

This summer I had the amazing experience of leading the Irish delegation at the WAGGGS World Conference in Johannesburg, South Africa. To attend a World Conference is an incredible experience in itself, but to attend one that is chaired by a member of IGG is even better. Elspeth Henderson chaired the World Conference, and at the end of the Conference, she had completed her term as Chairman of the WAGGGS World Board.

Elsbeth was presented with a WAGGGS Silver Medal, the highest award that WAGGGS can give. She received this award for her vast contribution to WAGGGS over a long period of time, but particularly while she was chairman of the World Board. During the Conference, the Irish Delegation was so proud of Elspeth and when she was presented with this award we were almost bursting with pride and admiration for her. As she closed the Conference, we placed an IGG neckerchief on her to welcome her back to IGG.

Our own National Conference takes place on the 6th and 7th of September in Maynooth, and it will be attended by about 150 Leaders. The theme of the Conference is "Your Role, Your Responsibility". The organising team of Nonie Hickey, Claire Colfer, Meriel Huggard and Liz Downes have put a lot of time and thought into organising a programme to make us all think about what we do in Guiding, what we have to offer, and what we get from it in return. I look forward to meeting many of you in Maynooth.

Of course, we also have all the Regional Conferences happening this autumn. These are a great opportunity to network within your own Region and to share experiences with both new Leaders and those who have been involved for a while. They really are worthwhile, and no matter how long you've been involved in Guiding, there is always something new to learn. Be sure to apply as soon as you receive the details to ensure you get a place.

Leave No Trace



The April edition of Trefoil News contained a True/False Quiz regarding the principles of Leave No Trace. Statement no. 19 said that "Leave nothing but footprints, take nothing but photos" is a motto of Leave No Trace.

Leave No Trace have asked us to point out that, as the numbers of people in the countryside are forever increasing, the way we think about being responsible to the environment has changed. Not only do we have to think about the damaging effects of things like litter and campfires, we now have to think about the impact from the increasing number of people travelling on certain areas. The phrase associated with Leave No Trace "Leave nothing but footprints, take nothing but photos" now seems irrelevant, as more and more footprints, leave a huge impact on the environment if not managed carefully.

Leaders are asked to replace no 19. with Lord Baden-Powell's statement "Leave nothing but your thanks" when doing this activity with the girls in their Unit.



Scouts100: Living the Adventure

In 1908, a magazine by Lord Baden Powell, 'Scouting for Boys', invited young people to form patrols, wear a uniform, be prepared and camp and survive in wild places. Scouting grew to become the largest youth movement in the world, with 28 million members worldwide. In its centenary year in Ireland, a temporary exhibition in the Riding School at Collins Barracks explores the experience, adventure and thrills of young people over the last 100 years.



The exhibition includes displays spanning the decades from 1908 right up until modern day. It shows the highlights of Scouting throughout the last Century as it affected millions of young people throughout the world and hundreds of thousands of young people in Ireland. It also includes exhibits on World and Irish Jamborees during the past century.

Some of the highlights of the exhibit are actual footage of the founder, Lord Baden Powell, addressing the Scout Association, mementoes taken from the first ever camp in Brownsea Island back in 1907 and the badge that Eagle Scout, Neil Armstrong, brought to the Moon on his historic voyage in 1969.

Scouts100 has been open since April but the exhibition will be ending on the 30th September 2008. If you have not had a chance to experience this piece of scouting history yet, then we recommend you have a day out and help the Scouts to celebrate their centenary, it will be our turn soon.

Garda Vetting of Unit Helpers

Leader's Questions Answered

1. What is the updated definition of a Unit Helper?

A Unit Helper is an interested person who does not wish to, or cannot, (e.g. a father) become a warranted Leader. This includes someone who is on a parents' rota. They may be invited to attend Unit meetings, camps or holidays when additional help is needed.

2. If I have a potential Unit Helper who wants to start helping in my Unit, or if I want to organise a rota of parents to help out, what should I do?

You should give each prospective Unit Helper a Unit Helper Pack which is available, free of charge, from the Membership Support Officer in National Office, all I.G.G. Distribution Centres, Regional Development Officers, District and Area Commissioners. This Pack contains all the forms and booklets appropriate to the I.G.G. screening procedure for Unit Helpers :-

- The I.G.G. Unit Helper's Notes and Guidelines
- Garda Vetting Application form
- *Code of Ethics and Good Practice*
- Agreement Form for Unit Helpers with The Irish Girl Guides (single sheet)

You should help the potential Unit Helper to complete the forms and go through the steps of the screening process with her/him.

3. How long will it take for her/him to undergo the screening process?

The screening process may take approximately three months to complete. This timescale is dependant on completion of Garda Vetting, which is outside I.G.G.'s control.

4. Can s/he help with the Unit while the screening process is underway?

Yes, once the prospective Unit Helper has submitted their completed forms to the Membership Support Officer, I.G.G. National Office and the screening process is underway s/he may help with a Unit strictly under the supervision of a qualified I.G.G. Leader. Unit Helpers must never have unsupervised access to children.

5. If I am planning to take my girls away overnight and have a parent/volunteer assisting me on the event, do they need to be Garda Vetted?

Yes, anyone assisting on a residential event e.g. overnight to a cottage, a pack holiday or camp is regarded as a Unit Helper and will need to undergo I.G.G.'s screening process which includes Garda Vetting.

The screening process may take approximately three months to complete and this timescale is dependant on completion of Garda Vetting, which is outside I.G.G.'s control.

