COMMUNITY TRAFFIC STUDY NIXED

The City of Calgary's transportation department has chosen to undertake a formal community traffic study in the communities of Mt. Pleasant, Tuxedo Park and Capitol Hill for 2010 while the request from Bridgeland-Riverside will be kept on the list to be considered for a traffic study in 2011.

It is interesting to observe that the quiet community of Scarboro has had numerous traffic calming signs and barriers implemented recently even though there is virtually no traffic going through that community and there has not been a recent traffic study completed for Scarboro. Oddly, I believe Alderman John Mar lives in Scarboro.

In any event, this may be a good thing for our community as it shows that the city is willing to put up signs and barriers without a traffic study and can execute safety measures throughout the city on an ongoing basis, not just one neighbourhood at a time.

There are many traffic/pedestrian safety initiatives that could be implemented at a low cost without the need for a study. Some NO LEFT TURN signs, some rumble strips for cars going down the 10 Street hill, a few curb bump-outs to eliminate passing on the right and some more frequent or thicker paint jobs at crosswalks are a few simple ideas.

Hopefully, the pedestrian crossing lights on 1 Ave and 8 Street can be replaced by some real and visible OVERHEAD lights before the leaves show up on the trees this spring.

The closing of St. Georges Drive just north of the Zoo parking lot has further inundated Bridgeland-Riverside with cut-through traffic (drivers who were using that road to bypass our community). Hopefully, this will be a short term closure. Permanent closure would be short-sighted and ludicrous.

Driving through Bridgeland-Riverside, I rarely exceed 40 km/hr as I find it unsafe to drive any faster due to the large number of pedestrians and parked cars on



Hosting a Successful Garage Sale

As an avid garage saler who has hosted many successful sales, I have compiled some ideas to assist in the planning of your own spring sale. If you want a successful garage sale, remember that making money is a bonus; it is the purging of all your unused treasures that is the far greater payoff.

Signage

Participating in a community garage sale is a great opportunity to get a lot of traffic to your sale. If this is not possible, you will need signs that are large, easy to read and placed at every intersection in your area. Signs on main streets should be placed well before the turn, so your potential shoppers have time to change lanes if needed, and make turns easily. If there can be any doubt which direction to turn, post a sign. You do not want anyone wondering where to go, or worse, ending up at someone else's sale because their signs were easier to follow. Also, do not forget to check your signs a few times during your sale. If you have a lull of customers, it may be because one of your signs blew over or fell down.

Pricing and Product Display

Be cautious of pricing items too high. When people perceive your prices as high, they are less likely to buy from you. Make offers that encourage people to buy more. Kids' books are great items to do this with. One book may be twenty five cents but five for a dollar is even better! If a child is at your sale and looking at a small toy, give it to him for free. You will have a very happy child, a parent who now has time to look at your higher priced items, and one less item to drag to a donation bin.

Do not waste time pricing everything in your sale as this takes unnecessary time and effort. Make use of boxes. Write a price on the side and fill it up with items of the same value. A "free" box is a great place for the little junky items you are unlikely to sell. For items you want people to be able to see more easily, use blankets and have one sign that applies to all items on that blanket. Four chairs and a piece of wood make a great table for showcasing your merchandise. String tied between two trees is an effective way to hang clothing. Group same priced items together and use one pricing sign whenever possible. When you have items that you want a specific price on, do not waste money on costly stickers, masking tape will do the trick.

Change and Bags

Make buying easy! Be sure to have enough change on hand. Want people to buy multiple items? Provide bags to make it easier for them to transport purchases.

Hours

The best time for a garage sale is Saturday between 9am and 2pm. Continuing your sale into Sunday is up to you, but be aware you will have minimal traffic and fewer purchases. It works best to sell everything you can on Saturday until 2pm, being more liberal with your pricing as the day goes on. At this point, remove any items you are not

willing to give away, and start telling all your buyers everything is now free. Yes, you read that right! Free! People will cart away free items by the boxful, saving you the hassle of getting rid of them yourself.

