One unit that has obviously been attended to in this way is '465/9' No. 465908, here forming the 09.58 service from London Victoria to Gillingham and passing Shortlands on 17th April. Brian Morrison

Car park and platform improvements for Dore station

Hopes are rising for drastic improvements to Dore station to keep track with the growing numbers of passengers.

The station could be doubled in size to meet passenger and freight demand, with a new platform, footbridge, car park and a ticket machine. Network Rail is proposing to lay extra track at Dore Junction, and passing loops in Grindleford and Hope, to increase capacity on the line. The works would involve a new platform being built opposite the current one, with a footbridge to meet disability legislation. Already South Yorkshire Passenger Transport Executive has bought the former garden company site to turn the area into a station car park with 100 spaces, relieving pressure on the existing small station car park and surrounding roads where

residents have complained about commuter parking. Subject to funding, the new platform and track are scheduled for 2014.

In February this year, a study was published that called for a £530 million investment in rail in the North of England over the next 10 years, including a 40% increase in trains each day. The TransPennine route between Sheffield and Manchester has been highlighted as one of the most overcrowded in the region. Northern Rail, which runs the unmanned station, has said if passenger 'footfall' increases, it could install a ticket machine. At present commuters from Dore can travel free to Sheffield if a conductor does not approach them before the nine-minute journey ends. Scores jam onto the two-carriage trains each morning.

Plans for Reading go on public display

A public exhibition of the plans for Reading station is to be held in Reading Town Hall from Thursday 20th to Saturday 22nd May, except on the Thursday evening when it will transfer to the station.

The Network Rail's scheme sponsor for the project, Tony Walker, said: "The work we are doing in Reading is one of the biggest pieces of railway investment anywhere in the country right now. I urge everyone who lives in Reading or uses the station to come along to the Town Hall and find out about the benefits and how they are affected by our plans".

There are schemes to build

five extra platforms and two new entrances connected by a new footbridge, in an effort to relieve congestion for passengers. New lifts and escalators will also make it easier to get about the station. The station will close over the Christmas period to enable much of the first phase of work to take place. In addition, there will be construction of a viaduct to untangle the tracks to the west of the station, boosting capacity and cutting delays. Network Rail engineers and project managers will be on hand at the Town Hall exhibition to answer questions about the future for Reading's railway, and the benefits for the travelling public.

35 year anniversary of DalesRail marked

The Lancashire DalesRail service has been running since 1975, and links Lancashire with Carlisle, travelling through the Ribble Valley, Yorkshire Dales and Eden Valley.

The Dales Rail service, which attracts

many walkers, was celebrated on 30th April, when Northern Rail Class 156 No. 156464 was named *Lancashire DalesRail* at Clitheroe by Matthew Beeton, Area Director of Northern Rail, and Richard Watts, Rail Projects Officer for Lancashire County Council.

New Carriage Washing Plant at Ilford

As part of the already announced National Express East Anglia Service Improvement Plan, a new £1.1 million Carriage Washing Machine has been installed by Birse on Road 20 of Ilford Maintenance Depot yards.

The washer will help to improve the quality of the exterior cleaning of the company's EMU fleet, which is to be increased by 188 new and additional carriages to increase peak travelling capacity at Liverpool Street by 11,000 seats. This increase will be achieved by the construction of 30 four-car Class 379 EMUs and the transfer in of 17 additional Class 321s that were previously with London Midland.

The Class 379s will be introduced on Stansted Express and London-Cambridge services late in 2011, and the additional '321s', some of which are already in service, are expected to be in traffic by the end of this year.

Also under the Service Improvement Plan, a further new carriage washer is to be installed at the Orient Way servicing facility.

Permanent revamp on the cards for Carlisle station

Plans have been submitted to Carlisle City Council for a £550,000 revamp of passenger facilities at Citadel station, partly funded through a £10,000 contribution by the Friends of the Settle & Carlisle line, the work including a completely new passenger waiting area towards the southern end of the platform.

