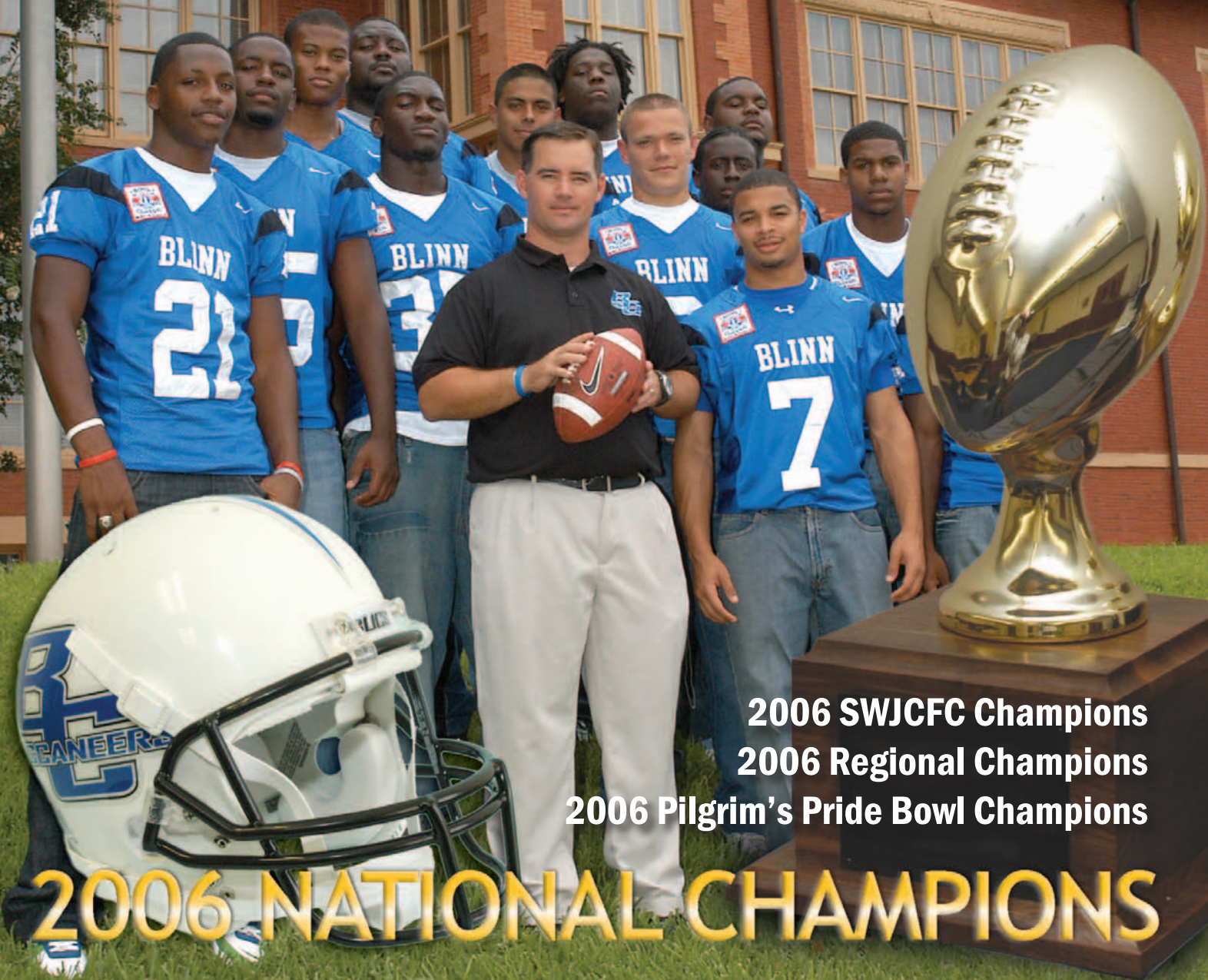

Blinn College History

Blinn College was founded in 1883 as Mission Institute, a private coeducational institution operated by the Southern German Conference of the Methodist Church. In 1889 the name was changed to Blinn Memorial College in honor of the Rev. Christian Blinn of New York who donated a large sum of money to the institution.

