
The "Federal Period" started on 7th September 1953 until 4th July 1964 (the last school day before Independence)

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
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# **SPONSORS**

### **FEATURE**



The Building of the

### **BLANTYRE CHURCH**

NYASALAND 1888-1891

By the Late Rev.

### ALEXANDER HETHERWICK

C.B.E., D.D., F.R.G.S.

On entering the building one passes under a shallow porch of four brick "fluted" pillars supporting a very small gallery under the western windows . This gallery Scott intended for a small organ, but it is manifestly inadequate for such a purpose.

The front of the gallery and the frieze running between the tops of the pillars is of wood, and is ornamented by a series of designs carved by one of the African carpenters. The series was never completed, but the parts already done give evidence of some wonderful symbolic work. It is not every artist who dare attempt to represent on wood the vision of Ezekiel, but there it is, plainly cut by the chisel of the African carver following the penciled outline of Scott's drawing. No flight of fancy was too lofty for Scott's mind not to soar after it.

To the left there is a narrow doorway with a Moorish arch leading into the bell tower staircase already mentioned. On entering the western doorway under the porch above mentioned one is at once struck by the vista of the Byzantine arcade formed by the arches between the nave pillars and the large transept arches on either side. These pillar arches are rounded and rise off the capital of the nave, while the pillars themselves are continued up the clerestory walls to meet the wooden corbels from which the principals of the roof rise.

The capitals of the pillars are plain ogee mouldings on a simple bead course running round the whole pillar. The base of each pillar is squared with a simple bead running around it corresponding with the bead at the top of the capital.

Looking along the whole length of the church from the western door one feels that the vista of aisle transepts and chancel would have been greatly enhanced had the floor of the chancel been raised by a few more steps, and still more had the apse been made the full width of the chancel instead of being narrowed to half. But in this case the architect would have had to sacrifice his half dome of the apse, as undoubtedly his system of groining by octagonal tapering bullet-head bricks would not have borne the strain of so wide an arch.

Standing beside the south-west pillar of the arch and looking across to the other transept and upwards towards the interior of the dome, the view is one of the most striking in the whole building, and shows some of me most difficult problems the architect had to solve. The working of the square central space between the main arches into the octagon above cost him many an anxious thought.

The panellino. of the interior of the dome is seen, taken from below. The coloring of the panels was meant to represent the sky. The narrowness of the side isles of the nave-riot more than three feet between the pillars and the wall. This gives a very cramped appearance to this part of the structure. A foot or two of extra width would not have thrown any extra strain on the flying buttresses which he threw over his isle, and would have added immensely to the spaciousness of the building. But when the foundations were laid he had visions of a groined roof in brick, and so thought more of strength than of space.

As left by Scott when he retired in 1897, the structure was completed only so far as its interior was concerned. The interior was still in much the same condition as it was when, it was hurriedly completed to admit of its being dedicated in 1891. The pillars and main walls were plastered over, and coloured - the former in dark green, the latter in red. At intervals since that date various efforts were made for its completion.

The roof has already been alluded to. The plaster was removed from the pillars, and the original brickwork uncovered. The mouldings of the main arches were done in various shades of brick colour, so as to emphasize their richness and depth. The same process was carried out in the various string courses and mouldings of the interior of the octagon and the dome.

In 1907 an organ was installed in the 'North transept. It is strange that Scott, with his musical inclinations did

not make provision for a larger instrument than could be accommodated on the narrow porch just inside the main door. The North transept was the only possible site, and even it could only be utilized for this purpose at the cost of interfering with the lower division of the central light of the triple window, in that transept.

In 1912 electric light was installed.

Much has been done to enrich the interior with gifts and memorials. The seven light windows in the apse form a memorial to Dr. John Bowie, for three years doctor to the Mission and to the European community. He died in the beginning of 1891 of an attack of diphtheria contracted as the result of an effort to save the life of the baby child of his sister, Mrs. Henderson, by sucking the tube after an operation of tracheotomy. He was a physician greatly beloved by both black and white, who together gifted this memorial of one whom all recognized as friend as well as physician. The three central lights represent the crucifixion- the figure on the Cross with the Magdalene kneeling beneath it, and on either side the Virgin and St. John. On either side again our Lord as the Good Shepherd and the Good Physician; and on either side again St. Peter and St. Paul.