There are three main areas of work, covering two seating areas and a waiting room. The station recently underwent a transformation as part of a

television ad but the new plans are on a more permanent basis, and will provide both extra seating and shelter from the winds. The new seating area will be created at the head of Platforms 5 & 6, where trains for the Carlisle to Settle line and that from Carlisle to Newcastle depart. It will be surrounded on three sides by a low stone-clad wall topped with glazed screens to cut out draughts.

At the other end of the platform the existing waiting area will be refurbished, the red hoops that define the seating area and

restrict access to the platform will be removed and a new 'totem' will be provided for train service information and the station clock.

New tram and rail interchange approved

Plans for a new tram and rail interchange at Gogar, near Edinburgh, estimated to cost £43 million, have been rubberstamped by Edinburgh Council.

The work to link Edinburgh-Fife rail services with the new tramway system is set to get under way this autumn and is scheduled for completion in around 12 months.

Councillors backed the plans, despite some concerns about Network Rail not being willing to make an underpass that forms part of the scheme available for use by pedestrians and cyclists 24-hours a day.

Located east of the Gogar roundabout, where the railway travels under the A8 Glasgow road, the station will be the main rail link to Edinburgh airport for Fife residents, with passengers transferring to trams for the final leg of the journey.

Court finds serious Health & Safety issues in Serco Docklands rail operations

Serco Limited, the operator of the Docklands Light Railway, has been found guilty of failing to stop a train after a passenger fell onto the track. A jury at Southwark Crown Court found Serco guilty of a serious Health & Safety offence following a prosecution brought by the Office of Rail Regulation (ORR).

The incident resulted in the death of a member of the public who fell onto the track and was struck by a train. The ORR prosecution followed the incident that occurred in April 2007 at All Saints station. During an altercation with another person on the platform, the victim was pushed

and fell onto the track, where a short time later he was struck by a train and fatally injured.

The ORR carried out a full investigation and found that Serco had an inadequate procedure in place for stopping trains in an emergency. The company allowed control room staff to decide whether to stop trains

based partly on CCTV images. The CCTV system was not designed or intended for this purpose. Following ORR's enforcement action, Serco has made changes to its procedure to ensure that such an incident should never happen again.

The case is due for sentencing on 12th May.

Test run for Sarah Siddons before Rickmansworth Canal Festival heritage workings


Britain's oldest working main line electric locomotive, the ex-Metropolitan Railway No. 12 Sarah Siddons, will be in action on 16th May on a series of shuttles between Harrow-onthe-Hill and Amersham, in conjunction with the Rickmansworth Festival.

A total of four round trips will be made commencing with a special working from Harrow-on-the-Hill at 10.26 to Watford (10.50/10.58). and then via the north curve to Rickmansworth (11.09) and Amersham, where it is due to arrive at 11.22. The return departs Amersham at 11.57 and runs directly back to Harrow-on-the-Hill. Trains will then leave Harrow-on-the-Hill at 12.42 for Rickmansworth only (returning at 13.14), 13.42 to Rickmansworth and Amersham (returning at 14.57) and finally 15.42 again to Rickmansworth and Amersham, returning

at 16.19. It is understood that except for the first run, *Sarah Siddons* will be positioned on the north end of the trains, which will operate in 'top and tail' mode with a pair of Class 20s. Special tickets are available and must be prebooked either on-line at www.ltmuseum.co.uk or by telephoning 020 7565 7298.

A vintage bus service featuring one of the London Transport Museum's Routemaster 'double-deckers' will connect the Festival site at Batchworth Lock with Rickmansworth station. The museum also reports that its famed 1938 Tube stock is currently unavailable as it is in need of repairs to the motor suspension, and two planned events featuring the stock have had to be postponed. It is hoped to have the problem rectified soon. Additionally, it is believed that Sarah Siddons will also be operating on 12th May on a train organised for disadvantaged children.