In 1927 the school was organized into a junior college, and two years later it merged with Southwestern University in Georgetown. This association lasted until 1935, when it was organized as a private non-denominational junior college. In 1937 a junior college district was created in Washington County by election, and Blinn became the first county-owned junior college in Texas.

A request to assist in meeting the educational needs of Brazos County was answered by Blinn in 1970 when it opened its first campus there in Bryan. A con-

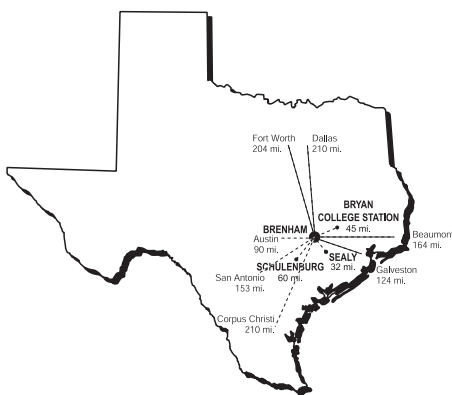

tinued growth in enrollment led to development of a campus in College Station in 1982 and the Blinn College Occupational Education Center in Bryan in 1991. In the spring of 1997 a new 120,000-square-foot consolidated campus was opened in Bryan. A major expansion on that campus was completed in 2000 and another was completed in 2003.

In the fall of 1997 a new campus was opened in Schulenburg, located in southern Fayette County. The college opened its fourth location in Sealy, in Austin County, in January 2005.

With an enrollment of more than 14,000 students, Blinn is the 10th largest of the state's 50 community college districts.

2007 Season: Time for Buccaneers to step up

How does the coach of a defending national champion prepare for the upcoming season? He looks to his team, his staff and himself and says, "It's time to step up."

National Football Foundation Two-Year College Coach of the Year Brad Franchione knows that what his team did last year – a perfect 12-0 season on the way to the National Junior College Athletic Association title – is in the past.

"Players and coaches will have to step up in order for us to continue the success that we have established," said the third-year head coach who is 19-3 at the helm for the Buccaneers. "Our theme in 2005 and 2006 was "Play Hard, Play Smart, Play Together," and we'll never deviate from that."

Blinn lost 20 starters from last season, among the 30 players who signed with four-year programs.

"You hope some of the leadership and athletic ability from last season can carry over," says Franchione. "But with only one returning starter from last year you can see why we say, "It's time to step up."

Franchione says that applies to three key points.

1. "We have only one returning starter but we have many players who had playing time last season. They will have to step up into the role of starters. We will see who is mentally ready and physically capable to do that."
2. "Time is of the essence. It's the only thing that is standard for everyone else on our schedule. In the time that we have to prepare, our coaches will have to evaluate and decide who can step up."
3. "We have some new faces – not only on the team but also on the coaching staff. It is important for all newcomers to understand their role in the success of the program and how they can add value to it."

While he says last year's title has no relevance to this season, Franchione believes it will have relevance to the Bucs' opponents.

"We have no more surprises for them," he says. "We will expect to see everyone's best game when they play us – hence, another reason to step up our game."

OFFENSE

Blinn lost some outstanding players on offense from the 2006 squad, including All-American running back Bernard

Scott. Coach Lloyd Spotted Wolf, who coached the offensive line last season, takes on the additional role as coordinator. To rebuild the offense, he will look to the positions where he has the most experience.

Receivers

The only starter returning from the championship team is a wide receiver.

New receivers coach Tony Haynes, who will also coach the quarterbacks, will have the experience of **Blake Kelley** (5-11, 186, Beaumont West Brook), who started every game in 2006. He will be bolstered by sophomore **E.J. LeBlanc** (5-7, 162, Beaumont West Brook) and a solid class of red-shirt freshmen in **Justin Jordan** (5-10, 181, Plano), **Justin Rideau** (6-2, 190, Beaumont Ozen), **Kierrie Johnson** (5-9, 168, Houston Westfield) and **Rod Harris** (6-1, 193, Bryan). **Kevin Ferguson** (6-2, 205, Fort Bend Kempner), who last played for the Bucs in 2005 and started every game, is back vying for a spot as is **Doug Pierce** (6-5, 190, Arp), a transfer from Tabor College in Kansas.