In the centre of the large south transept window is an inset of the Resurrection, in memory of Catherine Drummond Duncan, wife of Jonathan Duncan, who died in 1883. She was much lamented by the members of the small European community to whom she had endeared herself by many kindly deeds. Two of the three lights of the north transept window are fitted, one with the Baptism of our Lord and the other with the Ascension. The former was erected by his Directors in memory of Louis Monteith Fotheringham, manager of the African Lakes Corporation, who died at Chinde on his way home in 1895. The latter was erected by the members of the Chamber of Agriculture and Commerce in memory of John Buchanan, pioneer planter and Acting Vice-Consul, who also died at Chinde on his way home in 1896, and of his brothers David and Robert, who died at Blantyre in 1892 and 1896. Of the five lancet windows in the western gable of the nave, the central light represents the Archangel Michael, and is in memory of Dr William Affleck Scott, Mission doctor in Blantyre, who died in 1896. The two lights on either side of the above represent the angels Gabriel and Raphael, and was erected by the European community in commemoration of the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria. The pulpit was gifted by the late Miss Elizabeth Pearson of St. Andrews and Strathblane. The prayer-desk was made and gifted to the Church by the late Dr. Patrick M. Playfair, minister of St Andrews, at that time minister of Glencairn. The font was the gift of St Andrew's Church, North Berwick.\* On the Communion table stands a small book-rest made from the tree in the Ilala country under which was buried the heart of David Livingstone. The wood was gifted by the late Robert Codrington, first Administrator under the British South Africa Company. A small brass plate is fixed to the desk giving the name of the donor as well as well as the origin of the piece of wood from which the desk is made.

On the walls of the chancel and on several of the pillars in the aisles there are brasses erected to the memory of members of the staff - Robert Cleland, Henry Henderson, William Affleck Scott, and Janet Beck. A bronze tablet laid in marble on the north chancel wall commemorates the Centenary of the birth of David Livingstone. It was gifted by his grandchildren, and was unveiled on the day of the Centenary.

Commemorative Service - 13 March, 1913. On the east most pillar of the nave - and over the seat which he occupied in Church - when not taking part in the service - is a brass erected in memory of the architect and builder of the church and bearing an inscription to that effect. To those who remember the idealism with which he looked at all his work, the text appended seems singularly appropriate, 'Ye also as living stones are built up a spiritual House' (1 Peter ii. 4). On the opposite pillar is a brass to the memory of Dr John McRae, minister at Hawick, who took a leading part in the movement which led to the starting of the Mission in 1874. On one of the buttresses of the south-western tower is a small brass plate which commemorates the fixing of the longitude of Blantyre in 1885 by Lieut.H.E.O'Neil by means of a series of 365 sets of lunar observations. The result made the longitude of Blantyre to be 2 hrs 20 min. 13.56 sec. E of Greenwich. This result has not required correction and has been made the starting -point for the geographical survey of the whole of the Protectorate and the surrounding country.

Subject: IT HAS BEGUN

Hi All,

Well, we had our first guests in camp this week, a little ahead of the season but being a journalist and an agent who were insistent, we thought we would obliged as long as they understood they had to stay in staff quarters, (Brian, the Snr. Guide's house which is much more upmarket than those of us plebs!), and not the normal guests chalets as we haven't started rebuilding these yet.

The Agent works/co-owns a large Travel Agency in England that sends us a lot of business and he was accompanying this journalist from the Sunday Times in England, (Sports/Travel writer), on a trip out to Luangwa and they particularly wanted to come to Tafika for a couple of nights. So, a lot of tarting up of the camp and ourselves was done and instead of eating under our little rondavel shade near the kitchen we were all nicely set up in the main lounge area, or sitenje as they call it. So too was the bar which was quite exciting as for the next couple of days we would have pre-dinner drinks here before we moved to the dining table for a very nice three course meal. If this is what it's going to be like through the season I really am going to find it tough!

