Turning Off Fortunoff

The Source Sinks & Joins the Growing List of Jewish-Owned Business Shut-Downs



The long and unfortunately growing list of Jewish-owned businesses that have floundered and ultimately shuddered in our lifetime could fill more than this one column. And I'm not just talking about my Uncle's successful Buster Brown children's shoe store on Jamaica Avenue in Queens.

No, once again I was surprised when another giant hit the brick wall; I almost spilled my coffee when I happen to catch a Sunday morning TV commercial announcing that Fortunoff's would be holding a "Going Out of Business Liquidation Sale." What? Fortunoff's? Max and Clara Fortunoff's family-run empire where we could pick up a beautiful Menorah and

a box of Chanukah candles, shop for a stylish mezuzah, select a gold or silver chai necklace or a star of David charm, and even search and find fancy Passover sedar plates and haggadas? And those were just some of the Judaica-related items that reinforced their advertising slogan of being "the source." Fortunoff's, the store that filled our wedding registry, filled out bedroom linen closet; supplied our outdoor furniture and was the source of many baby gifts? How could they sink? How could they join that long and growing list?

So how many of these giants of Jewish retail names from the recent past do you remember shopping at? Alexander's (owned by the Farkas family); JW Mays (founded by Joe Weinstein who named his store for his favorite Spring month); EJ Korvette's (named for Eleven Jewish Korean Veteran's); Ohrbach's (founded by Nathan); S. Klein on the Square (founded on Union Square by Samuel in 1912); B. Altman's (The B stands for Benjamin)? And that's just a small number of Jewish-run retailers who along with Stern's, Gimbel Brothers and so many other retail giants have closed down. And what about the multitude of Jewish-owned Catskills resorts? The Parker Family's Concord Hotel, Jennie of Grossinger's fame, along with the hundreds of larger, middle-sized and small family run Catskill's hotels, bungalow colonies, summer camps and local businesses that have served the needs of our families for generations.

Unfortunately "going out of business" is not limited to those and other traditional businesses. As Temple Beth Israel proudly celebrated its 75th anniversary last year, I followed the news of the shuttering and merger of so many local synagogues throughout the New York metro area — including my childhood synagogue Israel Center of Hillcrest Manor in Flushing, Queens. It's also no surprise that so many synagogues have sold and become churches in our region.

Even on a much smaller scale, take a look at what's left of the Jewish Lower East Side in Manhattan where block after block was once filled with one Jewish-owned business after another. Sure today you can still pick up a pickle from Guss' (even though the address has changed), a knish from Yonah Shimmel's, a bialy from Kossar's and a challah or hamantaschen from Moishe's Bakery...but you'd better hurry. Because who knows how long even those delicious businesses will be around to feed us. And although I did read that liquidators will more than likely soon scoop up the brand name "Fortunoff" and probably use it on a catalog of various products in the future, it's still not the same as going into the family run store that you love to shop in and feeling like you're part of the family. No, it's just not the same. We'll miss Fortunoff's.

Book Review: The Rosendorf Quartet

This month's book review is written by our TBI Librarian, Tina Glassberg.

Winner of the both the 1992 National Jewish Book Award for fiction and Israel's Bialik Prize for Literature, *The Rosendorf Quartet* by Nathan Shaham is set in mid-1930s Palestine. It is composed of five distinct sections, written as diaries, one by each member of the quartet and the fifth by a writer who befriends the group and hopes to turn his observations of their interactions into a novel. What the reader is given is several different and distinct descriptions of the members of the quartet. Reality is a conglomerate composition of who these individuals are.

Literally, it is the story of five displaced German Jews forced to move to Palestine as life for each in Germany becomes intolerable. Although none of them is a Zionist, Palestine is the only choice each has. Once there, they are thrust into world totally alien to their natures, where they are forced to come to terms with life in a country where political turmoil and impending violence are the norm. This is totally foreign to their earlier lives, which had revolved about music, with little involvement in the politics of Germany. In addition, the orchestra they have joined is, in their eyes, far inferior to those in Germany. The quartet becomes their salvation. The need to adjust to the reality that the places where the quartet performs are often little more than the meeting halls of small agricultural settlements and that many of the audience seem to have little idea of what a "true" performance consists

is raising money to pay for a \$3 million "20,000 square foot indoor playground for the children of S'derot who are under constant threat of rocket attacks from the Gaza strip. This project [is] very important to the people of S'derot because the children who live there are not able to play outside freely, due to the dangers [posed by] the rockets." Besides recreational spaces, such as playgrounds, a basketball court, a rock climbing wall, games, a café, and a movie theater center, there are also much needed services available for the children, including a counseling center and a health clinic. The center is already up and running and \$50,000 has already been raised toward the costs.

Aviv's formal Jewish education has taken place in three institutions. In addition to studying at Temple Beth Israel, Aviv spent one year in Israel where he attended 5th grade in a public elementary school in Arad. He also studied for a year at Gahelet, a local program for Israeli children. Aviv is hoping to further his Jewish learning and connection to Israel through participation in the Prozdor High School of The Jewish Theological Seminary beginning this fall.

Aviv's parents and his younger brother, Yonatan, are very proud of Aviv's accomplishments and the beautiful job he has done preparing for his Bar Mitvah. They are looking forward to his "aliyah l'Torah" and to marking this joyous occasion at Temple Beth Israel. their wings but we wish we could hang on to them a little longer. We are looking forward to welcoming in our new toddlers and new families in other classes as well.



of is difficult for each of them and the group as a whole to accept.

Figuratively, each section shows how each individual uses the curative qualities of music to overcome their personal turmoil at being uprooted from their homeland, a country that has betrayed them. As they play the music, the individuals forget politics and their personal anguish and show that art transcends artificial national boundaries and conflict.

The Rosendorf Quartet is not necessarily an easy read. To fully comprehend the many complexities of the each of the protagonist's personalities, the book should be read in small bites and digested. After completing the book, the reader is left with insights into how traditional European culture combined with the Israeli pioneering social lifestyle that created the State of Israel. It can also be a quick read for those who want to read about several disparate individuals who, despite their differences, put all aside for the sake of their music.