Coach Gabriel Burks will assist Coach Haynes with the receivers.

Quarterbacks

Coach Haynes has only one returner with any quarterbacking experience, **Terrance Cain** (5-11, 188, North Shore), who was the scout team quarterback last year.

"He has proven leadership qualities and is solid in all aspects," says Franchione. "He can run and he can pass."

Terrance Kirk (6-2, 220, Alief Elsik), a big, tall thrower, and two freshmen will all have a chance to compete. **Cotton Turner** (6-1, 190, Sugar Land Dulles) was the second leading passer in Texas high schools in 2006. **Clay Sears** (6-2, 200 Fredericksburg) also gives the coaches something to look at.

Running Backs

Coach Matt Richardson has a nucleus of talent in returner **Jason**

Barnes (5-7, 212, Leander), a great one-cut runner who seldom loses yardage, and **Zach Booker** (5-11, 193, Spring), a transfer from Foothill College in California. Two freshmen also have strong chances. **Joshua Lewis** (5-8, 186, Cypress Springs) is a slasher who is a receiving threat out of the backfield and **Reginald Brown** (5-10, 200, Humble) is a great inside runner.

BUCCANEER FOOTBALL

Offensive Line

Coach Spotted Wolf will have two returners who should emerge as the leaders on the line. **Herman Hall** (6-1, 307, Fort Bend Bush) will anchor at center and **Quintin Johnson** (6-4, 333, Port Arthur Memorial) will be at left guard.

Red-shirt sophomore **Tim Keyes** (6-1, 320, Houston Washington) will bring some experience, while a crop of red-shirt freshmen should step in quickly. **Mase Duge** (6-2, 275, Brenham), a transfer from Fort Hays State in Kansas, **Lance Williams** (5-11, 286, North Shore) and **Tony Malfer** (6-1, 211, Tomball) will bring experience to the team.

The class of true freshmen will have to produce some starters, so the coaching staff will look strongly at **Marquis Franklin** (6-6, 315, Tyler John Tyler), **Brian Krauskopf** (6-3, 280, Santa Fe) and **Greg Bulls** (6-3, 300, Lubbock Monterey). The others are **Darrell Billiot** (6-3, 310, Texas City), **Dalvin Brown** (6-2, 350, Temple), **Alan Reitzell** (6-0, 330, Fort Bend Marshall), **Logan Smith** (6-4, 318, Lubbock Monterey) and **Tito Sanchez** (5-9, 261, Copperas Cove), who will all have a chance to earn a job.

Tight Ends

Lone returner **Samer Elqutub** (6-1, 234, Katy Cinco Ranch) will bring the experience, while newcomers **Prizell Brown** (6-4, 225, Pflugerville Connally), **Lawrence Jamison** (6-3, 260, Texas City) and **Terrance Hunt** (6-2, 218, La Grange) bring prospective talent.

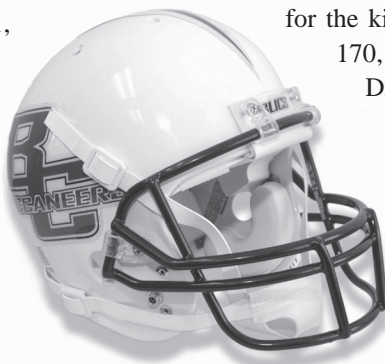
DEFENSE

The best defense in the nation last year returns several players with experience who will have to step up into starting roles.

Defensive Line

Coach Keith Browning moves from running backs to defensive line this year and has five returning players with game experience. Returning are 2005 sack leader **Emmanuel Stephens** (6-2, 207, Houston Waltrip), tackle **Terrance Flagg** (6-1, 285, Bay City), speedy nose guard **Michael Rhines** (6-1, 232, Little Cypress-Mauriceville) and expected breakout player **Clinton Leal** (6-5, 213, Kingwood), who all saw game action last year and will be relied on to step up this season.

Red-shirt freshmen **Rodney Gooden** (6-1, 256, Cypress Springs), **Brandon Lee** (6-2, 251, Richardson Berkner) and **Jarred Price** (5-10, 204, Dallas Madison) are a solid group of talent.