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- £2.2 million to fit regenerative braking to more than 200 units, starting with the fleet of 30 Class 458 Juniper EMUs, with the first two now starting to test the technology in service on the Waterloo-Guildford and Waterloo-Reading routes. Energy produced by a standard train braking is currently lost, but the regenerative system returns electricity to the third rail system, allowing trains in close proximity to draw on the electrical supply. The whole fleet of Class 458s is expected to be fitted with the new software by the end of this month, when the system will then be started on the 172 Class 444 and 450 Desiro EMUs.
- Transport for London (TfL) has purchased the remaining PPP contractor, Tube Lines, at a price of £310 million. The deal ends more than seven years of the PPP, which has been widely

criticised as a costly way of upgrading London Underground. The relationship between TfL and Tube Lines had broken down in recent months, with a funding gap of more than £400 million between what Tube Lines said its work should cost and what TfL was willing to pay. TfL was also highly critical of Tube Lines' performance on the lubilee Line upgrade, which is running months behind schedule. TfL has promised that the funding gap will now be closed and that upgrades of other lines, including the Northern Line, will now proceed with much less disruption than previously planned. Tube Lines, which is a consortium of the infrastructure companies Amey and Bechtel, have yet to comment, but Amey will still continue to provide management and dayto-day maintenance on some lines, but Bechtel will exit the Underground, and the Capital works will return in-house.

A major upgrade of Cheadle Hulme station has received the go-ahead following talks between Network Rail and Stockport Borough Council. Work should start on site in late autumn, and when completed, passengers will have direct access from the station car park to Platform 4 and to lifts and an over-bridge linking all platforms. A lift tower will be built on Platform 4 and there will be steps and a lift leading up from the car park directly onto the platform. There will also be staircases to the over-bridge from all platforms. The project is expected to be completed in summer 2011.

Southern creates info zones

A new project is underway by Southern to improve the way in which passengers get information at stations, every station on the network presenting service news in logical zones, rather than where space currently permits.

A major de-clutter of nonessential signs and posters is taking place, and stations will display useful information that is grouped together in logical areas. Called Information Zones, the new system will ensure that the same information is in the same place at whichever station one happens to be.

The stations will be divided

into four separate and distinct zones, the Welcome Zone containing station facility and where appropriate, community information, the Ticket Zone containing ticket purchasing and real time passenger service information, the Train Zone showing penalty fares and timetable information and the Onward Journey Zone providing multi-modal travel information.

The work to map existing poster sites has been completed at all 157 Southern stations and the re-zoning of each station has begun. The project is scheduled for completion by the end of this year.



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

Steam Dreams goes exploring for 2010 UK tour

Steam Dreams has entered the round-Britain market with its recently announced 'Cathedrals Explorer', which is scheduled to operate between 6th and 13th May next year, just weeks after Railway Touring Company's 'Great Britain IV', details of which were in the supplement that was with our last issue.

Although obvious comparisons will be made between the various merits of each tour, Steam Dreams Managing Director, Graeme Bunker, is keen to emphasise that the 'Cathedrals Explorer' is designed to maximise the time that passengers will have to enjoy the key points on the tour. For instance, on Day I, a late afternoon arrival in York will provide an entirely free evening to enjoy the delights of the city and after an overnight in Stirling the following day, the train will not leave until around lunchtime to enable passengers to enjoy a full morning of sight-seeing. Equally, there has been built in two 'buffer days' to offset a day that is acknowledged will be a travel day.

'The Cathedrals Explorer' starts its odyssey at some early hour in the morning of 6th May, when it may be possible (look out for further announcements) to join what is essentially the empty stock of the charter at Kensington Olympia, which will be hauled by Bulleid Pacific No. 34067 Tangmere through Kent to Minster, which is the official point of origin of the train. It will then meander up to London Victoria, where no doubt the bulk of its patronage will board for the onward journey to York, behind what Mr. Bunker refers to as 'appropriate traction' (an A4 with two tenders, maybe?). 'Appropriate traction' applies also to his description of what will be in charge of the journey the following day from York, via the Settle & Carlisle line and Beattock, to Stirling. No. 46115 Scots Guardsman maybe?