The journalist could not have looked less like a sports writer if he tried; with a long graying ponytail, and that typical gait of a wiry public school boy, he looked more like an ageing hippy than a sports writer. I think he was becoming a little concerned whilst here though when he realised he had missed the major story of the world cup cricket, something he should have been at but chose to send someone else!!

Soon after they arrived at camp, we adjourned to an area on the banks of the river where chairs had been positioned so we could look out over the river to view game and birds etc. and tea and cake was set up on a table close by. After tea, they went off on a micro-light flight which gave me a chance to finish off some work and then it was off to get ourselves ready for drinks and

dinner. The hardest part is joining them for breakfast at 6 a.m. each morning before they set off for their 'morning activity'. They headed off in the boat for a river safari up stream and I to my office for a mornings work. A leisurely lunch - something I am not used to after the years in the Entertainment industry in Australia - and back to work, to start all over again early evening. This is obviously how it will be in the season, but it will be up to me to find that balance between mixing with the guests and getting some real work done, or I am going to struggle to keep up with it all.

They left camp early morning two days later in a canoe paddling down stream to do a bit of bird viewing while their bags were transported down river by boat. It had been a very pleasant change to what has become a routine for us and to sit round the lunch/dinner table with fresh topics of conversation. I guess though, the novelty will wear off quite quickly once in full swing.

That day Carol and I were working in the office when we heard this incredibly loud "pop" and went out to the communal kitchen to investigate. Aside from our kitchen staff, there were a couple of game scouts there with their automatic weapons, one of which had a bayonet for some reason, (I'm sure a bullet would be sufficient in whatever predicament they found themselves!). Anyway, this scout told us he was sticking the bayonet into the ground to stand his weapon up when he pulled the trigger by mistake. The safety catch was not on so the gun went off! Pow! I had visions of what could have happened had he been waving that gun around in the air, as they tend to do!!! We were quite thankful our guests had left camp already.

Otherwise it has been the usual routine in camp with much observing of the bush, animals, insects and setting sun topped off with tapping away at the computer daily.

This observing of nature starts off with the dawn chorus for me; in the five minutes before getting up the other morning as I lay in bed I was amazed at the vast number of birds I could hear, so decided to try and count them. (I know, very sad isn't it!!) In between the sounds of the crickets, frogs and hippos I counted ten different bird calls and though there were quite a few more, I have no doubt, I was getting confused as to what I had counted and what I hadn't so left it at that. There is one that is so strange, it sounds so much like a kitten's meow - whilst working in the office a couple of weeks ago I heard it and went off to try and find this stray kitten, or so I thought, only to be told it was a bird! It's the weirdest sound! My two favourites are the sound of the dove, (which of the many, I haven't the foggiest), and of course the cry of the fish eagle which will always remind me of Lake Malawi, and is the national bird here.

One part of nature that is not quite so pleasant are the flies which are shocking at the moment due to the rains. I had to smile the first time I saw Jonathan Peach walk out in his hat with netting, that came off the brim to his shoulders, to protect his face from flies and 'mossies' but in the last couple of days I would have paid him for the use of it, the flies have been so bad. The minute you step out your room or the office they pounce - talk about the Aussie salute! Where ever you go when outside from there on you take about 15 or 20 flies for a walk too! For some strange reason though there are certain spots in the camp where they don't bother you and others where you wrap yourself in knots trying to fight them off. Fortunately when eating out doors we don't seem to be bothered as much which really baffles me!

I felt very sorry for the little pup the other day. Behind the kitchen we have this large vegetable garden which supplies the camp with much of its salad, fruit and veggies throughout the season, and to protect it from the animals, it has an electric fence around it which they turn on at night.

Between the kitchen and the garden runs the main path that we use to get to and from our houses/office and kitchen/main area. Well we had stopped on this path chatting one evening, the garden had been closed up and the fence turned on, which the pup soon discovered when it touched it with it's wet nose. We heard this almighty zap! and the dog, yelping wildly, ran round and round the camp squealing it's poor little head off. I really don't think it has associated the pain with the fence though as it still goes frighteningly close to it at times.