Coaches will also be watching the progress of several freshmen -- **Sean Warren** (6-0, 300, Texas City), **Nirada Clay** (5-10, 230, Jersey Village), **Stedmann Coleman** (6-2, 260, Cypress Falls) and **Travis Stephens** (6-2, 230, Jersey Village).

Linebackers

Coach Franchione will have four returners who saw time last year -- **Sterling Lewis** (5-11, 231, Copperas Cove), **Prentice Joseph** (5-11, 228, Houston Dobie), **Gary Ragston** (5-10, 195, Brenham) and **Chris Oguayo** (5-11, 231, Pflugerville Connally).

There is also great speed and talent coming in with the freshmen class -- **Vernon Brooks** (5-11, 210, Texas City), **C.J. Parrish** (6-1, 230, College Station A&M Consolidated), **Eric Banks** (5-11, 196, Round Rock) and **Logan Johnson** (6-1, 197, Seguin).

Secondary

New secondary coaches Todd Smith and Sterling Rogers will have two returning players who will be expected to become leaders quickly -- **Danny Jackson** (6-0, 189, Beaumont Central) and **Freddy Williams** (5-11, 208, Caldwell). Players coming in with spring practice under their belts are **Husani Sallah** (5-8, 175, Houston Worthing), a transfer from Texas A&M; **Paul Stephens** (5-8, 160, Fort Bend Hightower), a 2005 Junior College All American who transferred from Rochester College and sat out last season; **Cedric Pierce** (5-10, 175, Spring) and **Bryant Nnabuife** (6-1, 186, Fort Bend Elkins).

Talented and gifted freshmen add to the pool, including Georgia state high school champion triple jumper **Corey West** (6-4, 190, Brooks County), **Nathan Marshall** (5-10, 183, Austin Travis), **Derek McDonough** (5-11, 195, Klein), **Darryl Cole** (6-1, 170, Fort Bend Marshall) and **T.J. Jennings** (6-1, 180, Beaumont Central).

SPECIAL TEAMS

The Buccaneers' special teams bring back kicker and NJCAA preseason All-American **Luis Leal** (5-11, 198, Houston Scarborough) and deep snapper **Zach Taylor** (6-4, 187, Austin Westlake). Freshman **Shane Faulkenberry** (6-2, 250, Crandall) is also a deep snapper. Freshmen vying for the kicking and punting jobs are **Brad Hicks** (6-1, 170, Magnolia) and **Mark Sprague** (6-2, 195, Dickinson).

Brad Franchione Head Coach

Head coach Brad Franchione begins his third year directing the Buccaneer program, his 12th in college football. His foundation in the game has been built with input by his well-known father, Dennis Franchione, head coach at Texas A&M University, but his coaching philosophy and approach to the game have been constructed by his own experience in college programs ranging from junior college to NCAA Division I.

His last station before being named head coach of the Buccaneers in January 2005 was as the defensive line coach at Texas A&M University - Commerce. In his one season with the Lions he also served as the program's academic coordinator, travel coordinator and video coordinator. His recruit-



ing assignment was central Texas and Kansas junior colleges, including Blinn. Additional coaching experience has come at Bacone College in Muskogee, Okla. (2003-2004), the University of Tennessee - Martin (2002), the University of West Alabama in Livingston (2001-2002), East Central University in Ada, Okla. (1999-2001) and Fort Scott Community College in Fort Scott, Kansas (1998). While in college he was a graduate assistant with the offense from 1996-1998 at Arkansas State University and a student coach assisting with the secondary at the University of New Mexico (1992-1996).

At Bacone College he was an associate head coach and defensive coordinator while also serving as the recruiting coordinator, helping lead the Warriors to a second-place finish in the Central States Intercollegiate Football Conference. At Tennessee - Martin he was an assistant coach working with the

linebackers and the coordinating recruiting. He was also the kickoff team coach. For the Tigers of West Alabama he was an assistant coach working with the linebackers. He was also punt and kickoff teams coach. While an assistant at East Central he was the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator for the Tigers, helping lead the 2000 team to its first winning season since 1983. He also served as the team's academic coordinator and the special teams coordinator. His duties as an assistant at Fort Scott included working with the quarterbacks as well as the punt team and serving as video coordinator.