Day 3 will be a special day. The sight-seeing in the morning will just get that much better upon returning to join the train at Stirling, as the run to Fort William is scheduled for a magic K1/K4 combination, one that is long overdue on the main line. The locos were in LNER apple green when they last worked together, but now both Nos. 61994 The Great Marquess & 62005 will be in BR

lined-black, and by the end of the day, begrimed BR lined-black for good measure! The route will be via Larbert, and then through the Glasgow suburbs to the West Highland Line and Fort William. This long day will be followed by a rest day, but with the option of taking a run to Mallaig and back with the 'K4'. With the passengers rested, Day 5 will also be lengthy, as the train will leave Fort William hauled by the 'KI/K4' combination as far as the Glasgow area, where they will be replaced. Forward motive power will most likely be the locomotive that covered the York to Stirling leg on Day 2, which will then take the working through to Oxenholme. The passengers will be taken by bus to Windermere, where they will be able to enjoy a day of off-train activities on Day 6.

With both of lan Riley's 'Black 5s' now in charge on the penultimate day, the train will set out from an as yet to be confirmed station (possibly Carnforth) to head south via Preston, Chester and Shrewsbury, before reaching the destination of Carmarthen, which will include a run over the scenic Central Wales line. On Day 8, the final day, the 'Black 5s' will again be in charge for the run through South Wales, via Cardiff and the Severn Tunnel, to Bath Spa and onwards to Salisbury, before heading back to London, via Basingstoke. And finally, the 'Cathedrals Explorer' should conclude with a mini-tour of Kent, back to Minster, providing the rare chance to enjoy a pair of 'Black 5s' on southeast metals.

The tour is scheduled for all-steam traction and offers some interesting innovations, particularly the option to join the working through Kent at the beginning and the end of the tour, the latter with 'Black 5s'. With some traction still to be confirmed, the intention is to ensure as far as is possible that the motiver power will be 'appropriate' for the route, which means using locomotives associated with particular lines in BR days. Hence the 'K1/K4' combination on the West Highland, 'Black 5s' on the WCML and Central Wales, and Tangmere in Kent. The intention is also to emphasise that the train as a land cruise by including rest days and a late start or early finish on other days.

The Week Ahead

The coming weekend should witness one of the most ambitious, imaginative and physically taxing tours seen for many a long year, when at around 05.20 on Saturday 15th May, Class 40 No. 40145 East Lancashire Railway will depart from Crewe at the head of the joint CFPS/DTG 'East Lancs Champion' railtour.

After a circuit around the Manchester area for further pick-ups, the tour heads south to Birmingham International, where Class 52 No. D1015 Western Champion will be waiting to attach to the front of the train for a possibly unique occasion of a Class 52/40 double-header as far as Plymouth, running via Oxford, Swindon and Bristol Temple Meads. At Plymouth, the 'Western' will detach and reposition at the rear of the train for the 'Whistler' to lead into Cornwall through to Penzance. To crown an already hectic day, the tour does an about turn after a short break, and with D1015 again leading heads back to Truro, where a further reversal places No. 40145 at the helm for a run to Falmouth. After arrival at Falmouth Docks, the train then returns to Penzance with D1015 leading to Truro, and then the Class 40 back to Penzance, with an arrival time some 17 hours after leaving Crewe!

It may well be that after such a long gruelling day on Saturday, there will be the need for some liquid refreshment, the locally brewed Sharpes Doombar bitter is recommended, and there may be some weary souls arriving at Penzance for the proceedings the following day.

But, heads need to be cleared quickly, as the next leg is what dreams are made of, a Class 52 to St. Ives! Almost certainly the first-ever visit of a 'Western' to this iconic branch line and an event to be savoured. The bonus is that the return will be worked by the Class 40 back to Penzance. After a quick turn round, the tour then heads back 'up-country' with D1015 again leading to Par, where the train reverses, and with No. 40145

leading continues to Newquay. The 'Western' will then lead back to Plymouth, where the Class 40 will run-round and attach to the front for a double-headed return as far as Oxford.

D1015 will then detach, leaving the '40' to return the train as outwards to a weary 00.18 arrival back into Crewe. What a tour, and the CFPS and DTG are to be congratulated for arranging such an incredible itinerary (or should we say endurance test?)

