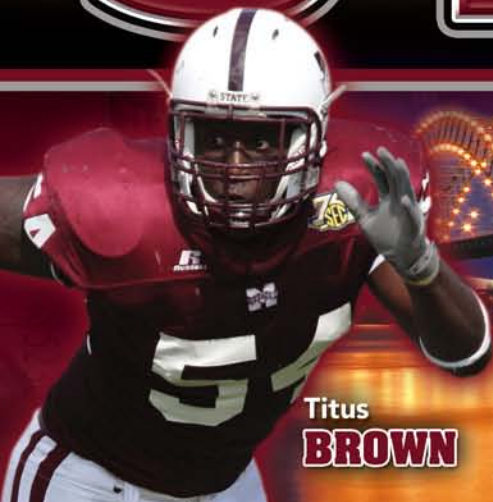

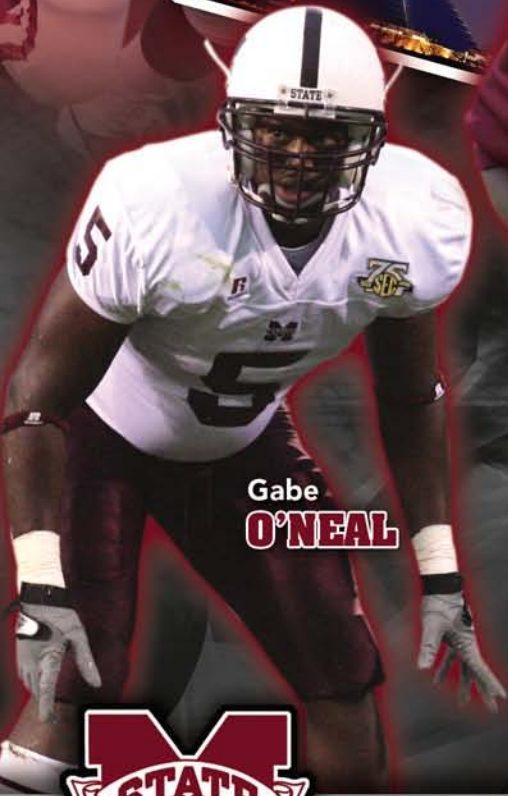

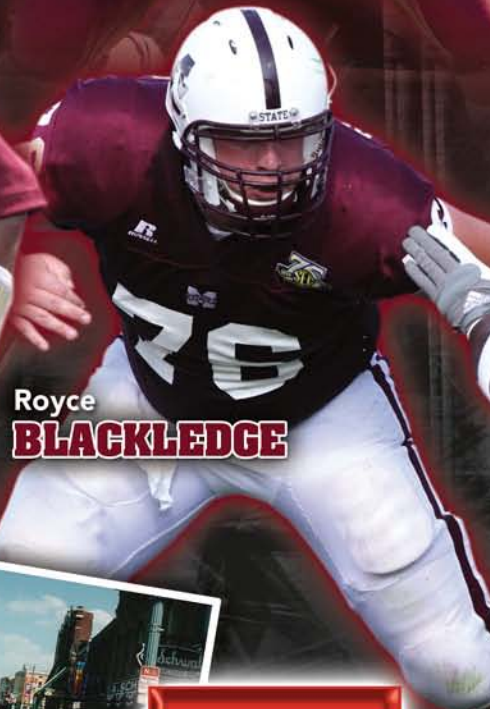

# 2007 SEASON Highlights

## THE ALABAMA GAME

Sophomore cornerback Anthony Johnson (11) intercepted a pass and returned it 100 yards for a touchdown to give MSU a 10-9 lead over Alabama immediately before halftime, earning Pontiac's weekly Game-Changing Play of the Week award. Junior safety Keith Fitzhugh (1) made 10 tackles and forced a fumble in State's 17-12 win over the Crimson Tide.

## THE OLE MISS GAME

Junior free safety/return specialist Derek Pegues (3) brought back a punt 75 yards for a touchdown to tie the game at 14, and junior place-kicker Adam Carlson (37) kicked a career-long, game-winning 48-yard field goal with 12 seconds left to give MSU a 17-14 win over Ole Miss for the Bulldogs' seventh win.

## THE KENTUCKY GAME

Senior defensive end Avery Hannibal (51) was named the Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Week after making three tackles for loss and two quarterback sacks of Andre Woodson at Kentucky. True freshman quarterback Wesley Carroll (13) completed 17-of-28 passes for 152 yards and two touchdowns in the 31-14 win over the Wildcats.

Sophomore halfback Anthony Dixon (24) rushed a career-high 32 times for a career-best 152 yards and three touchdowns in State's 30-13 homecoming win over UAB.

## THE TULANE GAME

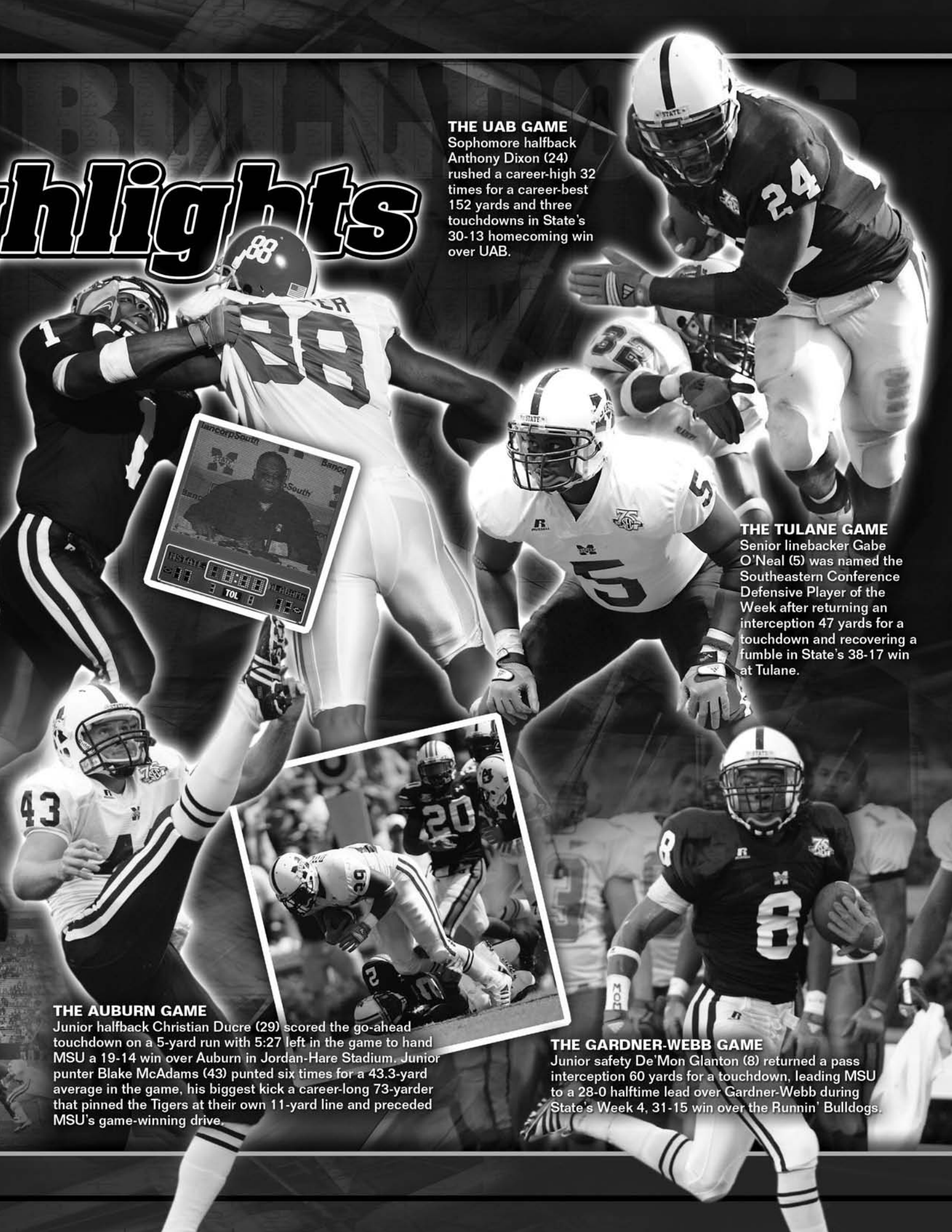
Senior linebacker Gabe O'Neal (5) was named the Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Week after returning an interception 47 yards for a touchdown and recovering a fumble in State's 38-17 win at Tulane.

## THE AUBURN GAME

Junior halfback Christian Ducre (29) scored the go-ahead touchdown on a 5-yard run with 5:27 left in the game to hand MSU a 19-14 win over Auburn in Jordan-Hare Stadium. Junior punter Blake McAdams (43) punted six times for a 43.3-yard average in the game, his biggest kick a career-long 73-yarder that pinned the Tigers at their own 11-yard line and preceded MSU's game-winning drive.

## THE GARDNER-WEBB GAME

Junior safety De'Mon Glanton (8) returned a pass interception 60 yards for a touchdown, leading MSU to a 28-0 halftime lead over Gardner-Webb during State's Week 4, 31-15 win over the Runnin' Bulldogs.

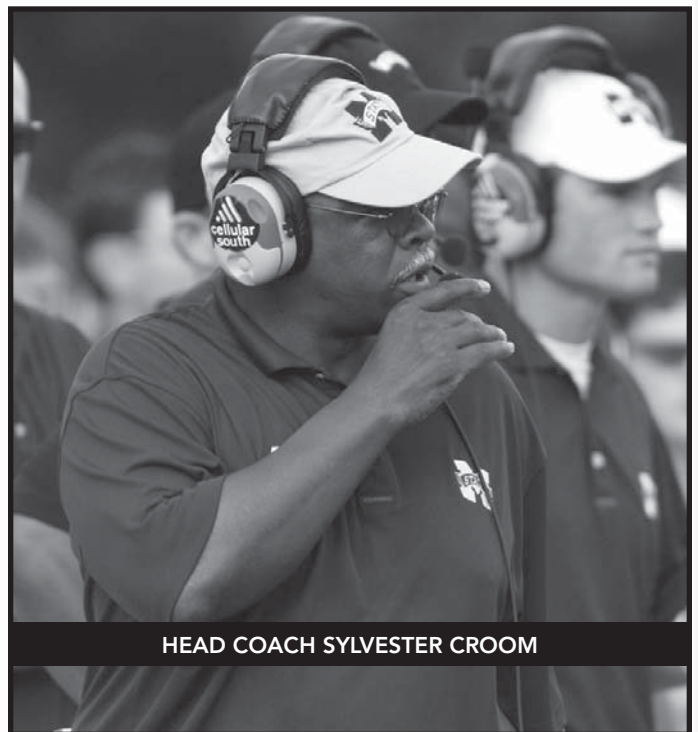

## MISSISSIPPI STATE EARNS POSTSEASON AT LIBERTY BOWL

MSU concluded its regular season with a 17-14 win over Ole Miss, finishing its schedule with a 7-5 overall record, 4-4 in the Southeastern Conference. State was chosen as the SEC representative to face Conference-USA champion University of Central Florida in the 49th annual AutoZone Liberty Bowl, Saturday, Dec. 29, in Memphis, Tenn. Kickoff is set for 3:30 p.m. The game will be televised by ESPN.

## BULLDOGS MAKE 13TH POSTSEASON BOWL APPEARANCE, FIRST IN 7 YEARS

Mississippi State will be making its 13th postseason bowl appearance when the Bulldogs play Central Florida in the 49th annual AutoZone Liberty Bowl in Memphis, Tenn. State is 6-6 all-time in bowl games, but have not played a postseason game since beating Texas A&M 43-41 in the 2000 Independence Bowl at Shreveport, La.

## MISSISSIPPI STATE'S 2007 APPEARANCE MARKS 3RD LIBERTY BOWL GAME

Mississippi State will be making its third appearance in the Liberty Bowl, but its first in 16 years. MSU played Air Force in the 1991 Liberty Bowl in Memphis under then first-year head coach Jackie Sherrill, and North Carolina State in the 1963 post-season game, the final Liberty Bowl played in Philadelphia, Pa. The MSU-Air Force game drew a crowd of 61,497, an attendance record for the bowl that still stands today.

## MISSISSIPPI STATE MAKES FIRST MEMPHIS VISIT IN FIVE YEARS

Despite the fact that the city of Memphis is less than a three-hour drive from Starkville, Mississippi State has not played football in Memphis since 2002, a 29-17 win over the University of Memphis at the Liberty Bowl. State is 29-16-3 all-time in the city of Memphis, with a 16-6 all-time mark at UM.

## MISSISSIPPI STATE LOOKS TO IMPROVE LEDGER VS. C-USA

MSU has posted an impressive 83-61-3 (.575) record against teams that currently comprise Conference-USA. State has played C-USA member schools more frequently than any other non-SEC league. The Bulldogs are 5-3 vs. C-USA under Sylvester Croom.

## BULLDOGS TO MEET UCF FOR JUST THE SECOND TIME EVER

Mississippi State has played Central Florida just one other time on the gridiron. The Bulldogs defeated the Knights 35-28 in 1997 at Davis Wade Stadium at Scott Field. That Mississippi State team went on to finish 7-4 on the year, setting the stage for an SEC Western Division championship one year later. That UCF team, with future All-Pro quarterback Daunte Culpepper under center, finished 5-6.

## BULLDOGS HAVE BEEN SOLID AGAINST NON-LEAGUE OPPONENTS

Mississippi State has posted a 159-117-10 (.573) record all-time against teams that are not members of the Southeastern Conference, an impressive 46-17-1 (.727) mark in regular-season, non-conference games since 1989. MSU, however, has won just nine of its last 18 non-conference games, dating to the beginning of 2003.

## MISSISSIPPI STATE RETURNS TO ESPN AT AUTOZONE LIBERTY BOWL

Mississippi State shows a 10-15 record all-time in games played on national sports network ESPN. The Bulldogs will be making just their fourth ESPN telecast since Sylvester Croom became the school's head coach in 2004. MState will be looking for its first win on ESPN under Croom, having dropped Thursday night games against South Carolina (2006) and LSU (2007), as well as a mid-season conference game against Georgia in 2005. The Bulldogs' game against Central Florida in 1997 was televised by the Florida-based Sunshine Network to a regional audience.

## MISSISSIPPI STATE TO MAKE NINTH TELEVISION SHOWING IN 2007

When Mississippi State and Central Florida meet in the 2007 AutoZone Liberty Bowl in Memphis, it will be the Bulldogs' ninth televised game of the '07 campaign. It is the most television exposures for the team since 2000, when nine games were also shown.

## SYLVESTER CROOM, GOOD FRIEND GEORGE O'LEARY MEET AGAIN

Mississippi State head football coach Sylvester Croom counts Central Florida head coach George O'Leary as one of his many friends in the coaching profession. Croom and O'Leary served on the coaching staff of head coach Bobby Ross with the San Diego Chargers in 1992-93.

## BULLDOG PAIR RETURNS TO HOME STATE, ONE TO HIS CITY

Mississippi State has two players on its roster from the state of Tennessee. Junior punter Blake McAdams (Ripley) returns to his home state, while true freshman defensive back Wade Bonner (Mason) hails from the Memphis area.

## SIX MISSISSIPPI STATE PLAYERS FACE HOME-STATE SCHOOL

Mississippi State lists six players on its roster from the state of Florida. True freshmen Dakota Merritt (Cantonment), Wesley Carroll (Parkland), and Karlin Brown (Tallahassee), redshirt freshman Reggie Odom (Deland), and juniors Jamar Chaney (Fort Pierce) and Anthony Littlejohn (Jacksonville) all call the Sunshine State home.

## MSTATE OFFENSE CONTINUES TO CONVERT, MAINTAIN BALL CONTROL

Mississippi State converted third-down opportunities at a 39.5 percent rate (eighth in the SEC) and ranked fifth in the league in time of possession average (30:25 average per game). By comparison, the Bulldogs converted 36 percent of its third-down opportunities a year ago, and averaged only 29:26 of possession time. State had 13 scoring possessions of 10 plays or more this season. In contrast, MSU had only four scoring drives of 10 or more plays last season.

## MSU TURNS ON THE OFFENSE TO SECURE SEASON-ENDING WIN

Trailing 14-0 and having gained just 144 yards of total offense on 39 snaps (3.7 yards per play) in the first three quarters of its season-ending game with arch-rival Ole Miss, MSU exploded for 129 yards on 22 snaps (5.9 yards per play) in the fourth quarter alone and scored 17 points for the team's seventh win of the season.

## DEFENSE HOLDS DOWN REBEL PASSING GAME, PRESERVES WIN

Mississippi State's defense held Ole Miss to just 10 completions in 30 attempts in that season-ending win over Ole Miss, allowing just 115 yards through the air. State ranks fourth in the conference in pass defense, allowing 182.2 yards per game, and leads the league in both fourth-down conversions against (.143) and red-zone defense (.721).

## TITUS BROWN REMAINS AMONG SEC SACK, TACKLE FOR LOSS LEADERS

Mississippi State senior defensive end Titus Brown (Tuscaloosa, Ala.) has recorded 37 tackles for loss (minus 172 yards), 18.5 of which were quarterback sacks (minus 114 yards) his career. Brown, who has recorded at least one tackle for loss in 10 of the season's 12 games, is eighth in the league with 1.12 TFL per game. His 0.67 sack-per-game average is fourth best in the SEC. His 18.5 sacks are good for seventh place all-time at Mississippi State in that category. Greg Favors (19.5; 1994-97) is next on the school list. Brown has now had at least one TFL in 16 of the last 19 games, dating to last season, and a QB sack in 12 of the last 19.