The timescale for the Garda Vetting needs to be factored into the planning of a residential event. The prospective Unit Helper should submit their Garda Vetting Application form at least three months in advance of the scheduled date of the residential event to ensure that they are fully screened, registered as a Unit Helper with I.G.G. and therefore able to assist on the residential event.

6. How will the person know if their application has been successful?

When the I.G.G. screening process is complete and the applicant has been approved, they will be notified in writing that they have been registered with The Irish Girl Guides. A letter will also be sent to the District Commissioner/Unit Leader with confirmation of this.

7. How can I explain to the parents of the girls in my Unit about Garda vetting?

A letter on I.G.G. headed paper explaining the process regarding vetting for new Leaders and Unit Helpers is available from the Membership Support Officer, I.G.G. National Office. Leaders can photocopy this and give it to each member's parents/guardian.

Hi Leaders,

Welcome to a new Guiding Year. Are you planning on taking your girls away this year – if so read on. The following are the minimum qualifications you as a leader must have to take your girls away. If you do not have the minimum qualification you must bring some-one who does.

- The leader-in-charge must be warranted.
- The leader-in-charge must have done her Basic Camp and Holiday Standard qualification.
- Anyone under the age of 21 must have at least one adult over 21 years of age on staff for all holidays and camps.

Going to an indoor venue in Ireland, e.g. Guide cottage:

The leader-in-charge must have her Indoor Licence. It is recommended that at least 3 adults are the minimum for every event.

Going camping in Ireland:

The leader-in-charge must have her Camper's Licence. She must have some-one on camp with an up-to-date First Aid qualification.

Before you go to the cottage or camp in Ireland you must fill out the appropriate forms – C1 form must be sent to your Commissioner and O.A. at least one month before the event.

Travelling abroad:

Before making any plans, a leader wishing to take a group abroad must discuss the proposed visit with the International Commissioner and her Outdoor Advisor. Brownies and Ladybirds cannot travel abroad.

The Leader-in charge must have the qualifications as set out above.

She must fill in a C4 form Part A to reach the International Commissioner at least 2 months before the event. Part B to be sent to International Commissioner to arrive before the departure date.

The leader-in-charge should have had overseas travel experience as an adult before taking a group away, or if this is not possible one of the other adults travelling in the party must have been abroad before.

Minimum age for girls travelling abroad is 12 years of age.

Please check all these details in your copy of the "Handbook of the Irish Girl Guides" (2007 edition)

If you are interested in taking any indoor/outdoor qualifications this year please discuss this well in advance with your O.A. and District Commissioner. Please give at least three months notice so that an assessor can be organised for your assessment.





COUNCIL OF IRISH GUIDING ASSOCIATIONS UPDATE



CIGA, the Council of Irish Guiding Associations, consists of The Irish Girl Guides and members of the Catholic Guides of Ireland that are resident in the Republic of Ireland only. Since its formation in 1993, CIGA has been the Irish representative to WAGGGS.

One of the aims of CIGA has been to find a way for all members of the Catholic Guides of Ireland to become full members of WAGGGS – up to now the members of CGI who are resident in Northern Ireland have not been members of WAGGGS. For the past 25 years, the World Board has been in consultation with The Irish Girl Guides and the Catholic Guides of Ireland in order to achieve this aim.

The talks, chaired by Mary Lyn Myers, Vice Chairman of the World Board, culminated with CGI and Girlguiding UK signing an agreement, as a result of which CGI members in Northern Ireland will become members of WAGGGS. Each year CGI will report to Girlguiding UK the membership figures for CGI members resident in Northern Ireland. Girlguiding UK will then include these numbers in its census figures to WAGGGS, and CGI will pay the appropriate sum to WAGGGS.

Thus CGI members that are resident in Northern Ireland will now become members of WAGGGS. They will be members of CGI, but will not be members of CIGA, and therefore will not be eligible to represent CIGA at World or European Conferences.

As a result of the above, it was necessary to amend the CIGA Constitution. During February and March, the Executive Committee held information meetings for all members of the General Council in every Region. A postal ballot was held of all Council members prior to the meeting of the General Council in April, and at that meeting it was announced that the amendments had been approved by over two thirds of the Council. The World Board has also approved these amendments.

The Executive Committee would like to thank all Council members who attended the meetings, considered the amendments and voted to approve them.



FELLOWSHIP OF IRISH GUIDE AND SCOUT GUILDS

2007/2008 has been a very good year for The Fellowship of Irish Guide and Scout Guilds, consisting of Trefoil Guilds and the Baden Powell Fellowship. All of the guilds met on a regular basis and a number of exciting events took place.

The big event this year was hosting the annual reunion for "Friends of the 4 World Centres". This took place at the I.C.A. house, "An Grianán", in Termonfeckin, Drogheda. 51 members from Ireland, UK and the USA attended. Hi everyone,

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself to you all. My name is Catherine O'Connor and I am delighted to say that I am the new Outreach Development Officer for the Irish Girl Guides. Some of you might have met me before, possibly at local, regional or national events but for those who I have not met before, here is a little bit of information about me

SO WHERE TO BEGIN:

I have been involved in Guiding for over 21 years now, starting off as a Brownie aged 7 in Thurles, Co. Tipperary. Since then I have been a member of 5 regions and attended numerous national events. Highlights range from cookouts and camps as a Guide, being a 'durple' at the standing camps in '97, being involved with Galway Senior Branch's mad plans to win the Senior Branch challenge in 2000, representing IGG at a Juliette Low seminar in Sangam, all the way to becoming a Guide Leader who organises weekly meetings and runs weekends away, including a very memorable trip to London in 2001. I love working with the girls from week to week and seeing them trying their best, learning and developing while in a fun, safe, and challenging environment. - Training IGG leaders and trainers and raising their awareness of the benefits and challenges of integration.
- Helping IGG leaders to target girls and young women from minority ethnic communities, to promote Guiding to their parents and to integrate the girls and young women into their Units.



