Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The buildings at White River are similar in plan and design to contemporary rustic structures at Nisqually and Longmire. The log frame entrance station was modeled after the Nisqually entrance station. However, the portecochere feature is original to White River and was only copied in the late thirties at Nisqually as part of the CCC remodeling. Characteristic features of the other structures in the forested setting at White River are woodframe construction, rough lapped cedar siding painted brown and mediumpitched cedar shake or shingled roofs.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The White River Entrance Station complex is significant for its association with the federal government's administration, management, and development of Mount Rainier National Park (National Register Criterion A). Originally built between 1929-1931 to accommodate the expected influx of visitors arriving on the Yakima Park Highway, White River continues to function much as it did historically. This complex of buildings is also significant for its association with the Rustic Style of architecture (Criterion C). This architectural theme was used throughout the park on all types of facilities in an effort to integrate man's presence and needs as sensitively as possible into the natural environment. The Men's Mess Hall and Dormitory (built 1933) is believed to be the only CCC camp building remaining in the park.

WHITE RIVER MESS HALL AND DORMITORY (W-207):

Boundary: A rectangle formed by lines running parallel to the structure's walls at a distance of fifty feet from the building.

Acreage: Less than 1 acre UTM References: 10/610110/5195100 USGS Quad: White River Park, Washington, 1:24,000

Justification: The boundary was drawn to include the historic building and some of the land encompassing the structure in order to convey the historic setting. This building is considered an integral component of the White River Entrance Historic District but is physically located outside the boundaries of the district as defined in this nomination because of its distance from the district's primary significant structures. Its inclusion within the district (for the purposes of Section 10 of this nomination form) would have resulted in additional non-contributing buildings and acreage being included within the district because of their proximity to the significant structures. In an effort to draw and define the boundaries of the district as carefully as possible, ensuring that only significant properties and acreage are included within those defined boundaries, boundaries were drawn around structure W-207 and are separate from the main district boundaries (Points A,B,C,D).


Log frame, one-story, seven rooms, "T"-shaped structure with a wood frame rear entrance addition; steeply-pitched gable roof intersects with gable roof extension or stem of "T" and a porte cochere of log post and beam construction; cedar-roof singles; stone chimney on main gable ridge; whole log rafters and purlins; exterior whole log walls with wood slab chinking; saddle-notch cornering with whittled log ends (crowns); casement and fixed windows; stone and concrete foundation (rebuilt 1952); interior walls are wall-board; tongue-and-groove floor covered by tile in main office; stone fireplace.

The Ranger and Checking Station at the White River entrance was built by the National Park Service between 1929-31. Initial construction was difficult as no roads were existing to the site. Although the Yakima Park Highway was under construction in 1929, it would not reach the White River Entrance until the following year. Further delays in transporting materials were experienced in 1929 when contractor A.C. Goerig failed to bridge Klickitat Creek, east of the site. A temporary cable line was erected over the creek to transport building materials. They were then hauled by shed teams to the White River Entrance. Increased costs delayed completion of the ranger and checking station until 1931.

16 SIGNIFICANCE

Modeled after the Nisqually entrance station, the White River Entrance Ranger Station was one of the numerous park structures constructed under Major O.A. Tomlinson's superintendency (1923-1941) and designed by the National Park Service, Branch of Plans and Design, under the supervision of Chief Architect T.C. Vint. The station's importance grew with the increase in traffic through the White River entrance following the development of Yakima Park (Sunrise). The original porte cochere, constructed at the request of Superintendent Tomlinson, was recently replaced when a new kiosk was installed. Otherwise, the facility remains largely unaltered.



The structure was originally used as a ranger's residence as well as a checking station. The main portion measured 21' x 44' with a floor size of 1500 square feet. It contained two bedrooms, a dining room, kitchen, a bath, and a bedroom. The "stem" of the "T"-portion measured 10.5' x 13' and contained the ranger's office. A kiosk was located under the porte cochere. It measured 13' x 20'. At an unknown date a rear entrance addition was erected. It measured 8' x 9.5' and was comprised of a steeply-pitched, cedar-shingled, gable roof with log rafters and purlins. Whole log posts supported the projecting verge and the exterior was covered with roughlapped Douglas Fir siding.

Presently, the facility is used for ranger's offices, information center issuing backcountry permits and checking station. The exterior remains largely unaltered except for the removal of the original work in 1982. Concurrently, a new porte cochere was constructed measuring 13' x 15'. The new kiosk is located on an island opposite the porte cochere.


Wood frame, one-story, two-room, rectangular structure; medium-pitched gable roof, log ridge beam, cedar roof shakes on wood sheathing over whole log rafters and purlins; 1 x 8 rough lap (clapboard) exterior siding with log post and beam framing, vertical log veneer siding on gable ends; two log veneer doors; pivot windows; interior wallboard siding; suspended ceiling; concrete floor; stone and concrete foundation.

A 1930 original drawing exists of the comfort station. The structure, entitled "Comfort Station and Delco Plant, White River Entrance," was built in 1931 by the National Park Service. The Waterhouse Report on Construction Activities (in 1931) reported that "all material was hauled to the site over the completed Klickitat Bridge..." Prior to the installment of 1 x 8 rough lap exterior siding, the structure had log siding.

Measuring 11.9' x 28', one end of the building housed a Delco lighting plant. Today, it is used for storage of sanitation supplies.



Wood frame, one-story, one-room, rectangular structure; medium-pitched gable roof; log ridge beam, cedar roof shakes on wood sheathing over whole log rafters and purlins; 1 x 9 rough lap (clapboard) exterior siding with log post and beam framing, vertical log veneer siding on gable ends; two log veneer doors; fixed windows with mottled glass; interior 1 x 4 tongue and groove walls; suspended ceiling; concrete floor; stone and concrete foundation.

A 1930 original drawing exists of the comfort station, entitled 'Womens Comfort Station, White River Entrance' (MORA White River Entrance-Campground Buildings File). Built in 1931 by the National Park Service, the structure measures 11.8' x 14.3', with a floor size of 168 square feet. Prior to the addition of 1 x 9 rough lap exterior siding, the structure had totally log siding.
