with the exception of mortgages, in 18 to 24 months.

Course participants paid a discounted fee, based on rank, for course materials, which included Ramsey's book, Financial Peace Revisited, a workbook, lessons on compact disc, and other course aids.

"This course more than pays for the tuition with the materials and resources given," haplain Hess said.

The students also committed to attending a weekly class that featured a DVD lecture by Ramsey on lessons including budgeting, debt, investing, retirement and home-buying. Meeting weekly enhanced students understanding of the materials, as well as creating accountability amongst class members.

"One of the life changing dynamics of FPU is the class interaction," said Staff Sgt. Brian Cravo, 355th Fighter Wing chaplain assistant. "In that environment real behavior modification happens as participants support, assist and challenge one another to get their finances on track."

Although students were expected to attend the weekly lecture, the objectives of the course were laid out for participants to achieve at their own personal pace. Ramsey repeated in his lessons a series of six "baby

steps" that lead participants toward the end goal — to "build wealth and give."

"Even though we only have the (first) baby step done, the fact that we have a legitimate and viable plan gives me an overwhelming sense of confidence," said Master Sgt. Chris McKinney, 612th Combat Operations Division.

For many of the participants, the class offered a great sense of stability, both financially and in their personal lives.

"FPU has given us a good platform to set ourselves up for a financially safe future and a healthy marriage," said Staff Sgt. Matthew Mayo, 355th Contracting Squadron, and his wife, Gwen Mayo.

"The class has been very instrumental in aligning my household under one common viewpoint as to how we need to handle our money in both the short and long term," Sergeant McKinney said.

"I have been married for one year and I be- 5411.

lieve that taking this class has helped us to navigate around many pitfalls associated with money management or lack thereof."

The chapel will offer the course again beginning June 12 for the first 30 volunteers. The encore is, in part, thanks to the resounding advocacy from the first course's students.

"Take it! Take it again! Get your friends to take it," said Tech. Sgt. Cheryl Replogle, 355th Maintenance Operations Squadron. "I wished I had taken or had the chance to get this class when I first came in (the Air Force). Imagine if Airmen today could actually retire after 20 years of dedicated service and not have to depend on his or her retirement with ease."

"This course is a must whether you are a E-1 or 0-6. All have much to gain," Sergeant McKinney said.

based on 179-day deployments. Tempo band B is a 1:4 dwell ratio — or six months deployed 24 months home.

Tempo band C is a 1:3 dwell. band D is a 1:2 dwell and band E. reserved for the most stressed career fields, is a 1:1 dwell, or six months out, six months in.

Tempo bands B through E have been added to provide predictability, structure and rule sets for the nearly 50 percent of functional areas currently operating at a tempo greater than 1:4 or for a duration greater than 120 days.

banning to go into effect as early as October. They will be able to see what tempo band they fall under by viewing their profile in the Air Force Portal. Information on the Portal is scheduled to be in place by December.

These changes were recommended by the AEF Steering Group to provide increased predictability of tour length and tempo for Airmen. The improvements are not intended to change how often or how long Airmen deploy, but instead they will synchronize the AEF with the joint-planning process and allow the Air Force to meet combatant-commander requirements more efficiently.

"You can think of it more as Airmen can expect the tempo truth in advertising for our Airmen," said Lt. Col. Ed Swanson, the ACC AEF provisioning branch chief. "What we want to do is create these tempo bands to reflect what the career fields are presently doing — so they have better predictability and know when their rotations will be." Colonel Swanson said it enables Airmen to make life plans accurately for their families.

It also aligns the Air Force deployments and planning with the rest of the military services.

"When we plan out (deployments and operations) ... we're planning 20 months out," Colonel Swanson said. "The rest of the (military) community is planning 24 months out. So we're off cycle with them, and have never aligned correctly."


Air Force Reserve members will not be placed in tempo bands like active-duty Airmen.