International Day of Peace

21 September



The International Day of Peace was established by a United Nations Resolution in 1981. It was first celebrated on September 21st 1982. It provides an opportunity for individuals, organisations and nations to create practical acts of Peace on a shared date.

The day should be a global ceasefire and a day of Peace and Nonviolence in our own communities and between nations.

The day is a chance to show that you care about building Cultures of Peace for the children of this and future generations. The day should serve as a reminder of our permanent commitment to Peace.

Wherever you are, you too can make a stand for Peace, by telling a story, taking a minutes silence, lighting a candle for peace, creating a poster/ bookmark etc., or playing a game that educates children about war and peace.

A good peace builder...

... Is an effective listener

... Promotes peaceful coexistence

... Encourages

non-violent conflict

resolution

... Ensures

dialogue and communication

As an introduction to the topic of Peace, you could use the story below about the nuclear bomb in Hiroshima, for older children. You could also look at World War Two, or the Northern Ireland Peace Conflict, if you want a situation closer to home.
Ask the Girls for their ideas about War and Peace, conflict and resolution and how we can all do our part for a more peaceful society.

The Story of Sadako Sasaki **and the Paper Cranes**

Sadako Sasaki was a Japanese girl who lived near Misasa Bridge in Hiroshima, Japan. Sadako was a victim of the first ever atomic bomb which was dropped on Hiroshima on August 6, 1945. Sadako was only two years old. At the time of the explosion she was at home, about 1 mile from ground zero. Ten years later she was diagnosed with leukemia, which was widely accepted to be a disease which occurred in those exposed to the radiation from the nuclear bomb. She was hospitalized on February 21, 1955 and given, at most, a year to live.

On August 3, 1955, Chizuko Hamamoto — Sadako's best friend — came to the hospital to visit. She cut a golden piece of paper into a square and folded it into a paper crane. At first Sadako didn't understand why Chizuko was doing this but then Chizuko told her the story of the paper cranes. In Japan there was a belief that if someone folded 1,000 cranes, they would be granted a wish. Inspired by the story of the crane, she started folding them herself, wishing for good health.

Though she had plenty of free time during her days in the hospital to fold the cranes, she lacked paper. She would use medicine wrappings and whatever else she could find. This included going to other patients' rooms to ask to use the paper from their get-well presents. Chizuko would bring paper from school for Sadako to use.

During her time in hospital her condition progressively worsened. With her family around her, Sadako died on the morning of October 25, 1955. One version of the story is that she fell short of her goal of folding 1,000 cranes, having folded only 644 before her death, and that her friends completed the 1,000 and buried them all with her. However an exhibit which appears in the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Museum stated that by the end of August, 1955, Sadako had achieved her goal but continued to fold more cranes, until her death in October.

After her death, Sadako's friends and schoolmates published a collection of letters in order to raise funds to build a memorial to her and all of the children who had died from the effects of the atomic bomb. Sadako has become a leading symbol of the impact of war on children. In 1958, a statue of Sadako holding a golden crane was unveiled in the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park.

At the foot of the statue is a plaque that reads: *This is our cry. This is our prayer. Peace in the world.*



The Statue is constantly surrounded by freshly folded cranes sent from schools around Japan and the world.



If you would like to fold a crane for peace, please see the instructions and diagram on page 28.

If older children would like to, you could encourage them to read some books about World War II in their spare time; to celebrate the International Day of Peace. Being informed about the mistakes that were made in the past, is one of the ways to create a peaceful future.

Books that are particularly good and recommended for children 11+ are:

LADYBIRD PEACE ACTIVITIES

What's the story?

Aim: That young people explore ways in which conflicts happen and how they can be solved.

Time: 20 Minutes

Materials: Copies of the story below, paper, crayons/markers.



To begin, sit in a circle and read out the story. Ask the following questions:

Who are the main characters in the story?

How did they behave in the story? Was it fair of them? How did they solve their problem?

Can you think of any other ways they could have solved their problem? Can you remember any occasions when you may have behaved in a similar way? How did you resolve the situation?

Give out paper and crayons, or markers. In pairs or small groups ask the children to illustrate the story. Display all the drawings. Ask if they know any other stories with conflict in them, such as Little Red Riding Hood, The Three Pigs,

HAY HAY, WE'RE THE DONKEYS!!!!

Once upon a time a farmer had two donkeys. The donkeys were called Mandy and Sandy. They went everywhere together. Well they had to, they were tied to one another by a rope!

One day the farmer led them into a field in which there were two piles of hay. Mandy made straight for one of the piles of hay but just before she reached it she was pulled back. Sandy too rushed towards a pile of hay but before he reached it he was pulled back.

Mandy and Sandy stretched and strained, but to no avail. The harder they tried, the greater the resistance. They sat down exhausted. 'I'm hungry', said Mandy. 'Why don't you let me eat?' 'I'm hungry too', said Sandy. 'You won't let me eat'.

They sat for a while and thought about it. 'Why don't I eat first and then you can eat', said Sandy. 'Yeah, right,' said Mandy. 'Do you think I was born yesterday? As soon as you've eaten your pile you'll go to sleep on the spot and I won't get near my pile.'

