# Ashville's Red Arrows Connection Continues



High-flying Andy Bryant is the latest OA to become a member of the world famous Red Arrows.

Now, as Flight Lieutenant Bryant, the 29 year old, has joined the team - officially known as the Royal Air Force Aerobatic Team - as a Junior Engineering Officer responsible for day-to-day engineering operations.

Andy will also lead a ten-strong team of engineers known as 'Circus', who are each assigned to a specific aircraft and pilot throughout the summer display season.

It is believed he is the fourth former pupil to join the elite team, with at least one being the lead pilot, or Red Arrow 1.

The new job will see Andy travel as a passenger in a Red Arrows' two-seat Hawk aircraft in transit flights to over 90 display venues throughout the UK and Europe - flying at speeds of more than 350mph. Once his aircraft arrives at the display's operating base, Andy will be responsible for servicing it before it can fly again.

Following his A-Levels at Ashville, he studied Aeronautical Engineering at Gonville and Caius College at Cambridge University where he graduated with a Masters degree before beginning his career with the Royal Air Force in 2003. Here, he completed Initial Officer Training and Engineer Specialist Training before being posted to Royal Air Force Wittering as Officer Commanding Support Engineering Flight.

Andy was then selected to become a Junior Engineering Officer on the first operational Typhoon squadron, 3 (F) Squadron and was soon moved to the Helicopter Engines Integrated Project Team, where he was responsible for airworthiness and engineering policy for all Merlin and Apache engines, supporting operations in both Iraq and Afghanistan. He joined the Red Arrows in October 2009.

# Newly Elected MP Speech Day Guest Of Honour



OA Julian Sturdy (81-89) who won the hotly-contested York Outer seat is the guest of honour at this year's Speech Day and Prize Giving.

In 2002, he was elected onto Harrogate Borough Council representing Marston Moor ward. In the same election, two other OAs, David Simister and Simon Theakston, also won seats. When Julian stood down to pursue a Parliamentary career, he was replaced by another OA, Anthony Alton. Julian's father Robert, who also attended Ashville, is an MEP for East Anglia.

Julian said: "I thoroughly enjoyed my time at Ashville and my years there helped shape me into being the person I am today.

"The school's reputation grows year by year and continues to turn out high-achieving, well-rounded individuals that are ready for the big, wide world.

"I'm honoured to have been asked to be the guest speaker "We are especially keen to have Old Ashvillians at this year's Speech Day and only hope that I can inspire the current pupils to go out and achieve what it is they want to achieve in life."

Ashville College Headmaster Andrew Fleck said: "We are incredibly proud that one of our former pupils has gained a seat in Parliament, particularly such a local and hotly-contested one, and delighted that he has agreed to be the guest of honour and main speaker at this year's Speech Day.

Julian, a local farmer, was born in Yorkshire in 1971. He is married to Victoria and they have two young children, George and Florence. Julian was brought up and has worked in North Yorkshire all his life, attending Harrogate's Ashville College and then studying agriculture at Harper Adams University, before running a successful farming and property business with which he is still involved today.

# OA Reservist in Afghanistan

Having toyed with the idea of a Short Service Limited Commitment Commission in 1979, Major Johnny (Zig) Longbottom (73-79) joined the Territorial Army in 1993 and has been serving ever since.

Following an enjoyable and rewarding two-and-a-half years Full Time Reserve Service appointment in the Ministry of Defence, Major Longbottom decided it was time for an operational tour and volunteered for service in Afghanistan.

Formally mobilised for Operation HERRICK 11 in May 2009, Major Longbottom was attached to 1st Regiment Royal Horse Artillery, based in Tidworth on the edge of Salisbury Plain.

He said: "Living in the Officers' Mess during the week an experience not dissimilar to his time as a boarder in Duckworth House – Major Longbottom under went four months of 'pre-deployment training' before flying to Afghanistan at the end of September.

"As a part of Battle Group North West, I spent the next six-and-a-half months as the Joint Fires and ISTAR Cell Commander in Musa Qal'eh, Helmand Province. "Living conditions were basic and the headquarters' only method of re-supply was by helicopter, but the Battle Group simply got on with the job that they had trained for."