Another significant event is also booked, is Steam Dreams' now annual 'Coronation' from London King's Cross to Edinburgh Waverley, which also sets out on 15th May. The original specification has endured some changes, initially due to the non-availability of No. 60007 Sir Nigel Gresley, which was booked to work the train on the 'out and back' legs south of York. This has been easily circumnavigated by the use of A4 classmate No. 60019 Bittern throughout, made possible by the provision of the second tender, which significantly reduces the need for water stops. The train will become only the third through working of a steam locomotive between King's Cross and Waverley since the end of BR steam. The first between the two capitals in the 1990s featured No. 60007 Sir Nigel Gresley, and the second took place last year when No. 60163 Tornado completed the journey for the BBC's 'Top Gear' programme. Coincidentally, the last through steam working prior to that was on 5th March 1968 when No. 4472 Flying Scotsman, working with the same second tender now attached to Bittern, completed the journey in celebration of the 40th anniversary of 'The Flying Scotsman' train. It is also considered a rare through working for Bittern, as being a Gateshead and Heaton-based locomotive in BR-days, it rarely featured on the through King's Cross-Edinburgh trains.

Day two was originally scheduled for a circular run from Edinburgh via the East Coast Main Line, the Tyne Valley and

Beattock, but was changed to a Waverley to Ayr working with Class K4 Mogul No. 61994 The Great Marquess. Unfortunately, the loco has a reported cracked middle cylinder and is unavailable and so 'Riley's International Rescue' 'Black 5' No. 45407 will deputise. There will also be a route change, as the tour will now operate via Croy and Lenzie, which will bring rare steam mileage to the 'Union' route between High Street and Shields Junctions that skirts the southern perimeter of Glasgow Central, prior to continuing west via Cardonald and Paisley Gilmour Street.

The final day will again see No. 60019 in charge from Waverley, via Newcastle-upon-Tyne to York, where the 'A4' will hand over the reins to rival LMS Pacific No. 6233 Duchess of Sutherland for the final dash to King's Cross. What is the betting that the 'Duchess' arrives in King's Cross with a 'Royal Scot' headboard? And if you can't make this year's train, you may not have to wait until next year to spend your cash!

Having already commented of a rather good Cornish ale earlier, this preview becomes a bit of a 'good ale guide' when we look at Sunday's tour with Britannia Pacific No. 70013 Oliver Cromwell from London Victoria to Faversham, which runs via Maidstone East, Ashford and Canterbury. The train title is 'The Spitfire', which takes its name from the excellent bitter ale brewed by Shepherd Neame, which in turn takes its name from the legendary World War 2 fighter aircraft. Shepherd Neame is the promoter, and the event is in conjunction with the Faversham medieval market and classic car rally. There is an afternoon fill-in to the Isle of Sheppey with the 'Britannia' leading to Gillingham, then diesel-haulage to Sheerness, before steam takes over for the run back to Faversham. This neatly positions No. 70013 for the return journey to London, which will be via Dover, Ashford and Bromley South.

Returning to Saturday, and *Tornado* will also be in action in Kent for Pathfinder on the first of three circular tours that run steam-hauled from London Victoria through

Paddock Wood, Ashford, Canterbury, Minster, Deal, Dover and Folkestone, returning to London, via Ashford. This working originates at Bristol Temple Meads and is diesel-hauled to the London terminus.

Also on Saturday, the South Devon banks will not just be vibrating to the sound of Maybach and English Electric power, as the old-Great Western will also be putting on a show with Vintage Trains 'Cornishman', which is booked for Tyseley's 'Hall' No. 4965 Rood Ashton Hall and 'Castle' No. 5043 Earl of Mount Edgcumbe from Bristol Temple Meads to Plymouth and back, which starts at Birmingham Snow Hill and runs dieselhauled via Worcester Shrub Hill to Temple Meads. The double-headed pairing also brings together the prospect of father and son on the shovel at the same time, but on separate locomotives, in the shape of Messrs Meanley Senior and Junior. Although in terms of footplate seniority, should that be Messrs Meanley Junior and Senior?

