Eleroy and Waddams Grove Schools

Both the Eleroy and Waddams Grove buildings were built from the same plan and each one has two well lighted classrooms, boys' and girls' toilet rooms, kitchen, boiler room, and an all purpose room forty-four feet long and twenty-six feet wide. The total floor space of each building is 3500 square feet.

Water is supplied by a pressure system using wells on the school grounds. Both hot and cold water are available. Sewage disposal is through septic tanks and drainage fields.

Heating is by a thermostatically controlled hot water system using an oil fired boiler.

The Eleroy Building is located on a plot of two acres. At Waddams Grove the school ground of one and seven-tenths acres adjoins Schudt Park which is available for school use.

Each of the buildings has a capacity of sixty pupils, thirty in each of the two classrooms. The Eleroy Building has been occupied since January 13, 1958 and the Waddams Grove Building since February 10, 1958. This year's enrollments are forty-four and forty-five pupils respectively.

The Winslow Elementary School

The Winslow Elementary School Building is the result of an addition and a remodeling program. In this program 9730 square feet of new floor space was constructed, 4400 square feet of area was remodeled, while the gymnasium and stage area of 5670 square feet was left practically unchanged.

New construction is of brick, wood, concrete, and steel. Floors are of concrete with asphalt tile, and ceilings are of acoustical tile. The roof is of built up tar and gravel carrying a twenty year

guarantee.

Included in the completed building are eight classrooms, kitchen, food storage room, gymnasium with stage, boys' and girls' locker rooms, boys' and girls' toilet rooms, boiler room, teachers' rooms, and offices.

Heating is by a thermostatically controlled low pressure steam system using an oil fired boiler.

The maximum capacity of the building is two hundred and forty pupils in grades one through eight. This building

was put into use January 2, 1958. Enrollment for the present year is one hundred and sixty.

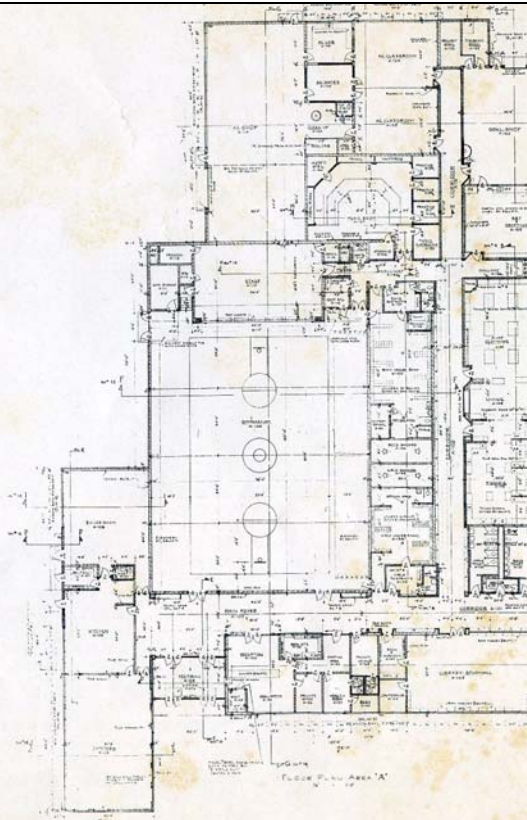

The new high school building, having a capacity of three hundred twenty-five pupils, is an attractive one story structure located on a seventeen acre site. It was first occupied in September, 1958 when two hundred seventy pupils were enrolled. Included in nineteen teaching stations are six general classrooms, two well equipped science laboratories, two business education rooms, a spacious, well equipped library, two homemaking rooms, two shops, a special room for art and drafting, music room, two agriculture classrooms, and a gymnasium to accommodate a class in girls' physical education and one in boys' physical education at the same time. This gymnasium has a regulation size playing floor with roll-away bleacher seating for 900 persons. An additional 200 persons could be provided for on the stage.

In addition to the teaching areas there are adequate locker room and toilet facilities, centrally located offices, kitchen and all-purpose room for operating a hot lunch program.

The building is of fire resistant construction. Foundations are of reinforced concrete, and the structural frame is of steel. Exterior walls are red brick masonry, with some buff brick in one end of the gymnasium for contrast. Window sashes are of steel with stone sills. Exterior doors are of hollow steel construction.

The roof over the gymnasium is of built up pitch and marble chips over insulation and a metal, acoustical deck. Over the remainder of the building the roof is of built up tar and gravel over insulation and solid steel deck carried on steel roof joists.

In the interior, corridor, classroom and laboratory floors are generally of asphalt tile. Shops have sealed concrete floors. Kitchen, main entrance vestibule, locker rooms and toilet rooms have terrazzo floors. The gymnasium floor is maple laid over a sub-floor on two by four sleepers attached to water proofed concrete.

Interior walls are mainly of painted light weight block. The main entrance vestibule walls and one wall of the entrance lobby are of brick. Corridor walls are a combination of tile, glass panels, and lockers backed by frame construction. Tile is also used for walls in the kitchen, all purpose room, homemaking kitchen, locker rooms, and toilets.

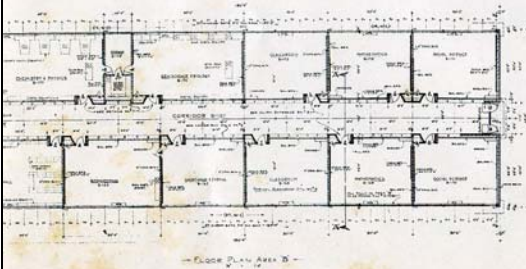
Ceilings are of suspended acoustical tile except in shops where the roof deck forms the ceiling, the gymnasium where acoustical metal deck is used, and in the kitchen, locker rooms, and toilet rooms where cement plaster is used.

Interior doors and wood trim are finished in blonde oak while block walls are finished in a variety of soft colors.

Fluorescent lighting is used in classroom, administrative, laboratory, and cafeteria areas. In corridors, shops, locker rooms, toilet rooms, boiler room, gymnasium, and kitchen incandescent lighting is used.

The building is heated by a thermostatically controlled forced hot water system using a boiler fired with number five furnace oil. Unit ventilators and exhaust fans provide adequate ventilation.

Water and sewage facilities are supplied by the village.