## DEREK PEGUES REMAINS ON THE VERGE OF ENTERING ALL-TIME LIST

Mississippi State junior defensive back Derek Pegues (Batesville, Miss.) has made eight career pass interceptions, returning three of those eight picks for touchdown, the most in school history. He is just one theft away from breaking into the school's all-time top 10 in that category (9; Bill Kiser, 1965-67, Emile Petro and Ken Phares, 1970-72).

# POSTSEASON NOTES

## PEGUES REACHES TOP OF KICK RETURN CHART, NEARING IN YARDAGE TOO

Derek Pegues became the school's all-time leader in kickoff returns (80) with a pair of returns against Ole Miss in the season-ending win over the Rebels. He is nearing the top of the school's kick return yardage (1,776) list as well, trailing only Tony James in the attempts category and trails only his yardage number (1989-92; 78-1,862). Pegues' kickoff returns are tied for the fifth most in Southeastern Conference history (Preston Brown, Vanderbilt, 1976-79) and his yardage is ninth-most ever in the league (next: 1,780; Robert Dow, LSU, 1973-76). He also ranks sixth on the school's all-time punt returns list (51) and is fourth on the all-time yardage ranking (615). Pegues now trails Billy Stacy (1956-58; 52) and Bobby Herrington (1930-31, '33; 777).

## CENTER BLACKLEDGE CLOSING HIS MISSISSIPPI STATE CAREER IN FINE FORM

Mississippi State senior center Royce Blackledge (Sandersville, Miss.) has now started 30 consecutive games for the Bulldogs, including 24 in a row at center. He has been on the field for every offensive snap 19 times. He has recorded an 84 percent blocking average thus far in the 2007 season, leading the offensive linemen in blocking grades five times.

## DIXON RUSHES UP TD LIST, ON VERGE OF ENTERING RECORD BOOK ELSEWHERE

Mississippi State sophomore halfback Anthony Dixon (Jackson, Miss.) has now rushed 432 times in his career for 1,648 yards and 22 touchdowns. He now stands eighth on the school's all-time rushing attempts list, surpassing Michael Haddix (425; 1979-82) and Dennis Johnson (428; 1974-77). Bruce Threadgill is just ahead in seventh (451; 1974-77). Dixon moved into 15th on the school's all-time rushing yardage list, surpassing Keffer McGee (1,647; 1994-96). Hank Phillips (1,743; 1985-88) is next on that list. And his 22 rushing touchdowns have moved him into a fifth-place tie on the school's all-time list with Walker (22, 1999-2002).

## JUNIOR LINEBACKER JAMAR CHANEY TIES FOR TEAM HIGH WITH EIGHT STOPS

Junior linebacker Jamar Chaney (Fort Pierce, Fla.) tied for the team high with eight tackles against Ole Miss in the season-ending Battle For The Golden Egg. He also was credited with one pass deflection against the Rebels. Chaney led or tied for the team lead in tackles four times during the year.

## SENIOR LINEBACKER GABE O'NEAL IS FINISHING HIS CAREER IN GRAND WAY

Senior linebacker Gabe O'Neal (Columbus, Miss.) tied teammates Jamar Chaney and Titus Brown for the team lead in tackles against Ole Miss. O'Neal had eight hits, including a team-high two for loss (minus 5 yards) and the team's only quarterback sack (minus 4 yards). O'Neal led or tied for the team lead in tackles three times during his senior season.

## JUNIOR PLACE-KICKER ADAM CARLSON EXTENDS STREAK, BOOTS GAME-WINNER

Junior place-kicker Adam Carlson (Gulfport, Miss.) drilled a career-long 48-yard field goal with 12 seconds remaining in the game to propel Mississippi State to a 17-14 victory over arch-rival Ole Miss to bring the Golden Egg trophy back to Starkville. It was Carlson's first game-winning three-pointer of his career, but his sixth straight made field goal. He has not missed a three-pointer in two months, and has made eight of his last nine attempts.

STARKVILLE, Miss. - The bulldogs used two fourth quarter touchdown runs by James Johnson to erase a seven-point deficit and defeat the Golden Knights 35-28 in Mississippi State's homecoming. It marked MSU's third fourth quarter comeback of the season.

J.J. rushed for career highs in both yards (146) and touchdowns (4) in the victory.

UCF quarterback Daunte Culpepper led his team to score midway through the final period, and completed a drive with a two-point conversion to give the Knights the lead 28-21.

Johnson then tied the game with six and a half minutes remaining with a 1-yard TD run, his third for the game.

J.J. scored the winning touchdown a little more than a minute later on a 7-yard scamper, after a punt return by Robert Isaac gave the Dogs excellent field position at the UCF 44 yard line.

MSU won despite being beaten in every statistical category, with UCF's Culpepper accounting for 420 yards of total offense.

State intercepted three Culpepper passes, including one which led to a State score. MSU sacked Culpepper four times.

The Bulldogs struck first in the seesaw game, with Johnson rumbling for a 9-yard score just 1:00 into the game. Isaac set the tone for the day, returning the opening kickoff 84 yards to set up the score. Isaac finished with a school record 176 kickoff return yards in the game.

STARKVILLE, Miss. - LSU opened the 2007 season by showing why it's the No. 2-ranked team in the country Thursday night, downing homestanding Mississippi State 45-0 at Davis Wade Stadium at Scott Field in the lidlifter for both squads. The loss was State's eighth in a row to the Tigers.

The Tigers picked off six State passes in the contest to aid in the shutout effort over MSU. State struggled offensively all evening against the highly touted LSU defensive unit, managing just 146 yards from scrimmage. MSU quarterback Michael Henig could not find a rhythm on the home field as he threw a school record-tying six interceptions.

### GAME NOTES

- Tonight's captains were seniors Titus Brown and Royce Blackledge and junior Jamar Chaney.
- Junior Michael Henig's six interceptions tied Max Stainbrook's individual school record (vs. Cincinnati, 1949).
- MSU's longest reception of the game was a 45-yard pass to senior wide receiver Tony Burks from Henig.
- With his 86 yards recorded on kickoff returns this evening, junior returner Derek Pegues moves into fifth on the MSU career list for kickoff return yardage. Pegues is also now tied with Reid for fifth on the all-time list with 61 career kickoff returns.

Meanwhile, LSU's offense tallied 347 yards in total. Quarterback Matt Flynn was 12-of-19 for 128 yards through the air, including two touchdown passes, one to Early Doucet who had 78 yards receiving on the night. Tiger running back Keiland Williams ran in a pair of scores for the Tigers on the ground in the first half. Backup signal-caller Ryan Perrilloux rushed and threw for scores in the fourth quarter to round out scoring.

The offenses for both squads came out flat at first, not scoring a single touchdown in the first quarter. The only points came on a 27-yard field goal from LSU kicker Colt David. The Tigers held a 3-0 lead at the end of the period.

In the second quarter, the Bulldogs still couldn't muster up any offensive production. Henig threw four of his six interceptions in the first half. He was 11-of-28 for 120 yards in the game. On the other side of the ball, the Bulldog defense started to lose ground as the Tigers put up 14 points in the last six minutes of the first half to head into the locker room with a 17-0 lead. The Bulldogs were outgained 185-79 in the first half.

At the beginning of the second half, the Tigers continued their attack, scoring on their first drive, an 11-yard touchdown pass from Flynn to Doucet to push the lead to 24-0. LSU then capitalized on another Henig interception by scoring another touchdown, a Flynn pass to Charles Scott to go up 31-0.

LSU also kept State sophomore running back Anthony Dixon from breaking loose, only tallying 29 yards rushing on 13 carries. Senior Tony Burks led the Bulldog receiving corps with 45 yards on one catch.

Dominic Douglas, making his first career start, led the team with nine tackles on the night. He, along with Jimmie Holmes and preseason all-SEC defensive end Titus Brown, accounted for one sack apiece.

Junior defensive back Derek Pegues moved into fifth place on the MSU career list for kickoff return yardage. He had 100 all-purpose yards for the night.

NEW ORLEANS, La. - Behind a strong second-half performance, Mississippi State posted a 38-17 road win over home-standing Tulane in the Louisiana Superdome. After the Bulldogs (1-1) and Green Wave (0-1) battled to a 17-17 tie at the half, State shut out TU 21-0 in the second half to secure the triumph.

Highlighting the night for MSU was sophomore running back Anthony Dixon, who

rushed 27 times for 131 yards (both career highs) and two second-half touchdowns. Starting quarterback Michael Henig completed 20-of-31 passes for 223 yards and a touchdown, and scored his first career rushing touchdown.

The Bulldogs jumped on top of the Green Wave early, with Gabe O'Neal intercepting Scott Elliott's second pass of the game and returning it 47 yards for the score. Tulane answered on its next drive on a Matt Forte touchdown run from 39 yards out. The Bulldog defense held the highly touted running back in check otherwise, as he ended the night with just 47 yards on the ground.

State went up 14-7 later in the first period on Henig's 18-yard touchdown run, but Tulane returned the favor on its ensuing possession to knot the score at 14-14.

In the second quarter, both defenses played well, allowing only a field goal apiece. Henig engineered an 82-yard State drive but was unable to get a touchdown in the red zone. Adam Carlson then connected on 23-yard field goal with 6:25 before the half to put State up 17-14. On the next drive, Tulane drove 65 yards before being stopped inside the 10-yard line. Their resulting field goal left the score tied at 17 at the intermission.

The Bulldog offense came out firing in the second half. MSU drove the ball 67 yards, scoring when Henig completed an 8-yard pass to Jeremy Jones. The defense continued its strong play by holding Tulane's offense to negative yardage for the third quarter and by forcing a fumble that led to a 27-yard touchdown run by Dixon.

Dixon continued to carry the load in the fourth quarter. He rushed the ball on all but one play on State's final scoring drive of the night, completing the charge with a 7-yard scoring run. The defense held Tulane to only six yards of offense in the second half.

Defensively, the Bulldogs were paced by Jamar Chaney's six tackles. In addition to his first career interception, O'Neal also recovered a Green Wave fumble. Keith Fitzhugh notched five tackles and a sack for State on the evening.

### GAME NOTES

- State had 489 yards of total offense - most since State racked up 547 total yards against Jacksonville State in 2002.
- Mississippi State finished with 290 yards rushing - most since rolling up 304 yards against Ole Miss in 2005.

AUBURN, Ala. - An interception that led to a mid-fourth-quarter drive by Mississippi State proved to be the difference in the Bulldogs' 19-14 upset win at Auburn.

After Blake McAdams' 73-yard punt had pinned Auburn deep in its own territory, Demario Bobo's first career interception of a tipped Tiger pass at the AU 44-yard line would set up an MSU drive that was the only scoring play of the second half. State drove the 44 yards on 10 plays and finished it with a 5-yard Christian Ducre rush with 5:29 to go in regulation. The two-point conversion failed. Ducre had an 18-yard rush earlier on the drive on a third-and-12 draw play from the Auburn 25.

Neither team had mounted much momentum in the second half of action before the MSU score, trading short drives back and forth throughout. The only other possessions of significance in the half were Auburn's first and last of the half. AU took the ball to open the third quarter and went 60 yards to the 16 before fumbling the ball away.

On its last attempt of the game, Auburn starting quarterback Brandon Cox returned to the field after being benched early on in favor of backup Kodi Burns. Cox quickly moved Auburn down the field 67 yards on 12 plays - to the Bulldog 9 - before State's defense stood strong, finally watching a last-minute, fourth down attempt fall incomplete in the end zone.

STARKVILLE, Miss. - Mississippi State won its third straight football game Saturday night, downing non-conference visitor Gardner-Webb 31-15 at Davis Wade Stadium at Scott Field. It marks the first time since the 2000 season the Bulldogs have won three consecutive gridiron contests.

State (3-1) amassed 379 yards of total offense in the game, led by another solid rushing effort from running back Anthony Dixon. Dixon tallied 86 yards on 16 carries while scoring two of the Bulldogs' early touchdowns in the affair.

MSU scored on its opening possession, completing a 68-yard drive with a 6-yard touchdown run by Dixon. On Gardner Webb's opening drive, De'Mon Glanton intercepted Devin Campbell's pass and returned it 60 yards for a touchdown and a 14-0 Bulldog advantage. Glanton's return marked the third consecutive week a Bulldog

player had returned an interception for a touchdown on the opponents' opening drive.

About halfway through the second quarter, Josh Riddell came into the game for starting quarterback Wesley Carroll (both splitting time in place of the injured Michael Henig) and drove the Bulldogs down the field for another Dixon touchdown run, this one for 12 yards. On the next drive for State, Riddell threw his first career touchdown pass, hitting Tony Burks for a 30-yarder to give the Bulldogs a 28-0 lead at the intermission.

The Bulldog defense held the Running Bulldogs' option offense to only 64 yards in the first half.

Bulldog penalties and a stagnant offense helped GWU back into the game in the second half. MSU had nine penalties for 102 yards, and those penalties helped the Running Bulldogs get in good field position. However, they could not capitalize as the MSU defense only allowed one touchdown, a 6-yard Phillip Peoples scoring run, and forced three Evan Kay field goals.

The Bulldogs lone second-half points came from an Adam Carlson field goal. He had missed one earlier, the result of a bad hold.

In addition to Dixon's night, backup Christian Ducre' ran for 52 of his own. Riddell ended the night 8-for-11 through the air with 124 yards, one touchdown and one interception.

On the defensive side of the ball, Gabe O'Neal led the way for the Bulldogs with 10 tackles. Titus Brown added two sacks and moved into eighth place on the school's career sack list.

COLUMBIA, S.C. - Mississippi State's upset bid at 16th-ranked South Carolina fell short as the Gamecocks used a blocked punt to change momentum and pull away for a 38-21 victory. It marked the fifth win in a row for USC (4-1, 2-1 Southeastern Conference) in the series with MSU (3-2, 1-2).

recovered on the MSU 27. On the very next play, Gamecock quarterback Chris Smelley hit receiver Kenny McKinley near the goal line and McKinley then darted into the end zone to put the USC back on top 24-21.

The longest drive State would muster following that scenario was 32 yards. Meanwhile, USC tacked on two more touchdowns, both rushes by back Mike Davis, to pull away for the victory.

The Bulldog offensive production was once again led by Dixon, who amassed 83 yards and two touchdowns on the day. Duce added 68 rushing yards for the MSU cause. Josh Riddell, in his first career start at quarterback for State, went 9-for-21 for 101 yards, a touchdown and one interception.

The Gamecocks were paced by Davis, who had 59 yards and three scores on the ground. McKinley was also stellar on the receiving end, hauling in four catches for 107 yards and two touchdowns. Smelley was solid in his new starting role for USC, completing 19-of-37 aerials for 279 yards, two touchdowns and one interception.

In a penalty-plagued first half (15 called between the two teams), South Carolina got on the board first in the game taking the opening drive 12 plays and capping it with a 3-yard touchdown run by Davis.

After the teams traded possessions and McAdams pinned the Gamecocks at their own 3-yard line, MSU capitalized by stopping USC on three downs and forcing an errant punt that gave the Bulldogs the ball on the USC 31. Two plays later, Riddell found Aubrey Bell for a 28-yard touchdown pass.

South Carolina got good field position for its next score at the MSU 37. The fourth play of the drive saw Smelley find McKinley for a 20-yard touchdown.

But the Bulldogs would answer again on its last drive of the first half, taking the ball 62 yards on 14 plays, with Dixon scoring from a yard out.

## Mississippi State 30

October 6, 2007

STARKVILLE, Miss. - Mississippi State (4-2) scored three fourth-quarter touchdowns, including two in a late 15-second span, to hold off a pesky UAB team (1-4) for a 30-13 victory Saturday afternoon at Davis Wade Stadium at Scott Field. MSU is 4-2 for the first time since the 2000 season.

State trailed 10-3 at halftime and 13-9 after three quarters of play before putting together an impressive 11-play, 80-yard drive early in the fourth period that lasted seven minutes. The possession ended in a 10-yard Anthony Dixon touchdown run to put State up 16-13.

The Bulldogs would then shut down UAB's offense the remainder of the day, while producing two more scores of their own. After forcing a punt, State drove 60 yards for another score, capped by a 12-yard Dixon run. On the Blazers' next drive, State's Anthony Johnson picked off Sam Hunt's pass on the first play and returned it 30 yards for a score.

Dixon led MSU's offensive performance on the day, registering a career-best 152 yards and three touchdowns on 32 carries. It was his fifth career 100-yard contest, the third of 2007.

### GAME NOTES

- Junior linebackers Dominic Douglas and Jamar Chaney posted double digit tackles against UAB to become the first Bulldogs to accomplish the feat since Titus Brown (11) and Darren Williams (10) against Mississippi on Nov. 27, 2004.
- With today's win, Mississippi State moves to 4-2 on the year for the first time since 2000.
- Anthony Johnson's fourth quarter interception returned for touchdown marks the first time since 2000 that the Bulldogs have posted four interception returns for scores in the same season.