Balloons


Balloons are wonderful things, especially at a garage sale! Place balloons on all your signs and in your yard and people will flock to your sale. Countless people have arrived at my sales and told me it was the balloons that brought them, so use balloons in abundance!

Some Final Thoughts

At the end of the day, remove all your signs. Your neighbours will thank you, not to mention you will

need those signs for the garage sale you will host next spring. We all swear we will never accumulate that much junk again, but we always do! It is not a bad thing either. Without unwanted treasures, there can be no sale, and garage sales are fun. Good luck at your next sale!





Facelift for the Langevin schoolyard



Dear Bridgeland-Riverside,

Langevin School is planning to naturalize our playground. This is what we have planned for our new playground so far.

We've been researching natural regions in Alberta and we're planning to put plants from those regions into our playground for educational reasons. Here is some information about some of the "regions" that we plan to develop in our schoolyard:

Parkland - This region has lots of vegetation so it needs lots of sun so we'll put it in the north where most of the sun is shining down. Parkland has plants such as Cattail and Bulrushes.

The Canadian Shield - This region doesn't need much sun so we're putting it on the end of a small, north-facing hill. This is similar to...

The Boreal Forest - Here, the coniferous trees don't need much sun to grow. Still, plants in the boreal forest region don't grow well because of the shortage of good growing weather in Alberta's climate, so it would make more sense to have fewer plants and focus on the trees if we end up making a boreal forest in our playground.

Grasslands - Grass needs lots of sun so we can put grass in a wide-open space where just enough light can reach it.

Here's some other information about our plans, as well as some ideas for vegetation use.

- White Spruce grows well in full sunlight and not well in soil that is sandy or loose from the ground. Instead, it would prefer hard packed, moist soil. They grow much better with other trees such as Aspen, Birch and Balsam Poplar. Ferns like The Bracken Fern also prefer woodlands and thickets.
- The Trembling Aspen would work well in the parkland or in a forest region that is built for coniferous trees (not deciduous trees such as the Aspen). Also, The Balsam-

root grows well on dry hillsides and forests.

We would also like to add some wild flowers to our park. Some good wildflowers for our grasslands are the Early Blue Violet, Yellow Prairie Violet, Common Mullein and Smooth Blue Beardtongue. We can also use our hill for flowers and a couple of trees that grow on slopes and in prairies or forests. Flowers and shrubs that would work well in a variety of conditions would be Colorado Rubberplant, Death Camas, Lyre-leaved Orckcress or the Sagebrush.

Rough Fescue is a great prairie plant along with Prairie Rose and Red Fescue. For coniferous tree areas, Bog Cranberry, Fowl Bluegrass and Common Moonwart would be good.

For Rocky areas such as the Canadian Shield region, we can use the Prickly Saxi-frage.

Our playground is very wet. We were thinking of making some sort of draining system to clear the water away. The soccer field is big attraction at our school, and we wouldn't want it to go to waste being the place where most of the water seems to pool up. So, we could turn the soccer field into a hill to drain water. You may be thinking that the water would just pile up at the bottom of the hill, but we planned for that. What we would do is we would put a bunch of water-loving plants at the bottom to suck up all the water.

Do you have any suggestions? You will have to see it all the time walking, cycling and driving past the school. Do you think we should add a drainage system? Please contact us for any comments or questions at naturelangevin@gmail.com.

I am a Grade 6 student of Mrs. Hastie's Schoolyard Naturalization group. I am writing this article in hopes that it will spread word throughout the community and get more people actively involved in our Schoolyard Naturalization Project. The project will involve turning our barren schoolyard into a rich, natural learning environment and making a large outdoor sandstone amphitheatre.

If you have ever walked past the Langevin School soccer field, you'd know that it is unattractive and bare, most likely from the hundreds of kids walking over it every day. But about three years ago, the students of Mrs. Hastie's Grade 5/6 class decided to change all that. They began planting trees and small plants, but over the summer - because of lack of water - they died. They began planning again, and found there was a lot more research to be done.

Now, three years later, after long periods without getting anywhere, we have come to a crucial step in the naturalization process: Support! We need some champion members of the community to step up and support us as we try to naturalize our schoolyard. First, let's talk a little about what naturalization means.

