Mentoring

A pilot mentoring program is being launched in academic year og/10 to help ease the transition to university life for incoming I-Promise students. Students who desire a mentor will be matched with an upper class peer or an adult mentor from the campus or local community. Sixty mentors currently serve in the pilot program. Outside funding is being sought to support mentoring for any I-Promise student who requests a mentor.

Illinois Promise is deeply committed to an evidence-based approach using data for program evaluation and greater understanding. Two student surveys have been conducted, and during AY 09/10 a longitudinal study will compare educational outcomes for I-Promise students with outcomes for other students. This will help us understand how I-Promise support impacts student success.

Programming & Partnerships

Several initiatives are under way in academic year 09/10 to enrich I-Promise students on campus through personal development, community services, and community-building events. Partnerships exist with a number of campus units and community organizations to coordinate these enrichment opportunities, including the Career Center; cultural houses; the Financial Wellness Center; the Illini Union Bookstore; the Leadership Center; the Library; the McKinley Health Center; the Office of Inclusion and Intercultural Relations; the Office of Minority Student Affairs (OMSA); the Office of Volunteer Programs; Talk Mentoring; TCF Bank; and University Housing. For example, the Counseling Center and the Office of Inclusion and Intercultural Relations are training I-Promise mentors; TCF Bank is offering sessions on financial literacy; and OMSA is providing training to I-Promise students in time management skills.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Illinois Promise is an access scholarship program

launched in 2005 to provide high achieving, low-income students an opportunity to attend the University of Illinois. Educational expenses, including tuition, fees, room and board, and books and supplies, are covered. In addition, enrichment programs are offered to foster student success.

Students do not apply to become an Illinois Promise scholar. Rather, students gain admittance to the University of Illinois, complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid), and then the Office of Student Financial Aid determines eliqibility based on:

- Illinois residency
- Freshman or transfer-student status
- Family income at or below the federal poverty level (\$21,200 for a family of four)
- Assets of less than \$50,000 (does not include your home)
- The Expected Family Contribution (EFC) is equal to \$0
- Minimum enrollment of 12 credit hours during fall and spring semesters

Students remain eligible for Illinois Promise if they continue to meet the criteria stated above (or are federal Pell Grant eligible) and have satisfied the college's GPA requirements.

Funding the program takes a team approach.

I-Promise students receive federal, state, institutional and/or private grants and scholarships for which they qualify. The difference between the covered costs and these awards is provided from institutional resources as well as private funding from individual and corporate donors. In academic year 08/09, Illinois Promise funding totaled \$2,284,855; the average award was \$3,581.





Diversity of Illinois Promise Students - Academic Year 08/09





Deferred Billing for Textbooks

In partnership with the Illini Union Bookstore, a pilot program was launched that enabled I-Promise students to purchase books and supplies for up to \$600 per semester and defer payment until midterms. This program allowed students to earn funds through Federal Work Study early in the semester and avoid having to purchase books through a loan or on a credit card. The partnership will continue in the next academic year.