Neither team scored in the first quarter, but the Blazers broke the ice within the first minute of the second period with a 42-yard field goal from Swayze Waters, capping a 30-yard drive that was setup by an interception of MSU's Mike Henig. Wesley Carroll received the start for State, but Henig played for the majority of the first half, playing for the first time since breaking his hand Sept. 15 at Auburn. He was 2-for-8 on the day for 26 yards and two interceptions. He did not play in the second half.

On the next Blazer drive, Bulldog Kyle Love blocked another Waters field goal attempt. That led to a 39-yard field goal from MSU's Adam Carlson to tie the game with 10:01 to go in the first half.

UAB answered that with its best drive of the afternoon, a 13-play, 87-yard march that was topped off with a 31-yard Hunt pass to Frantrell Forrest. That gave the Blazers their 10-3 lead at the intermission.

Mississippi State scored on the opening drive of the second half, a 1-yard, fourth-down touchdown run from Dixon. The drive, which went 75 yards, was the longest scoring of the season for MSU.

UAB's lone score of the second half came on the ensuing possession, Waters hitting from 29 yards away after a 69-yard drive by the Blazers.

Although being out rushed 165-71 in the contest, the Blazers still collected 288 yards of total offense as compared to the Bulldogs' 284.

Carroll ended his first career start for MSU 9-for-12 for 93 yards. His longest pass went to Aubrey Bell for 19 yards.

With his three rushing touchdowns on the day, Dixon now has nine touchdowns on the season and 18 for his career. That moves him into 10th place on the all-time list, tied with Dennis Johnson.

STARKVILLE, Miss. - Tennessee held off a strong Mississippi State upset bid 33-21 at Davis Wade Stadium at Scott Field as the Volunteers improved to 4-2 and 2-1 in Southeastern Conference play. State fell to 4-3, 1-3 in the league, while dropping their fifth straight to the Volunteers in the series.

Leading 27-21 early in the fourth quarter Tennessee mounted a solid drive, marching 69 yards on 14 plays and eating up 5:42 of the clock. The drive was capped by a 26-yard field goal from Daniel Lincoln, handing the Vols a 30-21 lead with 5:45 remaining.

Tennessee would shut down the Bulldog offense, which had a very productive day, the rest of the way, ultimately shutting them out of scoring completely in the fourth period.

The Vols were led by a solid performance from senior quarterback Eric Ainge who completed 22-of-36 passes for 259 yards and two touchdowns and was intercepted once. Receiver Lucas Taylor hauled in 11 catches for 186 yards and a score. Running

back Arian Foster also greatly contributed to the UT offensive effort, which produced 470 yards from scrimmage, by rushing 21 times for 139 yards and one score.

MSU's offense, which tallied 338 total yards of its own, got another 100-yard effort from running back Anthony Dixon, who tallied 108 yards and a touchdown on the ground. Rookie quarterback Wesley Carroll, in just his third collegiate start, completed 18-of-33 passes for 203 yards and two scores. Tony Burks and Jamayel Smith each had five receptions and a touchdown.

Tennessee built a 17-14 lead at half-time and expanded it to 24-14 when Foster scored on a 1-yard. But MSU answered with a 67-yard drive, as Carroll found Smith on 14-yard pass to the corner of the end zone on a third-down play.

The Vols threatened the end zone again on their next drive, but State's defense stood strong and forced another Lincoln field goal, this one from 29 yards away with 3:47 to go in the third gave Tennessee a 27-21 lead.

After the Bulldogs drove 48 yards on nine plays to the UT 35, MSU faced a fourth-and-6 early in the fourth quarter. The Bulldog opted to go for the first down, but Carroll's pass to Arnil Stallworth was tipped, forcing Stallworth to lean back toward the line of scrimmage to make the catch, which came up a yard shy of the first down.

State would intercept Ainge on the third play of the ensuing possession, but the Vols forced MSU to punt after just three plays. UT then put together a long, clock-eating drive for the field goal that put them up 30-21.

The Vols opened scoring on the afternoon by marching 78 yards on nine plays on their first drive of the day. Ainge hit Chris Brown on a 4-yard touchdown pass for the score.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va. - West Virginia scored 28 first-quarter points and the ninth-ranked Mountaineers never looked back in a 38-13 victory over visiting Mississippi State in the second meeting ever between the teams, the first on the Morgantown campus.

With the loss, the Bulldogs dropped to 4-4 overall. WVU improved to 6-1. The Mountaineers claimed both meetings in the series, also winning in 2006 in Starkville.

The opening minute of the game set the tone for the afternoon. West Virginia fumbled the opening kickoff and MSU recovered deep in WVU territory, but the play was called back due to an offside penalty against the Bulldogs. After the rekick, the Mountaineers struck very quickly as quarterback Patrick White scampered 64 yards for a touchdown on the first play from scrimmage and WVU led 7-0 just 21 seconds into the contest.

After stopping State on three plays, the Mountaineers drove 88 yards on 12 plays for their second score of the afternoon. White hit Owen Schmitt on a 12-yard pass to cap the possession. After a 51-yard return by Derek Pegues on the ensuing kickoff,

the Bulldogs would assist West Virginia on its next score when Anthony Dixon fumbled on the first play and WVU's Marc Magro returned the loose ball to the State 16-yard line. Three plays later, the Mountaineers found paydirt again, White hitting Darius Reynaud on a 10-yard completion. WVU led 21-0 at the 6:09 mark of the first period.

WVU got great field position again on its next drive after a 23-yard MSU punt went out of bounds at the Bulldog 48. West Virginia took advantage again, completing its impressive first period of play with a five-play drive that ended with running back Steve Slaton's 26-yard touchdown jaunt. Slaton had another big day on the ground, gaining 127 yards on 23 carries.

After a WVU field goal six ticks into the second quarter, the Bulldog offense finally got on the board later in the period. A State punt pinned the Mountaineers at their own 1-yard line and, after a three-and-out by WVU, the resulting punt was returned by Pegues to the West Virginia 29. Bulldog quarterback Wesley Carroll found Jamayel Smith on a 22-yard pass play to open the State drive. Four Dixon rushes later, he found the end zone from a yard out on fourth down for MSU's first points of the day. WVU led 31-7 at halftime.

State's offense opened the second half impressively, taking the opening kickoff and driving 58 yards on 13 plays. Christian Ducre ended the possession with a 3-yard scoring rush. MSU's two-point conversion failed and WVU led 31-13 at the 9:50 mark of the third period. Both teams would go scoreless the remainder of the quarter.

The final points of the game came less than a minute into the final period. West Virginia notched a seven-play, 48-yard drive led by backup quarterback Jarrett Brown, who found Reynaud for his second TD of the day.

LEXINGTON, Ky. - Two critical turnovers by Kentucky early in the second half led to 10 Mississippi State points and helped the Bulldogs upset the 14th-ranked Wildcats 31-14. The victory upped State's record to 5-4 overall, 2-3 in the Southeastern Conference.

With State leading 14-7 at halftime, UK (6-3, 2-3) took the opening kickoff of the second half but Alfonso Smith fumbled and Bulldog Keith Fitzhugh fell on the ball at the Wildcat 32. Seven plays later, place-kicker Adam Carlson hit a 31-yard field goal to give MSU a 17-7 lead early in the third period.

On UK's next possession, the Bulldogs forced a punt, but Wildcat punter Tim Masthay was forced to pull the ball down and run. State took over at the UK 26. Wesley Carroll found Jason Husband to convert a third-and-11; and two Anthony Dixon rushes later, State was in the end zone and led 24-7 with 8:16 to go in the third quarter.

State's defense would be the story the rest of the way, allowing the potent Wildcat offense just seven points in the second half. The remainder of the game would see the

STARKVILLE, Miss. - Two Mississippi State interceptions of Alabama quarterback John Parker Wilson led to 14 Bulldog points as MSU upset the 21st-ranked Crimson Tide 17-12 Saturday afternoon at Davis Wade Stadium.

A school-record crowd of 56,188 fans witnessed the victory - MSU's second in as many years over UA and upped State's record to 6-4 overall, 3-3 in Southeastern Conference. 'Bama fell to 6-4, 4-3.

With Alabama leading 9-3 late in the second quarter, 'Bama appeared it was going to take control of the game on a well-clock-managed possession which began at the 4:08 mark of the second period. UA drove 78 yards on 13 plays to the Bulldog 1 where it faced a third-and-goal with 21 seconds remaining before halftime. After a timeout, Wilson dropped back to pass, but a heavy rush from MSU's Titus Brown forced him to throw early and short. Waiting in the end zone was Bulldog Anthony Johnson, who intercepted the pass and returned it 100 yards for a touchdown. That huge momentum swing gave State a 10-9 advantage at the intermission.

On Alabama's first drive of the second half, the Bulldogs would pick off Wilson again, this time the interception being made by Derek Pegues. Pegues returned the

ball 40 yards to the Crimson Tide 25-yard line. Five plays later, State running back Anthony Dixon plunged in on the right side from three yards out. Adam Carlson's extra point put MSU up 17-9 with 11:35 to go in the third period.

The remainder of the game would highlight both teams' defenses, as only a fourth-quarter Alabama field goal would be scored the rest of the way and State would hold on for the victory. The Crimson Tide, which has now not scored an offensive touchdown against Mississippi State since the 2004 season, never penetrated MSU territory any deeper than the Bulldog 46-yard line in the second half (excluding the field goal drive).

In addition to being State's second straight win over 'Bama, it also marked Bulldog head coach Sylvester Croom's second consecutive win over his alma mater. It was also Crimson Tide head coach Nick Saban's first career loss against MSU (was 5-0 vs. the Bulldogs while at LSU).

Two Alabama field goals were the only scoring in the first period of the game. The Crimson Tide's first score was setup after MSU's first drive ended with quarterback Wesley Carroll's first career pass interception, leaving UA at the Bulldog 34. After State stood strong, Leigh Tiffin nailed a 39-yard field goal for an early 3-0 Alabama lead.

After the Tide held MSU to a second three-and-out possession, Alabama drove 25 yards on five plays to the State 34. From there, Tiffin connected on a 51-yard field goal effort for a 6-0 'Bama lead.

Alabama extended its lead to 9-0 on its first drive of the second quarter. After moving the ball 52 yards on 10 plays, Tiffin connected on his third kick attempt of the day, this time a 29-yard effort.

STARKVILLE, Miss. - Mississippi State's offense couldn't get in synch for three-and-a-half quarters Friday afternoon, but the Bulldogs manufactured three scores in the final 7:51 to rally and post an improbable 17-14 comeback victory over arch-rival Mississippi in the 104th meeting between the teams at Davis Wade Stadium.

With the victory, MSU improved to 7-5 overall, 4-4 in the Southeastern Conference, and virtually assured itself of its first postseason bowl bid since the 2000 season. It also returned the coveted Golden Egg back to Starkville. With the loss, UM fell to 3-8 and ended the season winless (0-8) in league competition.

Adam Carlson's 48-yard field goal with just 12 seconds to go proved to be the game-winner, but was just the conclusion to a fairy-tale ending in the Bulldogs' win.

The comeback started with the Rebels leading 14-0 and gaining possession of the ball with 12:44 remaining in regulation. After the Bulldogs forced a fourth-and-1 at the UM 49-yard line, the Rebels questionably decided to go for the first down. But the Bulldog defense stuffed UM running back BenJarvus Green-Ellis for a loss of two and State took over possession.

Intercepted Brandon Cox's first pass attempt of the game, on Auburn's second snap of the contest, and returned it 20 yards for a touchdown that gave the Bulldogs' a 10-0 lead at the time . . . It marked the third time in his career that he had intercepted a pass and returned it for score, a school record . . . Recorded five tackles against the Tigers and was credited with one pass deflection . . . Helped hold the Tiger passing game to just 107 yards on the day . . . Also returned two kickoffs for 44 yards during the 19-14 win . . . Had a pair of hits in Week 4 work against Gardner-Webb . . . Also returned two punts for 27 yards and one kickoff for 18 yards . . . Made five tackles at South Carolina in Week 5, and intercepted the second pass of his junior season (the seventh of his career) and returned it 15 yards . . . Also credited with a pass break up against the Gamecocks . . . Made two hits during Week 6 action vs. UAB . . . Produced the first double-digit tackle game of his career against Tennessee one week later . . . Totaled 10 hits against the Volunteers . . . With his two kick returns, he moved to second on the school's all-time list in both attempts (70) and yards (1,541) . . . Had

four tackles and a fumble recovery in State's Week 9 win over nationally ranked Kentucky . . . His fumble recovery at UK 26 put MSU in position to lengthen its lead to 31-14 with just over eight minutes left in the game . . . Also brought back two punts for 14 yards in Lexington . . . Returned an interception 40 yards and was credited with a pass break up and one tackle in the Bulldogs' Week 10 win over nationally No. 21-ranked Alabama . . . Also returned three kickoffs for 56 yards and one punt (4 yards) against the Crimson Tide . . . Totaled five tackles at Arkansas in Week 11 . . . Had one of his most productive return days against the Razorbacks, however, bringing back five kickoffs for 149 yards and three punts for 69 yards . . . His 218 yards of combined kick returns were the third most in the SEC this year . . . With his five kickoff returns, he tied Tony James (1989-92) for the most career kick returns in school history . . . He also moved past Glen Young (1979-82) into sixth place on the career punt return yardage list (531 yards) . . . Saved possibly the best game of his junior season for his last, the season-ending Battle For The Golden Egg against Ole Miss . . . Brought back four punts for 84 yards against the Rebels, including a 75-yard touchdown return with 2:38 left in the game that pulled MSU into a 14-14 tie with the Rebels and setting the stage for State's come-from-behind victory . . . It was his second career punt return for touchdown (Jacksonville State, 2006) . . . With that return yardage, he moved into fourth place on MSU's career punt return yardage list with 615 yards . . . The 84 yards in punt returns were the second most in the SEC this year, and the 75-yarder was the second longest by an SEC player . . . Moved to the top of the Southeastern Conference statistical rankings in kickoff returns, second in punt returns, with that performance . . . Made three tackles and a pass deflection during Week 4 action at UAB . . . Ran back three punts for 29 yards (9.7-yard average) and one kickoff for 21 yards against the Blazers . . . Maintained his spot atop the SEC in kick returns following that game . . . Registered two tackles and returned a pass interception 23 yards for a touchdown during Week 5 work at LSU . . . It was his first career score and the first interception return for a TD by a Bulldog since teammate Quinton Culberson returned a theft 35 yards for a score against Kentucky in 2004 . . . Widened the spread to 14-3 in the second quarter by returning a punt a career-long 81 yards for six points . . . It was MSU's first punt return for a touchdown since Jonathan Lowe returned one 73 yards for a score against Florida in 2004 . . . It was also the seventh-longest return for a TD in school history, the longest since Kevin Prentiss' 83-yarder in the 1998 SEC Championship Game . . . He became the first Bulldog to score as a specialist and from the line of scrimmage in one season in three years (Fred Reid; rush and kickoff return, 2003) and the first to score in both capacities in the same game since Kevin Prentiss returned a kickoff for a touchdown and hauled

in a scoring aerial against Kentucky in 1997 . . . Made it two straight weeks as a big-play performer for the Bulldogs at Georgia in Week 8 . . . Made just one tackle against UG, but intercepted a pair of passes (46 yards in returns), his third and fourth of the season, and had one pass deflection . . . Also returned three kickoffs for 65 yards and one punt (37 yards) vs. the Peach State Bulldogs . . . Maintained his hold on the SEC lead in both punt and kickoff returns following that game . . . Totaled four tackles during the Bulldogs' Week 9 game vs. Kentucky . . . Also returned five kickoffs for 93 yards (18.6-yard average) and one punt (1 yard) against the Wildcats . . . Had six tackles and a pass defended in State's Week 10 win over Alabama . . . Returned five kickoffs for 85 yards, a 17-yard average, and two punts for 24 yards (12-yard average), against the Crimson Tide . . . ## HEAD COACH SYLVESTER CROOM

Joined MState:

**I**t took just over three years for Sylvester Croom to rebuild a Mississippi State football program that was devastated by three straight losing seasons, a second NCAA probation with sanctions during the previous decade, countless student-athlete departures, all the while installing new offensive and defensive systems with a new coaching staff. With that as a backdrop, Croom was a landslide winner of Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year Award in 2007 for leading the Bulldogs to a 7-5 overall record.

Croom inherited all that and more when he accepted the challenge of reconstructing the Bulldog program for the 2004 football season. His work eventually built an organization that had endured six straight seasons with no more than three wins into one that earned seven wins overall in 2007, four in the SEC, and a post-season bowl reward. It was the school's best results in six years.

When Mississippi State athletic director Larry Templeton began his search in October 2003 for the 31st head coach in the school's long football history, Templeton sought an enthusiastic teacher with the energy to rebuild the Bulldog football program and an individual with an attention to detail who demands the discipline needed to bring structure to a vast organization. History will record that Templeton found his man when MSU hired Sylvester Croom on Dec. 1, 2003.

"Sylvester Croom met all of the criteria we laid forth for the selection of a new head football coach at Mississippi State," Director of Athletics Larry Templeton said at the time of the hire. "We went after the best football coach, and we're confident we found that individual in Sylvester Croom."