Naturalization versus Beautification

Naturalization is the process of planting native trees, shrubs and other plants to make an area feel more natural. It is kid-friendly, and there are almost no manmade objects or irrigation systems.


Beautification is the process of making something nice to look at, and it is usually abstract. Beautification projects are not always kid-friendly, they use many man-made objects and often use plants that are not native to an area.

COMMUNITY NEWS - MULTI-USE FACILITY

On behalf of the community, the Bridgeland-Riverside Community Association, has applied for monies under a Conceptual Drawing Grant. This money will be used to develop a design for a year-round multi-use facility. The Bridgeland-Riverside community is a vibrant piece of Calgary's riverfront and inner-city communities, offering a wide variety of recreation activities for a growing and evolving population. The area has a long established history, including being home to the Calgary General Hospital up until 1997. Since 1998, our area has seen tremendous growth in multi-family units and other housing types.

The BRCA represents the community in ensuring that the area develops in a way that meets the needs of the community members and that a variety of needs are met by this type of growth. One area in particular is in regards to recreation and leisure facilities and spaces, which has proven to be a challenge for the community association in the past. Several years ago, our community lost pillar recreation facilities that have yet to be replaced.

Ipsos Reid Study 2009/2010

In order to better understand what the community is looking for in the short and long-term, the BRCA conducted a survey of residents with Ipsos Reid and the community in late 2009 to discover what values hold true for the majority of residents, what kind of community we would like to become and what parts of the rich community heritage will move forward. One of the recommendations of the Ipsos Reid report was the multi-use facility. With that in mind the BRCA is requesting \$5,000 from the Conceptual Drawing Grant Fund so that we may move forward with a conceptual drawing of our vision for a multi-use recreational facility.

Our first priority is to the community residents of Bridgeland-Riverside and providing opportunities that create community health and vitality. We know that the health and wellness of Canadian youth is being compromised due to alarming increases in obesity because children are simply not active enough. The BRCA recognizes the opportunity to improve our community's sport and recreation infrastructure and is steadfastly committed to the enhancement of facilities and programs that families can directly benefit form.

In 2008, the BRCA partnered with Communities Choosewell, an organization set up by Alberta Recreation and Parks Association and Alberta Health to help communities realize the value of healthy eating and active living. Our community goal is to provide the infrastructure and programs so that all children receive equal opportunity to be active within the community of Bridgeland-Riverside.

Our vision

Our Vision is to build a multi-use facility to meet the needs of virtually all residents (young and old included) regardless of their physical abilities. Bridgeland-Riverside is home to a large community of at-risk and low-income individuals and families. We value diversity and hope that many children of all backgrounds and abilities can benefit from playing on this new and exciting multi-use facility that meets the community's needs at 917 Centre Avenue NE adjacent to the Community Hall.

This multi-use facility will offer safety, accessibility and fun to children of all ages and abilities within our community, involving parents, caregivers, grandparents and visitors. The space will play a central role in the Community, serving as a natural gathering place for the community and creating a sense of home and fellowship. The BRCA would like to create through this revitalization process a sense of community spirit, volunteerism and camaraderie, while working with all stakeholders to create a sense of shared ownership of the park and play space and to ensure that the play space meets the needs of the entire community.

Our scope

To create a play space with a natural area feel, with structures suited to a wide range of ages and abilities of children, offering accessibility options within structures and to include safety standards while blending into the natural area as much as possible. We look forward to the local area residents using this facility year-round for ice hockey in the winter and as a summer reprieve, as well as local-area assisted living facilities being able to make this a part of their residential exercise use.

We will continue to keep residents apprised as we go through the process. Please look to future articles in your *Bridges* newsletter on this latest venture by your BRCA.

BRCA FUNDRAISING CASINO

The BRCA Fundraising Casino has been scheduled. This year, it'll be held on Thursday, August 19 and Friday, August 20 at the Stampede Casino. As usual, we will require a lot of volunteers, but this event is so important to the community, as proceeds from these two days support many worthwhile projects in Bridgeland-Riverside throughout the year.