John took me out on a long "familiarization" flight on the micro-light last week; my past and only two previous flights were for 15 minutes at a time but this time we must have gone out for about an hour. It was as spectacular and amazing as usual, but about 45 mins into it after many steep turns and swoops and much diving to view game and birds etc I started to feel a little queasy. Thinking that we wouldn't be much longer I didn't mention anything but we flew on and I started getting greener and greener and thought if we don't stop soon I think I'm going to throw up! There was me, perched right behind the pilot with this large helmet on and visor down and I thought if it comes to it, what do I do? Do I lift the visor and risk upsetting the pilot, or do I keep the visor down??!! Fortunately, we did head back to camp and we landed without incident and with John, the pilot, none the wiser. I think I will be keeping my micro-light flights short in future.

On that note, I will sign off. I hope you are all well and enjoying life; do drop me a line when you get a chance but in the meantime, take care.

When reading the first Newsletter - received last month - so many memories came flooding back, good and bad! Some school friends came to mind, **Barry Stranik (Gregg)**, **Reggie Rice(**†), **Suzanne Lategan (Chevalier)**, (Yes, the Chief of Police's Daughter!!), **Mary Poynton (Malachias)** and many more. Also **Miss DUNBAR -** what a teacher!!

I was at both the Junior and High Schools, (longest years of my life!).

Mr SILCOCK and Bill OWEN(♣) would remember me in the "bent over the chair, cane position" - I'm sure they would not remember my face! In my own defence, most times I owned up to being the guilty party to get the "guilty party's" pocket money for the week and if my memory serves me right, it was about one shilling a week at boarding school. I then went to town on the bus on Saturday, in style, with many cuts and bruises, but it was worth it! Mr SILCOCK was the "Cane King" - OUCH!!!

At boarding school our initiation into school was "The Guinea Fowl" - all the guys lined up on the field in a straight line, and you had to run between their legs to the end of the line, our leather army cadet bootlaces were mostly used to encourage you to "move it up"!!

During the riots around the Clock Tower in Blantyre and other areas, the Federation soldiers from Southern Rhodesia, came to our school and bunked down in the corridors - we used to blanco their webbing, brasso their buckles and bone their boots etc, they tipped well and we spent our earnings in their army tuck shop at school - Be interesting to know if the Head knew about this? The planes used to fly over dropping pamphlets all over while President "Kamuza" Banda was driven around in his open top vehicle swishing his tail flyswats.

### Short life story:

From school, I did a 3 and-a-half years apprenticeship - Qualified Diesel Mechanic. Exempted from the army in Bulawayo due to motorcycle accident and returned to Salisbury.

Met my lovely Wife Lynne in Salisbury, (yes, happily married for 42 years). Came down to Durban end of 1963 - We have 3 beautiful, clever Daughters, (where the brains came from we are not sure!!) Kim, Kandi and Karyn. Kandi retired in Sandton, Jo'burg, at the age of 30 and has a Son Jacques and Daughter Erica-Lynne. Kim has a Son Keagan (14) who is at Kearsney College and is Cpt of the Jnr Cricket Team and Jnr Prefect. Her Daughter Kelsey-Lynne (10) attends St Mary's in Kloof. My youngest Daughter Karyn has two beautiful girls named Daena (11) and Beth (8) who both attend Hillcrest Christian Academy - Beth is very mischievous, (guess where that comes from??)

# **EXTRACTS FROM THE SCHOOL MAGAZINES SAPS Vol.1, No.3 - Dec 1958.**

# Report on Young Farmers' Club 1958

THE past twelve months have been a period of consolidation and expansion in spite of the splitting up of our club members due to the separation of the High School from the Preparatory School. We continued to work together until, during the visit of Mr. Derek Baker, the Chief Organizer from Southern Rhodesia, we elected two separate committees and planned our programme for the coming year.

Previously we had visited Byumbwe Experimental Station and Mikolongwe Livestock Improvement Centre, borrowing a boar from the former and admiring Huntsman, the heifer calf born from our cow Anticipation, at the latter. A most successful Pet Show, organised at Zomba by Mrs. Duncan, resulted in our winning the Pet of the Year award with our Jersey "Anticipation" as well as first prize in the heavy and light breed poultry, rabbits and guinea pig classes. We must confess with shame that a white mouse won first prize for us has since developed into a rat!