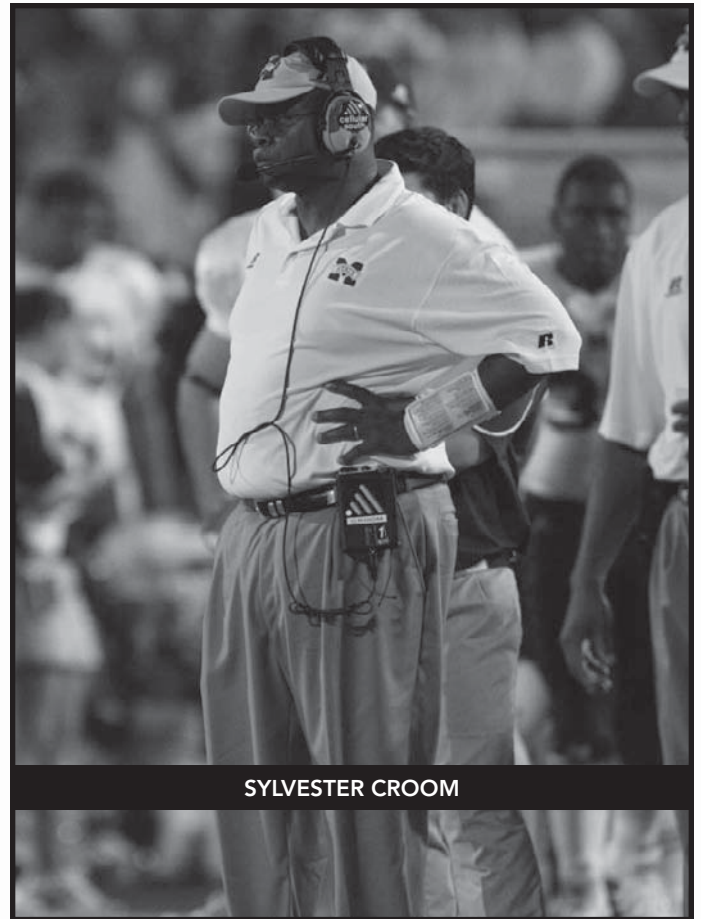
Since that hiring, Croom undertook the daunting task of constructing the foundation upon which the Bulldog football program would be rebuilt. There was little question that progress toward that goal was being achieved, even as the team won just three games in each of his first three years. In those first three years since being named to head MSU's football fortunes, the traits that made Croom the best coach for State came to life.

Croom immediately became an in-demand speaker at alumni and booster events because of his forthright approach to directing the pigskin program. But his non-stop energy on the banquet circuit was only exceeded by the fervor with which he began shaping the Bulldog football operation. He established new offensive and defensive systems, paying particular attention to an attack which mirrored what he taught as a National Football League assistant. And despite the fact he had been away from the college game for 17 years as a pro coach, he has been unwavering in his demand for student-athlete accountability, on the field and off it.

His first two Bulldog teams finished 3-8, a record he has been quick to point out is not acceptable at MSU. That said, the final marks were still one-win improvements over the team he inherited. His first team posted the school's first victory over a ranked team in four years, a 38-31 win over then-No. 20 Florida, and his second squad captured the Egg Bowl Trophy for the first time in four years.

His third team concluded the year 3-9, but lost four games by a field goal each, three of those being SEC contests. The Bulldogs were just one made play away in each of those games from a winning season and a post-season bowl bid.

Croom's fourth team turned those near-misses into success in 2007. State won three of its first four games, including two road triumphs – one at Auburn, a team that eventually earned national ranking during the '07 season. Croom's team also won three of its last four games, back-to-back wins over nationally ranked op-

ponents Kentucky and Alabama, and a heart-throbbing victory over Ole Miss, to reclaim the Egg Bowl Trophy.

Even before coaching his first football contest on the Starkville campus, Croom was recognized nationally in 2004 for his impact on the college game. Dennis Dodd ranked him #2 on CBS Sportsline's list of the 50 most relevant people in college football for the 2004 season. In so doing, Dodd said: "The State program took on a more organized look the moment he arrived."

Sports Illustrated rated him the 31st most influential minority in all of sports. "In Mississippi and beyond, his impact has already been profound," SI noted.

In February 2007, Croom was invited to the White House by President George W. Bush to celebrate African-American History Month. Croom was one of the 200 minority leaders invited to the program in the East Room. The President indicated that Croom was not only invited because he was the first African-American head football coach in the SEC, but because "he's a strong leader and a fine man. And I thank you for blazing trails."

Croom came to State from the NFL's Green Bay Packers, where he served the previous three seasons under then-Packer general manager/head coach Mike Sherman as the team's running backs coach. He is a veteran of 29 years in the coaching profession, 17 of which have come at the professional level on the offensive side of the football. He spent four years as an NFL offensive coordinator.

Croom's Packer running attack ranked third in the National Football League in 2003, averaging 160 yards per game. Under his guidance, Ahman Green blossomed into one of the true stars of the NFL. He finished second in the league in rushing in '03 and was the fourth most productive rusher in the NFL over the three seasons in which Croom was his coach.

The natural by-product of Green's stellar season in 2003 was a third-straight,

12-4 regular season and a second consecutive NFC North title. Croom, who had already accepted MSU's head coaching position, helped the Packers to the second round of the NFL playoffs.

In 2002, Green Bay clinched the inaugural NFC North championship with a second-straight 12-4 record. Croom's backs contributed to a Packers' rushing effort that posted the most yards on the ground in 17 years. His rushers helped Green Bay rank fifth in the National Football Conference in that category. As part of that effort, Green earned his second consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl on the heels of his third-straight 1,000-yard season. He ranked fourth in the NFC in rushing. Additionally, Croom's work with undrafted free agent Tony Fisher furthered his reputation as a successful teacher. Fisher's rushing total was the most by a Green Bay rookie in 16 years.

In his first season in Green Bay, Croom helped the Pack qualify for the postseason for the first time in three years with a 12-4 record. Green Bay defeated San Francisco in the NFC Wild Card game, the Packers' first postseason win in three seasons. Green posted a second-consecutive 1,000-yard season and led the team in receptions for a second-straight year. Green was second in the NFC in both rushing yards and total yards from scrimmage. Under Croom's tutelage, Green was named the team's Most Valuable Player and earned his first of three straight trips to Hawaii's Pro Bowl. He was also a second-team, All-Pro selection by the Associated Press.

During his three seasons in Green Bay, the Packers were the second-most successful NFL franchise, winning nearly 70 percent of their games over that stretch.

"Sylvester is a great football coach," Sherman said. "He is a salt-of-the-earth person who represents everything good."

Sherman hired Croom on Jan. 30, 2001, and the latter arrived in Green Bay after four seasons as offensive coordinator for the Detroit Lions (1997-2000).

Croom achieved noted success during those four years in charge of the Detroit attack. His 1997 offense ranked second in the NFL overall, and he helped lead the Lions to a postseason playoff berth. Hall of Fame running back Barry Sanders led the NFL in rushing and became just the third player in league history to crack the 2,000-yard barrier that year. Wide receivers Herman Moore and Johnnie Morton both surpassed 1,000 yards receiving, with Moore leading the NFL with 104 catches. Detroit became the first organization to have teammates lead the NFL in both rushing and receiving in the same season. Moore and Morton entered the 2003 season Nos. 7 and 21, respectively, on the NFL's top active receivers list.

In 1998, Sanders rushed for nearly 1,500 yards, and Morton duplicated the feat of more than 1,000 yards receiving in a season. One year later, Morton and Germaine Crowell combined for nearly 2,500 yards receiving and tight end David Sloan earned a trip to the Pro Bowl with the best production by a Lion tight end in 20 years.

Croom helped lead Detroit to its best finish in three seasons during the 2000 campaign, narrowly missing a second-straight, post-season appearance, what would have been the third in his four seasons in the Motor City.

Prior to his tenure with Detroit, Croom tutored the San Diego Charger running backs for five seasons (1992-96). During that span, the Chargers twice won American Football Conference Western Division titles and participated in postseason play three times. The '94 Charger team not only won a Western Division championship, it won a pair of postseason contests and played in Super Bowl XXIX.

Under Croom's direction, second-year back Natrone Means set a team rushing record in 1994 with 1,350 yards. It was in San Diego where Croom first joined the staff of head coach Bobby Ross, with whom he made the move to Detroit.

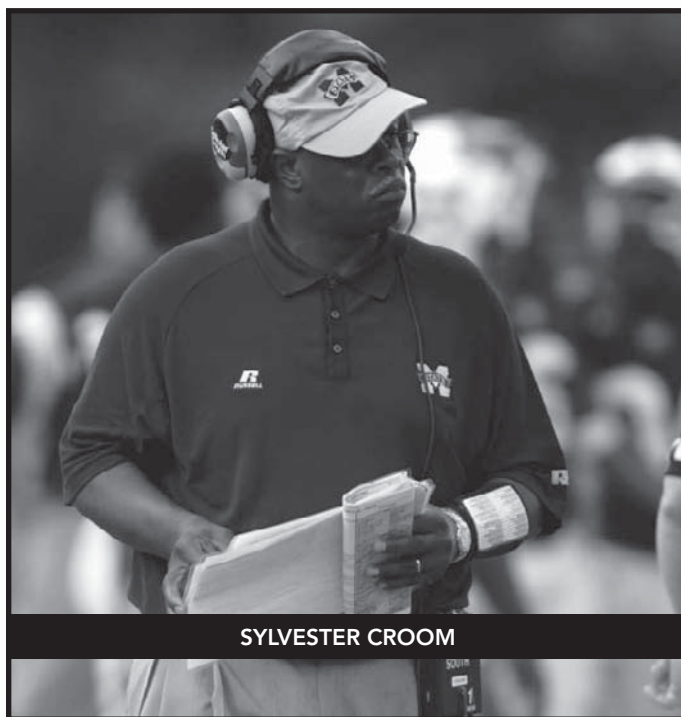
"He's as good a coach as you could ask for on the field and in the classroom," Ross said. "He is a great communicator with coaches and with players. I've had some great coaches work for me like George O'Leary, Ralph Friedgen and Frank

Beamer. I put Sylvester Croom in the same category as those guys."

Croom broke into the NFL as running backs coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1987. He worked in Tampa for four years (1987-90) before joining the Indianapolis Colts in the same capacity for one season (1991).

But the Tuscaloosa, Ala., native also has a solid resume on the college coaching level. He worked for 11 seasons at his alma mater, the University of Alabama, all on the defensive side of the football. Croom oversaw both the inside (1977-81, 1984-86) and outside (1982-83) linebackers during his tenure with the Crimson Tide. He helped Alabama to back-to-back national championships in 1978-79. With his help, Alabama led the Southeastern Conference in total defense during the 1979 and '80 seasons.

That '79 team recorded five shutout wins, gave up just seven touchdowns all season, and allowed only 180 yards of total offense per game during its champion-

ship run.

During his coaching tenure at Alabama, the Crimson Tide went to 10 postseason bowl games in 11 years. He accompanied Alabama teams to the Sugar Bowl (1977-79), Cotton Bowl (1980-81), Sun Bowl (1983,'86), Liberty Bowl (1976,'82) and Aloha Bowl (1985) while in Tuscaloosa. Croom helped Alabama teams to a composite 102-28-2 record during those 11 seasons.

Croom began his Alabama coaching tenure on the staff of legendary Tide head football coach Paul "Bear" Bryant and stayed in Tuscaloosa when Ray Perkins was hired to succeed Bryant.

Croom only left UA when Perkins took him to Tampa Bay when the latter was named the head coach there.

"Mississippi State has hired a real good man," Perkins said. "Sylvester is a great character guy, and he's a bright coach. He gets along well with people, and he's very organized."

Croom also enjoyed a measure of teaching success on the collegiate level at Alabama. Four of his players - E.J. Junior (1981), Mike Pitts (1983), Cornelius Bennett (1987) and the late Derrick Thomas (1989) - all became first-round NFL draft picks following their days with Croom. Two of his linebackers - Wayne Davis (1983-86) and Thomas Boyd (1978-81) - rank one-two on Alabama's all-time tackle chart,

while Thomas still ranks first in career sacks at UA.

Croom first enjoyed achievement at Alabama as a player under Bryant, lettering for three seasons (1972-74), and starting the final two at center, helping the Tide to a 22-2 overall record as a starter. During his playing career with the Tide, Alabama captured three straight SEC titles and the national championship in 1973. The Crimson Tide went to the Cotton, Sugar and Orange Bowls during his playing career.

As a senior captain, the 6-0, 229-pound Croom was named all-SEC and a Kodak All-America, in addition to earning the Jacobs Blocking Trophy as the best offensive lineman in the league. He earned a trip to the 1975 Senior Bowl in Mobile, Ala., for his standout play. He was so respected by the Alabama coaching staff for his devotion to the game of football that the program each spring awards the "Sylvester Croom Commitment to Excellence Award."

Before making his mark at center while at UA, he had stints at linebacker, tight end and tackle.

"In my career, I've been around a lot of great leaders," Ozzie Newsome, Hall of Fame tight end, current general manager of the Baltimore Ravens and former teammate of Croom's at Alabama, said. "And he led that hud-

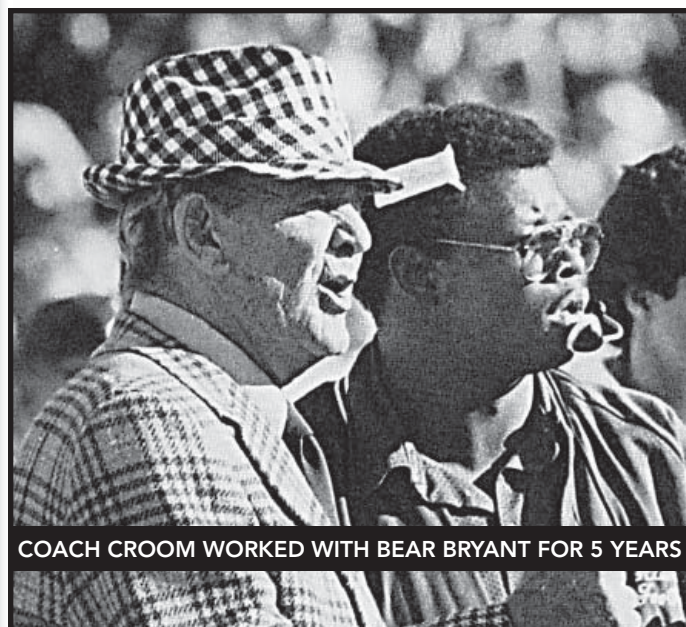
dle, trust me. He was impressive at a lot of things, but mostly a leader."

At just 20 years of age, Croom earned a bachelor's degree in history with a minor in biology in 1975 from Alabama. He earned his master's degree in educational administration in 1977 from the Tuscaloosa school as well.

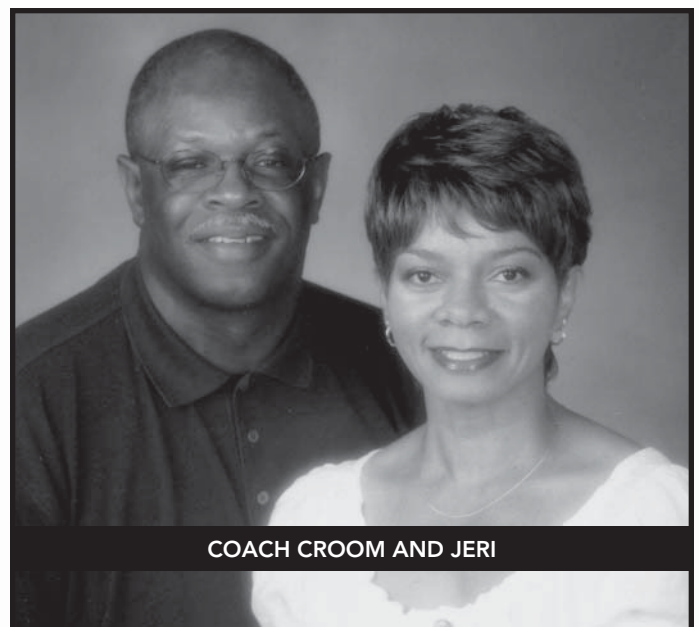
A 1975 free agent signee of the New Orleans Saints following his playing days at Alabama, Croom played one season in the NFL before going back to Tuscaloosa to launch his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1976. He worked with the centers during that one-season apprenticeship.

Born Sept. 25, 1954, in Tuscaloosa, Ala., Sylvester Croom Jr., starred at Tuscaloosa High School as a linebacker and tight end. His wife, Jeri, is also a Tuscaloosa native. The couple has a daughter, Jennifer, who lives with husband Ira Bates and daughter, Ryan, in Mobile, Ala.

# ASSISTANT COACHES

## WOODY McCORVEY Asst. HC / Off. Coord. / QBs

No assistant coach hired by Sylvester Croom has a longer personal relationship with the Bulldog head man than Woody McCorvey, who Croom hired as his assistant head coach on his initial Mississippi State staff. McCorvey runs Croom's West Coast offense and coaches the team's quarterbacks.

