The Bobcats defeated Ohio State (78-67) in Columbus, Virginia (94-83) in Charlottesville, and both George Washington (82-76) and New Mexico State, 84-80 in overtime, at Madison Square Garden. The four wins propelled Ohio to a No. 14 national ranking and helped fuel the national prominence of forward Gary Trent, who declared early for the NBA Draft at the end of the season. Trent was named Tournament MVP for his 103 points in four games, an average of 25.8 ppg. He peaked with 33 points in the title game vs. the Aggies.







MAC HALL OF FAME

The Mid-American Conference Hall-of-Fame was approved by the MAC Council of Presidents at their meeting on December 2, 1987. The charter class was inducted into the MAC Hall of Fame in 1988 and subsequent classes were added in 1989, 1990, 1991, 1992 and 1994.

The MAC was the first Division 1 conference to organize a Hall of Fame. Each of the schools nominates a list of individuals to be considered for induction. The nominated individuals must have participated during the time the university was in the MAC and five years must have passed from the time the individual participated in athletics or worked in the athletic department at his or her university or upon retirement from the institution. The individual is not required to be a MAC graduate, but must have worked or attended a MAC university.

With a seven-person selection committee, the nominee must receive at least five affirmative votes to be selected for induction. The selection committee consists of former MAC administrators in addition to long-standing members of the media.


In considering an individual's qualifications, the committee will consider contributions that the individual made during his or her time at the institution as well as the positive publicity and goodwill that the individual has brought to the university since leaving.

THE MAC MEDIA HALL OF FAME

Nine media members were inducted as the charter members of the MAC's Media Hall of Fame on Monday, May 20, 1996.

The MAC News Media Association co-ordinated selection to the MAC Media Hall of Fame. The criteria for selection are 30-plus years of active coverage, either as a newspaper beat reporter/columnist or as a play-by-play announcer or color commentator.

AKRON - JAMES A. RHODES ARENA

From the North - I-77 south to Grant Street/Wolf Ledges exit; turn left at first light (Wolf Ledges); go about one mile. Road will go under a bridge and curve sharply to right (at this point it becomes Carroll Street), then proceed to campus. (2) Ohio Turnpike (I-80/90) to Exit 12 (Route 8); go south on Route 8 approximately 12 miles to Buchtel/Carroll exit. Turn left at the stop light. The second traffic light is the Carroll Street/Spicer Street intersection. Rhodes Arena is directly in front of you. Gameday media parking is in Lot 8 at this intersection.

From the South - I-77 north to Route 8 north; exit at Buchtel/Carroll exit. Go straight through traffic light. Turn right on Carroll Street at the next traffic light. Rhodes Arena is directly in front of you. Gameday media parking is in Lot 8 at this intersection (Carroll Street/Spicer Street).

From the East - I-76 west to Route 8 north (at central interchange); exit at Buchtel/Carroll exit; turn left on either Buchtel Avenue or Carroll Street. The second traffic light is the Carroll Street/Spicer Street intersection. Rhodes Arena is directly in front of you. Gameday media parking is in Lot 8 at this intersection.

From the West - I-76 east to Grant Street/Wolf Ledges exit; turn left at light (Wolf Ledges); go about one mile. Road will go under a bridge and curve sharply to right (at this point it becomes Carroll Street), then proceed to campus. (2) Ohio Turnpike (I-80/90) to Exit 12 (Route 8); go south on Route 8 approximately 12 miles to Buchtel/Carroll exit. Turn left at the stop light. The second traffic light is the Carroll Street/Spicer Street intersection. Rhodes Arena is directly in front of you. Gameday media parking is in Lot 8 at this intersection.

BALL STATE - JOHN E. WORTHEN ARENA

From the North - I-69 south to Muncie exit 332 east; turn right at Tillotson (football stadium); turn left at Bethel Avenue (first stoplight); turn right onto McKinley (first stoplight), and proceed to campus.

From the South - I-69 north to Muncie exit 332 east; turn right at Tillotson (football stadium); turn left at Bethel Avenue (first stoplight); turn right onto McKinley (first stoplight), and proceed to campus.

From the East - I-70 west to State Road 35 north to 3/35/67 Bypass around Muncie; go north on bypass to McGalliard Avenue and turn left; turn left at Tillotson; then follow directions above (A).

From the West - I-74 east to 465 north to I-69 north; take I-69 to Exit 332 (Muncie); turn right at Tillotson (football stadium); turn left at Bethel Avenue (first stoplight); turn right onto McKinley (first stoplight), and proceed to campus.

BOWLING GREEN - ANDERSON ARENA

From the North - I-75 south to Exit 181; turn right and proceed to campus. Go west on Wooster Street. Go to the second traffic light (Mercer Road) and turn right. Go to Ridge Street and turn left. The arena and parking lot will be about one-half mile down on left side.

From the South - I-75 north to Exit 181; turn left and proceed to campus. Go west on Wooster Street. Go to the second traffic light (Mercer Road) and turn right. Go to Ridge Street and turn left. The arena and parking lot will be about one-half mile down on left side.