Finally Mandy had an idea and told Sandy. Both donkeys went to the same pile of hay and ate it. Next they went together to the other pile of hay and ate it too. When they had both eaten their fill, they lay down and went to sleep.



CRAFT CORNER



Peace Bookmark

Equipment:
White Card, Green Card, Scissors, Glue, Markers.



Draw the body of a dove onto white card. Cut out the body. (You could use the doves above as templates)



Cut a rectangle of green card, roughly 6 inches by 1 inch.



Glue the dove to the top of the green card and have the girls write their message of peace in coloured markers.

BROWNIE AND GUIDE PEACE ACTIVITES

Building Peace

Aim: to show how groups need to compromise in order to achieve peace.

Time: 30 minutes

Materials: cards for each country, scissors, glue, sticky tape, newspapers, string, wool, tinfoil, egg cartons, toilet roll holders, etc, for the monument construction. Markers, crayons, and paper.

What to do:

Form four teams. Explain that countries A,B,C and D have been at war for many years. Finally they have agreed to participate in a peace process with their former enemies. The countries have agreed to construct a monument to peace. Give each team one of the country cards, opposite. They have 5-10 minutes to discuss the type of monument they would like to have in their own country group. The groups then come together and have 15 minutes to construct a group monument, using the materials provided.

After 15 minutes, or when the monument is constructed, end the game and discuss the following:

What happened at first?

Was it easy to agree on a monument? Why?

How did you feel when you built the monument?

What qualities helped with promoting peace between the countries?

What qualities prevented you from working together?

DON'T SAY A WORD

Aim: that participants understand how assumptions and lack of communications can result in conflict.

Announce that no one is allowed to talk. Ask participants to form 3 equal sized groups. Place a set of chairs in the middle of the room. Hand out an instruction face down to each group. Explain that they have five minutes to complete their task.

Group 1: Place the chairs in a straight line.

Group 2: Place the chairs in a circle.

Group 3: Bring the chairs outside the room.

After 5 minutes, call a halt, if the groups are still in conflict, explain that it is not a competition. Ask what happened in the game? What assumptions did the group make when they got their instruction? How did people feel about the other groups initially? How did the groups feel when they realised it wasn't a competition? What did the groups have to do to work together?

Country A

You are a proud people, with a long history and rich culture. Your country is rich in raw materials that other countries covet. When people meet on your country, eye contact is avoided and physical contact is kept to a minimum. You are uncomfortable dealing with others and don't like being told what to do. In your country birds are a symbol of hope and the future.

Country B

Your country is small and has a short history. However, what it lacks in traditions it has compensated for with large engineering projects. You are a very friendly people and smile all the time. You are used to touching each other and strangers. In your country the Sun is a symbol of growth and prosperity.

Country C

Your country is rich and prosperous. Your people are proud of their history and place in the world. You are used to taking the lead and having others follow. Others often mistake your confidence as arrogance. Your people talk very loudly and are direct in what they say. In your country, trees are a symbol of life and hope.

Country D


Your country has a very fertile land and relies heavily on agriculture. There are no words for 'yes' or 'no'. You usually respond to questions with questions. Smiling is not considered appropriate, you prefer to frown. In your country crops are a symbol of peace and growth.




How to Fold a Peace Crane

(This activity is probably best for those over 10/11)



You will need: a beanbag or a ball.





LEAF RUBBING FAIRY

You will need:

- Crayons
- Paper
- Skin tone/white card
- Fallen Leaves
- Glue
- Pens
- Scissors

Put leaves under the paper with the veins pointing upwards, holding them still, rub over the paper with the side of your crayon until a picture of the leaves appears on the paper.

Cut out your leaves

From the card, cut out a body shape and draw on a face and some hair.

Use the cut-out leaf rubbings to make a dress and wings and glue them to the body.



LEAF PEOPLE

You will need:

- Dried, Fabric or Paper leaves
- Pens
- Paper
- Glue

On your paper, lay out the leaves until they look like a person.

You will need:

- Sheet or parachute
- Leaves (dried, fabric or paper ones)

Place the leaves in the middle of the sheet or parachute.


Gather around the sheet and have the girls lift the sheet slowly and then quickly to see how all the leaves "float".

It's that time of year again! All you Brownie Guide Leaders throughout the country are opening the doors of your meeting halls to welcome back your current and new Brownie Guide members. After your very well deserved summer break it's time to look in your Brownie Box and take out your Brownie Guide Book, opening at the first page where those 3 very important words are "Welcome to Brownies". Your Brownies return again and again because they love their meetings and most importantly they can't wait to meet you, their leaders. It is your dedication and commitment that makes their Brownie Pack special. We hope you enjoy your meetings in the coming year.

Programme Outline for your First Meeting



Opening Games

Either one or a few of these games can be played to enable the girls to get reacquainted with each other and also to introduce the new members through activity and fun. Most meetings are approx. one and half hours so you could time each item before the meeting. Each game will take approx 5-10mins .

Name Tag Switch

Suitable Location: Outside or in the Hall.

Materials: Pre-written labels with all the Brownie's names including your new members who are joining the Pack.



Aim: To get the Brownies mingling with each other after their break and to include the new girls. Gives them a chance to talk to someone different.

Method:

- Give someone else's nametag label to each Brownie and tell them they have to find that Brownie and give her that nametag.
- Everyone should meet at least two other people; the person that they give the nametag to and the person who gives them their own nametag.
- The Brownies will know each other from before the summer but they may have forgotten names particularly if they haven't seen each other in a while.
- It might be an idea to give your Sixers the labels with the names of the new Brownies and when they have handed over the correct name they can help them find the Brownie they are looking for.

