Dr. A. James "Jim" Kerley became the fifth president of Gulf Coast Community College on June 1, 2007.

Dr. Kerley holds a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) degree in Educational Administration and Supervision of Higher Education from Florida State University; a Master of Arts in Teaching in History from The Citadel; and a Bachelor of Science in Social Sciences/History/Secondary Education from Tennessee Tech University.

Dr. Kerley has 25 years of community college experience, with 18 of those years as a community college president. Since 1998, Dr. Kerley has served as president of what is now Bluegrass Community and Technical College in Lexington, Kentucky. From 1989 to 1998, he was president of Hopkinsville Community College in Kentucky. From 1986 to 1989, Dr. Kerley served as academic dean at Madisonville Community College. From 1983 to 1986, he served as chair and professor of undergraduate teacher education program at Union College in Barbourville, Kentucky.