Tempo banning allows Air Force warplanners to more accurately identify when a career field is approaching a 1:2 dwell ratio, which may trigger mobilization for Reserve components. If Reserve Airmen are mobilized. they will fall into a standard 1:5 tempo-band ratio.

This evolution of the active duty "will be the new description of the air and space expeditionary force," Colonel Erichsen said. "If we pull out of the Middle East, ideally everyone will come out of those tempo bands and we'd (all) be in Tempo Band A." But the tempo band structures would remain in place for potential upcoming surges and crisis.





of her," said Adam Smith, Sergeant Blue members. Smith's husband, after watching her perform. "She has a true gift, and for her to be able to share it in this way is the best thing that could ever happen for her.

"She's been singing in talent competitions in Tucson for years and sings the National Anthem and other patriotic songs at Tucson's Air National Guard base during ceremonies," her husband said. "I've always known that she has an amazing voice."

She also performed during several group numbers consisting of 12 costume changes over the course of the show. "Some changes take only a minute," she said. "These days I can put my mess dress on in 1 minute, 20 seconds."

According to Sergeant Smith, the performance is only one aspect of Tops in Blue that's a matter of military precision. Since reporting to Tops in Blue headquarters at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, in March, every minute of her training and preparation has been planned, and each member of the team is challenged to fill several roles as Tops in

The Airmen are divided into four distinct flights: personnel, operations, logistics and technical.

"We're a self contained unit," Sergeant Smith said. "I'm the personnel flight chief and I'm responsible for seven people. We all have additional duties that range from promotions, to protocol, to technical crew," the sergeant said, who doubles as a member of the lighting crew.

The typical routine for the team consists of six hours to set up the stage, a rehearsal, the performance, and four hours to pack the stage and move on to the next venue.

It's a ritual they will perform in 30 Countries at 150 shows until the season concludes in March 2009.

In addition to touring the United States, Europe and Asia, Tops in Blue will spend three weeks in Southwest Asia performing for deployed troops.

"I'm looking forward to going to the desert. I heard the crowds get really excited," Sergeant Smith said.

The team of goodwill ambassadors made a special trip to her unit at Davis-Monthan Thursday to present the commander with a plaque in appreciation for unit support. They also sang a few songs for Sergeant Smith's co-workers. It's a courtesy the team extends to each member's home unit

"We are very proud of Chandra," said Lt. Col. Moon Milham, 162nd Fighter Wing Alert Detachment commander. "Talent aside, she's an excellent example of today's Airmen and she represents the Air National Guard and our unit as a true professional.

At her detachment, Sergeant Smith is a personnel specialist and an information manager maintaining computers, accomplishing administrative work, processing orders, keeping records and managing several additional duties.

"She is certainly missed around here," Colonel Milham said, "but after watching her perform with Tops in Blue it's easy to see that she's right where she belongs. She's a credit to our country, an important part of troop morale, and exemplifies Air Force values."

309 AMARG: Three years of change

In a sense, the past three years at the 309th Aerospace Maintenance and Regeneration Group (309 AMARG) have been like the computer and digital electronics industry – one monumental and positive change after another.

Perhaps the most obvious change came only one year ago when the Group transformed itself for the first time in 30 years – shifting from a stand-alone Center to become a Group of the 309th Maintenance Wing at Hill AFB, Utah. Four squadrons replaced the old center divisions. That change has brought tremendous benefits to the Group by clearly establishing 309 AMARG as a partner with the three Air Logistics Centers (ALCs), available to support ALC overflow requirements and small-scale work projects as a partner – not a competitor – since 309 AMARG has many of the same capabilities as the ALCs albeit on a much smaller scale.

Many of 309 AMARG's changes have taken place at the squadron level. For example, the 576th Aerospace Maintenance and Regeneration Squadron (576 AMRS), which replaced the old maintenance division, has dramatically changed the F-4 regeneration cycle through a Lean process improvement. Gone are the days of a division of workers swarming over seven aircraft – replaced by a cellular concept in which cells of workers complete a specific series of tasks relinquishing their aircraft to the next cell and moving on to another jet. This process improvement has cut an average of 500 man hours off the time required to

regenerate each full-scale aerial target – a significant savings to our Air Combat Command customer.