TIP: When Brownies arrive put a label aside with their name on it. This will ensure that all participants are present. Check that all Brownies can read the labels and know who they are looking for

Follow That Sound

Suitable Location: Outside or in the Hall

Aim: This is a trust building exercise. It can be played outside so participants have a lot of room to move around. Listening skills are developed and younger members love the chance to make all kinds of sounds.



Method:

Encourage Brownies to pair off with someone they don't know that well or place them in pairs by numbering them.

When pairs are formed they are now called A & B.

- B closes her eyes and stretches out her right arm and A is going to lead her around for a few seconds by the little finger.
- As soon as both parties are ready, A is going to use a sound that B can identify with, it can be sound of a cat, a tiger or any sound she wants to use.
- When they have agreed on a sound, A will let go and try and lead B around using only sound, no talking at all.
- After a few minutes let them change around. It must be emphasised to both parties that they are responsible for the safety of each other.



Band Aid Tag

Suitable Location: Outside or in the Hall.

Aim: To get the Brownies moving quickly and to develop their concentration to see if they can spot who needs rescuing.

Method:

- One person is "it", Choose a name from your It Bag or whatever method you use to choose the Brownie who is it
- Whenever someone is tagged by "it" they must hold a Band-Aid (their hand) on the spot where they were tagged as they keep running around.
- The game continues with Brownies being tagged and when someone runs out of **Band-Aids**, (**they get tagged twice**), they are frozen until two other Brownies come over to them and "**operate**." This means that the two Brownies need to tag the frozen person at the same time and count to five. This will release that Brownie to join back in the game
- Let the game continue for as long as it remains exciting and fun.

TIP: Switch the person who is "it" often. As this is quite an energetic game you may have to have two Brownies as "It". A Brownie can get quite tired trying to tag everyone!



BROWNIES



The Twister

Suitable Location: Outside or in the Hall.

Aim: Develops listening skills, observation skills and Co-operation with each other.

Method:

TIP: Before you begin this game it is important to demonstrate to the Brownies the different positions and what they mean. It may be easier for the leaders to do this for the Brownies. Also explain clearly each of the instructions and what they mean when they are called.

- Divide the Brownies into groups of 3. However 1 or 2 people must not be in a group, they are the extras.
- In each group of 3, 2 Brownies face each other holding each other's hands making an arch. They are called the "House."
- The 3rd person in the group will kneel in between the 2 Brownies. This Brownie is the "Human".
- When all are in these positions, the two extra Brownies can take up any position they like not within group for now.

A leader can then call out one of the following 3 instructions.

EARTHQUAKE: An earthquake knocks down the houses, so Brownies who are the "House" must change partners to form new "Houses", they cannot remain as a house with their existing partners. Brownies who are "Human" must not move, they must remain in their existing place so that the Brownies who are the "Houses" can form new "Houses" over them.

FLOOD: causes the rivers to rise and flood so the "Humans" must move. Therefore the "Human" must change to other "Houses"; they cannot remain in the same existing "House." Brownies who are the "Houses" do not move this time.

TWISTER: Everybody has to change her position. For the Brownies who are the "House", they can either change partners, or they can kneel down to become "Human" themselves. For the Brownies who are the "Humans", they can either change to other "Houses" or they can stand up and partner with someone to become a "House". Whenever the leader calls either 1 of the 3 options, the 2 Brownies who are the extras must move quickly so that they can compete with the original players by partnering up with someone to become "Houses" or by becoming "Humans" and occupying the "Houses". As a result there will be always be 2 Brownies extra each time an option is called. To enhance the excitement the leader shouldn't wait too long to call out instructions so that the Brownies are constantly moving around.



Sock Toss

Suitable location: In the Hall.

Aim: This game is a good way of getting the Brownies to remember names and what order they are called in. The use of socks creates some fun. Develops observation skills to ensure that everyone gets a go tossing the socks.

Materials:

3 pairs of socks of different colours.
(You may be asked are they clean!!!)

Method:

- Roll up the pairs of socks into a tight ball. For a circle of 20 or more Brownies, use three pairs of socks.
- Gather everyone into a circle sitting down or standing.
- A Leader tosses a sock to the first Brownie and says their name. Brownies may have to inquire about each other's names before tossing.
- Each Brownie throws to a different Brownie and so on until each person has caught and thrown the sock. The last person will toss back to the leader who started the sock toss.
- Use the same pattern as the first time and add 2 more pair of socks



Who stole the cookie

Suitable Location: In the Hall:

Aim: Great way of getting to know names and learn rhythm to the clapping actions. You will need to ask for a volunteer to start this game.

Method:

- Have all the Brownies form a circle sitting close together.
- All the Brownies chant together:
"Who- stole- the -Cookie -from- the -Cookie- Jar" while clapping their hands together first and then clapping their thighs at the same time in a pattern. The Brownie who has agreed to start the game calls out a name, of someone in the Brownie Circle and says:

Volunteer: "Josie" stole the cookie from the cookie Jar!

Josie : "Who me"!

Group: Yes! You!

Josie : "Couldn't be"

Group: Then who stole the cookie from the Cookie Jar!

- Josie names another Brownie e.g. Linda stole the cookie from the cookie Jar!

The above pattern is repeated and Linda names another Brownie in the group until everyone has had a chance.

You may have to help the new Brownie members, as they may be quite shy speaking out in front of the Brownie Pack.