In April 2010 Major Longbottom flew back to the UK after a challenging but worthwhile operational tour. Now de-mobilised and looking to re-establish himself in the civilian world, he will return to his Territorial Army regiment, the Honourable Artillery Company following a period of 'post operational leave'.

The regiment was formed in 1537, is based in the City of London, and is the oldest regiment in the British Army.

# OA Embarks On Middle East Expedition



This summer sees former head girl, Lucy Laycock, embarking on an exciting and prestigious expedition.

Lucy and 11 intrepid Durham University students will undertake an epic and life-changing expedition to the desert communities of Jordan. The team will be supported by the British Council and the Crown Prince Hassan amongst other influential figures, making the expedition an exciting and important event for both Jordan and the United Kingdom.

Lucy said: "In order to participate in the trip, the team must each raise at least £1,900. £900 will go to CARE International UK to help with the work the charity have been doing there to tackle water shortages.

"The money raised will fund a project for the water-scarce community of the Badia in Arajef. The community will learn permaculture techniques such as composting, mulching, grey-water reuse, duck and chicken husbandry and planting techniques.

"Community members are enthusiastic and ready to begin learning, having observed the success of the techniques elsewhere. The money will fund the various elements of the project, from grey water units to goats, chickens and ducks." She added: "The practical side of the project is equally worthwhile. Two weeks will be spent in Rajef, working with special needs children and women, who are often overlooked in this traditional community.

"The final week will be spent in the desert community of Safawi near the Iraqi border, working alongside Jordanian volunteers to teach English, IT and occupational skills to all ages.

"The team will also work with a local women's charity that is seeking to empower the women of the community through improving their level of education."

# Headmaster's Report to the Ashvillian Society

We live in turbulent times!

And in the midst of that turbulence we have to ask a fundamental question about our response to change. Are we intimidated by the potential loss of what we know or can we foresee new opportunities which are an exciting prospect?

Economic threat, political and social change all present the College with much to think about at all levels. In the classroom, the Economists are having a field day, teaching through the most interesting period of their careers, Geographers too are making the most of the social and physical changes that are taking place. Across the College, the economic climate has brought other benefits as we have undertaken refurbishment works at costs well below pre-Crunch levels. The changes have brought greater urgency to our work as pupils and teachers recognise that the labour market will become ever more competitive and that our children must extend their vision of their future to embrace global opportunities. So you should not be surprised to receive an upbeat report of activities undertaken and success gained in many spheres.

At the same time, we have to be prudent and consider carefully the future of the College. Happily recruitment for September 2010 is strong in almost all areas of the College. Boarding recruitment is nearly 20% up on 2 years ago. Junior Boarding in Greenholme (Co-Ed) has seen a dramatic revival since the refurbishment of the House such that we are full of boy boarders for next year. The space created by moving younger girl boarders out of Norfolk House has meant that we are able to refurbish that area of the school this summer and already we are seeing increasing numbers there. Briggs and Mallinson are full at almost all ages. In Year 7, we enjoyed a very strong application from outside the school and have good numbers enrolled in Year 7 for September. This is backed up by a large body of pupils in Year 6 which bodes well for 2012.

As we look ahead, two things seem certain; public sector cuts will come and at some point economic growth will return. There is every possibility that they will overlap and that the College will be able to take advantage of this in the mid-term. Therefore the main focus of development activity must be for three to five years hence. This is the focus of much work at all levels.

However we must not lose sight of our day to day work and we know that we will only thrive if we provide an education that is outstanding. I believe that it is and we can reflect with some pride on our achievements this year. • In January the Government placed our GCSE results as the best in N Yorkshire, beating highly selective schools such as Ermysteds and Skipton Girls. The Telegraph rated us 3rd in the North of England and 73rd in the whole country.

