# Labour Gains But Conservatives Keep Double Digit Lead in Britain

The governing party gets a boost in London, but still trails the Tories across all demographic groups.

[LONDON – Apr. 13, 2010] – As the United Kingdom prepares for the first ever televised debate featuring the three main party leaders, the opposition Conservative Party retains the upper hand over the governing Labour Party, a new Angus Reid Public Opinion poll has found.

The online survey of a representative national sample of 2,006 British adults also shows that the economy remains the most important issue for most Britons, while immigration has been identified as the main concern for voters who are currently supporting three minor parties.

# **Voting Intention**

Across Great Britain, 38 per cent of decided voters and leaners (+1) would support the Conservative candidate in their constituency in the 6 May General Election. The governing

From April 9 to April 12, 2010, Angus Reid Public Opinion conducted an online survey among 2,006 randomly selected British adults who are Springboard UK panelists. The margin of error—which measures sampling variability—is +/- 2.2%. The results have been statistically weighted according to the most current education, age, gender and region data to ensure samples representative of the entire adult population of Great Britain. Discrepancies in or between totals are due to rounding.

Labour Party is second with 28 per cent (+1), followed by the Liberal Democrats with 22 per cent (=). The United Kingdom Independence Party (UKIP) is fourth with five per cent (=), followed by the British National Party (BNP) with three per cent (=) and the Green Party also with two per cent (=).

# **Regional Breakdowns**

The South of England continues to be the best area for the Conservatives, who are close to garnering the support of half of decided voters (47%). Labour has gained four points in a week in Midlands and Wales, but still trails the Tories by a considerable margin (37% to 26%).

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In the North, the Tories are ahead of Labour by five points (35% to 30%). In Scotland, Labour remains in first place (36%), followed by the SNP with 24 per cent. In London, Labour had a good first week of the campaign, turning last week's six-point deficit to the Tories into a five-point lead (38% to 33%).

# Other Demographics

The Conservatives continue to gain amongst voters over the age of 55 (43%), but dropped slightly in the two other age groups. The Tories lead Labour by seven points amongst voters aged 35 to 54 (35% to 28%) and hold a slight edge amongst voters aged 18 to 34 (33% to 31%).

The Conservatives now lead by ten points amongst male voters (38% to 28%) and by nine points amongst female voters (37% to 28%). The proportion of men who would vote for other parties has dropped by four points in a week.

#### **Issue Watch**

Following the first week of the campaign, the economy remains the most important issue facing the United Kingdom for more than a third of respondents (34%, -1). One-in-ten (10%, +1) are concerned about unemployment.. Immigration is still second on the list of important issues with 19 per cent (=).

More than a third of respondents who will vote for any one of the three major parties believe the economy is the most important issue facing the United Kingdom right now (Con. 39%, L-D 38%, Lab. 37%), but this view is only shared by 17 per cent of respondents who will vote for three "other parties" (UKIP, BNP and Greens).

In fact, two-in-five Britons who will vote for these three "other parties" (41%) say immigration is the most important issue facing the country right now, along with 21 per cent of Tory supporters, 16 per cent of Labour supporters, and 13 per cent of Liberal Democrat supporters. Unemployment is more of a concern for Labour voters, while Tories and Lib-Dems are more worried about leadership.