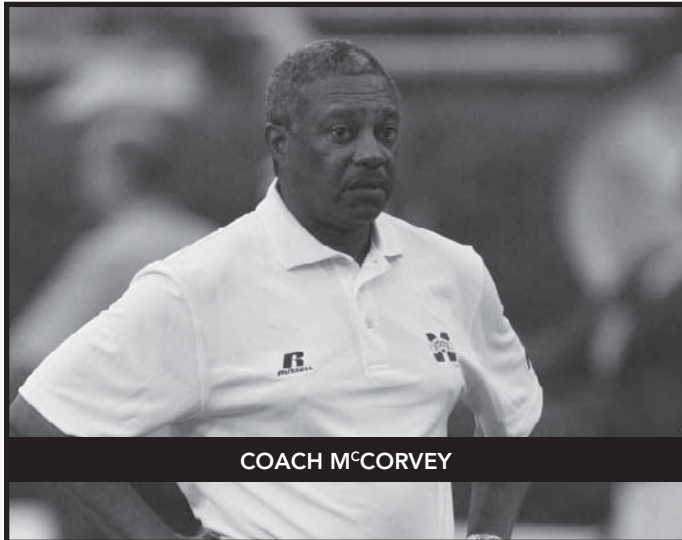
In his first two seasons at the helm of the Bulldog offense, McCorvey helped Jerious Norwood become just the second running back in MSU history to surpass the 1,000-yard rushing plateau in consecutive seasons. Within McCorvey's offense, Norwood became the school's all-time leading rusher. Following the mid-point of his third season directing the attack, McCorvey's offense began to flourish on the ground and through the air. State averaged 24.2 points per game over the season's final six weeks. The team averaged 217.7 yards per game passing over that stretch, and 145.7 yards per game rushing in the final three, all conference games.

In 2005, Norwood gained 1,136 yards on the ground, the school's third-highest single-season rushing mark. On the way to that feat, he gained 257 yards rushing against Houston, a single-game MSU record. In Norwood's first season under McCorvey, the running back became just the sixth Bulldog back to rush for more than 1,000 yards. In 2006, Anthony Dixon set school freshman rushing attempts, yards and touchdowns records.

This past season, MSU improved its scoring offense by 40 points over '06, and its total offense average by nearly 20 yards per game.

McCorvey, 56, came to State from the University of Tennessee where he served the previous five seasons as the Volunteers' running backs coach. With McCorvey heading the UT running game, the Volunteers posted a 46-14 overall record during that time frame. He helped guide Tennessee to the 2000 Fiesta, 2001 Cotton, 2002 Florida Citrus, 2002 and '03 Peach Bowls.

Under McCorvey's leadership, Tennessee maintained the school's reputation of having a hard-nosed rushing attack. The Volunteers led the Southeastern Conference in rushing in 1999, averaging 191.3 yards per game. McCorvey's work helped tailback Travis Stephens pace the SEC in rushing in 2001 with 1,464 yards. He was named first-team, all-America that season and narrowly missed winning the Doak Walker Award as the country's premier running back. One year prior, McCorvey helped tailback Travis Henry finish second in the league and 14th nationally in rushing with 1,314 yards. During that team-rushing, league-leading '99 season,

current National Football League star Jamal Lewis was third among conference ground-gainers.

Prior to joining the staff at Tennessee, McCorvey worked one season at South Carolina, where he served as the Gamecocks' receivers coach.

McCorvey took the South Carolina job following an eight-year stay at the University of Alabama from 1990-97. McCorvey served seven seasons as the Tide receivers coach, and the 1996 campaign as the team's offensive coordinator.

During those first seven seasons under head coach Gene Stallings, Alabama posted a 70-16-1 overall record on the field. During that time, UA was invited to the 1991 Fiesta Bowl, the 1991 Blockbuster Bowl, the 1993 Sugar Bowl, the 1993 Gator Bowl, the 1995 Citrus Bowl, and the 1997 Outback Bowl. Alabama won the SEC Championship and the national title during an undefeated '92 campaign. With McCorvey at the controls of the offense in 1996, Alabama finished 10-3 overall, including a win over Michigan in the Outback Bowl.

Before his SEC tenure, McCorvey worked seven years at Clemson University (1983-89). With McCorvey coaching the tight ends from 1983-85 and the wide receivers from 1986-89, Clemson posted a 60-19-3 overall record. During that time frame, the Tigers were invited to the 1985 Independence Bowl, the 1986 and '89 Gator Bowls, as well as the 1988 and '89 Florida Citrus Bowls.

From 1979-82, he served as an assistant coach at Alabama A&M. He began his collegiate coaching career at North Carolina Central in 1978. McCorvey began his coaching career with a six-year stint at Tate High School in Pensacola, Fla.

A quarterback at Alabama State University from 1968-72, McCorvey earned his bachelor's degree from ASU in 1972 and a master's degree from the University of West Florida in 1977.

A native of Grove Hill, Ala., McCorvey is married to the former Ann Brown, and the couple has a son, Marlon.



## ELLIS JOHNSON DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR / LBs

Joined MState:

**W**hen Mississippi State head football coach Sylvester Croom tabbed Ellis Johnson as his defensive coordinator, he not only was drawing on his Alabama connections for an experienced defensive leader, but he was also getting a veteran teacher with head coaching credits on his resume.

Johnson's defensive know-how went on display immediately and has continued throughout his four seasons at the head of the MSU defense. In his first season, his group whacked more than 100 yards per game off the opponents' total offensive output per game in the year prior to his arrival. In 2005, MSU whittled another 30 yards per game off that average and moved to eighth overall in the league, just 40 yards per game from moving into the conference's top three schools. Johnson's defense held five opponents to 17 points or less in '05. In 2006, the MSU defense carved another 15 yards per game off its offense allowed, moved to seventh in the league overall in that category, just 30 yards from reaching the league's top four. His group was fifth in the conference in rush defense in '06. This season, MSU tied for fifth in the league in total defense, allowing just 341 yards per game, less than 20 yards per game from the league's top three. Additionally, MSU permitted its opponent 17 points or less seven times.

Under his guidance, middle linebacker Quinton Culberson finished third in the Southeastern Conference in total tackles and earned all-SEC recognition in 2006.

Johnson, 55, came to State from The Citadel, where he served the previous three seasons as the school's head football coach. The military institution based in Charleston, S.C., finished the 2003 campaign with a 6-6 mark, the best record at The Citadel in six years.

A veteran of over a quarter-century in the coaching profession, it was a third homecoming for the former Citadel player. He served as defensive ends coach at his alma mater in 1975 to begin his coaching career and returned as linebacker coach in 1982, a pair of one-year stints. Johnson's varied background includes work at the high school, small college, I-AA and major college levels. He has coached in four Southeastern Conference championship games and tutored more than 20 players who have made National Football League rosters.

Prior to his head coaching responsibilities at The Citadel, Johnson was defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Alabama from 1997-2000. During that four-year stay in Tuscaloosa, the Crimson Tide finished the 1999 season 10-3, won the Southeastern Conference championship over Florida 34-7 in the league title game, and earned a berth in the 2000 Orange Bowl. That team had the nation's second-best rushing defense, a unit that ranked ninth nationally in total defense. He also helped UA to a Music City Bowl appearance in 1998.

That tenure in Tuscaloosa was his second with the Tide. He spent four years as Alabama's outside linebacker coach (1990-93), helping Gene Stallings' teams

to a 41-9 record on the field. He helped the 1992 UA team go undefeated, win the SEC title, and earn unanimous national championship acclaim. His linebackers were an integral part to Alabama's defense ranking first nationally in both total defense and against the run. The '91 team finished 11-1, losing only to Florida. All four Tide teams ended their seasons in bowl games: the 1991 Fiesta, the '91 Blockbuster, the '93 Sugar, and the '93 Gator.

Between stints at Alabama, Johnson spent three seasons at Clemson (1994-96), the first two as outside linebackers coach, the final as defensive coordinator and defensive line instructor. Those last two Tiger teams concluded their seasons in the '96 Gator and '96 Peach Bowls. He helped that '95 defense rank 10th nationally overall and first in the Atlantic Coast Conference in scoring defense.

Prior to his initial stay with the Crimson Tide, Johnson was the defensive coordinator at Southern Mississippi (1988-89). On the staff of Curley Hallman at USM, those two teams finished 15-8 overall, and earned a post-season bowl reward at the Independence Bowl in 1988.

Between his second stint at The Citadel and the two-year stay in Hattiesburg, Johnson worked in the state of North Carolina. He was head coach at Gardner-Webb College (1983), defensive coordinator at Appalachian State (1984) and outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator at East Carolina (1985-87).

Johnson played defensive end for The Citadel in the early 1970s, and his coaching career began under Bobby Ross following his graduation in 1975.

A native of Winnsboro, S.C., Johnson is married to the former Caroline Courie of Columbia, S.C. The couple has two sons, Eli and Charlie, and a daughter, Sandra Elliott.

## ROCKEY FELKER RUNNING BACKS / RECRUITING

**R**ockey Felker is living proof that persistence, loyalty and hard work pay dividends. At one time the head football coach at Mississippi State, Felker has taken a long and circuitous route back to coaching on the Bulldog sideline. He is finishing his first season as the running backs coach at his alma mater in 2007, he also serves the staff as recruiting coordinator. Under Felker's guidance, halfback Anthony Dixon entered the school's all-time top 20 rushers in 2007.

State head football coach Sylvester Croom initially retained Felker as the staff's coordinator of football operations in 2004, a position Felker had held prior to Croom's arrival. But it was during the next three years in that capacity that Felker showed Croom that he should be back on the practice and game fields. It was on the field that his career accomplishments had earned him the designation as a rising young star on the coaching front, one that gained him an SEC head coaching position at age 33.

Felker, 54, was the nation's youngest collegiate head coach when he was selected to guide the MSU football program in 1986. He directed the Bulldogs to a 6-5 mark in his first season at the helm, the school's first winning season in five years. Felker's team won road games at Syracuse and at defending SEC champion Tennessee during that '86 season, and he became the first State head football coach to post a winning record in his initial season since the legendary Darrell Royal in 1954. Felker served as State's head football coach through the 1990 season.

He came back to State as the school's head coach following 11 years as an assistant coach on the collegiate level. Immediately prior to rejoining the MSU program, he was an assistant at Alabama from 1983-85. He served as the Crimson Tide receivers coach in 1983-84 and the offensive backfield coach in '85. During his stay in Tuscaloosa, he helped Alabama to postseason bowl wins over Southern Methodist ('83 Sun Bowl) and Southern California ('85 Aloha Bowl).

Prior to returning to the SEC, Felker worked two years each at Texas Tech (1979-80) and Memphis State (1981-82) under the guidance of the late head coach Rex Dockery.

Felker began his coaching career at Mississippi State following his playing days, working for head coach Bob Tyler. He worked with the junior varsity (1975) and the varsity receivers, quarterbacks and running backs (1976-78).

A native of Jackson, Tenn., Felker was a five-sport letterman at Brownsville (Tenn.) High School, earning all-state honors in football under the tutelage of his father, Edwin "Babe" Felker, an assistant coach at the school.

Felker's first association with Mississippi State came in December 1970, when he signed a football scholarship to play quarterback for the Bulldogs. After playing one year of freshman ball, he was under center for most of the next three seasons. In 1974, Felker led MSU to a 9-3 overall record, leading the SEC in total offense and directing the Bulldogs to a win over North Carolina in the Sun Bowl. He was named the Nashville Banner SEC Player of the Year and the Birmingham Post-Herald Outstanding Senior Player for his stellar final season.

Following his five years as head coach at MSU, Felker worked nine more years as an assistant coach. He had two terms as the offensive coordinator at the University of Tulsa (1991-92 and 1997-99) and spent four years on the coaching staff at the University of Arkansas, working three seasons (1994-96) as the school's offensive coordinator.

He helped Tulsa to a 10-2 record in 1991, coaching the quarterbacks and wide receivers. That Golden Hurricane team defeated San Diego State in the Freedom Bowl during that season. He also tutored the running backs during his stay at the Western Athletic Conference school.

While at Arkansas, Felker coached the running backs in 1993, then tutored the quarterbacks the next three years. He helped the Razorbacks win the SEC Western Division title and earn a berth in the '95 SEC Championship Game. The Razorbacks concluded that season with a bid to the Carquest Bowl in Miami, Fla.

When Felker was hired back to the MSU football staff in the spring of 2002, it was indeed a sweet homecoming for one of the school's most loved personalities.

Felker is married to the former Susan Tingle and they have three sons, Jay, David and Stephen.



## J.B. GRIMES OFFENSIVE LINE

**W**hen head football coach Sylvester Croom hired J.B. Grimes, the MSU mentor was bringing in a college assistant coach with a long list of credits as an offensive line tutor. He has done nothing in his first four years in Starkville to alter that reputation, all the while building the Bulldog offensive front back into what became a major strength of the 2007 team.

Grimes' offensive line moved a Bulldog rushing attack that averaged just 118 yards per game before his arrival to 158 yards and 138 yards per game, respectively, in his first two seasons with the Bulldogs. In both seasons, Jerious Norwood surpassed the 1,000-yard rushing total. State was seventh in the league in rushing in 2005, but just 7 yards per game from the league's top four. In 2006, MSU averaged 145.7 yards per game rushing over the final three weeks (against SEC foes Alabama, Arkansas and Ole Miss.). Just as important, his offensive line reduced the team's number of sacks allowed from 36 prior to his arrival to 29 a year ago, including just three sacks over the season's final four weeks (all SEC games). This season, Grimes offensive line paved the way for a running attack to gain more than 135 yards per game and chopped the quarterback sacks allowed to just 20.

In just his first season with the Bulldog offensive linemen, State rushed for 1,744 yards, the most at the school in four years. Under his guidance, offensive tackle David Stewart was selected in the fourth round by the Tennessee Titans in the 2005 National Football League draft. State upped that rushing total to 1,908 in 2007.

Grimes, 52, came to Mississippi State from East Carolina University, where he served Pirate head coach John Thompson as assistant head coach and offensive line coach in 2003.

Under Grimes, the Pirates' offensive line paved the way for its third straight 1,000-yard rusher. After ECU's running game struggled early in the season, the Pirates averaged 161 yards rushing per game in the last seven contests.

A veteran of 29 years in the coaching profession, the last 27 of which have come at the collegiate level, Grimes has been associated with teams that have won five conference championships and gone to 13 post-season bowl games.

Prior to making the move to East Carolina, Grimes served as the offensive line coach under R.C. Slocum at Texas A&M for five seasons, 1998-2002. During his time in College Station, A&M posted a 40-22 overall record. Those teams ended their seasons in the 1999 Sugar Bowl as champions of the Big XII, the '99 Alamo Bowl, the 2000 Independence Bowl, and the '01 GalleryFurniture.com Bowl.

Immediately prior to joining the A&M staff, Grimes coached five seasons at Virginia Tech, 1993-97. As the offensive line coach for head coach Frank Beamer at Tech, he helped the Hokies to a composite 44-16 overall record. Grimes helped

lead the Gobblers to season-ending berths in the '93 Independence Bowl, the '94 and '98 Gator Bowls, the '95 Sugar Bowl, and the '96 Orange Bowl. The 1995 and '96 teams won back-to-back Big East championships.

Grimes served as offensive line coach at his home-state institution, Arkansas, on two different occasions. He was with the Razorbacks from 1989-92, working under three different head coaches. He helped head coach Ken Hatfield's final Arkansas team to a 10-2 overall record and a berth in the '90 Cotton Bowl as Southwest Conference champions. Two seasons later, he assisted Jack Crowe's second and final UA team to an Independence Bowl invitation. He earlier had worked at Arkansas under Lou Holtz from 1981-82 as first a graduate assistant, and then the offensive line instructor. Those two teams posted a 17-6-1 record and landed in the Gator and Bluebonnet Bowls, respectively.

He served two terms as the offensive line coach at Northeast Louisiana, from 1979-80 and again from 1985-88. With Grimes as the offensive line coach, NLU won the 1987 Division I-AA national championship. He worked one-year stints at Delta (Miss.) State and Missouri in 1983 and '84, respectively. Grimes began his coaching career with two seasons on the Arkansas high school level.

A four-year letterman as an offensive guard at Henderson (Ark.) State, he helped his team to a 40-6 record during that time. Grimes helped lead his '74 Henderson State team to a berth in the NAIA championship game. He earned his bachelor's degree in education from Henderson State in 1977 and received his master's in education from Northeast Louisiana.

A native of Memphis, Tenn., John Bryan Grimes grew up in Clarendon, Ark. He is married to the former Jennifer Graves, and the couple has four children, sons Aaron and Nick, and daughters Danielle and Lindsey.

## CHARLIE HARBISON

**W**hen Mississippi State head football coach Sylvester Croom hired Charlie Harbison this past January, he was bringing not only an experienced assistant coach to the Bulldog sidelines, he was acquiring a decorated college recruiter who was also a veteran instructor in the Southeastern Conference.

In just his first season in Starkville, Harbison helped the MSU pass defense rank fourth in the SEC, allowing just 182.2 yards per game, sixth in pass efficiency defense (114.8). The Bulldogs improved their interception total from 12 to 15 in just one season.

Harbison, 47, comes to MSU following four years in his second tour of duty on the staff at the University of Alabama. He coached the Crimson Tide wide receivers during his most recent stint. Harbison helped UA to a 26-24 overall record during that stretch, including berths in the 2004 Music City, '06 Cotton Bowl and Independence Bowl this past December.

During that four-year stretch, Harbison helped receivers D. J. Hall, Antonio Carter, and Triandos Luke rank among the school's all-time top 10 pass-catchers. Two of Hall's single-season receiving totals were among the eight best ever at the school. Following the 2005 season, he was honored as one of the nation's top 25 college football recruiters by Rivals.com.

