
To insure Rabbi Mishkin's and Tamara's successful transition and integration, Temple Beth Israel's officers, Board of Trustees and

From the Rabbi

As I write my first bulletin article, I am full of joy, excitement, and gratitude for the opportunity I have to be a part of your community and to lead it as your rabbi. I also have these feelings because of other wonderful events that are taking place in my life. Most notably, my fiancé, Tamara Noble, and I are planning to be married on August 30. While the wedding will take place in Dallas, we look forward to celebrating this simchah with you in Port Washington.



As I reflect on the past six months, I see some interesting parallels between my private and professional lives. A community finding the right rabbi and a rabbi finding the right community is very much like a shidduch — the coming together of two parties to form a deep connection and partnership. On both levels, there is a checklist. There are certain things that you know you are looking for. There are specific traits and values you hope to see. As a rabbi looking at synagogues, I wanted to make sure that my future community was multi-generational, egalitarian, vibrant, and engaged in supporting the activities of the community.

Knish Wish?

Celebrating the 100th Birthday of that Little 'Ol Potato Pie



What a way to celebrate the 100th birthday of our favorite knish. All those in favor of having a Friday night Shabbat dinner at TBI featuring an all-knish menu (potato, sweet potato, kasha, broccoli, cabbage, mushroom, vegetable) perhaps washed down with a variety of Dr. Brown's sodas (cream, black cherry, root beer, Cel-Ray) and egg creams raise your hand and email me at MarkASchn@optonline.net. Is there a better way to remember the century anniversary the 100th birthday of the Yonah Schimmel's Knishery?

Historians claim that the knish was created by Eastern European Jews. They wanted to add some innovation to

their basic inexpensive staple of potato. So they creatively wrapped dough around it. (Does the concept remind you of how the Japanese may have come up with sushi to creatively work with their staple of rice?) Anyway, a rabbi from Romania by the name of Yonah Schimmel started selling his knishes (potato and kasha) to New York immigrants on the beach in Coney Island. He also sold them in a pushcart on the Lower East Side before opening his store on Houston Street back in 1910.

My wife Barbara and I recently returned to the home of my favorite knish and learned that there's still a Schimmel family member running the business. A greatgrandson is still overseeing the recipe. The original store itself looks like it has been stopped in time. You can just imagine feeling that the old black and white photos on the wall were taken yesterday instead of decades ago. But of course, you go to Yonah Schimmel's place for one thing. The knish. The king of the potato pie. It's a tough menu choice — one can fill you up so if you can, and you're with a group, vary the choices so you can nosh on a variety. At only \$3.50 a piece, it makes an inexpensive meal. Rabbi Schimmel would be proud that his potato pie is still a staple of the Lower East Side, still freshly made in the back and below the store. There's even a dumbwaiter chute to bring the freshly baked knishes up from below. Of course Rabbi Schimmel never could have imagined that you could now even order his knishes over the Internet! But that's just not the same as experiencing dining at his original location with its entire delicious atmosphere. By the way, just like there's no substitute for an original New York freshly made bagel (sorry Lender's and all the other so-called bagel manufacturers) there's really no substitute for a good old fashioned Yonah Schimmel round knish. Yes, we can debate (perhaps in a future column) the merits of the Knish Nosh on Queens Boulevard. And we can spend some time addressing the so-called Coney Island square knishes made by Gabila — they're now made in Copiague Long Island and even sold in supermarkets! No, the four-star winner is sill Rabbi Schimmel's original — one hundred fresh years and still the knish champ by a mouthful.

professional staff have begun to plan and schedule a number of welcoming events to take place over the next weeks and months. These events are intended to welcome Rabbi Mishkin and Tamara to our Temple Beth Israel family and the Port Washington community. I urge you to keep an eye on your mail for all the details.

Recently, Jonathan White and I had the opportunity, together with Rabbi Miskhin, to attend a full day workshop on transition called Eit Ratzon, which was held at the Rabbinical Assembly's offices at The Jewish Theological Seminary. The purpose of the program was to deepen our understanding of the process of transition, create a model for successful transition and be reflective and purposeful about the months ahead. The three of us found the program to be extremely informative.

In the materials that were handed out at the workshop, an article written by Rabbi Eliot Schoenberg entitled *Parnasah: Finding It. Keeping It, Enjoying It* explored what rabbis and congregations can learn and expect from the phenomenon of a new rabbi's first 100 days in comparison to that of a new U.S. president taking office.

According to Rabbi Schoenberg, a new president must rush to action, as citizens are looking for quick achievements and not necessarily establishing a healthy process or strong relationships. This is just the opposite for a new rabbi, as the rabbi must build a process and the key relationships that will permit him to have a long and successful tenure. A new president can also focus his attention on certain issues while leaving others on the back burner. A new rabbi does not have this luxury, as the rabbi must focus on many issues and different constituencies simultaneously when he starts his new position. Finally, a new president can find that despite his best efforts, new programs and plans can be derailed. our community or our customs? Communities answer these questions through their actions. And how a community acts when new quests arrive says a lot about the character of that community. The way you have welcomed Tamara and me has impressed us. Thank you for welcoming us with open arms and open hearts.

In our tradition, the exemplars of this mitzvah are Abraham and Sarah. Famously, they lived in a tent, which was open on all sides in order to be able to see travelers coming from all directions. In one of the stories in the book of Genesis, Abraham and Sarah burst into action, welcoming three guests into their home (the guests turned out to be angels). Welcoming in guests, feeding them, and allowing them to rest are all acts of chesed (loving kindness). Through their actions, Abraham and Sarah teach us that these acts of chesed are some of the most important that we can do. We shower guests — even strangers — with chesed because they are human beings, created in the image of God.

I valued the chesed I have seen in the TBI community. I know that I will be nourished by it, and I look forward to adding to it. May we, together, go from strength to strength.

I would like to take a moment and give a special thank you to Jonathan White, Jay Silverman, Mitch Schuckman, Cantor Baruch Blum, Rabbi Robert Fine, and Lisa Naiburg for their support during the interview process and for their personal acts of hachnasat orchim.



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
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