Franchione was born in Miller, Mo., graduated from Pittsburg (Kansas) High School, earned his bachelor's degree in physical education at the University of New Mexico in 1996 and his master of science degree in education at Arkansas State University in 1998.

He and his wife, Rebecca, have a son, Wyatt, who is 3 and a daughter, 18-month-old Isabella. His hobbies include golf, racquetball, weight training and computers.



Lloyd Spotted Wolf

Offensive Coordinator

Offensive Line

Coach Lloyd Spotted Wolf joined the Blinn staff in 2006 to head up the offensive line and this season rises to offensive coordinator.



His experience includes Division I, II and III, as well as high school programs. Before joining the Buccaneer staff, Spotted Wolf was the assistant head coach at NCAA D-II Oklahoma Panhandle State University, where he had two linemen earn All-IFA honors. In addition to his offensive line duties, he was also the recruiting coordinator, and a health, physical education and recreation instructor.

For the 2003-2004 seasons, Spotted

Wolf returned to his high school alma mater, La Cueva High School in Albuquerque, N.M., as an assistant. During his two-year stint, La Cueva won back-to-back 5A state football championships, amassing a 26-0 record. He was also a full-time English teacher.

Spotted Wolf was the offensive line coach/special teams coordinator for NCAA D-III University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, which won the WIAC championship in 2001.

The Blugolds attained a No. 11 national ranking, and Spotted Wolf coached two all-conference linemen, one all-region selection, and one All-American offensive lineman. He was also an assistant men's and women's track and field coach, and a kinesiology lecturer.

Spotted Wolf spent three years on Rocky Long's staff at the University of New Mexico (Division IA), working with the offensive line. He worked with two

Hula Bowl selections (place kicker and deep snapper) who both continued on to the NFL, as well as two all-conference linemen and two linemen who eventually went on to the NFL.

He has also coached at NCAA D-II Adams State College, Del Norte (Colo.) High School and Zuni (N.M.) High School.

He has a bachelor of science degree from Adams State College, with a double major in English and exercise physiology, and a master's degree in sports administration from the University of New Mexico. He was a four-year letterman and three-year starter on the offensive line for the NCAA D-II Grizzlies. He was named Academic-All Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference.

Spotted Wolf is a member of the American Football Coaches Association.

He is single.

Keith Browning

Defensive Line

Coach Keith Browning moves from running backs coach to defensive line coach in his third season on Coach Brad Franchione's Buccaneer staff.



Prior to coming to Blinn, he spent two years (2002-2004) as a graduate assistant coaching the defensive line at Howard Payne University.

He holds a bachelor of science degree in business administration with a minor in marketing management from Howard Payne. A four-year letterman for the Yellow Jackets, Browning was a first-team all-American Southwest Conference selection and was named Defensive Lineman of the Year in the conference.

Browning has experience in multiple areas in the Buc system. In 2005, his first year with the Bucs, he coached the offensive line and tight ends. Last year he coached the tight ends and running backs, including all-American running back Bernard Scott.

The Houston native is a graduate of South Houston High School. He is single.

Tony Haynes

Quarterbacks/Receivers

Coach Tony Haynes, who comes to the Buccaneers from Valdosta State University in Georgia, will coach the quarterbacks and wide receivers.



Haynes, a native of Lakeland, Fla., played wide receiver and quarterback at Webber International University in Babson Park, Fla. In 2004, he was hired on there as the Warriors' quarterbacks coach.

The last two-and-half years he coached at Valdosta where he worked with the offensive line and wide receivers.

Haynes also coached quarterbacks at the high school level at Santa Fe High School in Lakeland.

Matt Richardson

Running Backs

Coach Matt Richardson is in his second season with Coach Brad Franchione and the Buccaneer and moves from linebackers coach to running backs coach.



Prior to coming to Blinn, Richardson spent two years (2002-2004) as a student manager

working with the offensive line and running backs for the Arkansas Razorbacks.

He holds a bachelor of science degree in kinesiology from the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville.

