



Infrastructure – Smart Power: How will this new US Foreign Policy approach affect Africa?

This workshop will discuss how a new US foreign policy approach called "smart power" will affect Africa and US-Africa relations. Smart Power involves the strategic use of diplomacy, persuasion, capacity building, and the projection of power and influence in ways that are cost-effective and have political and social legitimacy. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton used the term during her confirmation hearings, in which she said, "We must use what has been called smart power -- the full range of tools at our disposal -- diplomatic, economic, military, political, legal, and cultural -- picking the right tool, or combination of tools, for each situation. With smart power, diplomacy will be the vanguard of foreign policy." Panelists will address how "smart power" will increase prospects for peace, security, prosperity and stability on the African continent. Panelists will discuss current examples of US "smart power" foreign policy in action in Africa and the difference it has and will make for economic growth, a stronger business climate and development prospects.

Bob Emrey
Chief, Health Systems Division
USAID, Office of Health, Infectious Diseases, and Nutrition
Emrey is chief of the Health Systems Division in the Office of Health, Infectious Diseases, and Nutrition, Bureau for Global Health, at USAID. He leads a team addressing issues in health financing, human resources, quality assurance, management of pharmaceuticals, and information systems for management, evaluation, and planning. Previously Emrey

served as health management and finance advisor to USAID's Health Office, and was founding director of international programs for the Association of University Programs in Health Administration, Washington, D.C. Emrey began his public health career as a commissioned officer in the U.S. Public Health Service. He holds a bachelor's degree in economics from Occidental College, an MBA from the University of California, Los Angeles, an MPH from University of California, Berkeley, and completed all coursework for a PhD (ABD) in public administration from University of California, Irvine.



Allan Hegburg Deputy Assistant Secretary for International Energy Policy U.S. Department of Energy

Alan Hegburg is a deputy assistant secretary for international energy policy in the U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE) office of policy and international affairs. His policy and management responsibilities cover international energy issues in the Middle East, Russia and the Caspian, and Africa, as well as functional areas such as energy security and

markets. Hegburg spent 17 years in management positions in three international, integrated oil companies. He represented one company on the Council on Foreign Relations Middle East Task Force. In addition he served 17 years in the public sector, including service in the U.S. Navy as well as management positions in the U.S. Departments of Energy and U.S. Departments of State, the latter as a career diplomat. Most recently he was affiliated with The Scowcroft Group and the Center for Strategic and International Studies where he provided oil and gas consulting services. He taught graduate energy courses at The George Washington University and at the School of International and Public Affairs at Columbia University. He is a graduate from the University of Illinois and earned a master's degree from the Johns Hopkins University' School of Advanced International Studies.



Robert D. Hormats Undersecretary for Economic, Energy, and Agricultural Affairs U.S. Department of State

Robert Hormats was sworn in as under secretary for economic, energy and agricultural affairs September 23, 2009. As under secretary, he leads the department on issues ranging from trade, energy, and aviation to bilateral relations with America's economic partners. Prior to becoming under secretary, Hormats was the vice chairman of Goldman Sachs (International). Hormats served as assistant secretary of state for economic and business

affairs from 1981to 1982, ambassador and deputy U.S. trade representative from 1979 to 1981, and senior deputy assistant secretary for economic and business affairs at the U.S. Department of State from 1977 to 1979. He served as a senior staff member for international economic affairs on the National Security Council from 1969 to 1977, where he was senior economic advisor to Henry Kissinger, Brent Scowcroft, and Zbigniew Brzezinski. Hormats was also a recipient of the French Legion of Honor in 1982 and the Arthur Fleming Award in 1974. Hormats has been a visiting lecturer at Princeton University and currently is a member of the board of visitors of the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy. He earned a bachelor's degree in economics and political science from Tufts University and a master's degree and a PhD in international economics from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy.



Eunice Kazembe Minister of Industry and Trade Republic of Malawi

Eunice Kazembe is currently serving as the minister of industry and trade for the Republic of Malawi. Kazembe is also a member of parliament representing Chiradzulu South. She recently served as chief advisor to the President on urban and rural development. Her previous positions include minister of trade and private sector development; minister of energy, mines and natural resources; ambassador to the Republic of China; and chairperson of the Malawi Development Corporation. Kazembe earned an MBA from

Indiana University, and bachelor's degree in commerce from Carleton University, Ottawa. She is a trustee and co-founder of Chisomo Children's Club.