BROWNIES



Opening Ceremony

We have Ceremonies to develop the imagination of our Brownies and to create a feeling of unity in the Pack. For all Brownie Guide Ceremonies see pages 213-218 of "The Handbook of the Irish Girl Guides."

The purpose of the Opening Ceremony is to enable the Brownie Sixes to form a ring for the Brownie Ring Ceremony. There are a number of ways this can be achieved. The following is an example of one method.

How Many?

Give out the Brownie Roll books to the Sixer in each group and ask them to stand in their Six Corners and mark in the attendance for each Brownie. Explain to each Six that it is very important that this Roll Book is marked carefully at all times. As this is being completed perhaps a leader could mark the main roll book as well.

As each Six completes their Roll Book they bring it back up to a Brownie Leader and they can then be called in to the Brownie Ring in that order.

Subscription Ceremony

If your Pack collects weekly subscriptions it might be at this point you could collect them.

Each Brownie Pack has its own way of collecting weekly subscriptions. You might like to use the following method.

Six Coins!

Let the Brownies in each Six make the first letter of their Six names with their coins. (There are more ideas in The Handbook of the Irish Girl Guides pg.218.) When the subs have been collected and put away, the opening ceremony continues.

The Brownie leader who has taken the roll books now proceeds to call each Six as follows.

Brownie Guide Leader: How many Elves are coming to Brownies?

Starting with the Sixer, each Brownie claps her hands over her head and says; One, Two, etc and the Sixer then says the total number i.e. "There are six Elves coming to Brownies today." The Brownie Leader (depending which Owl is calling) says, "Come along then!" The Elves skip into the Brownie Ring and sing their Six Song. Repeat this with each Six.

Another variation of the above is to ask each Six to make up their own movements instead of skipping into the Brownie Ring they might like to come in like robots or

dance in making up their own movements. When the Brownie Ring is complete the Brownie Song and a Prayer should be completed.

Brownie Song

The Brownies join hands in the circle and skip in one direction singing.



"We're the Brownies here's our aim. Lend a Hand and play the Game."

Then the Brownies sing the same song while skipping in the opposite direction.

In some Packs, the members who are not Brownies yet are called "Tweenies" They have their own song;

"We're the Tweenies as you see, Someday Brownies we will be."

They can form an inner circle facing the Brownies and skip around singing their song.

It is nice if a Brownie Leader joins them for the first few times until they become more confident. Tune for this is on the Brownie Guide to songs CD.

Brownie Prayer

Prayer for Autumn:

Thank you God for keeping your promise that seedtime and harvest shall come every year. Thank you for giving us hay and corn, fruit and vegetables, and all we need. Keep us from grumbling or being wasteful and help us to be grateful to all the people who have worked to bring us our food. Amen.



Taken from "A Brownie Pack Prayer Book" Maybe a Brownie might like to make up her own prayer for the group.

Renewal of Brownie Guide Promise and Brownie Guide Leader's Promise.



This would be a nice time at the start of the year for all the Brownies to say their Promise and also the Brownie Guide leaders. It will give the new members a chance to hear it and realise that they too will have an opportunity to make this Promise.

Pow-Wow

As this is your first meeting after the break it would be a nice idea maybe to have a Pow-Wow as there will be a lot of very excited Brownies dying to share their news. Sometimes this may be the only chance a Brownie gets to talk aloud to a group and she has everyone's attention if only for a few minutes.

Pow-Wow or Talking ring is where the Brownies sit close together; elbows touching and one of the Owls begins the discussion. When a Brownie wishes to speak she makes a special sign by stretching forward her right hand with her 3 fingers touching the floor. In this way everyone who has some news or a good idea can easily be heard.

Programme Work

As this will be a very busy first meeting there may only be enough time to check with each group of Brownies to see where each group are at in their programme.

- Divide Brownies into their various Footprints; Blue, Green, Red, and Yellow and the Tweenies into their pre-enrolment group.
- Recap where each group is and if they are all starting a new footprint or completing one. As all the Brownies have renewed their Promise it might be a good idea to focus on the Promise aspect of each footprint.

Blue Footprint

Promise Challenge: Two areas of this could be selected and worked on for the next meeting. Pg 19 the Brownie Guide Book.

Green Footprint:

Promise Challenge: page 31 part 3 of this challenge with the link to the Homemaker special interest badge.

Red Footprint

Promise Challenge: page 41 part 3 and 4 "What does it mean to be a friend to someone?" And complete page 42 of the Brownie Guide Book

Yellow Footprint

Promise Challenge:Page 49 Part 3 of this challenge with the link to the Conservation special interest badge.

Tweenies:

The Tweenies will go into their pre-enrolment group and receive their new books. If they don't have their books yet it would be an idea to



photocopy page 14 for them to start colouring in as they have heard the Promise during the meeting. The Brownie Guide Promise will be explained in much greater detail to the Tweenies in the weeks leading up to their enrolment as Brownies into the Brownie Pack. Their colouring work can be displayed at their enrolment.

Closing Ceremony

After an enjoyable and busy meeting the Pack comes together for a short ceremony. Some of the following games / songs can be used to end your meeting.

Magic carpet

The Brownies huddle up close together on an Invisible piece of Magic carpet in the centre of the room. When one of the Brownie Leaders comes to the end of the following rhyme the brownies leave the Hall.