Harbison coached the Crimson Tide defensive backs in his initial stay in Tuscaloosa from 1998-2000. He helped UA to a 20-16 mark and appearances in the 1998 Music City and 2000 Orange Bowls during those three years. He was a part of the 1999 Alabama team that won the Southeastern Conference Western Division title, defeated Florida in the SEC Championship Game, and dropped a one-point decision to Michigan in the Orange Bowl.

Two of his pupils, Fernando Bryant in 1999 and Tony Dixon in 2001 were taken in the first and second rounds of the National Football League draft.

Sandwiched between those two Alabama assignments, Harbison coached the defensive backfield at LSU in 2001 and '02. He was a member of the Tiger coaching staff that directed the 2001 LSU team to an SEC Championship Game win over Tennessee. During his two years, LSU finished 18-8 overall and played in the 2002 Sugar and 2003 Cotton Bowls. Corey Webster, who played under Harbison his

first two years in Baton Rouge, finished his career second on the school's all-time pass interception list.

Prior to his first stint at Alabama, Harbison served as the defensive backs coach at Clemson from 1995-97. The Atlantic Coast Conference Tigers posted a 22-14 mark during those three years, ending those seasons in the Gator and back-to-back Peach Bowls.

He also coached the secondary at UTEP (1994) and served twice at his alma mater, Gardner-Webb, coaching wide receivers (1992-93) and defensive backs (1984-85).

In addition to his collegiate coaching experience, Harbison worked in both the Arena Football League and the World League of American Football. His professional football coaching resume includes serving as defensive coordinator for the Charlotte Rage (1993).

A native of Shelby, N.C., Harbison graduated from Gardner-Webb College in 1995. A two-sport star in football and track on the college level, he was a free-agent signee of the Buffalo Bills following his senior season.

He and his late wife Gloria, who passed away in early 2003 after battling cancer, have four children – Charlie, Stedman, Masai and Msiba; daughter-in-law Caroline and grandsons, Masai II and Amari.



## MELVIN SMITH

**M**ississippi State University head coach Sylvester Croom wasted little time bringing a coach with deep Mississippi connections and proven recruiting ability back to the Magnolia State in spring 2006 when he hired Melvin Smith to work in the Bulldog secondary. He coached the cornerbacks in 2007. In just his second season back on the campus, Smith helped the MSU pass defense rank fourth in the SEC, allowing just 182.2 yards per game, sixth in pass efficiency defense (114.8). The Bulldogs improved their interception total from 12 to 15.

For Smith, 49, returning to MSU was a homecoming, not only to the university but to the state of Mississippi. A native of Taylorsville, Miss., who grew up in Magee, Miss., Smith was an assistant football coach previously at State for seven years (1995-2001), helping guide the Bulldogs through arguably the greatest period in the school's football history. The 25-year coaching veteran has spent 21 of those years working in the Magnolia State.

In Smith's first season back at State, Jeramie Johnson led the league in forced fumbles in 2006, and earned all-SEC recognition at free safety. Derek Pegues reached similar all-league honors at cornerback in 2006.

Smith came back to Mississippi State following three seasons at Texas A&M, where he coached the safeties. During his tenure in College Station, Texas, Smith helped the Aggies to a 7-4 regular season record in 2004 and a berth in the 2005 Cotton Bowl.

Prior to his stint at A&M and immediately following his seven years at MSU, Smith coached the safeties at Alabama in 2002. That Crimson Tide team posted a 10-3 regular season record that year.

Despite his assignment with the secondary, Smith has shown an ability to teach on both sides of the ball. In addition to having served six seasons as a defensive backfield coach, he started his MSU coaching career with one year as the wide receivers coach during his initial stay in Starkville.

He tutored the likes of current National Football League cornerback Fred Smoot (1999 and 2000) and long-time pro standout wide receiver Eric Moulds (1995) during that time.

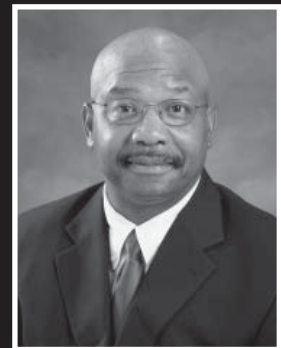

In 2000, three of his four defensive backfield starters signed professional football contracts. That secondary intercepted 19 passes, the second-most in school history. One year earlier, Smith's secondary led the Southeastern Conference in pass defense and finished the season ranked fourth nationally in that department. In 1998, his troops were the last NCAA Division I unit to allow a touchdown through the air (Week 5).

From 1997-2000, Mississippi State posted a 33-15 overall record, 20-12 in the SEC. The 1998 team won the SEC Western Division championship and played eventual national champion Tennessee in the SEC title game in Atlanta. That team culminated the year with a berth in the 1999 Cotton Bowl. In 1999, State finished 10-2, defeating Clemson in the '99 Peach Bowl. The 2000 Bulldog team won eight games and beat Texas A&M in the Independence Bowl.

Smith has also coached on the collegiate level in Mississippi at Ole Miss (1992-94) and Delta State (1990-91). He began his coaching career on the high school level at Greenwood (Miss.) from 1982-89.

Smith holds a master's degree in administration from Delta State (1992) and a bachelor's degree in health and physical education from Millsaps College. Smith is married to the former Sheilah McLemore and the couple has four children, sons Robert and Melvin, and daughters Deondra and Ashlee.

## REED STRINGER TIGHT ENDS

**W**hen Mississippi State head football coach Sylvester Croom rewarded Reed Stringer with a position on his full-time, on-the-field staff in January 2005, it was an endorsement of the work performed by the former two-year graduate assistant in Croom's initial season. In 2007, Croom further rewarded Stringer by adding oversight of the MSU special teams to his job description.

His impact was felt immediately, particularly with the special teams. After his average dipped by nearly 4 yards per punt between his freshman and sophomore seasons, punter Blake McAdams returned his punting average to the 40-yard threshold in 2007. Place-kicker Adam Carlson, who made just eight-of-16 field goals in his first two seasons at State, converted nine-of-12 three-point opportunities this past season, including six in a row to close the regular season. Even more improvement was made by the Bulldog cover units, which reduced both kickoff return and punt return yardage against.

Stringer responded in 2005 by helping Eric Butler become the school's all-time touchdown receptions leader among tight ends with seven scoring catches. This past season, his tight end corps combined for the most receptions by the position at MSU since 1990. He is blessed with tutoring one of the team's deeper and more experienced positions – the top three on the depth chart at the position are seniors. That unit improved its pass-catching numbers each year under Stringer's guidance.

Stringer, 28, served the previous two seasons as the school's graduate assistant on offense, working primarily with the offensive line.

He heads into the '07 season with a pre-season all-SEC performer and former freshman all-league returner at tight end -- Butler -- who set a single-season MSU record for touchdown catches by a Bulldog tight end the year before establishing the career standard, one of the team's most versatile performers -- Dezmond

Sherrod -- who has already made a name for himself as a relentless blocker who can play fullback as well, and a converted wide receiver -- Jason Husband -- who has been impressive as a pass catcher at the position with three touchdowns in 15 career grabs.

It was his fervor in working with the scout team preparing the Bulldogs for their weekly opponents, and his work with J.B. Grimes and the 2004 offensive line that paved the way for his initial promotion.

Prior to joining the MSU staff, Stringer served one year as a graduate assistant working with the tight ends at his alma mater, Delta State.

A four-year letterman on the Statesmen's offensive line, he helped DSU claim the 2000 NCAA Division II national championship. Stringer concluded his career with a string of 35 consecutive starting assignments at offensive left tackle. In addition to that '00 national title, he was also instrumental in helping Delta State win the 1998 and 2000 Gulf South Conference championships. He graduated from the Cleveland, Miss., based institution in 2001 with a degree in business management. Stringer also completed his master's degree work in business administration from DSU in 2003.

A native of Canton, Miss., Stringer was a two-time academic all-Gulf South Conference player while at Delta State. He was also named to the GSC Academic Honor Roll three times. He is married to the former Emily Howell, of Starkville, Miss.

## DAVID TURNER DEFENSIVE LINE

**M**ississippi State head football coach Sylvester Croom considered himself fortunate indeed to find an experienced coach to replace Brick Haley, when the latter accepted an early spring coaching assignment with the Chicago Bears of the National Football League. But in David Turner, not only did Croom get an experienced coach, he got an accomplished defensive line instructor with a Southeastern Conference coaching background.

Faced with rebuilding the interior of the defensive line which had three seniors depart prior to his arrival, Turner not only found capable starters to man those positions, he built depth to allow fresh troops to remain on the field as the season developed. Under Turner's tutelage, State reduced its rushing touchdowns allowed. And working with defensive end Titus Brown in his final year of eligibility with State, he helped the player break into the school's all-time top 10 sack leaders.

Turner joined the MState staff after one season at the University of Alabama. He coached the Crimson Tide defensive ends during his lone campaign in Tuscaloosa, and helped the Tide to a 6-6 regular-season record and a berth in the Independence Bowl in Shreveport, La. UA finished 23rd nationally in total defense in 2006.

A 22-year veteran of the collegiate coaching ranks, Turner joined the Alabama staff after four seasons at Vanderbilt where he was the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator. During his time with the Commodores, he coached all-SEC defensive end Jovan Haye, who tied for the league lead in sacks and was named Vandy's first all-league lineman in 10 years.

A native of Goldston, N.C., Turner has also worked in the Big Ten Conference at Minnesota (2001), where he worked with the defensive ends, and in the Atlantic Coast Conference at Virginia (1997-2000), where he was the defensive tackles and linebackers coach. He also served as a special teams co-coordinator during his final year with the Cavaliers.

He began his collegiate coaching career in 1986 as an assistant at his alma mater, Davidson College. He worked with the running backs, tight ends and then

outside linebackers over a two-year stretch.

In 1988, he moved to North Carolina State, serving two years as a defensive graduate assistant. He worked with a Wolfpack unit that ranked first in the ACC in total defense both seasons.

He spent one year as the defensive line coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, helping the team to a 12-2 overall record and Division II national championship. He also worked two seasons at James Madison, helping the Dukes to a 9-4 record and a berth in the 1991 Division I-AA playoffs.

Turner returned to the Division I ranks in 1993, serving two seasons as defensive ends coach at Kentucky. In 1995, he went back to N.C. State, coaching defensive ends and linebackers before joining the UVa staff in '97.

Turner worked as an intern for three National Football League teams – Detroit Lions (1992), Miami Dolphins (1997) and the Pittsburgh Steelers (1998) and he played professionally for one season in the Italian Football League.

A three-time varsity letterman as a running back, Turner earned a bachelor's degree in sociology from Davidson in 1985.

He is married to the former Yvette Modica and the couple has two daughters, Bianca and Alexyia.

## PAT WASHINGTON Wide Receivers

Joined MState:  
January 2007  
Auburn, 1987

**W**hen Pat Washington joined the Mississippi State football coaching staff in January 2007, one of the premier wide receiver instructors in the Southeastern Conference – and a coach with a connection to offensive coordinator Woody McCorvey -- was added to Sylvester Croom's staff.

With Washington at the helm of the receiving corps, MSU threw for more touchdowns than one year prior. Under his direction, Jamayel Smith improved his pass-catching numbers from 20 for 335 yards to 31 for 503 yards. Smith had 208 yards receiving against Arkansas in 2007, tying for the second-most yards receiving in a game by a Bulldog.

Washington, 43, may have come to MSU from Kansas State University of the Big 12 Conference, but it was in the SEC that he gained his reputation as an elite developer of wide receivers. In his lone season as wide receiver coach at KSU, he helped the Wildcats finish 7-5 overall and earn a post-season invitation to play Rutgers in the Texas Bowl at Houston. Along the way, K-State defeated conference opponents Oklahoma State and Texas, two foes who earned post-season bowl wins.

He oversaw a receiving corps that accounted for 2,601 yards in 2006, a total that was 63.5 percent of the Wildcat offense and the most receiving yards at the school in three years. He had four pass catchers with 23 or more receptions this past year.

Prior to his one season in Manhattan, Kan., Washington had an ultra-successful 11-year run as the receivers coach at the University of Tennessee, from 1995-2005. It was in Knoxville where he was widely credited with helping develop the Volunteers' traditionally strong passing game.

During his tenure with the Vols, Washington coached a string of celebrated pass catchers, including Donte' Stallworth, Cedrick Wilson, Peerless Price, Marcus Nash and Joey Kent. In all, Washington produced 11 National Football League draft picks, including first-team, all-SEC selections Kent and Nash. Those two, with Wilson and Price, are the top four names on UT's career receiving list.

He also helped coach Tennessee to 10 bowl berths during his 11 seasons,

three Florida Citrus Bowls, two Fiesta, Peach, and Cotton Bowls, and one Orange Bowl selection. UT's 1998 SEC Championship Game win over Mississippi State and 1999 Fiesta Bowl win over Florida State capped the Volunteers' undefeated, national championship season.

Prior to joining the staff at Tennessee, Washington served one season as running backs coach at Baylor University (1994), two years as quarterbacks and receivers coach at Texas Christian University (1992-93) and three seasons as receivers instructor at Louisiana-Lafayette (1989-91). He began his coaching career with two seasons as a graduate assistant at Auburn University.

He also helped those schools attain post-season bowl recognition. Washington was with Baylor at the 1994 Alamo Bowl and in back-to-back Sugar Bowls with Auburn (1988-89).

A native of Mobile, Ala., Washington graduated from Auburn in 1987 with a degree in management. He played quarterback for the Tigers from 1982-85, starting his junior and senior seasons and helping coach Pat Dye's teams to four-straight bowl games. Auburn played in the 1982 Tangerine Bowl, the '84 Sugar Bowl, the '84 Liberty Bowl, and the '86 Cotton Bowl. Playing in the same backfield with Heisman Trophy winner Bo Jackson, Washington guided AU to a 17-8 record as the school's starting QB.

Washington and his wife Claudette have two sons, Tyson and Justin.

Mississippi State has implemented the use of white helmets instead of maroon headgear during certain periods of its football history. Archives show that the white helmets were utilized exclusively by the team from 1951-62 and 1966-73. MSU also wore the white headgear in seven games during the 2000-2003 seasons before again switching permanently in 2004. State's record when wearing white helmets is 91-150-9 (.379).

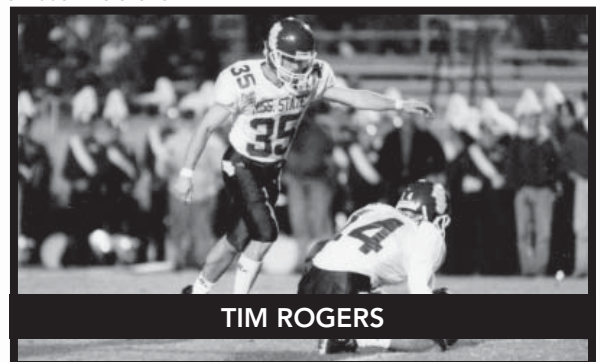

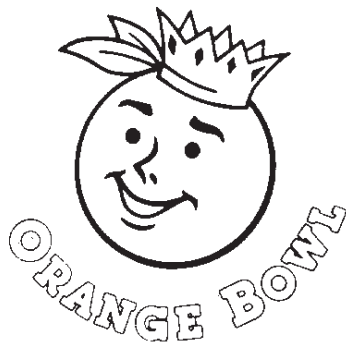

## Mississippi State 12 Duquesne 13

**January 1, 1937**  
**Orange Bowl**  
**Miami, Florida**

A desperation 72-yard touchdown pass from tailback Boyd Brumbaugh to end Ernie Hefferlie spelled an end to Mississippi State's upset hopes as Duquesne edged the Bulldogs 13-12 in the first decade of Orange Bowl history.

With time running out, coach John "Little Clipper" Smith's Dukes went to the air. His team had thrown six straight incompletions before Brumbaugh heaved one after fading back all the way to his own 20-yard line. Hefferlie cradled it in at the State 25 and scored untouched for the game-winner.

"A shouting, shirt-sleeved crowd of 9,210 went wild when Brumbaugh's bull's eye in the final period pulled the Dukes from almost certain defeat," a local newspaper account detailed.

Coach Ralph Sasse's Bulldogs, who ended the year at a hearty 7-3-1 after the postseason clash, scored first on a 10-yard run by back Ike Pickle. Pickle later boomed an 82-yard punt for an Orange Bowl record that still stands.

After Brumbaugh plunged 1 yard and a PAT kick put the Dukes of Pittsburgh, Pa., ahead 7-6, State reversed the advantage again when tailback Pee Wee Armstrong of Meridian lofted a 40-yard touchdown pass to Fred Walters of Laurel to give the Bulldogs a 12-7 lead. That same twosome had combined for a 65-yard scoring pass to give MSU a stunning 13-7 upset at Army during the 1935 season.

Armstrong's scintillating passes had provided State with the impetus to gain the lead. His aerial strikes set up Pickle's touchdown run prior to his throw to Walters to gain Mississippi State the lead.

Brumbaugh later found Hefferlie for the game-winning TD pass in the fourth quarter. The Dukes edged State after two Bulldog conversion tries had failed.