Fradique de Menezes President Democratic Republic of São Tomé and Príncipe

Fradique de Menezes was elected President of Democratic Republic of São Tomé and Príncipe in July 2001, and assumed office on September 3, 2001, after renouncing his Portuguese citizenship. Earlier, he had a successful business career as a cocoa exporter, and had also served as foreign minister of Sao Tome and Principe from 1986-1987. On July 16, 2003 while he was visiting Nigeria, de Menezes was ousted by a military coup, but restored to

power on July 23, 2003, following an agreement facilitated by the Nigerian government. De Menezes was re-elected with 60 percent of the vote on July 30, 2006 defeating Patrice Trovoada, Democratic Action party candidate, who became prime minister in a power sharing agreement.

Emeka Nwankwo is the president and CEO of Vertical Optimization as well as founder and managing partner of Export Path, a multinational public-private partnership. He has led private and community-based water resource development projects; university student housing development; refugee housing development; design and development of manufacturing

plants for agro-processing; and planning of a nationwide telecommunication. Previously, he worked in the research and development division of the DuPont Company. He worked on a number of technology development projects including development of new fibers for advanced application; development of instruments for rheological characterization of polymeric flows; and characterization of thin film sensors for commercial application. Nwankwo earned a PhD in chemical engineering from Columbia University and a master's degree in community development from the Judge Business School at the University of Cambridge.



Jean Ping Chairman African Union Commission

Jean Ping was elected chairman of the African Union Commission on February 1, 2008, and assumed office on April 28, 2008. Previously, he served as foreign minister of the Gabonese Republic from 1999 to 2008. As foreign minister of the Gabonese Republic, he was selected to be president of the 59th session of the UN General Assembly in 2004. He began his professional career at UNESCO in 1972, and subsequently



became Gabon's permanent delegate to UNESCO where he served until 1984. He then served as director of the civil cabinet of the president of Gabon from 1984-1990. From that post, he advanced through several cabinet level assignments before becoming minister of planning, the environment and tourism in January 1997, where he served two years before becoming foreign minister of Gabon. He was elected to the National Assembly of Gabon in elections in 1996, 2001, and 2006.



Jennifer Riria CEO Kenya Women Finance Trust

Jennifer Riria is the CEO of Kenya Women Finance Trust, the largest microfinance institution working with over 200,000 clients. Riria earned a PhD, and is considered a specialist in microfinance. She has spent all her adult life in building and contributing to systems that empower the majority; and in particular women's empowerment and development. Riria is a public



Katherine Almquist

Former Assistant Administrator for the Bureau for Africa

U.S. Agency for International Development

Katherine Almquist served as assistant administrator for the Bureau for Africa, U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) from May 2007 to January 2009. She led and directed the largest regional bureau in the U.S. government's primary foreign assistance agency, comprising more than 2,000 staff in 26 bilateral and regional missions and headquarters. The Africa Bureau manages more than \$5 billion annually of development, reconstruction, and humanitarian assistance to 48 sub-Saharan African countries. Almquist now advises and consults on a range of international matters including foreign assistance, conflict management, peacebuilding, and African affairs. Almquist has also formally served as the USAID/Sudan mission director, the United States representative to the Assessment and Evaluation Commission, the deputy assistant administrator of USAID's Bureau for Africa, and the special assistant and senior policy advisor to the USAID Administrator. She earned a master's and bachelor's degrees from Johns Hopkins University.

Ala Al Senusi is the managing director of international operations for Gulf Capital Partners. Deputy Director, Office of Regional and Security Affairs, Africa Bureau U.S. Department of State

Michael Bittrick has served as deputy director of Security Affairs for the office of regional and security affairs in the Africa bureau of the U.S. Department of State since late 2002. In this role, his work has focused on the issues of U.S. regional security policy toward Africa; conflict management; security sector reform; maritime security; peacekeeping operations; disarmament, demobilization and reintegration and post conflict activities, humanitarian programs and operations; program and contract planning and oversight; budget justification for security assistance programs in Africa; and assisting with ongoing conflict resolution efforts in several countries in sub-Saharan Africa. His previous positions include: military advisor on the Africa Bureau; defense attaché on the U.S. Embassy in Luanda, Angola; battalion executive officer and brigade operations officer in 501st Military Intelligence Brigade; and country director for Central Africa and Somalia/Rwanda for the office of the secretary of defense in Washington D.C.

Reuben Brigety Director, Sustainable Security Program Center for American Progress

Reuben Brigety is director of the sustainable security program at the Center for American Progress. Brigety's work focuses on the role of development assistance in U.S. foreign policy, U.S. national security, human rights, and humanitarian affairs. From 2007 to 2008, he served as a special assistant in the bureau for democracy, conflict, and humanitarian assistance at the U.S. Agency for International Development.