From the East - Ohio Turnpike (I-80/90) to I-75 south (exit 4A-Perrysburg). Take I-75 south to Exit 181; turn right and proceed to campus. Go west on Wooster Street. Go to the second traffic light (Mercer Road) and turn right. Go to Ridge Street and turn left. The arena and parking lot will be about one-half mile down on left side.

From the West - Ohio Turnpike (I-80/90) to I-75 south (Exit 4A-Perrysburg). Take I-75 south to Exit 181; turn right and proceed to campus. Go west on Wooster Street. Go to the second traffic light (Mercer Road) and turn right. Go to Ridge Street and turn left. The arena and parking lot will be about one-half mile down on left side.

BUFFALO - ALUMNI ARENA

From the West - Take the I-90 East until you reach the I-290 (past the Buffalo airport exit). Take the I-290 West (sign is for Niagara Falls) and proceed until Exit 5B (Millersport Highway, Rte. 263). Get off exit and merge into traffic. Go through first light (Marriott is on your left) but move into right lane. Enter campus at the Flint Street exit and follow signs to athletic events.

From the East - Take the I-90 West until you reach the I-290 (just past tolls, follow State University signs). Take the I-290 West (sign is for Niagara Falls) and proceed until Exit 5B (Millersport Highway, Rte. 263). Get off exit and merge into traffic. Go through first light (Marriott is on your left) but move into right lane. Enter campus at the Flint Street exit and follow signs to athletic events.

From the South - Take I-79 North until you get to Erie, PA. Take the I-90 East until you reach the I-290 (past the Buffalo airport exit). Take the I-290 West (sign is for Niagara Falls) and proceed until Exit 5B (Millersport Highway, Rte. 263). Get off exit and merge into traffic. Go through first light (Marriott is on your left) but move into right lane. Enter campus at the Flint Street exit and follow signs to athletic events.

From the North - Take the QEW to the Queenston/Lewiston Bridge. Once across bridge, get on I-190 South. Follow I-190 South until you reach the I-290 East and proceed until Exit 5B (Millersport Highway, Rte. 263). Get off exit and merge into traffic. Go through first light (Marriott is on your left) but move into right lane. Enter campus at the Flint Street exit and follow signs to athletic events.

CENTRAL MICHIGAN - ROSE ARENA

From the North - U.S. 27 to the first Mt. Pleasant exit. This will exit to the right and become Mission Street on the north side of Mt. Pleasant. Take Mission all the way south with the CMU campus on the right (west) side of Mission starting at the corner of Bellows and Mission. Turn right onto Broomfield Road. Football, basketball, softball, indoor track and outdoor track venues are on the left

From the South - U.S. 27 to the first Mt. Pleasant exit. This will exit to the left and become a two-lane road that goes right into campus and the town. CMU will be on the left (west) side.

From the East - I-75 to M-57 or M-46. Then take U.S. 27 to the first Mt. Pleasant exit. This will exit to the right and become Mission Street on the north side of Mt. Pleasant. Take Mission all the way south with the CMU campus on the right (west) side of Mission starting at the corner of Bellows and Mission.

From the West - M-46 to U.S. 27 to the first Mt. Pleasant exit. This will exit to the left and become a two-lane road that goes right into campus and the town. CMU will be on the left (west) side.

EASTERN MICHIGAN - CONVOCATION CENTER

From the North/South - U.S. 23 to Washtenaw Avenue (exit 37); head east on Washtenaw to Oakwood; turn left on Oakwood and proceed to campus.

From the East - I-94 west to Huron Street (exit 93); head north on Huron Street to Cross Street; turn left at Cross to Oakwood; turn right at Oakwood and proceed to campus.

From the West - I-94 east to U.S. 23 north; exit U.S. 23 at Washtenaw Avenue (exit 37); head east on Washtenaw to Oakwood; turn left on Oakwood and proceed to campus.

MAC ARENA DIRECTIONS

KENT STATE - M.A.C. CENTER

From I-76 - take the Kent (Route 43) exit and proceed north to Route 261; turn right (east) onto Route 261. Proceed 1/4 mile to Campus Center Drive; turn left and proceed to campus.

From I-80 - take the Streetsboro exit (#13). After the toll booth, proceed straight (follow the Ravenna sign) onto Route 14 (southeast) past Route 303 to Route 43; turn right (south) on Route 43 and continue for approximately six miles until you come to the traffic light at Main Street; follow Main to the fifth traffic light; turn right (south) onto Lincoln Street; proceed on Lincoln Street to the first traffic light; turn left and proceed on Summit Street to the second traffic light; turn left at the light and proceed to campus.

From I-90 - proceed toward Cleveland. Take I-271 south to I-480 east; stay on I-480 until it becomes Route 14 in Streetsboro. Turn right (south) on Route 43 and continue south for approximately six miles until you come to the traffic light at Main Street, then follow directions above; follow Main to the fifth traffic light; turn right (south) onto Lincoln Street; proceed on Lincoln Street to the first traffic light; turn left and proceed on Summit Street to the second traffic light; turn left at the light and proceed to campus.