**Brownies are over
It's getting late
The magic carpet will never wait
So huddle up closely
And hold on tight and
Away we go into the night.**



Magic Squeeze

Everyone makes a circle and holds hands with the person on both sides of them linking with their little fingers only. Everyone closes their eyes and one Leaders asks for everyone to be very quiet. She announces that she is going to send around a magic squeeze, not indicating whether it will go to her left or right. When she starts it, everyone should still be very quiet with all eyes closed. It should go around the circle and come back to her but the chances are it will start coming back from both sides. When it looks like it has gone around a few times everyone can leave quietly if possible.



Brownie bells




Brownie Bells can be sung at this time. The music for this can be found on the Brownie Guide CD. Actions can be done to this. Pretend to hold a bell in each hand, that they ring while singing the song, or hold hands and swing hands together in time with the song.

We hope you have had a good summer. The following are some warm up games and ice breakers to get your unit off to a fun start this September.

Guide Branch Committee

The Element Game

Equipment: Handkerchief/neckerchief

Playing:

1. The players sit in a circle and one is chosen to begin the game.
2. That player throws the handkerchief at one of the other players and calls out one of the following elements: Earth, Air or Water.
3. As soon as the player says one of these words, they start to count up to 12 quickly.
4. The player at whom the handkerchief/neckerchief was thrown must name a creature living in the Earth, Air or Water.
5. If they give a suitable answer before the first player reaches 12, they stay in the game and throw the handkerchief next.
6. Players who cannot think of anything to say drop out of the game.



Apples to Oranges

Equipment: One apple, one orange, paper, pencil, container and music.

Playing:

1. Print out slips of paper that you will put into the container.
2. Each slip will be labelled differently as follows.: Before the apple, The apple, After the apple, Before the orange, The orange and After the orange. You might want to do a couple of sets in case certain slips become detectable after use.
3. Once you've completed the slips place them in a container and mix them up.
4. Have players stand in a circle, give the apple to one person and the orange to someone across the circle, then start the music.
5. They are to pass the fruits until the music stops.
6. When the music stops, pull out a slip of paper and read it. If the paper states before the specific fruit that person is out. If it's after the specific fruit that person is out. If it just states a fruit that person is out.
7. So not only do you have to worry about holding the fruit but where it is in the circle.
8. If you have a large group, set up several circles or a circle within a circle would be good.



Heads I Win

Equipment: Two balls


Playing:


1. The players are divided into two teams and each team has a ball.
2. The game starts by throwing the ball high into the air.
3. The idea of the game is to prevent the ball from hitting the ground.
4. No player may touch the ball more than twice in a row.
5. When the ball hits the ground that team is out and the other team scores a point.
6. Play continues for a set time and the team with the highest score wins.

Variations to the game can be passing the fruit under the leg, behind the back or twirl around once then pass the fruit. You could also use different coloured balls instead of fruit

Do you need to bolster your Guide Company's numbers? Why not have a "Friends Night" and play some of these games.

Ask each Guide to bring along a friend and explain that if their friend stays on to take the Promise then both of them get half of the cara badge.

Blanket Identification

Equipment: 1 non-see through blanket

Playing:


1. You'll need two people to hold up a blanket as if it were a curtain.
2. Separate the group of players in half and place the groups on opposite sides of the blanket.
3. Each group picks 1 person from their team (very quietly so the other team doesn't hear) and that person goes and stands right behind the blanket (*make sure that the players standing at the blanket cannot see each other.*)
4. When a player has been selected from each team, to stand at the blanket, the two people holding the blanket drop it. and the two players shout out the other player's name from the opposite team who was standing behind the blanket.
5. The first person to yell the name correctly gets one point. First team with 10 points wins.
6. Do not tell them the game or the rules they will be playing until the blanket is up and the teams are separated.

Nifty Naming

Equipment: None Necessary

Playing:

1. Everyone sits in a circle.
2. The first person introduces themselves by giving themselves a nifty name i.e. Amazing Amanda, Thrifty Teresa etc
3. The second person introduces themselves in the same way but also introduces the previous person.
4. The last person to go must introduce themselves and everyone in the circle.





A World Conference Diary

Saturday 5th July

As the morning of Saturday the 5th of July finally arrived, I was repacking my case, possibly for the fourth time. I was determined not to be beaten by my luggage, which consisted of my own things, IGG display materials, goods we would sell at the world market for WAGGGS and the goodies we were bringing for the International evening, all lovely produce from Ireland. It was testing my packing skills to the limit to fit everything into one case and stay within the allowed weight

Not long after 1pm, both Emer and I headed through the gate at Dublin airport. We were both on the first leg of our journey, that was to prove to be a most incredible experience. We arrived in London with not much time to spare as our flight from Dublin was delayed, we had to run in Heathrow to make our connection, but we did it.

Sunday 6th July

At 10.30 the following morning, we arrived at Birchwood Conference Hotel in Johannesburg, both very tired and very much looking forward to a couple of hours sleep before we would attend the orientation session. Ah! but this was not to be. We had to remember that we were in Africa and things operate at a different pace than in the rest of the world, so we finally got our room at 3pm in the afternoon. This just gave us enough time to have a quick wash and change before we headed off to the Orientation session in the Marco Polo Hall. Everyone was in great spirits - with introductions, greetings and embraces for all our old friends. After a rundown of all the rules and procedures, we had a few icebreakers and then headed off to evening dinner.

Monday 7th July

Monday morning we were up early. It was freezing, I believe it was minus one and with frost on the ground. 


Irish Delegation at their table in the Conference Centre

Tuesday was a full day of Conference work from voting on Constitutional matters, discussions on proposed motions in the morning to an afternoon of Leadership Development, and a focus on Advocacy. That night we were treated again to a most enjoyable traditional African evening of food and music.