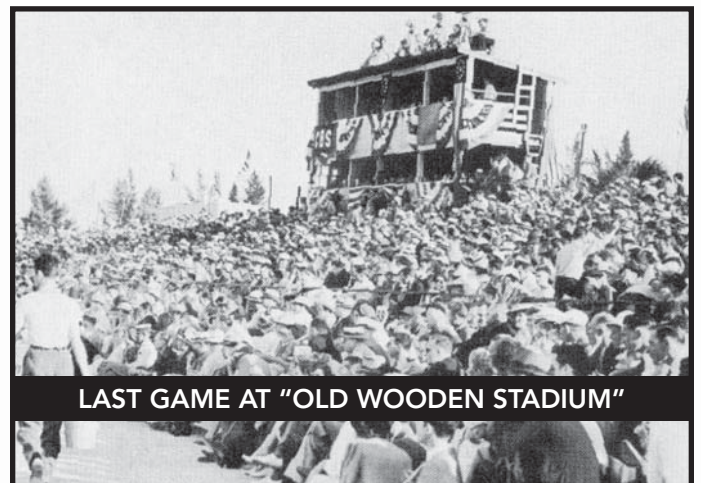
The narrow loss to Duquesne was a microcosm of the '36 season for State. The Maroons lost three games by a total of 20 points.

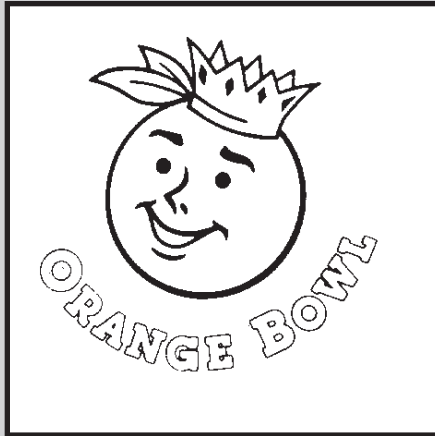

## Mississippi State 14 Georgetown 7

**January 1, 1941**  
**Orange Bowl**  
**Miami, Florida**

The Associated Press proclaimed following State's standout season: "Mississippi State reigns as undisputed king of football in the Deep South. State's 13-0 trouncing of Alabama and subsequent acceptance of an Orange Bowl bid eliminated any doubt that the Maroons were gridiron kings of these parts."

Almost a year before the United States of America officially entered World War II, Mississippi State downed the Georgetown Hoyas (who reigned strongly in Eastern football circles in those days) 14-7 in the '41 Orange Bowl to end the year with a 10-0-1 record and a No. 9 ranking nationally.

Coach Allyn McKeen's crew scored in the first quarter when tackle John Tripson covered a blocked Hoya punt in the end zone and Wilbur Dees' extra point gave the Bulldogs a quick 7-0 lead.

State's rugged defense took control in the second quarter after the Bulldogs had jumped ahead 14-0 when tailback Billy Jefferson scored on a 2-yard dive play and Sonny Bruce kicked the PAT.

Georgetown dented Coach McKeen's vaunted defense for the lone Hoyas' TD of the day in the third quarter when Benny Castiglia hit paydirt on a 2-yard run. But MSU managed good ball control behind the running of tailback Harvey Johnson and the defensive work of all-America end Buddy Elrod to secure its first bowl win.

State was led by Starkville native Hunter Corhern, a captain of the team and an outstanding guard. MSU was considered to have the finest line in the South during the '40 season, a group that boasted three all-Southeastern Conference performers, plus the aforementioned Elrod, a consensus all-America.

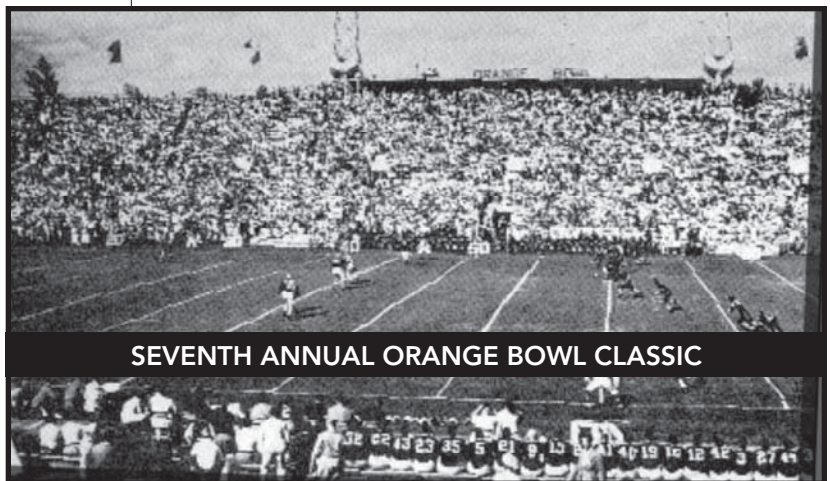
When asked to compare all his great teams at Mississippi State, head coach Allyn McKeen said, "Some of the school's greatest wins came during the 1939 season, but I have to go with the 1940 team as my best."

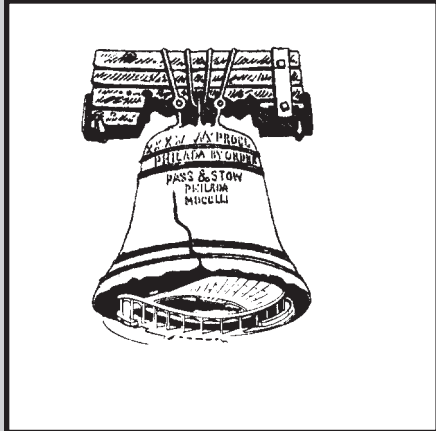

# Mississippi State 16 NC State 12

## December 21, 1963 Philadelphia Stadium Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

Hot coffee froze on press box ledges between kickoff and halftime, but the action on the field was warm enough to offset eight-degree temperatures and 17 mile-per-hour winds outside as coach Paul Davis' Bulldogs took a 16-12 win over the North Carolina State Wolfpack.

As the Bulldogs capped a 7-2-2 season before their first national television audience (on NBC, with the legendary Lindsey Nelson providing play-by-play) at Philadelphia Stadium, a blocked punt helped provide MSU's margin of victory for the second bowl game in a row.

In the first quarter, MSU end Bill McGuire blocked a Dave Houtz punt at the N.C. State 26, and fellow end Tommy Inman scooped up the loose football and ran it 11 yards for an MSU score. Justin Canale's PAT made it 7-0. Quarterback Sonny Fisher gave the Bulldogs a little more breathing room later in the period as the Laurel, Miss., resident sprinted 3 yards for a second touchdown. Canale's extra-point kick failed, but the future pro football standout later redeemed himself.

He gave MSU a 16-0 second-quarter lead with a 43-yard field goal into the gusty wind.

But North Carolina State made a bit of a comeback bid, aided by 122 yards on 11 penalties assessed against the aggressive Bulldogs. The Wolfpack scored the last two touchdowns of the game, but both two-point conversion attempts failed.

Coach Davis and his team had heaters on the State bench and a Plexiglas canopy to protect them from the frigid air.

"The defense did a good job all day, especially considering the conditions," Davis said. "We had a stronger line."

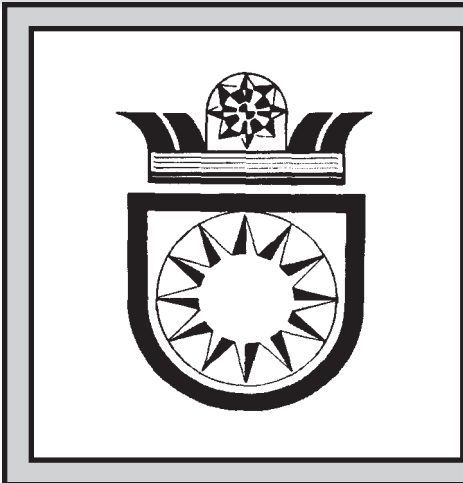

## Mississippi State 26 North Carolina 24

**December 28, 1974**  
**Sun Bowl**  
**El Paso, Texas**

Mississippi State's 26-24 Sun Bowl win over North Carolina was one of the truly great contests of the 1974-75 bowl season.

Coach Bob Tyler's Bulldogs, who finished 9-3 and 18th in the nation, set the stage for the game when Most Valuable Offensive Player Terry Vitrano took a handoff from quarterback Rocky Felker and sprinted 55 yards on the game's opening play.

While a rising fog blanketed the field during most of the first half, Vitrano gained big chunks of real estate to end the day with 164 yards on 20 carries, including a game-winning, two-yard touchdown run.

That run capped a 6:29 drive that ate most of the fourth-quarter clock, ending at the 3:41 mark. Three times MSU faced third downs on the drive and State faced a fourth-and-2 at the UNC 25-yard line, where Felker called his own number, clawing for 15 yards. Felker then ran eight more yards to set up Vitrano winning score.

The drive reminded both Tyler and Felker of the Bulldogs' 29-28 win over Memphis State earlier in the year, a game in which State drove 98 yards in the closing two minutes for the win.

All-America defensive tackle Jimmy Webb, named Most Valuable Defensive Player in the game, registered one of his most critical 12 tackles of the day on a fourth-and-short situation at midfield in the fourth quarter to preserve the MSU win.

MSU's all-SEC tailback Walter Packer piled up 183 yards on 24 attempts, scoring on runs of 1 and 16 yards while Vic Nickels kicked field goals of 24 and 32 yards.

Mississippi State's 455 yards of rushing, which still stand as a Sun Bowl record, were just a bit much for the Tar Heels, coached by MSU grad Bill Dooley.

"This team was better than we expected in a lot of ways," Tyler said. "I think we're a year ahead. We established unity in our program that usually takes two seasons to establish. I've never been more confident or enthusiastic about the future than I am right now."

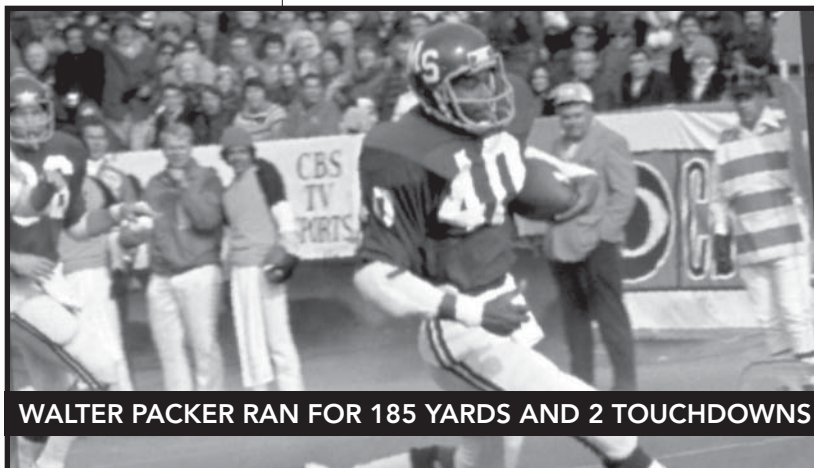

# Mississippi State 17 Nebraska 31

**December 27, 1980**  
**Sun Bowl**  
**El Paso, Texas**

The scene was the same as six years earlier in the Sun Bowl when Mississippi State engaged a team that had as much talent as any football power in the nation.

This bowl trip proved to be less successful, however, as coach Tom Osborne's Huskers prevailed in a 31-17 contest.

Mississippi State had won five consecutive regular-season games to enter the contest with a 9-2 record under coach Emory Bellard, but Nebraska was just a bit too deep and powerful as the Huskers took a 17-0 halftime lead.

State's high-powered offensive attack, which set school records for total offense and rushing offense, later cut the margin to 24-17 behind the option play of freshman quarterback John Bond of Valdosta, Ga. He ran for one touchdown on a 1-yard sneak and hit all-SEC tailback Michael Haddix of Walnut, Miss., for an 11-yard TD pass and MSU's final touchdown.

The day, however, belonged to Nebraska's defense, which held Bond to minus-8 yards rushing on 16 carries, and to seven completions in 19 attempts with two interceptions.

Sophomore kicking specialist Dana Moore from Baton Rouge, La., booted a 47-yard field goal and had a 64-yard punt, enabling him to achieve an MSU-record, 50-yard punting average for the afternoon.

"I am proud of our team and the season we had," Bellard said. "We just flat out gave Nebraska too many opportunities. Our defense played well enough to win. Looking at what we have, we will be back next year."

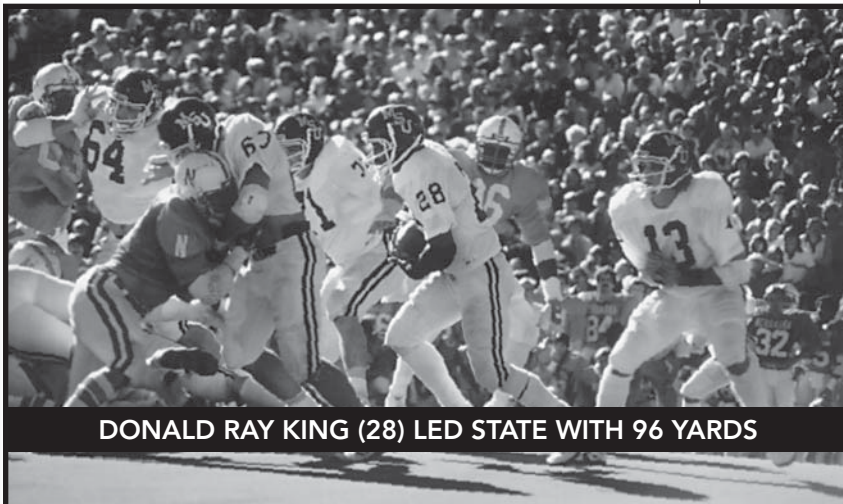

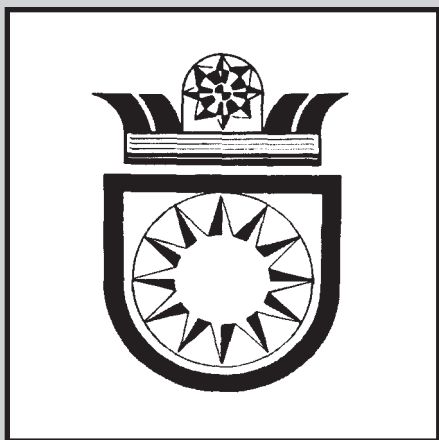

## Mississippi State 10 Kansas 0

**December 31, 1981**  
**Legion Field**  
**Birmingham, Alabama**

With Defensive Most Valuable Player and all-America linebacker Johnie Cooks of Leland, Miss., leading a fierce charge, Mississippi State scored its first bowl shutout win by downing the Kansas Jayhawks of the Big Eight Conference 10-0 to improve its bowl record to 4-2.

It was, indeed, a day for the defense.

The Bulldogs, aided by a steady mist that fell throughout the day, held Kansas to 35 yards rushing on 40 attempts, intercepted a pair of Jayhawk passes, and forced a fumble. State recorded its first shutout since 1979.

Lightning struck early for the Bulldogs as all-SEC defensive back Rob Fesmire of Nashville, Tenn., recovered a Ricky Green fumble on the opening kickoff and the opportunistic Bulldogs scored on the next play. Quarterback John Bond, State's Offensive Most Valuable Player and the game's MVP, sprinted 17 yards around right end on the first play from scrimmage and Bob Morgan's PAT gave the Bulldogs an early 7-0 lead.

Place-kicker Dana Moore iced the game with a 22-yard field goal with just over 11 minutes left in the first half for the final margin of victory. The Bulldogs advanced to 8-4 and moved up to 17th in the final AP national poll.

Moore also set a record, averaging 49.1 yards per punt on nine kicks.

Wingback Danny Knight of Natchez, Miss., contributed a big 37-yard sprint down the left sideline on a third-and-long situation while Cooks, defensive tackles Glen Collins, Earnest Barnes and a number of unsung heroes on the specialty teams gathered together to provide the Bulldogs with the ingredients necessary for a satisfying bowl win.

"The whole defensive unit played extremely well," MSU head coach Emory Bellard said. "We didn't ring the bell quite enough on offense, but we did move the ball down the field a good bit."

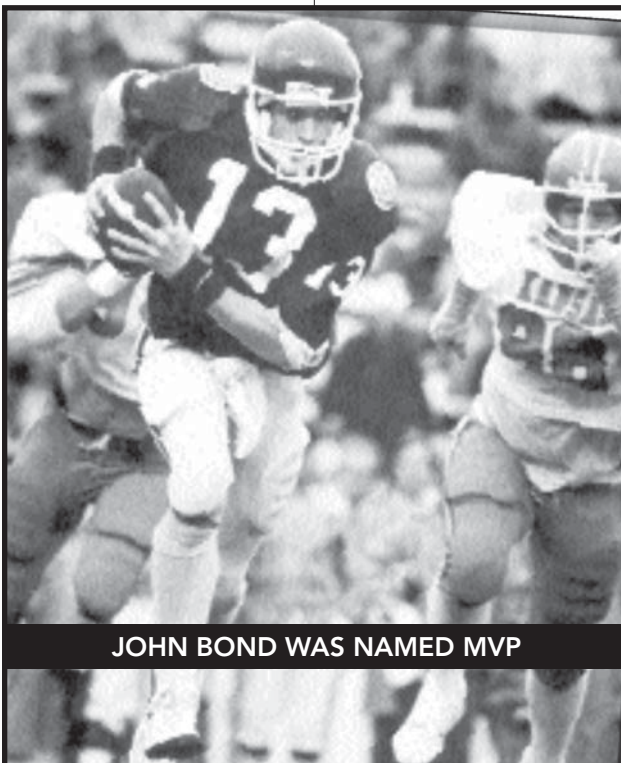

An all-time Liberty Bowl crowd of 61,497 looked on as the wishbone-attack of the Air Force Academy spoiled Mississippi State's return to the bowl scene with a 38-15 victory over the Bulldogs in the 33rd annual Liberty Bowl postseason contest.