• This term's sporting crown must go to the U16 girls' netball squad who have qualified for the national finals to be held in Brighton over the weekend 20/21 March. The Y15 girls qualified as area netball champions and the U19 girls came third in the regional competition. In the swimming pool the Senior Boys squad are undefeated this season and hopes are high for the Bath & Otter Championships to which coincide with the Society meeting. Of particular note is the performance by Matthew Rider (Year 11) who won one Gold, two Silver and one Bronze medal at the Berlin International Gala. At junior level the Under 9 boys have won the Bradford Grammar School Invitation Cross Country Championships.

It has been a busy term in the music department. The College has hosted inaugural Festival of Song for Young Singers. 200 singers participated with 28 of the placed singers from the Ashville College. Andy Chan has achieved an outstanding success in gaining his ATCL piano diploma and subsequently won the class for solo piano diploma holders at the Harrogate Music Festival. Amongst music examinations, Tom Taylor (U6) gained a distinction at grade 8 clarinet, Olivia Stanford (Year 11) gained distinction at grade 8 flute, Alex Barker (Year 8) gained grade 7 violin with distinction and Hannah Adamson and Lizzie Quirke (L6) gained distinctions at grade 7 singing. We have also enjoyed an outstanding performance by Alex Hunter (Yr 9) who sang the tenor solos in a performance of the passiontide cantata 'The Crucifixion' by John Stainer in Doncaster Minster. Dr Andrew Padmore, who is conductor of Harrogate Choral Society and Alex's singing teacher spoke of Alex's performance in glowing terms. 'Never before have I used a 14 year old in a part as demanding as that in a performance before. I think he has great potential'. Finally, at the end of January the Massive Messiah from Scratch took place in the Soothill Hall. Involving some 40 pupils, parents and staff in a choir of over 300 with professional soloists and orchestra a total of £8000 was raised for the charity 'Marie Curie Cancer Care'.

• We have enjoyed an excellent house Drama Competition, won by Riverdale, and the Upper and Lower Sixth Theatre Studies groups recently performed their practical examination pieces to a packed studio of enthusiastic parents, staff and students. All the students had been awarded A grades in the exam the previous day. The range of technique and originality of content was exceptional.

Our success confirms the fact that we will continue to flourish if we afford the greatest concern to each individual pupil. We are committed to knowing their strengths and valuing them for what they achieve, encouraging them to aspire to excellence and challenging them to embrace new opportunities without fear of failure.

# Library Named in Honour of Joe Lancaster

The College's library – which has undergone an extensive refurbishment programme – has been officially re-opened in honour of former headmaster, Joe Lancaster, who led the school from 1927 to 1957.

A ceremony was attended by a number of OAs, and Ashvillian Society President, David Simister, performed the official "opening" duties.

He said: "Those involved with the redesign deserve a huge amount of credit as it is a resource the College can be justifiably proud of. It is also fitting to have named it in honour of the inspirational Joe Lancaster."

The first official school library was opened in July 1924 by former pupil, Lord Riverdale, and named the Memorial Library as it was sited in the Memorial Hall. It was stocked with 400 books, the majority of which were donated by old boys and governors.

# An addition to Ashville's Great War Dead

#### **Gilbert Carmichael**

While researching one of our Old Boys for a recent talk to the Rotary Club of Harrogate, I went through some editions of the Ashvillian magazine for the war years. My attention was caught by an entry about a name which has not been listed on any record I am aware of – in particular, the Memorial Hall and the school Cenotaph.

The name is that of a former teacher, Gilbert Carmichael. The Ashvillan describes him as a graduate of Edinburgh University who taught at Ashville from 1908 to 1912: it does not say which subjects he taught, but it credits him with the success of the football team of that time, and mentions that his CO had written to The Times after Carmichael's death.

Gilbert Carmichael died on 21 March 1918, the opening day of the powerful German offensive known as the Kaisersschlacht. His body was not identified and he is commemorated on the Memorial to the Missing at Pozieres, in the middle of the Somme battlefield.

I feel his name deserves to be added to our records, but I am not clear how easy it would be for his name to be added to the Cenotaph or to the names already in the Memorial Hall.