I need 52 volunteers to complete full eight-hour shifts (no shift-splitting unfortunately) on either the Thursday or the Friday. To work in the cash cage, the shifts are either in the morning from 10:30 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. or in the evening from 6:00 p.m. to close. Alternatively, working in the count room involves volunteering from 10:00 p.m. to close.

CASH CAGE GENERAL MANAGER / ALTERNATE GENERAL MANAGER DUTIES:

- Ensures a sufficient number of volunteers for each day.
- Ensures signed cheques are available to pay expenses on the evening of the second day.
- Verifies transactions including the opening and/or closing cash cage float of chips and cash, opening game chip counts, and banker shift change.
- Witnesses cashier/player transactions of more than \$200.00.
- May be required to relieve the banker and chip runners during meals/breaks.

Note: Must be in the casino at all times.

BANKER DUTIES:

- Controls the cash cage float of chips and cash.
- Witnesses cashier/player transactions of more than \$200.00.
- Generates fills/credits for cash/chip transfers through the Casino-Track computer system.
- Is busiest during opening, volunteer shift changes, and closing of casino.

Note: Computer skills are very helpful.

CASHIER DUTIES:

Cashes in chips for players.

Notes: Good manual dexterity is helpful.

This position requires concentration and accuracy. Cashiers are responsible for their own floats.

CHIP RUNNER DUTIES:

- Acts as a courier for chip orders (requests) from casino games.
- Operates a touch screen portable computer.

Notes: This volunteer should be mobile and have a steady hand. This position is usually busy at opening and closing.

COUNT ROOM SUPERVISOR DUTIES:

• Records cash counts through the CasinoTrack computer system.

Notes: Good computer skills are helpful.

Not required to handle cash in this position.

COUNT ROOM STAFF DUTIES:

• Sorts, counts, records, verifies and amalgamates cash from the drop boxes from the games

Note: Recorder assists count room supervisor; computer skills are helpful

Bridgeland - back in the day

Back in the sixties, a twelve-year-old girl won her schools' Artist of the Year award for her sculpting. She really was quite a talented young lady, back in the day.

Sometimes, when she was working on her clay art pieces, the lonely old woman next door would belittle her work. She would yammer on that the girl was "playing in mud".

One day, the girl was just about ready to break out in tears, when a man from around the neighbourhood (who was considered to be a little 'simple'), came walking down the sidewalk, carrying the fish he had just caught in the Bow River. He witnessed the old lady spew off her temper, and he shook his head at the woman's rudeness. When the old woman went into her house, the man decided to say something to the poor girl.

Still shaking his head, he said quietly, "I feel sorry for that old woman". The girl looked at him in disbelief, then, forgetting her hurt, replied "You feel sorry for her?"

The man slowly drawled "When I get mad, my stomach hurts all night. She must have stomach aches a lot 'cause she's always mad." The girl thought about that, and, realizing the wisdom in what she had just heard, it helped encourage her to, as the old lady called it – play in the mud, despite the old woman's mean-spirited comments.

A few years later, she created a life-like bust of Father Lacombe, which was presented to the Father Lacombe Church. She also sculpted a bronzed bust of Nick Taylor, who was, at that time, the head of the Alberta Liberal Party. There were many others she lovingly and skillfully created too.

Then she got married, and quit her sculpting for many years. Her husband was a doctor, who didn't always know what house calls meant, particularly with his female patients, if you catch my drift. He developed a brain aneurism and was off work for about a year. The girl, now a woman, spent her time looking after both her husband, and her son, who had heart problems. She also put herself through College during this period in her life.

Eventually, when her husband recovered from his illness, he ran away with another woman, leaving his wife and son alone in a town far away from her family. So, they moved back to Calgary where she managed to support the two of them, never really having the time to devote to her sculpting. Now after much longing and time away from it, she's enjoying the feel of the clay in her fingers again, having gotten back into it a few years ago.

I believe that her experiences in life have given her pieces a richness of quality and expression. Be sure to watch for news of her art exhibition when it opens in the fall of this year. And, has you may have suspected, she is my daughter, and she counts herself among my family's third generation of Bridgelanders. These days, she is known simply as Sylvia of Calgary.