The squadron has also applied the F-4 lessons learned to other elements – resulting in improvements in the A-10 service life extension program (SLEP) and in the regeneration of F-16s for foreign military sale (FMS).

The 576 AMRS' medium-sized aircraft branch applied lessons learned in their P-3 Orion regeneration program to increase from two (in the first year) to 10 P-3s regenerated in their third year – applied those lessons learned to the regeneration of five C-130Es for the FMS program, and reapplied lessons learned on C-130s to become key partners in the C-130 programmed depot maintenance (PDM) – directly supporting the vital workload for both



ALCs and operators needing the aircraft in the field.

The 576 AMRS team also converts B-1Bs from strategic nuclear capability to pin, point conventional

strategic nuclear capability to pin-point conventional strike through the addition of a target pod modification in accordance with the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty.

Other squadrons have also seen significant changes and upgrades in the past three years. The 578th Storage and Disposal Squadron (578 SDS), which replaced the old storage and disposal branches, also underwent a major Lean transformation in the past year. The process improvement has helped the team review storage procedures and make improvements to better in-process, store and preserve aerospace assets in their charge. Their efforts haven't gone unnoticed. Members of the Sierra Army Depot, charged with storing and preserving tanks and other heavy equipment for the Army, have visited twice in the past three years, each time seeking to gather information and lessons learned about desert storage and preservation. Likewise, two allies have visited 309 AMARG, one to gather lessons for potential aircraft storage, and a second with an interest in taking advantage of the 578 SDS team's knowledge to store allied aircraft at the Group facility - for the first time in about 10 years. Even NASA, tasked with retiring the Space Shuttle Orbiters in 2010, has visited 309 AMARG to gather ideas and best practices for storage and preservation.

Oldest operational KC-135E retires, joins others in Arizona desert

KC-135E, Serial No. 55-3145, having been replaced by the KC-135R, retired here on May 28 from Forbes Field, Kan. after a long Air Force career taking it to destination stops all over the world.

The airframe is fondly remembered by former crewmembers according to SMSgt Cheryl Orr, USAFR, the plane's assistant crew chief for 11 years. In fact, she and Mr. A.J. Ford, 3145's crew chief for 21 years, have requested to "visit" the refueler as it sits in the Arizona desert for one more photo op with the plane.

"She was a very special aircraft, one-of-a-kind, always ready to go," said Mr. Ford. "The flight crews loved to fly her," he added.

"We (crew chiefs) flew all over the world with her, with hardly any maintenance problems," SMSgt Orr said. "The crews loved to fly her because A.J. kept her immaculate a well as in perfect mechanical condition"

In the same manner this aircraft made lasting memories for those who crewed 55-3145 since

rolling off the Boeing assembly line in 1955, so did other major world events occuring that same year. The same year this aircraft took flight for the first time, Disneyland opened its doors in Anaheim, Calif.; Ms. Rosa Parks was arrested for refusing to give up her seat on a bus; and the Salk polio vaccine was introduced, all forever making an historical impact.

Former flight crews of 55-3145 can rest easy as this aircraft will be placed in the highest level of storage at 309 AMARG, and preserved for flight should future duty call.

Squadron (577 CMRS) recovers tens of thousands of preserved, reusable spare parts annually. The squadron returns parts, potentially worth millions of dollars, to operators at a cost of the man hours required to remove, package and ship them. Frequently, the most vital parts move from customer's request to shipping dock in as little as 24 to 48 hours.

The 577 CMRS team also turns out A-10 wings - rebuilding more than 11 wings annually in support of both A-10s undergoing SLEP both at 309 AMARG and at Hill AFB, Utah.

Finally, the 309th Support Squadron (309 SPTS) manages critical supply functions such as packaging, crating, shipping and warehouse, among others. Two-time Oscar winner presents film at Air Force Week

PHILADELPHIA (AFPN) — Military medicine and wounded warriors took center stage in the "Fighting for Life" documentary produced by Terry Sanders shown during Air Force Week in Philadelphia May 28 at the Levitt Auditorium of the University of the Arts here.