Following a visit from Mr. Faulkner, Director of Veterinary Services who talked to us about Animal Husbandry, we formed a new advisory committee of interested experts drawn from the Departments of Agriculture, Veterinary Services, Forestry and from practising farmers. We must record our grateful thanks to those busy people who have unhesitatingly at all times rendered personal assistance to us whenever we were in need of advice or help.

Our breeding programme this year has been most successful although we were unable to rear any piglets. Our large white sow ate several of her young at birth and in spite of the efforts of Mr. Eccles, who tried to hand-rear the survivors at home, the last remaining piglet died a month later. Our sheep and goats have increased considerably and we were able to hatch some very fine chickens in our perspex-topped "incubator. Our guinea pigs, tortoises and rabbits continue to flourish but we are now designing a new rabbit run to prevent too much fighting. Five goslings were born this year but we are turning down all applications to buy one for Christmas Dinner!

The highlight of the year was undoubtedly the visit of Mr. Derek Baker who not only officially declared our clubs and presented the badges we now so proudly wear, but also injected us with some of his enthusiasm for the Young Farmers' Club movement in the Federation. Our Senior Club will now work on project lines and we hope to invite children on leave from Rhodesia to join us in educational visits and functions during the school holidays. The Preparatory School club with their headquarters at Sunnyside, will continue to look after poultry (including newly imported Game birds and Silkies) and small livestock and to build up vegetable and flower gardens. Unfortunately, we have had to disperse our larger' animals, but with the assistance of Mr. Barry Marshall and officials of the Soil Conservation Department, terraces have been planned and a most attractive lay-out should be completed by the end of the year.

We should like to congratulate Mr. D. Dunn, who established a very flourishing unit at Glenae School, Cholo, in spite of having very few children of 10 and over. With the first club at Zomba continuing to go from strength to strength under the leadership of Mrs. Duncan, and the children of Chichiri School showing an active interest in our movement, the future of Young Farmers' Clubs in Nyasaland is indeed bright.

# **NEWS FROM THE SCHOOL**

("Friday in Malawi" reported on the following event at the School)

### St. Andrew's High School 5-a-side Football Tournament

After a gap of some years, St. Andrew's International High School will be running a 5-a-side tournament on Saturday 31st March as part of the Saints School Fair. We hope to raise 16 teams from companies and organisations across Blantyre in a friendly, but competitive tournament.

We propose that the first matches will kick off at 10.00am with the teams being divided into groups of four who will play each other on a round robin basis. After a short break, the top eight teams will progress through into knock-out stages. The final should be completed by 2.30pm and the engraved tournament trophy awarded to the winners shortly after. There will also be a player of the tournament trophy. All matches will be played on the main school field on 5-a-side marked pitches, refereed by professional officials and will last for 20 minutes with a 10 minute break in between. I joined the School in 1961, but at the break up of the Federation, unlike most of the staff, I headed north, having by then been away from the UK for six years and as on only child I felt obliged to do

# **RECIPE CORNER**


Extract from the "St Andrew's High School Recipe Book"

-- 12 --

#### ORANGE JELLY:

Take the juice of 6 oranges and 1 Lemon. Mix with yolks of three eggs and three teaspoons of gelatine dissolved in  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup boiling water and 1 cup sugar.

Whip whites of eggs until stiff and stir into mixture. Place in refrigerator until set



#### EGG ICE CREAM:

### Ingredients.

2 Eggs 2 tbsp. Sugar

Few drops flavouring essence

1 small tin Carnation Evaporated Milk chilled in refrigerator overnight.

The refrigerator should be on very cold for at least ½ hour before making.

#### Method.

Separate the yolks from the whites and beat to a cream with sugar. Whip the egg whites very stiff and add to the egg yolk basin. Whip the milk as stiff as possible and fold with the egg whites into the yolks. Pour into an ice tray and freeze.

**N.B.** The secret of this ice cream is to have it as stiff as possible otherwise it will separate. The ice tray should be cold so that it freezes quickly.

### **DPP HAS NO PLANS FOR CONVENTION**

The Democratic Progressive Party (DPP) has no immediate plans to hold a convention to elect a presidential candidate because Bingu wa Mutharika is the party's automatic torch bearer in the 2009 general elections. DPP publicity secretary Zeria Chakale said Monday the party is well-prepared for the 2009 general elections with Mutharika as its candidate.