The round-up is completed with two UK Railtours' workings on consecutive days, commencing on 14th May with the 'Broadsman' to Wroxham from London Finsbury Park, which works outward through Cambridge and returns along the East Coast Main Line. DB Schenker Class 67s are the likely motive power for the train. Next day it is the ECML throughout with a King's Cross to Durham working, which may well have a DB Schenker Class 90 on the front.

Reflecting on the weekend activity, with so much quality steam mileage to be enjoyed it is perhaps a little unexpected that a heritage diesel tour should scoop pride of place. But the CFPS/DTG 'East Lancs Champion' is indeed an exceptional tour, particularly as it highlights the co-operation between two locomotive-owning societies in order to get this project off the ground. Pathing in Cornwall is always difficult, especially to St. Ives, and so the fact that this tour is operating to its original specification means that there has been an industry wide effort to make it happen. Well done to all involved.

■ HF Railtours has announced a further outing with BR Standard Pacific No. 71000 Duke of Gloucester on 15th July, hot on the heels of booking the locomotive for the 'Cumbrian Coast Explorer' on 3rd July. The 'Heart of England Explorer' features steam haulage from Crewe, via Birmingham International, Coventry, Leamington Spa, Oxford and Swindon, to Bath Spa and Bristol Temple Meads. The train originates at Preston and picks up at Chorley, Horwich Parkway, Bolton, Manchester Victoria, Stockport, Wilmslow and Crewe. The company is run by Hellifield-based farmer Hayden Fortune, whose objective is to run trains offering the best catering possible allied to the maximum comfort. He says that his ethic is to serve high quality food that offers the best in both quality and quantity. No 'pictures of food' type meals, which is how he described some of the catering on offer elsewhere! Hayden certainly stands out as a man who knows what he wants, and how to achieve it. Look out for more HF Railtours excursions in the

coming months, especially making full use of the stunning coastal and mountain scenery in the North West.

■ The discovery of a crack in the right-hand cylinder of the North East Locomotive Preservation Society's (NELPG) Class K1 No. 62005 caused the locomotive to be withdrawn at the last minute from NELPG's 'Blyth Spirit' railtour on 8th May. A formal statement is expected soon from NELPG that will confirm the scale of the problem, which has potentially come at a very bad time as the locomotive was due to move to Fort William next week to be in position for this year's 'Jacobite' season that commences on 17th May. Meanwhile, the tour ran diesel hauled throughout with West Coast Class 37/5 No. 37516 in charge to an amended route from Middlesborough, via the Durham Coast and the Blyth & Tyne route to Morpeth to avoid the several reversals that featured in the original itinerary.

Restoration plans for unrestored 'Barry 10'

Plans have been announced by The Cambrian Group, the new operators and custodians of the Barry Rail Centre, for the restoration of the remaining "Barry 10" steam locomotives.

At Barry Rail Centre, Cambrian Group Chairman, John Buxton, said: "The 'Barry 10' were the last of the steam locomotives remaining at Dai Woodham's historic Barry Scrapyard to await restoration. The exciting plans announced today are the culmination of over 10 years of work undertaken by Cambrian with the Vale of Glamorgan Council to secure a future for them, ensuring they continue to be available for future generations to understand our railway heritage".

The Cambrian Group also has plans for the Barry Rail Centre and for the Barry Tourist Railway (previously operated as Barry Island Railway), which is now fully operational again under its new custodian Cambrian Transport Ltd. Much of the restoration work on the locomotives and tenders is to be undertaken. at the Barry Rail Centre, and as a result, employment and skills training opportunities will be directly accessible to local people. It will also be ensured that as much public

access as possible is available to view the restoration projects as they progress over the next few years.

This runs alongside the development plans to create a centre for engineering and training excellence at the Barry Rail Centre, as well as the progressive improvement for services and facilities available to visitors of the Barry Tourist Railway, including a café at the Barry Island station buildings that is intended to open soon.

New rail apprenticeship scheme from RHC Reaseheath College. What we do here is real Pete Waterman is promoting a new

apprenticeship scheme at the Crewebased Railway Heritage Company, which he owns, to provide skilled railway engineers.




New station for Welsh Highland line