MIAMI - MILLETT HALL

From the North - I-75 south to I-70 west to State Route 127 south (Eaton-Hueston Woods exit); turn left; follow State Route 127 through Eaton and Camden to State Route 73; turn right, and proceed to Oxford.

From the South - I-75 north to I-275 north (take the airport exit which goes off to the left); follow signs for Indianapolis/Cincinnati (I-275 splits and becomes I-74/Indianapolis and I-275/Cincinnati-Dayton); follow I-275 east towards Dayton; take Colerain Avenue exit and turn left. This is State Route 27 north, proceed towards Oxford.

From I-70 Going East - Take the State Route 27 south exit in Richmond, Indiana; proceed through Richmond and Liberty, Indiana, to Oxford.

From I-70 Going West - Continue west to State Route 127 south; follow State Route 127 through Eaton and Camden to State Route 73; turn right, and proceed to Oxford.

NORTHERN ILLINOIS - CONVOCATION CENTER

From the North or West - Take I-39 south to Route 38 (exit #99); take Route 38 east 14 miles to DeKalb; turn left at Annie Glidden Road and proceed half a mile to campus.

From the South - Take I-39 north to Route 38 (exit #99); take Route 38 east 14 miles to DeKalb; turn left at Annie Glidden Road and proceed half a mile to campus.

From the East - Take I-290 or 294 to I-88; take I-88 west to Annie Glidden Road (exit #107); go north on Annie.

OHIO - CONVOCATION CENTER

From the Northeast - I-77 south to State Route 7 (exit #1 - Marietta) to U.S. 50 west to Athens; follow U.S. 50/State Route 32 west to State Route 682 north (sign denotes Ohio University); exit 682 north; turn right at first traffic light (Richland Avenue), and proceed to campus.

From the Northwest - U.S. 23 south to I-270 east to U.S. 33 east (Lancaster exit) to Athens; exit the second State Route 682 north exit (marked Ohio University this exit); follow 682 north; then follow directions above; turn right at first traffic light (Richland Avenue), and proceed to campus.

From the West - Follow State Route 32 east (Appalachian Highway); State Route 32 merges with U.S. 50; follow 32/50 to Athens; exit State Route 682 north; turn right at first traffic light (Richland Avenue), and proceed to campus.

TOLEDO - JOHN F. SAVAGE HALL

From the North - (1) I-75 to I-475 west; exit at Douglas Rd.; south (left) on Douglas Rd., crossing Monroe St., Central Ave., Kenwood and University Hills Blvd.; enter campus via Oakwood Ave. and proceed to the first stop sign, where attendants will direct you to the parking lot; or (2) Rt. 23 to I-475 east; exit at Secor Rd.; south (right) on Secor Rd. to Bancroft Street; left on Bancroft one-half mile to campus main entrance on the right.

From the East - Ohio Turnpike to Exit 4A; I-75 north to I-475 west; exit at Douglas Rd.; south (left) on Douglas Rd., crossing Monroe St., Central Ave. and Kenwood Blvd.; right on University Hills Blvd., which leads to the main entrance to campus.

From the South - I-75 to I-475 west; exit at Douglas Rd.; south (left) on Douglas Rd., crossing Monroe St., Central Ave. and Kenwood Blvd.; right on University Hills Blvd., which leads to the main entrance to campus.

From the West - Ohio Turnpike to Exit 59; Reynolds Rd. north to Bancroft St.; east (right) on Bancroft St. three miles to campus main entrance on the right.

WESTERN MICHIGAN - UNIVERSITY ARENA

From I-94 - Exit at Oakland Drive and proceed north. Go through a stoplight at Howard Street and continue one mile until coming to Oliver Street on your left. Turn left onto Oliver and follow down to the Stadium Drive stoplight. Go through the stoplight. Read Fieldhouse, which houses the arena, is directly in front. Media parking is in Lot 14, at the south end of the building.

From U.S. 131 - At exit #36, turn east onto Stadium Drive, go 2.6 miles; turn left onto Oliver Street. Read Fieldhouse, which houses the arena, is directly in front. Media parking is in Lot 14, at the south end of the building.

From M-43 West of Kalamazoo - Go easterly past U.S. 131; after 1.7 miles, turn right onto Solon Street; follow Solon into Howard Street and go 1.1 miles to Stadium Drive; turn left and proceed easterly 1/2 mile to Oliver Street; follow directions above for exiting from U.S. 131 (B).

From M-43 North of Kalamazoo - Turn left off M-43 (Gull Road) in Kalamazoo onto Riverview Drive; go under the railroad overpass and bear right onto Michigan Avenue. Continue westerly on Michigan Avenue for 1/2 mile; it then becomes Kalamazoo Avenue, which is one-way westbound. After 1.4 miles, bear left and go 0.3 miles; cross Main Street and rejoin Michigan Avenue; proceed westerly on Michigan Avenue to campus.

From Downtown Kalamazoo - Go westerly on Kalamazoo Avenue as in above directions OR go westerly on Lovell Street, then turn left onto Michigan Avenue and proceed to the campus.