Directed by two-time Academy Award winner Terry Sanders and presented to hundreds of community leaders and Airmen, the film documents today's military medical professionals and the challenges of saving lives every day in the war zone as well as the learning process of becoming doctors for the military.

The opening sequence silenced the audience as "Fighting for Life" shows the harsh realization of all the behind the scenes efforts of medics to save wounded warriors in the battle

"Nothing was staged. Nothing was rehearsed. Everything was real and captured as it was happening," said Mr. Sanders, who has produced or directed more than 70 award-winning dramatic features, theatrical documentaries, television specials and portrait films. He also coheads the American Film Foundation.

"The Air Force had a tremendous part of this film because we filmed at the Air Force hospital in Balad (Air Base in Irag) and the whole way of caring for the wounded by moving them out of Iraq is a trademark of care in this war," he said. "The passion and dedication of everybody — medics, doctors and nurses — is what we were filming."

Mr. Sanders and his film crew worked more than three years on the film and followed the process of wounded warfighters as well as future doctors as they progress through the Uniformed Services University, which prepares scientists and health care practitioners for careers in service to the nation.

"This film is apolitical; neither left nor right," Mr. Sanders said. "The film captured life as it happened. I wanted to make a film to reach the people who are turned off by anything to do with the Iraq war. This is about human drama and the realities of what is happening."

What is happening is that Americans are fighting the war on terrorism and the business is dangerous. The Air Force Theater Hospital in Balad Air Base sees up to 10,000 patients a year making it one of America's busiest trauma centers. In the film, military medics explained they have treated up to 17 patients an hour.



Film Director, Terry Sanders, a two-time Academy Award winner, premiered his film 'Fighting for Life' to nearly 300 Air Force Airmen and city civic leaders during Air Force Week - Philadelphia May 28. The film is a feature documentary telling the stories of doctors and nurses fighting on the front lines of battle to save lives. The Air Force Week program is part of a proactive initiative to increase communication with the public. Air Force Week includes community visits and talks by Air Force officials, flight demonstration team performances and displays highlighting the Air Force men and women serving on the front lines.

Treating and caring the wounded is not discriminatory. In the war zone, the majority of patients are locals injured and American medics treat each patient with respect and without favoritism.

Saving lives sometimes requires moving patients to larger medical facilities. In past wars, battle-wounded troops would be treated and kept in field hospitals. "Fighting for Life" shows how aeromedical evacuations quickly transport causalities and how an American servicemember can be wounded in Iraq, initially treated and then taken to Landsthul Regional Medical Facility in Germany in as little as 11 hours.

The more than 300-member audience gave the director a standing ovation at the end of the film.

"We have 30,000 men and women that are medics in the Air Force," said Brig. Gen. (Dr.) Byron C. Hepburn, the command surgeon for Air Mobility Command from Scott Air Force Base, Ill. "They are serving in combat operations in Iraq and Afghanistan and serving around the world.

"The film captured the spirit of the patients and also the courage of our men and women in uniform," General Hepburn said, who has served at a forward-deployed hospital during the war. "You see our theater hospitals doing tremendous work and you see our aeroevacuation team - pilots, loadmasters and aeromedical teams — doing incredible lifesaving efforts. It is a serious film and we can all reflect on the courage displayed here. It shows true service before self on the part of Soldiers wounded and on the part of men and women caring for them."

"I didn't expect to see so many tears in the theater," said Tech. Sgt. Steven McLane of the 305th Maintenance Operations Squadron from McGuire Air Force Base, N.J. "It was a very moving film. It really opened my eyes. It is something every American needs to see."

The Air Force Week program is part of a proactive initiative to increase communication with the public. Air Force Week includes community visits and talks by Air Force officials, flight demonstration team performances and displays highlighting the Air Force men and women serving on the front lines. 