Directed by all-WAC quarterback and Liberty Bowl MVP Rob Perez, the Falcons piled up 318 net yards rushing while attempting only two passes in this ESPN telecast. A potent ground attack earned AFA a 37:34-22:26 edge in possession time.

The Falcons jumped on MSU early as they posted three unanswered touchdowns before the Bulldogs dented the scoreboard just before halftime. AFA scored on a pair of 1-yard plunges by Jason Jones and Perez in the opening stanza. A 35-yard fumble return by Air Force's Shannon Yates at the 6:12 mark of the second quarter stretched the lead to 21-0.

The Bulldogs got on the scoreboard with the final score of the first half, a 4-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Sleepy Robinson to tight end Trenell Edwards.

After the intermission, AFA added a third-quarter, 20-yard field goal by Joe Wood and a 31-yard touchdown gallop by Scott Hufford to build the Falcons' insurmountable lead to 31-7 with 14:19 remaining in the contest.

Making its first bowl appearance in 10 years, MSU scored its final points on a 7-yard run by fullback Michael Davis with 7:23 left on the game clock.

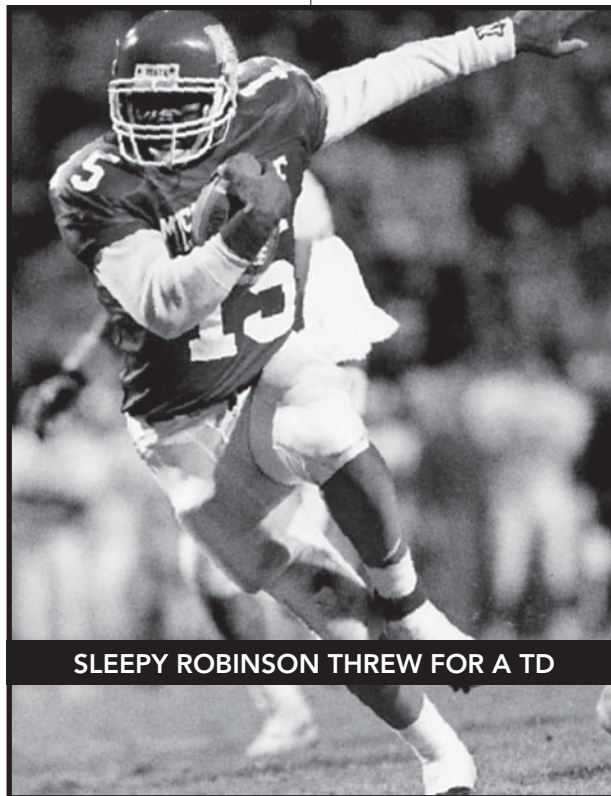

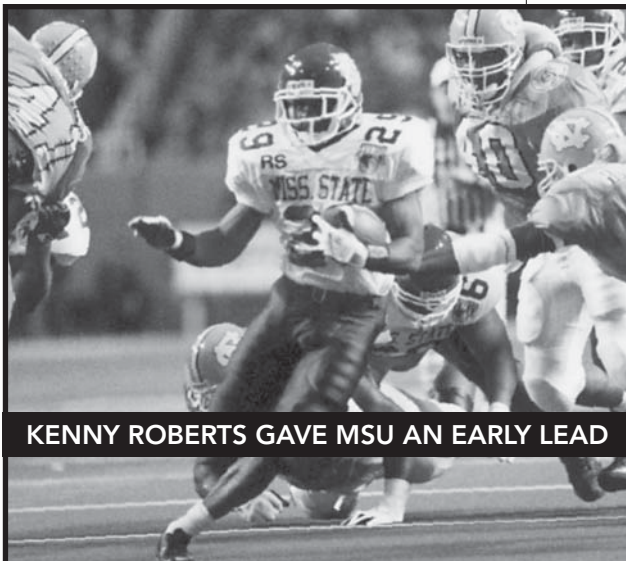
The Bulldogs jumped on top early, scoring on their first possession when Greg Plump found Olanda Truitt on a 2-yard touchdown pass. MSU added to that lead when Kenny Roberts raced 22 yards on the final play of the first quarter to give the Bulldogs a 14-0 lead.

State had a chance to put the game away in the second quarter, but a pair of Plump-to-Truitt touchdown passes were called back due to Bulldog holding penalties.

Trailing 14-0 at halftime, North Carolina took the second half kickoff and drove 82 yards to score on Natrone Means' 1-yard plunge. Later in the third period, the Tar Heels' Bracey Walker broke through to block a Todd Jordan punt and raced 24 yards into the end zone to tie the game at 14-14.

North Carolina took the lead for good early in the fourth quarter when UNC's Cliff Baskerville intercepted a Plump pass and returned it 44 yards for the go-ahead touchdown.

After Chris Gardner's 46-yard field goal made the score 21-17, the Bulldogs had their chances to win the game late. MSU drove inside the Tar Heel 30 twice in the game's final three minutes, but an interception and loss on downs, respectively, doomed the Bulldogs' final chances.

# 1995 PEACH BOWL



## Mississippi State 24 NC State 28

For the second time in three years, Mississippi State earned a berth in the Peach Bowl. And for the second time in three years, the Bulldogs held a third-quarter lead over its Atlantic Coast Conference counterpart. But again, State could not maintain that advantage, dropping a 28-24 decision to NC State.

Like it had done two years prior, Mississippi State gained an early advantage in this Peach Bowl match-up. Place-kicker Tim Rogers, MSU's Offensive Player of the Game, booted a 37-yard field goal just 2:21 into the contest, and the Bulldogs had a 3-0 advantage. It would be the first of a bowl-record and school-standard tying five field goals for Rogers.

But, as NC State was able to do throughout the game, the Wolfpack erased that early lead. Running back Tremayne Stephens capped an 80-yard drive with a 2-yard touchdown run to give NCSU a 7-3 lead.

Rogers and Steve Videtich traded field goals around the first-quarter break before the Bulldogs mounted a touchdown drive of their own. Senior running back Michael Davis scored from 11 yards out to give MSU a 13-10 edge.

A pair of big plays opened the door for the Bulldogs to take control of the game as the second half began. Forcing the 'Pack to punt on their first series of the second half, Andre Bennett blocked the NC State kick into the end zone for a safety, and MSU had a two-point lead.

On the ensuing free kick, Keffer McGee returned the punt a bowl-record 50 yards, putting the Bulldogs in business at the NCSU 15-yard line. Unable to advance the ball into the end zone, State settled for a Rogers field goal and its lead was just 18-13.

Three plays later, however, defensive tackle Larry Williams, State's Defensive Player of the Game, put his team back in scoring position with a standout defensive play. On a second-and-16 play from the NCSU 30, Williams sacked 'Pack quarterback Terry Harvey, stripped him of the football, and then recovered the pigskin at the 21.

But once again, the Bulldog attack was not able to capitalize, and Rogers was forced to convert a 36-yard field goal.

Rejuvenated by the disaster averted, NC State struck for a game-tying touchdown and two-point conversion at the close of the third period. Harvey hit Dallas Dickerson from 3 yards out for the score, and then ran for the extra points.

The Wolfpack used a big play of their own, a 62-yard pass play to set up their go-ahead score. Freshman fullback Carlos King bulled in from 11 yards away and State was down 28-21.

The Bulldogs narrowed the deficit with just under five minutes remaining in the game, but excellent field position again resulted in three points instead of six.

Playing in their first traditional New Year's Day bowl game since the 1941 Orange Bowl, the Bulldogs faced an enormous task in trying to stop the University of Texas and its Heisman Trophy winner Ricky Williams. Behind Williams' Cotton Bowl record 203 yards rushing and two touchdowns, the Longhorns snapped their seven-game losing slide to Jackie Sherrill and defeated Mississippi State 38-11 in the Southwestern Bell Cotton Bowl Classic.

Texas struck early in the contest behind the arm of quarterback Major Applewhite. The freshman found Wayne McGarity late in the opening period on a 59-yard scoring strike, giving Texas an early 7-0 lead.

The Longhorns took advantage of good field position and a long pass play to take a 14-0 lead, as Applewhite again called McGarity's number for a 52-yard touchdown with 5:11 to go in the first half.

Mississippi State would close out the scoring in the half with a 39-yard field goal from senior Brian Hazelwood.

After showcasing their passing game in the first half, Texas began to exploit a tired Bulldog defense with a running game that featured the NCAA's career rushing leader in Williams, who got the scoring started in the second half with a 37-yard gallop to stretch the Longhorns' lead to 21-3 just 2:26 into the second half. A Kris Stockton field goal would extend the UT lead to 24-3 six minutes later.

The Bulldog offense, led by James Johnson's 112 yards on the ground, still struggled to find its niche against a stubborn Texas defense. An injury to star all-purpose receiver Kevin Prentiss in the opening half made their task even more difficult. Unable to keep the weary MSU defense off the field, the Bulldogs were victimized by another Williams' scoring run at the 2:42 mark of the third period as Texas grabbed control of the contest with a 31-3 advantage.

# Mississippi State 17 Clemson 7

Behind the impetus that had been the key all season — defense — Mississippi State downed Clemson 17-7 in the 1999 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl in Atlanta's Georgia Dome.

The win gave State its 10th victory of the season, grouping the '99 Bulldogs with MSU's '40 edition which also posted 10 victories.

MSU notched the win despite allowing the most yardage it had all season (391), with 301 of that coming from quarterback Brandon Streeter who passed 50 times in the game.

Defense was the norm in the first half for both squads as the teams played to a scoreless tie at halftime. The closest either team got to a score in the first half was when Clemson advanced to State's 9-yard line late in the first quarter. But Tiger Tony Lazzara's field goal attempt was blocked by Bulldog senior Robert Bean, who registered his seventh career blocked kick.

State wasted little time breaking the scoring ice in the second half. After Pig Prather returned the opening kickoff after intermission 45 yards to the MSU 47-yard line, the Bulldogs drove 31 yards on seven plays to set up a 39-yard field goal from Scott Westerfield at the 12:39 mark.

Three possessions later, Clemson threatened to answer, driving to the State 13 where it faced a fourth-and-7. The Tigers elected to go for it, but the MSU defense held firm, with defensive lineman John Hilliard batting down a Streeter pass.

The quarter would end with State leading 3-0. The fourth quarter would be quite a different story in terms of point production, as the teams combined for three touchdowns in the final frame.

State extended its lead to 10-0 on the first full drive of the final period, going 43 yards on 10 plays with quarterback Wayne Madkin scrambling for a 2-yard score. The drive was set up at Clemson's 43-yard line on an interception by Bulldog Eugene Clinton, one of five State pickoffs in the contest.

Clemson would answer on the ensuing possession with its only score of the night. The Tigers drove 70 yards on eight plays with Streeter diving in from a yard out.

But State was not intimidated. The Bulldogs answered that challenge with a solid eight-play, 57-yard charge of their own. Madkin, the game's Most Valuable Offensive Player, found tailback Dontae Walker on the left side and Walker jaunted 15 yards for the touchdown which iced the game for MSU at 17-7 with 4:31 remaining in regulation.

# Mississippi State 43 Texas A&M [OT] 41

Willie Blade blocked an extra point, Julius Griffith ran it to the end zone for a two-point conversion, and Wayne Madkin scored from 6 yards out — all in overtime — to give Mississippi State a hard-fought, 43-41 decision over Texas A&M in the snow-filled Independence Bowl.

The Aggies took advantage of a couple of early MSU miscues on the snow-covered field to take a 14-0 edge seven minutes into the game. After scoring following a mishandled MSU snap just over two minutes into the contest, A&M continued to control momentum on fullback Ja'Mar Toombs' 4-yard plunge. Toombs had a game-high 193 yards.

Jackie Sherrill's Bulldogs fought back in the second quarter. With Toombs running through the State defense, Dontae Walker returned the favor to the Aggie stoppers, tallying 143 yards of his own. The sophomore took a handoff up the middle and scurried for 40 of those yards over the snow-covered goal line to cut the lead to 14-7.

With just over a minute until halftime, State got possession back and scored behind Wayne Madkin. After the junior quarterback rushed for 10 yards, he connected on two pass plays, the second a four-yard score to Dizenzo Miller to tie the game at 14.

A&M bounced back with 31 seconds left in the half to take a 20-14 lead into the locker room. Quarterback Mark Farris lofted a ball high and deep into the heavy falling snow, finding Robert Ferguson on a 42-yard score.

The Aggies tried to put the game out of reach with two fourth-quarter touchdowns. On the opening play of the period, Farris once again went deep, this time connecting with Bethel Johnson on a 35-yard strike. A two-point conversion put the Aggies up 28-21. Toombs extended the lead on the following possession, rushing in from 13 yards to give A&M a 35-21 edge.

Walker cut the lead back to seven as he rushed in from 32 yards out, and, after a Marco Minor interception put MSU at the Aggie 4-yard line, Madkin found tight end Donald Lee in the end zone for the touchdown that sent the game into overtime, tied 35-35.

In the extra session, Toombs rushed in from 25 yards out on the first play to put A&M up 41-35. Blade reached up and blocked the Aggie extra point try. Eugene Clinton picked up the loose ball and pitched to Griffith who ran it in for two points.

Faced with a must-score situation on State's first overtime try, Madkin rushed down to the Aggies' 6-yard line and then took a keeper into the end zone to clinch the 43-41 win in what has become known as "Snow Bowl 2000".

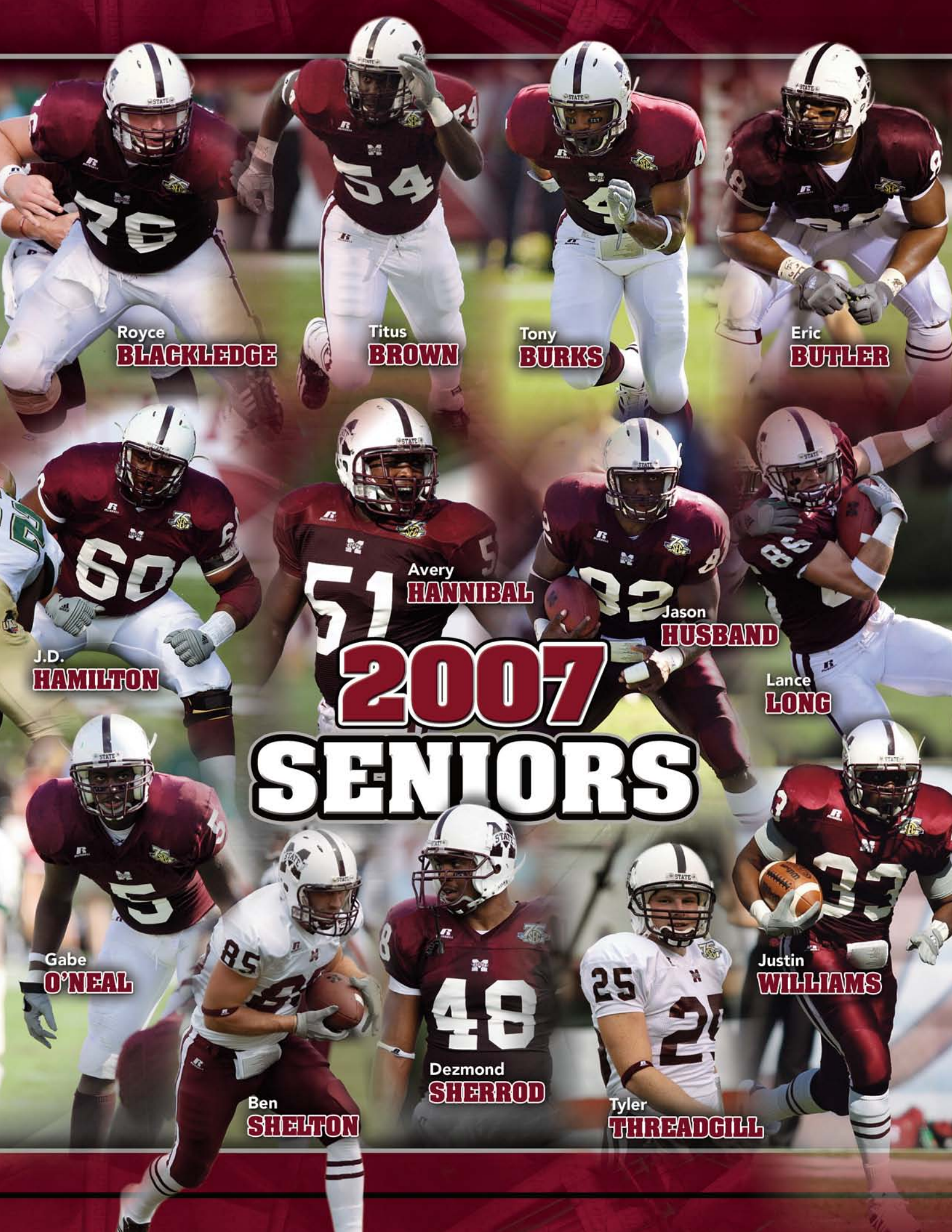