He and his wife, Jennifer, have been married for three years. Their family includes, their parents James and Glenda Richardson and John and Vicky Stevens, brothers Jeff Richardson, Zach Stevens, Ryan Richardson, sister-in-law Adrienne and nieces Kayleigh and Gigi, and Kris Richardson, sister-in-law Kourtney and nephew Tracker.



Todd Smith

Secondary

Coach Todd Smith joins the Buccaneer football staff in 2007 and will coach the secondary and defensive backs.



Smith comes to Blinn from his last coaching job at Menlo College in Atherton, Calif., where he was the defensive coordinator and linebackers. Prior to that he spent a year as defensive backs coach and physical education instructor at Sierra College in Rocklin, Calif. He also spent three years as an instructor and defensive coordinator/defensive backs coach at his alma mater Gavilan College in Gilroy, Calif.

The native of San Jose, Calif., played defensive back for two years at Gavilan before walking on at San Jose State. He has a bachelor of business administration degree and a master's degree in kinesiology from San Jose State.

While serving as defensive coordinator at Gavilan, the Rams had the No. 1 ranked overall defense in the country in 2004. Gavilan was the 2003 Coast Conference champion and had consecutive bowl appearances in 2003 and 2004.

During his time at Sierra College, the Wolverines reached a 37-game win streak and had their fourth consecutive bowl win.

While at Menlo College, Coach Smith's Oaks defense registered a school record 10 consecutive scoreless quarters to open the 2006 season. His defense that season produced five all-conference players, two all-American candidates and three honorable mentions.

Gabriel Burks

Receivers

Coach Gabriel Burks joined the Buccaneer staff in the spring in his first coaching position and will work with the receivers.



The graduate of Jack Yates High School in Houston was an all-district selection in football and baseball. He returns to Blinn where he was a wide receiver on the 1995 squad. He moved on to Howard Payne University where he also played wide receiver. He then spent three years playing semi-pro football for the Houston Wolverines.

Burks has a bachelor's degree in management from the University of Phoenix.

He and his wife Miyosha have five children.

Sterling Rogers

Secondary

Coach Sterling Rogers is in his first year of the Buccaneer staff and will work with the defensive secondary.



He is a Houston native who graduated from Cypress Falls High School, where he was a second team all-state selection in 1998. He was a two-time

All-Southland Conference selection in 2000 and 2001 at Texas State University (formerly Southwest Texas State) where he was also named Freshman of the Year in 1998.

Rogers has a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Texas State.

David Rehr

Athletic Director



Blinn College head volleyball coach David Rehr was named the new athletic director for the college on June 15, 2007.

Coach Rehr is the first athletic director since Leroy Dreyer to serve in the position while continuing his duties as a head coach. He has been the volleyball coach at

Blinn four years where he has a record of 146-18, with four trips to the National Junior College Athletic Association championship tournament. His teams were named NJCAA All Academic teams in 2004, 2005 and 2006. He was interim athletic director from May to July 2005.

The 2006 national tournament appearance was actually Rehr's fifth consecutive trip there. In 2002, his team at Frank Phillips College in Borger took him there for the first time. He was the head trainer at Frank Phillips when the program lost its head coach. He was offered the head coaching job and in his first season the team struggled with a 1 and 10 start, but ended it by winning 18 out of its last 24 games. The next two seasons Coach Rehr's teams were 30-6 and 31-8 and made it to the National Junior College Athletic Association championship tournament in 2002. The Lady Plainsmen were named an NJCAA All Academic Team all three seasons under Coach Rehr.

In his inaugural season at Blinn, his team went 43-2; in 2004 the Bucs went 35-7; in 2005 they were 34-5; and last year his team was 34-4 and finished fifth at the national tournament, the highest finish ever for the program.

Coach Rehr's move to Brenham also put him closer to family. His mother and father, Susan and John, live in Houston. He and the former Felicia Rae Robles were married in December 2005.

The native of Tampa, Fla., graduated from Satellite High School and then attended Brevard Community College in Melbourne, Fla., where he was a student assistant with the volleyball program. After graduating from Brevard he went on to earn his bachelor of science degree in wellness and a master of arts degree in physical education from the University of South Florida in Tampa.

His hobbies include sports and reading.