She added DPP has no immediate plans to hold a convention, saying the current focus is to strengthen the party at grassroots level. "The DPP is a focused and strategic party. We cannot fight the President. He is delivering. He is an automatic candidate. Our party currently does not have a programme or agenda for a convention. Right now, we are building the party. We cannot go to a convention without proper structures," said Chakale.

Asked whether or not by declaring that Mutharika is the party's automatic candidate was not a warning to aspiring candidates, Chakale said DPP has no intention to interfere with a president who is performing. According to the publicist, constitutionally Mutharika has another five-year term to continue with his development agenda. DPP regional governor for the North, Harry Mkandawire concurred with Chakale, saying there is no one who can compete with Mutharika for the position of president. "We can't get anybody better than Bingu. There is no one who wants to compete with the President," said Mkandawire. DPP regional governor for the Centre, Kalazi Mbewe and his Southern Region counterpart Isaac Nyakamera could not be reached as they were with Mutharika on a whistle stop tour in Kasungu.

Commenting on regional polls which were postponed last year, Chakale said the party is working on modalities though the date has been set yet. Mutharika is likely to face former president Bakili Muluzi who said on Sunday at a rally in Blantyre that if endorsed by the party's convention, he will stand in the 2009 polls together with MCP President John Tembo. The development, according to some quarters, is a threat to democracy as possible candidates are naturally intimidated since their bosses have declared interest to stand. Political analyst Mustafah Hussein said the declaration by Mutharika, Muluzi and Tembo to contest in the 2009 polls undermines democracy as it prevents possible aspirants from competing. Mustafah said the problem is that there is a "founders" and "big man" syndromes in most parties, arguing it's high time the old guard groom and promote young leaders to be seen practising the democracy they preach.

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# Madonna denies new adoption reports

London - A spokeswoman for pop star Madonna confirmed on Friday that the pop star was going to Malawi over the weekend, but denied a newspaper report that it was to adopt another child from the impoverished African nation. Citing unnamed sources, The Sun tabloid in London said Madonna was intent on adopting three-year-old girl Grace after watching a documentary about a child care home for orphans in the country, despite a storm of controversy over her efforts to adopt a Malawian boy last year. "Madonna is going to Africa to continue her work with the Raising Malawi organisation," the star's spokesperson Liz Rosenberg said. "She is overseeing the building of a children's healthcare centre. She is absolutely not adopting another baby."

The pop star, 48, sparked a furore late last year when she and her husband Guy Ritchie, secured a temporary 18-month custody order from the Malawi courts for baby boy David Banda. The couple hope to formally adopt him. They have two other children -10-year-old Lourdes and Rocco, six.But the granting of the order, which enabled Madonna to take Banda out of Malawi last year, sparked heated debate about adoption laws in a country where the number of orphans is surging as a result of Aids. A legal challenge is now underway from rights groups who claim that existing legislation in Malawi does not allow for international adoption.

"Madonna saw a film of children at a place called The Consol Home," The Sun quoted an unidentified source said to be close to the star as saying. "She spotted a beautiful girl called Grace who lit the room with her smile, and fell head over heels for her. Madonna kept saying, 'That girl has so much love in her. I want to help her achieve her potential'," the source said. "But adoption officials are being very strict after uproar when Madonna adopted David. They know Grace is her first choice, but have insisted she looks at other girls first - and that the final decision is theirs." David's father, Yohane Banda, was initially quoted as saying he did not realise his son would be taken out of the country for good, but later said he supported the adoption. "It was always Madonna's intention to adopt two orphans from Malawi - a boy and a girl. Grace is healthy, stunning, and has no living relatives. It was the fact David's dad Yohane was alive and well that caused most of the problems last time," the source told The Sun. - Sapa-AFP

When I met up with Nanette Alsop (Lenkiewicz) [JH] at the SA Reunion she gave me some photos and amongst them was this one that she does not have any information on!


It seems to be a Float of some kind with some African Huts on the back. The Ford in the background certainly dates it to the 60s.