In Praise of Elspeth Henderson

The lead up to the presentation of Elspeth's Silver Medal was marked by five beautiful speeches made by various guiders of different nationalities. They give a detailed description of all the work that Elspeth has done, and reading them, makes us realise what a gem Elspeth is, and why she truly deserves her award. The following is a condensed version of the speeches made at the 33rd World Conference.

ZSOFI SZALAI, HUNGARY – SPEAKER 1

In 1992 the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts invited six young women artists to submit designs for two very special medals. These medals would be presented to individuals or Member Organizations of WAGGGS to show appreciation for outstanding work in support of Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting. A panel of judges selected from among members of the World Committee, WAGGGS Member Organizations, and the Royal Mint chose the designs which were thought to best convey the spirit of WAGGGS. The medals were cast in bronze and silver by the Royal Mint. Since then, the World Board has recognized a number of very deserving individuals with the bronze medal. Today the Board recognizes a prior bronze awardee, this time with WAGGGS highest award, the WAGGGS Silver Medal. The silver medal has been awarded only 5 times before today to those who have given truly extraordinary service to our Movement over a very long time.

CHEMPAKA PAHAMIN, MALAYSIA – SPEAKER 2

Elspeth Henderson, Chairman of the World Board, today WAGGGS says thank you for more than three decades of truly extraordinary service to the Girl Guides and Girl Scouts of the World. Elspeth was recognized with the WAGGGS Bronze Medal in 1999 at the 30th World Conference in Ireland, which was a great success thanks to her leadership. At that time she had already performed outstanding work in support of the Movement. She joined the Movement as a Guide and was a Ranger and a Guide Leader as well as an active leader of her Association, the Irish Girl Guides. Between 1975 and 1989 she was a National Trainer, Chairman of the National Training Committee, Member of the National Executive Committee and International Commissioner for IGG. During these same years, she also served the larger Movement as a Member and Chairman of Our Chalet Committee, an Ex officio member of the Europe Committee and later as a Substitute Member of the Europe Committee.

DORIS MARCELLE, IVORY COAST – SPEAKER 3

She was elected Chairman of the Europe Committee in 1989, a position she held for 6 years, during which she also served as a Member of the Europe Region Task Force responsible for development of Guiding and Scouting in Central and Eastern Europe and then as a Member of WAGGGS' Central and Eastern Europe Ad Hoc Group. She also devoted countless hours over more than a decade in support of the Irish Girl Guides and the Catholic Guides of Ireland as they worked together to form the Council of Irish Guiding Associations (CIGA) which, in 1993, became the successor to the Irish Girl Guides as the WAGGGS Member Organization for the Republic of Ireland. When she retired from the Europe Committee in 1995, she surely anticipated having a rest from Guiding duties. She had earned one.

HAIFA OURIR, TUNISIA – SPEAKER 4

Barely a year later, at the World Conference in Canada, Dublin, Ireland, was selected as the venue for the 30th World Conference. Elspeth agreed to come out of WAGGGS' retirement and lead the Conference Planning Team. Later she served as President of the Irish Girl Guides until 2002, when the delegates to the 31st World Conference in the Philippines elected her as one of the six new members of the World Board. She was asked by the new Chairman, Kirsty Gray, to take on the leadership of another World Conference, the 32nd in Jordan, our first in the Arab Region, with its own unique challenges and opportunities. Her colleagues on the World Board affirmed Elspeth's outstanding leadership skills when they elected her to lead them as Chairman at the close of the 2005 World Conference.

The last triennium has been unique in its challenges as well. In addition to all the usual work that comes with being Chairman of the Board, and the thousands of miles she has travelled to every corner of the WAGGGS' world, Elspeth has led the Board as it has changed its structure, improved its governance, and adopted a comprehensive Board evaluation process, consistent with best practice in the United Kingdom. She chaired the Search Committee for a new Chief Executive and managed the retirement of our former Chief Executive and the transition to new leadership. We believe she logged a new record on Ryan Air for the most flights between Dublin and London in the shortest time. It is impossible to fully measure the impact her leadership of this process will have on the future success of the World Association. We do know from the favourable reaction of our Member Organizations in the year since Mary McPhail joined us, that the outcome of the search has been viewed as a resounding success.

Rebuilding Lives – Asia Pacific Region

Rashini Ishara is one of the 37 young Tsunami survivors in the Hambantota district who has received life-changing help and support from the Sri Lanka Girl Guides. The Association set up a Disaster Relief branch in Child Development Centres in the devastated areas. The Centre where Rashini lives has provided young people with access to libraries, computer labs and extra coaching in school, work and sports while monitoring their well-being.

Ghana Guides prevent anaemia – Africa Region


A peer-educator's training event took place in Ghana in March, where 30 leaders and Rangers were trained on the causes of anaemia, who gets affected and how best to avoid the illness through nutrition, including making a nutrition book of local foods. This event is the latest leg in the Africa Region WAGGGS vital anaemia education programme, designed to increase the life expectancy and improve the health of more than 34,000 girls, young women and infants in the region. The Anaemia Prevention Badge handbook and workbook for Girl Guides and the training manual for leaders can be downloaded from the Africa Region micro website.

Preparing for an emergency

Guides from all over the Caribbean shared emergency procedures in their countries at the Caribbean Link trainers' workshop. The event was titled 'In the service of country in times of crisis' and was held in Trinidad in April. It aimed to help enhance the response that Guiding can make in such situations. They learned about preparing for national emergencies, as well as understanding post-traumatic stress disorder.


