



5th BRITISH COMPOSER AWARDS Winners Announced

- Choral Music celebrated in 2007 Awards -

- World premières by John Tavener and Gabriel Jackson featured in Celebration Concert - New International Award won by German composer Wolfgang Rihm -

Choral music was a dominant theme at this year's **British Composer Awards** when both the **BBC Singers** and BBC Radio 3 Choir of the Year **Chantage** joined in the celebrations, with the amateur ensemble performing the world premières of 'The Voice of the Bard' by Gabriel Jackson and a new carol by John Tavener, entitled 'Rocking.'

The full list of winners of the 2007 Awards was announced yesterday evening, Wednesday 5th December, in a ceremony hosted by the **British Academy of Composers & Songwriters** at Glaziers Hall on London's South Bank. The winning works of the Awards, sponsored annually by the **Performing Right Society** (PRS) and run in association with **BBC Radio 3**, were revealed by Radio 3 presenters Sara Mohr-Pietsch and Andrew McGregor, and the composer **Errollyn Wallen MBE**, winner of the BBC Radio 3 Listeners Award in 2005, was on hand to present the Awards.

The International Award of this year's **British Composer Awards** – a new initiative for 2007 – has been won by the German composer **Wolfgang Rihm**. Rihm, described by Andrew Clements of The Guardian as a composer who "continues to provide an experience quite unlike that of any other composer working today" and one of the most prolific composers writing today, won the Award for his orchestral work **'Verwandlung'** premiered at the 2006 BBC Proms by the Bamberg Symphony Orchestra conducted by Jonathan Nott.

Sarah Rodgers, Concert Chair of the **British Academy of Composer & Songwriters** said, "The British Composer Awards are unique in their celebration of contemporary composition in the UK. Over the past five years, the Awards have recognised the work of 122 composers, brought about the broadcast of some 200 different performances, and offered, through the generosity of its supporters, 10 new commissions. The introduction of the International Award this year serves to recognise those composers from abroad whose works have been performed here over the past year and whose music does so much to enrich the contemporary music scene in the UK."

The full list of winning works this year reflects the huge diversity of new music being written today. The winner of the Award for a Community or Educational Project, **Stephen Deazley's 'Thrie Heids'**, was written specifically to include the participation of five disabled adults and makes use of bespoke digital instruments, specially created for each performer. **Stephen McNeff's** community opera **'Tarka the Otter'**, based on Henry Williamson's nature story and winner of the **Stage Works** Award, is a work for a mixed cast of professional and non-professional musicians, making use of a large and entirely amateur Chorus.

Edwin Roxburgh's oboe concerto entitled **'Elegy for Ur'**, winner of the Award for Wind Band or Brass Band, mourns the loss of the earliest surviving musical instrument, the Royal Lyre of Ur, destroyed or stolen in the looting of the Iraq Museum in Baghdad. **Jem Finer's 'Score for a Hole in the Ground'**, a huge installation in the depths of King's Wood in Kent, which amplifies sounds produced by drips of water falling on percussion instruments, wins this year's New Media Award.

Some of this country's most distinguished composers have won Awards this year. Oliver Knussen wins the Vocal Award for 'Requiem – Songs for Sue', a work written in memory of his former wife; Harrison Birtwistle wins the Instrumental Solo and Duo Award for a piece for solo harp, entitled 'Crowd'; Thomas Adès is the winner of this year's Orchestral Award for 'Tevot' and Julian Anderson wins the Choral Award for 'Heaven is Shy of Earth' – both of these works having been premièred at the 2006 BBC Proms.

Further emphasising this year's celebration of choral music, Anderson wins £5,000 funding towards a new commission or project from the **PRS Foundation for New Music** for his Award, while the 29-year old composer, **Tarik O'Regan**, a British Composer Award winner in 2005, wins the Liturgical Award for '**Threshold of Night**' and £1,000 from the **Worshipful Company of Musicians** towards a new commission.

Another young composer very much in the ascendance is the Welsh composer **Guto Puw**, Resident Composer of the BBC National Orchestra of Wales who wins this year's **BBC Radio 3 Listeners Award**, voted for by the listening public, for his **Oboe Concerto**. Taking its inspiration from different qualities of the human voice, such as stutters, the concerto features its own musical interpretation of chatterboxes. In an interview prior to the work's first performance, Puw commented: "The whole concerto is very lively. The second movement is inspired by talkative people who won't let you contribute to a conversation!"

The British Composer Awards will be broadcast on BBC Radio 3 on Thursday 6th December at 7pm. The Celebration Concert will be broadcast the same evening at 10.15pm. A full list of the winners follows overleaf.

Further Information

The UK premiere of a work entitled 'I Am A Mistake' by International Award winner **Wolfgang Rihm** takes place at Symphony Hall Birmingham on Thursday 6th December at 7.30pm.

The Scottish premiere of **Oliver Knussen's** winning work in the Vocal category, **'Requiem – Songs for Sue'** will take place in Glasgow (City Halls) on Friday 14th December, and in Edinburgh (Queen's Hall) on Saturday 15th December, performed by the Scottish Chamber Orchestra.
